Religious Education

at Bunbury Catholic College

At Bunbury Catholic College education in the Catholic beliefs, values and practices takes place in all aspects of College life.

1. Religious Education: This is a course like any other course that you will study. Therefore, the expectations for students participating in Religious Education classes is the same as for all subject classes – a determination to learn and succeed, positive attitudes and behaviour choices, and respect for everyone who is part of the class.

In Religious Education the focus is on understanding what it means to be you in your community and in your religion. There will be assignments and, at the end of the Semesters, a grade is awarded.

2. Campus Ministry: This refers to the experiential aspect of Religious Education. Masses, liturgies, prayer events and retreats are organised in each year group or as whole school events. The focus is on spiritual experience. Students are invited to contribute to these events by sharing their talents in events management, in reading, singing, playing music, or in the creative construction of sacred space. Through participating in **Christian Service** students learn what is meant by the Gospel call to be of service to others. Campus ministry co-ordinates service opportunities that enable the students to respond to the needs of others, be good stewards of the environment and develop community.

3. Finally, Bunbury Catholic students are asked to choose behaviour that is based in Catholic values. The College motto, **“To act justly, to love tenderly and to walk humbly with your God”**. (Micah 6:8) points towards the Pastoral Care Programme (Choose Peer Respect) that is committed to the promotion of the dignity and respect of the person.

The Peer Support Program

Moving from primary into secondary school can present significant and often pivotal change for students. Leaving the familiar and comparatively smaller primary school for a larger secondary school such as Bunbury Catholic College can be both exciting and a challenge for many students to negotiate successfully.

Experts agree that a good transition to secondary school can have a positive impact on a student - socially, emotionally and academically. Peer Support Australia advocates a peer-led approach to developing relationships and building connections. This program has been implemented successfully at the College for the past five years.

Our senior students are taking on an active role in the transitioning of the Year 7 students into secondary school and they promote a welcoming and supportive school environment. Through the activities in the framework, Peer Support Leaders assist students in getting to know one another while addressing common concerns about starting secondary school. This may normalise anxious feelings and assist students in feeling accepted by their peers and the new school community. The program also assists students in developing practical skills to enhance social and emotional wellbeing.

During Term 1, students in Year 7 work in groups of 8-10 with two Peer Support Leaders. The Peer Support Leaders facilitate a series of activities with the Year 7 students covering a range of skills and concepts - focussing on resilience. They will have eight sessions which will be run during the extended homeroom periods. The activities are designed to assist students in becoming familiar and confident with their school, teachers and new routines. Students also learn how to manage school life and organise themselves.

On top of these sessions held during the term, the Peer Support Leaders will assist the Year 7 students on their first day at Bunbury Catholic College and on their Retreat and Activity Days. They will also man a Peer Support booth to assist Year 7 students at the Athletics Carnival held towards the end of Term 1.


Bus services run from most areas directly to the College.



Frequently Asked Questions

General Administration

Q I need to contact my child during the school day. Can I send them a text?

A All parents are urged not to contact students or make arrangements to leave messages at a certain time, or ask students to call home, at any time during school hours. This leads to students having to contravene the ICT Policy, which has real implications for all students.

As is standard practice, it is preferable that all communication from, and to students, is through the College Administration. For their own safety, a student who is unwell should report to the College Nurse in the Wellness Centre, instead of texting this information to parents. The College asks that parents do not respond to texts from their child, if this is at all possible, but instead parents are encouraged to contact the Administration, if there is a concern.

Q I need to collect my child during school hours. What is the procedure?

A When a student is to be collected from school during the school day, a note must be given to the student from a parent/guardian to present to the relevant classroom teacher. The student must meet the parent/guardian at Administration – Student Services. The student must be signed out by a parent/guardian.

My child is going to be absent from school. Do I need to let anyone know?

When a student is absent from school, it is required that on the day of the absence, a parent contacts the College before 9.30am. A medical certificate is required if a student is absent for a period of more than three days. On their return to school, students are to provide a written note, signed by their parent/guardian, explaining their absence.

When do we receive information about the student's computers?

There will be a Computer Rollout Parent Information session in the first two weeks of Term 1, where parents will receive information regarding the devices. There is also a permission form that will need to be signed before the students are provided with a machine. This document will be sent electronically during February.

What is SEQTA?

SEQTA is a Learning Management System. The SEQTA Suite is an all-in-one teaching and learning ecosystem that enables teachers, students and parents to work together in an interactive, supportive online community. All student course programs, assessment outlines, resources are located in SEQTA. In addition, communication occurs to and from school via SEQTA: Direct Message.

Where can I find copies of the policies to be followed by College students?

Pastoral Care and Health

Q *How can my child access a counsellor at the College?*

A There is a form for your child to fill in at the Wellness Centre, near Administration, to request an appointment with a counsellor for the first time. Otherwise, a Homeroom Teacher, Head of Year or Class Teacher can send your child in the right direction if there is an issue. Students may also send a direct message to the College Counsellor.

Q *Does BCC have a nurse on site?*

A Yes we have a full time College Nurse in the Wellness Centre near Administration. If your child is sick during the school day, they are to visit the nurse who will make contact with home. Students are not to call home please.

Q *Will my child receive any vaccinations at school?*

A All Year 7 students will be offered participation in the WA school-based immunisation program in 2022. A consent form will be sent to parents and must be returned by the specified date. Please contact the College on 9721 0000 if you have further questions.

