## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

My Lord Bishop, members of the College commus sound, first class rhythm, and powerful, effective nity I am privileged to present to you the 1994 Bunbury Catholic College Report.
In this Year of the Family, the most outstanding feature of the year was the level of activity and involvement in a particularly wide range of events.

From the outset, Bishop Quinn's Jubilee formed a significant part of our planning. We congratulate you, Bishop, on the years of dedicated leadership to our diocese and we delighted in sharing your joy with you in song and in dance.

Other events which made the year memorable for our student community, from the year's Opening Mass (always an inspiring and awesome start to the academic year) to the Thanksgiving Mass and Speech Night, included:

A developing, frequent use of our Chapel for Wednesday morning Mass, rosary during May and October, Retreat Days, and class and Homeroom prayer. We were especially pleased to see the occasional parent arrive to join us and would welcome a further growth of parent numbers.

Camps... from the small groups involved in Educational Support and Development, Leadership, Art, and Science Camps, to Outward Bound, to the always friendly Year Eight camp and to the always enriching Year Twelve Retreat.

Our Year Twelve Retreat this year was outstanding because of the quality of personal dignity and valuing which our Year Twelves brought to the occasion; I felt truly privileged to be a part of the week.

Among the staple events (no less special for their regularity) like student socials, Newman Festival (held at Aranmore this year) Catering Dinner (we thoroughly enjoyed Eastern European fare) and the Senior Ball, we must highlight the Rock Eisteddfod in which Bunbury Catholic College this year took off five of the eight awards: Best Sound, Best Lighting, Best Costumes, Best Concept, and Best Choreography.

Our College Choir followed suit at the Bunbury Music Eisteddfod by distinguishing itself with a score of $88 \%$ and a commendation for its "mature
dynamics.'
In addition to all our usual activity, 1994 saw the introduction of ex-students as guest speakers in our Careers programme: among our guests we welcomed Stacey Walkely to speak on Veterinary Science, and Glenn Crouch to speak on Navy Communications and Code Development.

Social Justice issues - the world as part of our family - were highlighted this year through student involvement in the St Vincent de Paul Winter Warmth Appeal (many students knitting their first ever "squares"); special fundraising for Rwanda Relief (students raised a total of \$1389.05), fundraising by year eight for St Joseph's school in Bombay, and involvement in contributing to Peace Packs for Kenya. A link with East Timor with the Don Bosco School of Fuiloro Lospalos at the eastern end of the Island saw a compact disc player and many books find their way to East Timor and letters and information find their way back to us. All this and no diminution of efforts in raising funds for the Pontifical Missions.

College curriculum development saw added growth in our music department, with the introduction of peripatetic classes in saxophone, flute, clarinet, violin and cello; the introduction of our aborigina studies program after many months of planning; and the piloting of the new Religious Education Guidelines (these are approved by our Bishops and do refer to the new Catechism)

Our college staff have worked diligently throughout the year to ensure familiarity with the new Mandate of the Catholic Education Commission, relating this call to our own Vision Statement and to the needs of the adolescents we educate. Anothe major part of our community learning this year focused on the tragedy of youth suicide, particularly in the area of recognising young people at risk and responding to their needs; our counselling department organised and hosted a "Steering Clear" programme for parents eager to improve their family relationships.

The achievements of our students as a community and as individuals is testament to the excellence of
eaching and learning which is the daily business of any college.

As a community we congratulate the year twelve students of 1993 on their success - $69 \%$ of this year group qualified for tertiary entry and a significant number achieved marks in the top $10 \%$ or $20 \%$ of the state in English, English Literature, Accounting, Geography, Economics, Physical Science, Human Biology, Physics, Discrete Mathematics and Applicable Mathematics.

Subject Distinctions, awarded to students who have achieved in the top . $5 \%$ of the state, were awarded to Michael Abdo and to Sarah Martin (both for Geography); Sarah Martin was also awarded a Certificate of Excellence for achieving A grades in ten subjects over her two final years.

Special congratulations go to Sarah Martin, Heath Pardoe and Jared Potter, who each scored an aggre gate in excess of 400 points; Sarah Martin was awarded the Kelderman Award as the student scoring the highest TEE aggregate.

Current students highlighted 1994 with a vast range of special achievements.

