






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Message from the Makers...

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

My Lord Bishop, members of the College community, I am privileged to present the 1997 Bunbury Catholic College Annual Report.

For me, as a new principal, it has been a year of many firsts - my first time appointing staff, my first set of enrolments, my first set of graduating Year 12's and now my first report as Principal of this College.

I would like to begin with a heartfelt thanks - the way that my family and I have been welcomed into the community has been unbelievable. Staff, students and parents have done everything possible to ensure that my first year as principal has been as enriching and trouble free as possible.

I believe that 1997 has been a year of consolidation, a year of making sure that as a community we are aware of what Bunbury Catholic College stands for.

On August 15th, the feast of the Assumption, we celebrated our own Feast Day. At our school assembly I took the opportunity to speak to our students about what an education at BCC is all about. There are 4 things that I believe a Catholic school should be developing within the students entrusted to its care.

Firstly, we should be teaching students to know and love the Christian Faith and practise it in the Catholic tradition. This will develop students who will leave our school with an absolute conviction in the presence of an ever-loving God.

Secondly we should be developing students who are independent thinkers with a deep sense of responsibility to themselves and to others.

Thirdly we should be encouraging students to seek out and value excellence and to never settle for second best.

Finally we should be nurturing students who have an understanding of the meaning of 'community' - what it means to care for and respect another person - students who realise that doing things for others is more important than doing things for themselves.

It is this concept of 'community' that I have spoken to staff, students and parents about at various times throughout the year. I would like to take this opportunity to share with you some of

the different dimensions of our community.

Primarily we are a Catholic community providing a Catholic education. However Catholic Education is more than the Religious Education lessons we provide, in fact to limit Catholic Education to just RE lessons is a disservice. Being a Catholic educational community includes our liturgies and paraliturgies and all class activities. A Catholic community such as ours is dependent on all things that develop a culture and an environment where students, staff and parents respect and value one another.

Immersed in this authentic Catholic Education community is an academic community. Our academic results at all year levels continue to make us very proud. The dux of the College for 1996 was Piotr Baizert, who in his TEE earned a score of 477.7 allowing him entry into any course, in any university, across Australia. I am confident that our student's results for 1997 will make us equally as proud. On a day-to-day basis, our academic learning occurs in a traditional classroom setting as well as many off-campus experiences. Both the Art and the Biology Camps allowed students to experiment and discover ideas in a different atmosphere. Our students qualified to represent us in a variety of national educational forums - these included Halina Lamparski at the National Youth Science Forum in Canberra, Michael Martella at the BHP National Engineering Summer School in Brisbane and Craig Jennings at the Australian Student Mineral Venture in Kalgoorlie. Our students also performed exceptionally well in a variety of state and national academic competitions. Chris Gibson was placed in the top 5% in WA of the AMP Investments Economic competition. In the Australian Mathematics Competition Nicole Birch, Stephen Gorddard and Craig Jennings all achieved High Distinctions with Craig achieving our school's highest aggregate and being placed in the top 1% of all participants. Excellent results were also achieved in the Australian Geography Competition, the Asia Wise Competition and the University of New South Wales English and Science Competitions.

Besides being a formal academic community, we are a community which values wider learning. A number of our students this year were awarded their Bronze Surf Life Saving Medals. Other students made their fortune in the Stock Market Game and another group became proficient scuba divers. At all year levels, students were exposed to new experiences through retreats, camps, and Outward Bound. Our students were provided with opportunities to learn through off-campus excursions, including historic walks through Fremantle, visiting the Holocaust museum and trips to various tertiary institutions. This year we were privileged to have Constable Frank Yates of the Community Policing Programme come to the school and run a Driver Safety Course for interested students.

We are a sporting community with teams from the College representing us with pride in Bunbury, Perth and interstate. We continue to cherish and build on our Marist links, with our cricket team representing us at the Marist Cricket Carnival in Sale, Victoria and our netball team at the Marist Netball Carnival in Shepperton, Victoria. On an individual basis our students also received many accolades; Richard Gibson was selected as Captain of the State U/16 Hockey team with Jarred Phillips selected in the U/15 state team, Oliver Harbutt made the National Cross-Country Finals in Adelaide, Ian Fewster and Liam Shalders made the WA State Amateur Soccer Association Squad for Singapore. Leila Trezise made the National Equestrian Championships in Adelaide. Three of our students: Jemma Harris, Mark Johnson and Jarred Phillips were selected for the Associated and Catholic Colleges combined hockey team to tour Fiji. And in the ACC Honorary Athletics Team we were represented by Daniel Farnell and Daniel McLaren.

