



## MISS McDONAGH GOES TO ISRAEL







Miss McDonagh, has been instrumental in guiding many students, over the years, both on a personal and academic level.


We hope she returns, safely to B.C.C., full of new ideas, which will prove valuable to her students.





On the second Friday of



## **RELIGIOUS EDUCATION**

Teaching the young child is both difficult and rewarding, since the progress made is both visible and exciting. New ideas are absorbed and practised, while wonder and awe are never too far away. But the teachers of Religious Education in the Secondary School have an equally difficult task with only an occasional realization of the overall effectiveness for the students. This is not surprising, as they are dealing with the doubts, the fears, the emotions, the values and the way of life of their students.

Long gone are the days of question and answer catechetics. In its place are the discussions, the questions, the expressed doubts, the clarification of values, the presentation of somewhat unpopular doctrines or Church teachings, and the participation in ceremonies and celebrations which in most cases are no longer part of their family lifestyle. Often the Religious Education teacher is placed in the position of Defender of the Faith which is both disconcerting and demanding.


Through participation in the Faith in Action programme Camps and Activity Days, opportunities are provided to practise, in a supportive atmosphere, the principles learned in class. Love for their neighbour and concern for those in need are fostered by their being invited to take part in - Red Cross Appeal, Project Compassion, Red Shield Doorknock, Walk Against Want, Freedom from Hunger, Fast for Faith and Appeals for Emergency Help.

As an ongoing reminder of their responsibilities towards those in greater need, there is the daily contribution and weekly collection of "Mission Money" from each classroom. This is then totalled and banked with the Diocesan

Development Fund. So far our students have raised \$1600 of which \$400 went to Project Compassion

\$200 to the Sudan \$200 to the Bangladesh

A highlight in the R.E. programme for each class is the time spent at the Parish House from 7.00a.m. to 10.45a.m. on one day in the year. This feature is unique to Bunbury. Its strength lies in that it provides an opportunity for the student to become more acquainted with the Priests of the Parish, receive two Sacraments, join in prayer and celebrate Mass together as a class.



Our total programme from Years 8-12 embodies the doctrinal, the spiritual, the experiential, the Sacramented and the personal. Thus by keeping close to the Religious Guidelines presented by the Catholic Education Office and by structuring our modules on its principles the R.E. team is confident that good, sound religious principles are being inculcated. However no programme dealing with the spiritual can stand on its own. In this area more than any other we can only extend and support what is being taught and practised at home. On an academic level good principles can be

learned but will bear fruit only when practised. Parents and home-life are generally the strongest influence in a child's life. So by enriching home-life and strengthening family principles, the student can be enabled to benefit greatly from the R.E. taught at the College.




# .....AND FROM ONE OF OUR YEAR EIGHTS




This year, opportunity has been provided for Year Eleven students to accept challenges and to test the boundaries of their own abilities.

## THEATRE ARTS


In Year 11 Theatre Arts we have learnt about all types of drama.

Vocation Education is a reconstructed unit this year with Year 9 & 10 students all being required to complete this unit of The emphasis is on the work. development of the whole student not just personal development or work related knowledge. The skills presented are very transferrable skills and a broader view is taken on a whole of life programme of paid and unpaid work possibilities.

Comunity involvement is essential to the satisfactory completion of the objectives of the unit and so students have spent a number of periods out in the work force Job Shadowing. During this time students actually shadow a person and record the tasks they carry out and the interaction with other work mates. When at a later time they select an area for work experience they will have a first hand experience to draw upon to make an informed decision.

All employers who have offered their services for this programme are now on computer so next year the work experience placement task will be streamlined. This year I am thankful for the very enthusiastic and competent assistance of ex students Susan Musitano and Greta Hanley.

Next, we trotted off to the museum. This was great, because we were set loose, in groups with our mates (minus






## TIME OUT!


The performance was a great success from both participants and spectators point of view. Students were also exposed to the dances in Theatre Arts Classes and Physical Education (Ethnic Dance).


Overall, all students and staff involved in the program have now a greater awareness and appreciation of the Aboriginal cultures.







The final result should be an exciting enhancement to library resource facilities which will definitely meet the present, and future needs of our school.



Day 5 saw the good bowling continue as we dismissed Sale School for 94. Don Shine bagged 5 wickets.



Sacred Heart won the carnival, and Mark Steele and Steven George were selected in the "Australian Marist XI"


Altogether the tour was a successful and enjoyable one.

What a year BCC has had in the local competition! We fielded a side in the finals of every Junior Boys' grade and our illustrious girls team also won through to the Grand Final of their division





goalie Warren Drew in his pads and sent the team into the grand final, which we duely won.





The season extended from late March until early August. Fourteen College teams participated in the Bunbury Netball Associations' Saturday afternoon competition.


Teams were coached by teachers, senior students, community members and parents. (Even our Principal and two other male staff members - which was marvellous for our players).





JUSTIN DREW: A young windsurfer who has improved incredibly over the last few seasons despite having an expensive board stolen.