We began the year with our touring Cricket first X1 the boys defeated New Zealand, scored a moral victory over Victoria and found representation through Drew Walker in the All Australia Marist Cricket Team.

Our Dragon Boaters continued the winning trends blitzed all comers in events in Fremantle, Mandurah and Bunbury, and finally took off the Junior Trophy and the State Championships.

In Swimming the Catholic College team defeated Bunbury Cathedral Grammar in all age levels and competed in the A division of the Associated and Catholic Colleges competition-THEFIRSTCOUNTRY TEAM IN HISTORY TO COMPETE AT THAT LEVEL. I arrived on the day in some trepidation, fearing that a rout, even at A level, would be difficult to accept. Our team, however, was fortunately oblivious to my fears and tackled the opposition with confident enthusiasm, the boys coming second in both the Senior and Junior divisions, the team finishing a sound fifth. Danny Novak highlighted the day, finishing as the under thirteen Champion

In cross-country we competed with the ACC against thirty-five other schools and ran in fifth, with three of our students being named in the honorary ACC cross-country team; congratulations to Angela Summerfield, Ben Halligan and Chadi Ghandour.

At the ACC Athletics, competing in B division our Junior Boys finished in first place and our team finished fourth overall. Ben Piggott at this even jumped a new under 16 record of 1.95 m in the High Jump and gave notice of a very special athletic gift.

Many students in a wide range of sports excelled during the year; our girls won the SW Senior High Schools' Basketball; in Netball we took off the Junior Coca Cola competition and the Bunbury Netball competition with Melanie Prout awarded the All Stars Certificate; our Junior footballers took off the inaugural Independent Schools' Shield Volleyball recorded an excellent season; and in Water Polo BCC teams came first and third.

Academic achievements also abounded during the year. Our students participated in Science, Mathematics, and English competitions; In science we saw or students awarded eleven distinctions and twenty three credits with Craig Martin achieving in the top $1 \%$ of the state; in Mathematics seventeen distinctions were achieved, fifty-seven percent of students scoring in the top half of the state and six in the top five percent; and in English our students achieved thirteen distinctions and forty credits.

Individual highlights during the year included Piotr Baizert earning a place in the Murdoch Summer school for Science; Jenelle Carter and Rachel Pelusey winning places in the women in Engineering Science Camp at Curtin University; Cameron Shinne awarded a high commendation at the Inaugural Angelico Art Exhibition in Perth (exceptional for a Year Eleven student), and Melissa Cawdell continuing to demonstrate her writing prowessin achieving a high commendation in the Canon Young Writers of the Year Competition

With so much talent and abundant skill with which to develop this potential, it is not surprising that this year the college board determined to add Sporting scholarships to the academic scholarships established last year.

Our community owes much to the hard work and dedicated time freely given to us by the members of the college board.

Currently, much time is given to developing a College concept plan to extend over the next ten years including planning for a Lecture theatre and all purpose communication centre, a gymnasium, swimming pool, extended manual arts room as well as upgrading and maintaining facilities and groumds.

Much has already been achieved, and in 1994 we witnessed the establishment of a one-way direction of the internal road, brick paving of the canteen area, landscaping between the hall and the chapel area, new gardens established to beautify the grounds and, of course, general maintenance continued.

On behalf of the college community I would like to thank each member of the Board, and in particular Mr Bryan Sykes for his work as chairperson.

Thanks are also due to the wonderful parents who consistently contribute to the work of the P\&F; from the parents who help feed the hungry in the canteen, to the P\&F committee for its tireless work through the chair held in 1994 by Mrs Maria Trovato.

The year began with a welcoming breakfast preceded by Mass in the college chapel; activities during the year incorporated a cakeless cake stall; a progressive dinner; a fundraising movie ( In The Name Of The Father); and Art Extraordinaire. Many thanks to the special sub-committee which continues to give its energy to this last, vital fundraiser through Frank Townsend as Chairperson, and with the continued energies of Helen Nicholas and her teanyi of assistants.
This year the college opened its Uniform Shop, seiling the new sports uniforms. The venture proving a success through the efforts and energies of Lesley Gasmier, the decision was made to continue with a full uniform shop for 1995 and into the future, so that all uniform items except shoes will retail solely through the college. Many thanks are due to Mrs Gasmier for spearheading this most difficult task and guiding us through these early stages.