Our involvement as a cultural community was recognized at the Catholic Performing Arts Festival. This year the College was awarded the Zenith Trophy for Participation and Excellence. In July, staff and students put in an enormous effort presenting a cultural evening for our parents and community. Our students were also exposed to live theatre by attending various performances in Bunbury and Perth. Five of our students were awarded distinctions at the recent English Speaking Board Assessment panel. Our band and choir performed many times, both for our own community and for others. Their impor-

tance to our College was highlighted at the Mass of Thanksgiving several weeks ago. Our artists contributed to two major Exhibitions, the Angelico Exhibition and the Westralian Sands Visions Exhibition, our students received many certificates of commendation with Olivia Frewen winning the Upper school ceramics award in the Visions Exhibition.

We are a technological community with the Bunbury Catholic College home page being launched on the internet earlier this year. Our staff and students were connected with students throughout the world using the internet and being part of the international GLOBE project. Craig Jennings and Nick Kemp-Downs skillfully remodeled our Vision Statement using computer graphics - a framed copy of which is now hanging in our front office.

We are a community that is aware of the needs of others. Each year group focused on raising money for a particular overseas mission and the assistance of Robyn Willinge from the Bunbury Catholic Office was invaluable in setting up this project. Our students also generously donated their time in order to assist others in the wider community. Our Year 11/12 Food Production students raised almost \$1000 dollars for Palliative Care here in Bunbuy by hosting and catering for nearly 100 guests at a special dinner. Another of our students, Halina Lamparski, was appointed to the National Executive for the Young Christian Students' Movement.

We are also a community that cares for itself. Through our own retreat programme several year groups served our BCC community with their involvement in gardening, clean-up programmes and other community service projects. One of the most visual projects was the preparation and planting of the central garden acknowledging next year's celebration of our silver jubilee.

We are a community concerned with developing leadership qualities in our youth. A number of projects and issues were initiated by students. The school ball, two school socials, two free dress days as well as a review and modification of several school rules can all be attributed to the efforts of our Student Council. The Outward

Bound experience is one that almost all Year 11 students look forward to. This experience allows participants to display and develop leadership qualities under challenging circumstances. This year's event was no different and certainly a large number of students returned having a better understanding of what it means to be a leader. Another of our students, Bree Maciejewski (Year 11), was nominated for the Queens Trust - a national competition recognizing excellence in student leadership. Our Student Council, House Captains and Vice Captains as well as Kate Matthews (Head Girl) and Nathan Eaton (Head Boy) served our community well.

We are a community which welcomes and honours parental involvement. Our staff appreciate the support from the many parents who attend the parent information nights and parent teacher nights. The efforts of our parents to ensure the success of our Board, P&F, canteen and Art Extraordinaire must not go unnoticed. The work of this large group of parents contributed to the financial and social aspects of our community. To the retiring members of the Board; Fr. Jess, Charles Lockwood, Judy Cunningham and our long standing Board chairman, Paul Potter, I thank you for the years of dedicated service you have generously given to the College.

It is also appropriate to acknowledge the support of Bishop Quinn and all the priests of the Diocese. Bishop Quinn is very involved in the life of the school having visited the College to meet with our Year 12's and he has always been our principal celebrant at the Opening Mass and the Mass of Thanksgiving. A special note of thanks to Fr. Jess who has been the school chaplain for the last three years; we wish you well as you take up your pastoral role in the area of Katanning and Kojonup.

Thanks must be extended to all our staff, both teaching and non-teaching staff, because without their efforts the majority of the issues that I have reflected on would never have happened. Our staff strive to ensure that the education of each and every student is of paramount importance be it spiritual, academic, physical, cultural, technological or in the development of leadership. I firmly believe that a better team of colleagues would be hard to find. A vote of

thanks must also be extended to the spouses and families of our staff for their understanding of the many extra hours our staff give to this community. This year an Administration Team was established to assist me with the many decisions involved in the day-to-day running of the College: To Carmel Forest, Les Fabre, Pat MacDonagh and during her absence, Mark Browning a special thank you, their support, advice and counsel to me have been invaluable. And while acknowledging the support of key personnel in the school, a thank you is extended to Brent Steere whose financial acumen has been of enormous value to the College.

We are a dynamic community and this does involve staff changes. To Anne Cairns (retiring), Rachel Gallucio (Seton College), Stacey Shea (travel) and Tarsha Standley (marriage); I thank you very much for leaving your mark on Bunbury Catholic College. I pray that wherever your paths take you that you recall your years at BCC with fond memories.

To the future - and it is certainly a bright future for our community. For the first time since the late eighties we have a waiting list of students wanting to enter the College at Year 8. Solid links have been established with our feeder primary schools and these will be built upon in 1998. Parents in the Bunbury and surrounding parishes can feel confident that the different stages of Catholic education system are working together to provide a Catholic education from Kindergarten to Year 12. A new position, that of 'Publicity and Development Officer', has been established at the College to develop our links with past scholars and to ensure that the wider community is fully aware of the many good things happening here in our community. 1998 will also be special because it is a year that we are dedicating to the celebration of the Silver Jubilee of the College - I hope to see many of you at the various celebrations planned for next year.

