ACTING PRINCIPAL'S REPORT, 1987

My Lord Bishop, ladies and gentlemen. It is my privilege this evening to present to you the Bunbury Catholic College Report for 1987, in the absence of Mr. Val Murphy who, as you know, is currently enjoying well deserved study leave in Ireland. I feel that the year can be encapsulated in three words: CHANGE, CHALLENGE and COMMUNITY.

As you are all aware, we are living through a time which many people claim involves unprecedented change, change that is complex, extensive, real and unrelenting. Yet it is a reality which each one of us has to live with in an informed, creative and Christian manner. We, as an educational community, have to face the challenges presented by this reality and provide our students with a curriculum and educational experience which will hopefully prepare them to deal with the challenges both of today and beyond the year 2000. If our students are to be adequately prepared, it is essential that we try to synthesize their faith development into their life experience and to create a climate where their faith is synthesized into the culture in which we live. This, obviously, is not a simple task. Our culture is complex. The life experience of our young people in no way resembles the presumed Utopia of vestervear, but I feel the staff of Bunbury Catholic College have provided very genuine and thoughtful educational programmes and experiences which will assist our students to move confidently towards the ideals of the pursuit of excellence, critical reflection and lived Christlike relationships.

Our curriculum has undergone many fundamental changes in 1987 has been the final step in the journey towards implementing the recommendations of the Beazley Report. In order to provide a curriculum of breadth, depth, balance and continuity, whilst providing for flexibility of choice which can accommodate the ability and interests of the individual student, implementation of the Unit Curriculum was recommended for lower school. We at B.C.C. will have curriculum unitized in 1988.

The preparation for this final change has been led by Mr. Les Fabre. I wish to acknowledge his efficient, enthusiastic and professional leadership in the process of changes to our curriculum. He has been effectively supported by the Heads of Subject Departments and the staff, hence the process of change has proved to be stimulating and exciting for the whole school community. Many extra hours of work have been involved in the unitization process, and we as a College are fortunate to have a competent, professional staff who are prepared to tackle the challenges of the educative process in a manner which is educationally sound; at the same time maintaining creativity and vision.

The Religious Education Programmes of our College continues to be competently co-ordinated by Sr. Cabrini. The Catholic faith life of the College is greatly enhanced by the presence of Father Leon and Father Tony. Sometimes we are guilty of taking this support for granted, but our Religious Education Programme would be very much poorer without the presence of our clergy. Our students feel welcome at the Parish House and have a very positive experience of Church, it's liturgical and sacramental life and of the Parish community. Our Year 11 students were privileged with the presence of Bishop Quinn for most of their retreat. This I feel could be guite a unique experience for any student in Australia and we thank you Bishop for your presence. However, I wish to emphasise that the most important aspects of religious education takes place in the home, and I encourage you the parents to provide the example of a living Faith for your sons and daughters.

In August of this year the face of the College campus changed with the completion of the Bunbury Catholic College Hall. Although we are very proud of the facility I think, more importantly, it provides a focus for one of the fundamental aspirations of our College, the development of a personal relationship with Christ through the experience of community. The B.C.C. Hall has been well used by the school, the Parish and community groups and I trust that it will continue to be a venue where the God given talents of all members of our community can be further developed. The school production of 'Esther' so ably co-ordinated by Mrs. Turner, not only provided us

with enjoyable and challenging entertainment but brought together the diverse talents of our staff, our students and our parents. Congratulations to all who were involved. I thank the Bunbury Catholic College Board for their vision in the planning of this facility, the community who have supported the project financially and Mr. Brian Delf who has designed a hall which is aesthetically pleasing whilst catering more than adequately for it's diverse use.

Parental involvement at B.C.C. during 1987 has been extensive in areas as diverse as coaching our many sporting teams, preparing lunches for our students, Art Extraordinaire, providing improved facilities, the formation of a committee to monitor our journey towards Unit Curriculum, organising various social occasions, most importantly, however, providing support, interest and encouragement for our students.

The Parents' and Friends' Association continue to be a dynamic group who actively support our College and I thank you for your contribution to our community.

At the end of the year the staff of our College will be changed by the departure of Mrs. May, Mr. Brown, Mrs. Mathews, Mrs. Payne, Mr. Coote, Miss Lamont-Smith and Ms. Harding. I thank each one of you for the very special giftedness you have brought to the College during your time with us and I wish

you happiness in the various avenues you have chosen to pursue.

To the Bunbury Catholic College Board I express my gratitude for your vision and generosity and I compliment you on your ability to face the issues involved with the development of Catholic Education so efficiently and effectively.

Our Year 12 graduating class of 1987 I present to you as a talented and hard working group of young adults, who have shown a fine example and sound leadership throughout the year. I feel confident that they will be able to take their place in society with dignity. I wish each one of your fulfilment in your life's journey and pray that you will always have the courage to deal with the challenges that you will face, in the light of the Gospels.

Finally, I would like to extend a personal thankyou to the staff and members of the community who have been so supportive and patient during my time as Acting Principal. Thanks must also go to the students who have responded to the challenges placed before them during the year — whether academic, sporting, social, spiritual or cultural. In concluding this report I would like to reiterate the theme of our Mass of Thanksgiving that "The Lord has indeed worked marvels for us during 1987".

I greet the whole College community on the eve of I delight in my contact with the College — "Parish



JOURNEY TOWARDS UNIT CURRICULUM

Over the past two years the staff and students have been considering a new structure of education called the Unit Curriculum. The concept was recommended in the Beazley Report 1984, commissioned by the Western Australian Government. It will operate in Years 9 and 10 in 1988 at Bunbury Catholic College.

The new Unit structure has divided the total curriculum into seven components, namely English, Mathematics, Practical and Creative, Physical Education, Science and Technology, Social Studies and Vocation Education. Each student will choose twelve units of study drawn from these seven categories. Each student is required to choose a minimum of one and a maximum of three units from each component of study. All students will study Religious Education.

Each unit will be conducted for three periods per cycle for one semester (two terms). This new structure will allow students to more readily pursue their particular talents and interests in their study careers at Bunbury Catholic College.

Students have been counselled by their subject and homeroom teachers in making suitable choices of units according to each ones capabilities and interests. The units attempted by a student in subsequent semesters will be determined by the level of achievement gained at the current level of study.

When a student completes his/her studies at the College in Year 10 a school certificate will be issued indicating the units of study undertaken and the level of achievement gained.


In addition to the work and information circulated within the school community, a Unit Curriculum

We started our day off with an early morning mass at St. Mary's Chapel. Everybody took part in the mass in a very special way, showing everybody what 'real'


talents we had.


I was going to try and write this story without mentioning Mr. Taylor's nose meeting Jamie's head quite suddenly during a 'harmless' game of softball — but I didn't!






PUBLIC SPEAKING


The Restaurant Night






INDEPENDENT SUBJECT EXPO '87


This year's display of specific subject areas was intended to provide students and parents of some insight into UNITS of STUDY, able to be undertaken in 1988.







Well, the B.C.C. swimming calendar for 1987 was not as jam-packed as in recent years but still as successful.






These were just a few of the statements made by the media about our C.I.G. footy team.

All the girls would like to thank Mr. John. Rhonda and Lyn for their time and dedication.



YEAR 11 PHYSICAL EDUCATION STUDIES