In giving recognition to the parents who have contributed so much to college life, I cannot fail to also thank their children, the students who have wholeheartedly participated in college life. In particular, I wish to pay tribute to the class representatives for
their willing involvement in organisation and management. The student council in 1994 was well led through the efforts of Head Boy Joshua Giumelli and Head Girl Fleur Zani. Thanks, too, must be rendered to that other team of student leadership, the House Captains and Vice Captains who ensure that college life has available a range of activities to further individual and team achievements.

None of the above would be possible without the dedicated efforts of a team of wonderful staff. From the Administrative team - Mrs De Gooijer as Office Manager and her staff and my Deputies Miss Pat McDonagh and Mr Les Fabre, each teacher, and each staff member, I have been privileged to be ably supported in the critical task of walking with God's children in this part of their life journey.

Finally, this report comes to its conclusion as we farewell those leaving the College at the end of this year. We bid farewell to Fr David, whose other commitments prevent him from continuing as our Chaplain for Years Ten, Eleven and Twelve; to Fr Pat on transfer to Margaret River; to Joseph Twynham who left for warmer climes of Queensland earlier in the year; to Gregg Moxham who will devote his teaching skills to students at Newman College, to Colin Nielson who will similarly enhance student learning at Guildford Grammar; to Janine Guidera who has chosen to extand her experience closer to home, to Joseph Munforti who masqueraded as Ed Taylor and thereby gave him the opportunity for a relaxing long service leave; and Mrs Debbie Salathiel who similarly gave Mrs Jan Palmer her leave opportunity. We thank each of you for your contribution to the BCC community and we wish you God Speed and good fortune.

For each member of the community I thank God, and pray that the coming year brings us closer to His vision for each of us

## RELIGION

As I look back on 1994 I'm aware of the various ways in which we strive to live out our faith amidst the 'buisiness' of daily living.

We marked the beginning of our school year with Mass in St Patrick's Cathedral. Our student leaders were inaugurated and our Year 12's challenged us to grow beyond our 'old shells'. Nowhere was this growth
more evident than in the response of students to the needs of those less
fortunate than ourselves. Mission money totals skyrocketed during Term One to equal what had been given in the previous four terms!

Concern for justice and personal generosity were evident on many fronts, whether it was people in Rwanda or here in Bunbury. For example, Year 8's and 12 L have raised several hundred dollars for

St Joseph's School in Bombay where the students have no sanitation facilities or drinking water ! During his visits in Term 3, Bishop McKeon personally encouraged the students in their efforts to "act justly, love tenderly and walk humbly with [their] God." Micah 6:8

Throughout the year we have been enriched by many guest speakers. Bishop Peter Quinn was the first and he welcomed our new Year 8's as he participated in their R.E. programme by sharing his story," his life as Bishop of Bunbury Diocese". During the Bunbury Parish Mission, Norma Woodcock spoke to Year 11's and 12's and to staff, sharing her journey of faith and her great love for God. The Disciples Youth Mission Team were among others who shared their faith in a very personal way during Year 10 and Year 11 Retreat Days. Representatives from many welfare organizations in Bunbury spoke to Year 9's on their Retreat Day and in Term 4, Sr Romanus spoke to Year 11's and Year 12's on the topic of vocation.

During Terms 1, 2 and 3, each Homeroom had time set aside "to walk with God" on a Wednesday morning at 8.05 a.m. Thanks to the patient dedication of our Chaplains, Fr David Mackay and Fr Pat Rooney, we have celebrated the Eucharist many times and held a Communion or Prayer Service
occasionally. Since many students live out of town, they were excluded from these times of worship so in 1995 we will experiment with alternative times that include all students. In Term 4, Wednesday Worship consisted of time set aside for personal prayer and reflection and was led by various teachers, beginning at 8.15 and concluding at 8.30 a.m.

Term 3 saw the twenty one staff responsible for Religious Education begin the pilot of new R.E. units. This has required inservice and evaluation with students involved in the latter. Already our recommendations have been implemented in the current unit . As well, our school-based pilot of a Year 8-12 Human Sexuality Programme has continued, thanks to the assistance of staff from the Billings Family Life Centre who gave freely of their time for such seminars as Love In The 90's held during Term 2 for Year 10's. Until our students realize their God-given gift of sexuality, they can neither realize their potential as fully human persons nor challenge those values of our society which tend to dehumanize, rather than enhance, human life.