Finally I wish to say thank you for your presence and support here tonight, I hope that we continue to have a long and happy association during the coming years.


Good luck to the entire BCC community for 1998, especially the Year 12's of next year as







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DEPARTMENT REPORTS

The BCC VIP Report

The Bunbury Catholic College Vocational Interest program addresses the continuing need of our post compulsory students to attain the best vocational education possible. Entry to the program is by selecting and invitation, it requires a high level of commitment from the Year Eleven and Twelve students chosen.

Seventeen Year Eleven students formed the core group for this year's program which required a commitment to additional year eleven courses whilst maintaining a full Year Eleven study program. Participants were able to participate in two different courses:

Structured Workbased Learning course content is based on 33 generic workplace competencies. A selected workplace trainer provided opportunities for competency skills to be developed and assessed at a workplace standard. A minimum time commitment of 15 days or 120 hours were required. Successful participants in this course achieved completion of seven Curriculum Council approved courses. Lee-Anne Bickley, Bronwyn Blackburn, Catherine Donnan, Sam Edmonson, Paul Paonni, Vincent Panetta, David Pugh, Elizabeth Read and Beth Williams are the students in this course.

Building and Construction Course has content based on National Building and Construction modules that are delivered at a purpose built live work training centre managed by Group Training South West. A minimum time commitment of 30 days or 240 hours are required. Successful students in this course could complete eight courses with the addition of NBC modules where competency is achieved. Robert Bray, David Dwyer, Simon Russo and Ben Selkirk are completing the course.

The success of this years program has been evidenced by improvement of the students enthusiasm, self esteem and confidence. The successful completion of additional courses as well as development of real workplace skills will greatly enhance their prospects of entry into the workforce, TAFE or further training.

I received references for my resume. Another advantage is that I have also completed an additional course called Structured Workbased Learning.





The Catholic Performing Arts Festival saw 55 students travel to Perth on two separate evenings to present three plays alongside students from many of Perth's Catholic Colleges. Social Science

1997 saw another year of great activity within the area of social science. Staff have worked extremely hard to make the area of social science come alive at the Bunbury Catholic College.

A review of the 1996 saw the restructuring of the assessments offered in unit curriculum. Problem solving assessments were introduced. Students are required to think critically and apply knowledge to the real life situations. This development was indeed a challenge to both students or teachers. Teachers developed both creative and relevant assessments, whilst students needed to draw from many resources and research techniques to develop an appropriate response.

1997 saw the introduction of a new syllabus in Year 12 History and the second year of the new syllabus in Year 11. This is very exciting as a different style TEE paper will be sat this year. The style of learning has an emphasis on primary source material. Source material is referred to in assessing the nature of society and changes occurring within society. The TEE paper will include 2 sections. Within each section a document investigation will be carried out and an essay completed.

As a department, the staff make a great effort to broaden the minds and experiences of our students. This year has been no exception with a variety of opportunities being made available.

Entering students in competitions is one way to provide academic extension. In 1997 students have been involved in Australian Geography Competition (yr 9-10), AMP Investments Economics Competition (Yr 11-12) and the Asia Wise Competition (Yr 8-10).

Through this involvement, our students are able to compete against their peers on a national level and hopefully discover the potential of their academic capability.

Fourteen of our Year 11 and 12 Economics students participated in the AMP Investments Economics Competition. The competition was open to all high school students in W.A and we congratulate the students who took part in the competition, especially CHRIS GIBSON who achieved a high distinction (top 5% in W.A)

Recently 100 Year 8-10 students competed in the Asia Wise Competition. While the results have not been returned yet, the students entered into the spirit to learn more about Asia and its importance to Australia.

Numerous guest speakers have been into our classrooms to provide the students with additional information about issues such as solutions to the erosion of the back beach, town planning in Bunbury, the W.A parliamentary system and the role of police in society.

Excursions occurred in many year levels to enrich our students' learning. Year Eleven History students visited the Holocaust Institute in Perth. During this visit students were exposed to a survivor's account of events during WWII, All Year Nine students travelled to Fremantle. Students visited the Fremantle Gaol, Maritime Museum and took part in a Historical Walk throughout Fremantle. Year 11 and 12 Practical Geography classes visited many locations in and around Bunbury to see first hand how and why Bunbury takes on its current form and analyse the direction and need for change within the Bunbury area.

Well done to all students for their efforts both inside and outside the classroom. To all the Social Science staff, I thank you for your support and continued efforts in making Social Studies relevant for your students.




9T HOMEROOM REPORT








VOLLEYBALL