Q *Do I notify the school if there is a change to my child's health status?*

A Yes, please notify the College Nurse if your child's wellbeing differs/alters in any way whilst they are at Bunbury Catholic College. This includes the commencement of medication.

Q *If my child has an EpiPen, what do I need to do?*

A You will need to provide a current action plan from your GP and an EpiPen (x1) which will be stored in the Wellness Centre. If the student attends any activity off campus, their action plan and EpiPen will be given to the supervising staff member attending the activity.

Can I take the EpiPen home during the school holidays?

A

Absolutely...please remember to bring it back when school recommences.

Q

If my child takes medication prior to commencing the school day and they forget to have it, what can I do?

A

The College Nurse encourages parents to supply a small amount (no more than three tablets) for such occasions.

Medications are stored in a locked draw and are only accessed by the College Nurse. Parent/Guardians will need to contact the College prior to the administration of the 'missed' medication, by either phone, email or SEQTA: Direct Message.

Academic

Q Does my child have to take a language in Year 7 and Year 8?


A Languages is a core subject in Year 7 and Year 8, hence a language is learnt for a minimum of two years and it is not possible to change languages once the selection has been made. Two languages are offered at Bunbury Catholic College: Italian and Indonesian. It is extremely important that the student is involved in the decision process when selecting the language to study. An equal number of places are allocated for Italian and Indonesian; hence, it is not very easy to move from one language to another once the selection is made.

Q Will my child need to do any assessments in their language class?

A Yes, language courses attract a number of assessments: speaking, writing and listening. Constant revision is required in order to build the vocabulary and familiarise with new grammar structures.

Q What does my child need for their Science classes?

A In Science, your child will need two important learning resources,
(1) a **Pearson Science 7 (2nd Ed)** textbook and
(2) a paid annual subscription for **Education Perfect Science**.
Both of these appear on the booklist as essential items for Science.

What is Education Perfect Science?

Education Perfect Science is an online learning and assessment tool that will be used extensively as part of the Science teaching program. It enables students to make use of their computer devices to engage with interactive learning modules, participate in learning at their own pace, both in school and at home, to test their science knowledge and receive immediate feedback, and to participate in some within-class and national Science competitions.

Are the Year 7 classes streamed in Mathematics?

Mathematics at Bunbury Catholic College is streamed in the second semester of Year 7. This means that Mathematics teachers will collect a lot of data in the first two terms of 2022 in order to decide the best place for each student commencing in Term 3. We endeavour to meet the needs of each student in their Mathematics class, therefore movement can happen at any point of the year following Semester 1.

Will I see all my child's Mathematics assessments?

Some of the assessments in Year 7 Mathematics do not leave the classroom and all students are encouraged to review these tasks in the room with their teacher and peers.

How can I help my child succeed in Mathematics?

Mathematics, as one of the core subjects, is likely to be taught with greater frequency and time each week than students coming from primary school are accustomed to. This can mean that greater content is covered and this can be a challenge for students. It is important that students develop a strict study routine early in Year 7 to ensure that they do not fall behind in the completion of homework, study, assessments and assessment preparation.

Mathematics tutorials are held at Bunbury Catholic College every Monday and Thursday afternoon from 3:00pm to 4:00pm. Students of all ability levels are encouraged to attend.

Mathematics is a fun and exciting, yet challenging, subject. Students are provided the opportunity to thrive and enjoy this learning area. Therefore, it is important that the attitudes towards Mathematics that they are exposed to, in and out of school, are positive, allowing all students to connect with Mathematics and generate an opinion of their own.





Academic Support

Q As recommended by my child's Primary School Teacher, I would like my child to attend Literacy Support class, instead of learning a Language. Is this a possibility, and how does this happen?

A There are limited places available in Literacy Support Classes; therefore, a set identification process is followed. A staff member from the Learning Support Centre will make contact with you in week 4 or 5 of Term 1. If a place is offered to enter the program, your child will be withdrawn from Languages to attend. We look at diagnostic testing results, primary school recommendations, and Year 7 progress to date to determine placements. If your child has a diagnosed or imputed learning disability or difficulty, they will still undergo this same selection process.

Q My child has a diagnosed learning disability. Who do I see to discuss this?

A Most of this information concerning learning issues is requested and is to be exchanged during the enrolment process. However, if there is a new or recent diagnosis occurring after the enrolment process, it is requested the parent or guardian provide this diagnosis to the College. A staff member from the Learning Centre will then be in contact to discuss the issue with you.

Electives

Q What Year 7 electives are offered at Bunbury Catholic College?

A All Year 7 students at Bunbury Catholic College have the opportunity to complete **eight electives** over the year. Electives are varied, fun, engaging and provide practical, hands on 'Taster Courses' of the Arts and Technologies Learning Areas. Students will be placed into mixed groups and will complete **two different electives** each term.

Q What Arts learning area courses in Year 7?

A Drama, Dance, Music and Visual Arts.

Q What are the Technologies learning area courses in Year 7?

A Food Technology, Metal Technology, Wood Technology and Robotics.

Q Do I get changed for Dance?

A Yes, you need to wear your Physical Education uniform so you can move comfortably. You will change from your school uniform in the PE change rooms. You may not come to school in your PE uniform if you have Dance in period 1 of that day but may go home in PE uniform if you have Dance in period 6.

Q How does my child order their lunch?

A Lunch orders are made before homeroom where possible. If ordering at recess, go to the table marked "Lunch Orders".

Fill in a paper bag with your name, homeroom, the food item and price. You are then to join the queue at the checkout, to make your payment and hand in your paper bag order form.


Secondhand Books