At the end of Term 2, we regretfully farewelled our Chaplain to years 10,11 and 12 , Fr David, whose added teaching and study commitments prevented him continuing as Chaplain. Now at the end of Term 4, we are no less sorry to farewell Fr Pat, Chaplain to Years 8 \& 9 students. Both priests have been an enormous support to staff and students alike. We wish them well in the future as we offer them our heartfelt thanks for their gifts of time and energy, wisdom and faith.

In all things we are mindful that Jesus is the Light in our darkness, as was the theme of our Thanksgiving Mass in November. We continue to pray that we, the Bunbury Catholic College Community, will always turn to Christ who is our guide and our light.

Now that I am into my second year as R.E.C., I have as many questions about the 'how' of religious education as about the 'who' i.e, those who we teach. In all the challenges I have been very ably assisted by a team of devoted and energetic R.E. teachers of which I extend my gratitude for their creativity, support and patience

## Computer Related Studies

Something which is becoming clear, is the increased dependence by society on the use of computers and other related technology. Recently, the federal government promised millions of dollars to the development of a multi-media, CD-ROM industry in this country. Just the other day Telecom announced that they had signed a deal with a large American software company to develop software that would enable people to get easier and cheaper access to the Internet and the information highway.

One or two of the local banks have increased the number of automatic tellers outside their doors because more people are requiring them. The larger supermarkets in Bunbury have gone to using computer based systems at their check-outs. Even the local delicatessen owner has bought a new computerised cash register. However, what are we doing at Bunbury Catholic College?

Our students are living in a world where computers and related technology are common place. They have not experienced a world where banks were open on Saturday morning and until five o'clock on week days, because they were the only times people could get their money. We at the college recognise the need to reflect this new society in our educational methods

Computer graphics has been introduced as a subject within the school and is very successful. Units of science have been taught using computers to supplement the teaching methods. Typing is now introducing computer technology. This very magazine has been produced using the latest of computer software and hardware available in the school, by students studying computing and typing. The thanksgiving mass booklet was a similar exercise. These are only a few examples.

Computer related studies as a subject is still going. Through this medium we can develop those people who can possibly become the computer experts of the future. However we do not all need to be computer experts. We only need to be computer users, able to recognise what skills are required to be able to achieve a certain goal or a certain outcome using whatever tool is at our disposal.

Mrs Morris and the science club are in a recession at the moment but will be constructing milk carton boats for the Aqua Spectacular at the end of the year.
Mr Tom Hall and the school board are to be thanked for organising the construction of a shade house. This is already being utilised by classes and the ground staff.

## 1994 Speech Night GUEST SPEAKER

First of all I'd like to thank Bunbury Catholic College for inviting me to speak. Painters and Dockers have been touring Australia, including Busselton and Bunbury, for nearly as long as the people in East Timor have been enduring the pain of the Indonesian military oppression, so I was a little surprised that the College had a bunch of hardworking Social Justice activists who had recently twinned with a school in East Timor. I was even more surprised to discover that at least five students regularly demonstrate in political rallies for East Timor, and that the curriculum of the Business Studies class incorporates letter writing exercises to the Secretary General of the United Nations requesting self determination for the East Timorese people.

I wondered whether education in Catholic schools had changed, or if at De La Salle College all those years ago, I just wasn't lucky enough to encounter teachers who retained their sense of enquiry. I now know that BCC is a little unique. Very few Westerners, in particular institutions are prepared to actively listen and learn from countries like East Timor who keep telling us that all the well meant aid sent to them is of little use unless it reinforces a political platform which will ultimately reduce the country's dependency on charity. This is why BCC's stance is important-not only are you responding to East Timor's direct request for help to finance education (you even sent a teacher up to meet relevant East Timorese people) but you are promoting the political reality and path which they have chosen. Self determination for the East Timorese means that eventually they will take charge in determining their own affairs. In fact at the launch of the CD "All in the Family" Jose Ramos Horta went a step further: he welcomed the help of Australian musicians for the present but undertook a personal guarantee that young East Timorese rock singers would concert in solidarity should Indonesia invade Australia and people like me and Peter Garrett are sent to reeducation camps.

Tonight I've been asked by the Principal to answer one question: "Why does a Westerner with a privileged background and education, who has a good job and a fairly high profile want to help a bunch of people who are not close friends, who don't speak

English, and who don't live in Australia? Surely it ranks of tokenism" she suggested.

Unfortunately this is a question that comes up time and again. It's normally asked by people who for one reason or another have lost their sense of enquiry and rendered less capable their imagination and powers of creativity. We could pose a similar question to one of the great creative thinkers: let's ask Jesus Christ why he cured those ten lepers mentioned in the Bible and not the twenty blind people in the valley next door? Or why he chose a bunch of Catholics instead of all the Muslims? Hopefully he would come up with a better answe than I, but since I've been invited to speak tonight I'll give it a go.

I went to East Timor tracking my brother's last media assignment, and was appalled at the way the Indonesian military treat the East Timorese people . I was even more appalled when they put me and Colin Buckler, the drummer from 'Painters and Dockers' in gaol. I'm still really devastated when my mother cries about losing her eldest son; I can still remember her ringing Foreign Affairs every day for months-like the Wilson family were doing this year; I get sick to death of my Timorese friends in Melbourne begging me to write yet another article about yet another atrocity in East Timor. My whole life, my family's life, my friends' lives, my five year old daughter-all our lives have been altered and influenced by Tony's death in East Timor. The world is now so interconnected that whether we like it or not we are deeply affected not only by events in neigbouring countries, but by political decisions made thousands of miles away Life is no longer a whole lot of unrelated isolated incidences. It seems that if you ask enough questions and learn enough about one story, you not only want to do something, as a citizen of the world you are obliged to. It's in your own interest. It could well be that one day, as Ramos Horta says, we may need his mates in East Timor to pull off that gig.

So my basic motto is:

1) keep asking questions;
2) keep on pumping out the best vibes you can; and 3) get involved.

We all created this world-all its glory and all its messes. We've all got to jump in -with a good clean sense of fun and integrity-help each fix the
mistakes and find ways to do it better. Essentially I think we should ask ourselves not "why should I" but rather "Why shouldn't I?"

It's great fun working with the Timorese in Melbourne. You learn a lot. About generosity. About love. About good food. Their music is differentfor instance when Midnight oil recorded a version of an old Timorese melody called Kolele Mai [which we put on the CD] one reviewer said it was the most interesting thing the band had done for years. Even some of the Australians I've met and had to work with for East Timor have been great. For examples before we launched the CD in Melbourne I had to get Bishop Hilton Deakin on side so that he'd jump from a helicopter and make a big splash for the media. I've never really sat down at a table drinking red wine with a bishop, but I figured it might loosen him up a bit-make him think more like us rock ' $n$ rollers. And it did. I made myself very good friends with a Catholic bishop and he now wants to launch all the Dockers CDs providing its from a helicopter. ## AN ODE TO A MATE - IN MEMORY OF AARON PRINCI (1977-1993)

Aaron Princi came into our school community in 1991. He was put in Mr Browning's homeroom and he settled in well, making friends easily. However, these friends didn't immediately know how special a young person Aaron was. Only his family, a few close friends from his home town (Brunswick) and the staff knew.
Aaron had a rare heart disorder which prevented him from being fully physically and academically involved in our school community. However, he passed through Year 8 with little stress. He even had a piece of literature published in the school magazine that year.

In Year 9 he was assigned to Miss Moore and his subjects were cut down so that he had some time to catch up on any unfinished work (he was very pleased with that!). In all, 1992 was a pretty uneventful year for Aaron, until November.

On November 21st, Aaron suffered a major heart attack. However, with the help of his loving parents and a few dedicated medical staff, he came back. He was worn down, but was definitely not out. His heart attack meant that he missed out on his Year 9 final exams, a fact that he kept reminding his visitors about.

Aaron went through some major adjustments that summer, but he was ready for Year 10 in 1993. Mrs Martella was given the job of trying to control him. A few meetings with "The Lord" Fabre reduced his time at school to three days a cycle, and he was thrilled with that concept.

Unfortunately, Aaron's time was coming to an end. On the 16th of March, Aaron Princi passed away, fifteen days before his sixteenth birthday.
This tragic event saddened the lives of Aaron's family and friends and it touched the hearts of students and staff. Many students formed a guard of honour at his funeral and a school choir sang at the church service.

I am just one student in cur school who knew Aaron and his family well. I dedicate this article to my memories of a true friend who is missed very much.
