And none of this would have been possible without the vision and leadership of a very hands-on and proactive Principal. One particular memory of Denise is on the day before the Mercy campus opened, where she could be seen carrying desks, wiping down tables, directing the placement of lockers and still managing to get things up and running for the commencement of term!

Her outstanding career in Catholic Education, spanning more than 40 years, has afforded Denise the opportunity to be successful, both in terms of her personal aspirations, and by way of shaping the lives of those in her community. She is strong and passionate and brave; she is a woman of abiding faith, she will leave an indelible mark on both the Colleges she has served and on the community at large.

In choosing to retire in Boyanup, Denise has clearly indicated that her heart lies in this area, with the people in her parish and those in the greater Bunbury region.

# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Our College has been built on the intrepid vision of the Sisters of Mercy who journeyed from Perth to Bunbury in 1883 and the Marist Brothers in 1954, establishing Catholic education in the region. The decision to amalgamate the two single gender schools to form a co-educational secondary school in 1973 was a further step on the journey of our College which allowed Catholic secondary educational offerings to flourish and provided certainty for our Catholic families.

A further note in the history of Catholic education in Bunbury was achieved in 2015 with the opening of a second campus of BCC in the Australind area. This bold proposition was presented in April 2012 by Mr Ron Dullard, then Director of CEWA, to the College Board and College Executive and it is thanks to this courageous group who accepted the challenge, that the Mercy campus opened its doors to 300 students in February 2015.

In April this year, we were informed that CECWA had agreed that the two campuses would separate to two schools in 2020. This milestone will see the hard work of so many people come to fruition as Our Lady of Mercy College (OLMC) is launched.

I am grateful to the College Board, under the leadership of Mr Danny Griffin, who have assisted in driving this project and for the wonderful encouragement, support and financial advice on the governance of the College this year.

At our Community meeting we elected new members to the BCC Board and established the Foundation Board of OLMC, under the guidance of Mr Joseph Musitano. I would especially like to acknowledge the dedication of Mr Thomas Hall who has served as an elected and co-opted Board member for the last 32 years, providing the wealth of his experience and knowledge for our many building projects. My thanks also to Mrs Kellie Hislop who has served as Chair of the Finance Committee for 5 years, guiding us through several significant financial changes and the challenges of the future.

The College has been supported by strong leadership from the members of the College Executive over the last 5 years. A tribute must be paid to Mr Brent Steere, our College Bursar.

In addition to managing the College finances across two campuses, he has been integral in managing the capital development projects on both the Marist and the Mercy campuses. This involved all of the site works prior to building on the Mercy campus, the planning and construction of six large buildings on the Mercy campus and three major works on the Marist campus.

I am very appreciative of the leadership and management of the College by our Vice Principal, Mr Eugene de Lima, our two Deputy Principals, Mrs Deborah Garbutt and Mr John O'Dea, the two Heads of Campus on the Mercy campus, Mrs Viv McKenzie and Mrs Maree Maughan, and Mrs Gobnait May, our Religious Education Coordinator. This team have had to be creative, flexible and organised to ensure we established structures which could also stand alone in the future. This has been a particularly demanding role for the Mercy staff as we move to a new identity for 2020. I am indebted to them for their generous support and cheerful undertaking of all facets of leadership.

A special thanks to Mr Eugene de Lima who will conclude his 27 year association with BCC as he transfers and takes up the role as Vice Principal at OLMC in 2020.

I am very thankful to our parents who entrusted the education of their children to the College, especially the fledgling campus in Australind, and who have supported the many parent-led community building and fundraising efforts for both campuses. Special thanks to the members of the Mercy and Marist P&F Executives for their hard work on behalf of the students on the respective campuses.

During the last 5 years, our educational and pastoral leaders have worked cooperatively to support the staff on the Mercy campus and to ensure consistent academic and pastoral standards have been achieved across the whole school. This has not been an easy feat and has added extra pressure to the members of our Academic and Pastoral Councils and the teachers. I appreciate the dedication of these leaders and our teachers for maintaining our high standards for our students.

The fruits of their efforts can be seen in the continued success of our students in their WACE achievements, the completion of Vocational Educational Certificates, strong performances in NAPLAN and successful completion of OLNA. The participation and success of our students in a variety of interschool activities, such as the Philosothon, Debating, Story Writing, Science, Mathematics and Humanities competitions, in the visual and performing arts and in the variety of Christian service learning opportunities, can also be attributed to our teachers providing and supporting our students' involvement in these events. I am also grateful to our staff who have continued to provide numerous opportunities for our students to participate in a wide variety of sporting competitions and activities. Our students have maintained the reputation of the College as good sports, always putting their best efforts in all they undertake, and having success in so many competitions.

As our school year concludes, I extend my thanks and best wishes to staff members who are leaving the College or taking a period of leave in 2020. In particular, I wish to thank Mrs Ana De Gooijer, my secretary who retires after 32 years at the College, Mrs Christine Hogan who retires after 25 years, and Mr Greg Chipchase (26 years) and Brigid Terry who leave us having served as Heads of Humanities and English, respectively.

As we conclude our time as a two-campus school and move to a new era of two secondary Catholic colleges in the Bunbury region, my wish is that the Colleges will continue to work together to enhance the offerings of education for students in both Colleges.

I extend my best wishes to all of our staff and students and their families, especially to our Classes of 2019.

# BOARD REPORT

The Board annual report for 2019 provides evidence of the College's firm commitment to excellence in education, pastoral care, social justice and staff development, as well as the integral role families play in the life and spirit of the College.

In 2019, Bunbury Catholic College student enrolment was 1449, of which 850 were Marist-based and 599 were Mercy-based. Attracting and retaining student enrolments remained paramount to the ongoing financial viability of the College. A Separate School establishment subcommittee of the board was formed during the year to address the exciting strategic task of preparing both campuses to separate and become standalone colleges in 2020.

Parents are integral partners in the education process at our two campuses and the Board, P&F, and other forums at our college allow this partnership to flourish. The College actively encourages parents to participate in the learning, faith, sport, co-curricular and social activities of the College and by giving their time and skills in this way makes our college life that little more rounded to benefit our fine students.

This year has witnessed two fantastic community events organised and managed by our wonderful P&F teams. The Mercy P&F team, led by President Claire Crump, hosted the first Mercy Fete in April and proved to be a huge success in terms of its school and community engagement. A big thank you to Dale McAtee and his Fete team for their efforts and results. The funds raised will benefit our students directly.

Also, many thanks to Kate Turner and the Marist P&F for all their dedicated support. At the Marist campus it was pleasing to see the return of Art Extraordinaire for the first time in two years. The event was well attended and the scope of art on display was a credit to this wonderful project team led by Jennifer Fuller-Hill. You brought many smiles to those who attended across our community and many to come from our students who will benefit from these vital funds.

An external audited, recurrent financial statement was adopted and close focus as always to our financial management will be needed to ensure the College can provide our students with an excellent Catholic education.

The College upgraded various facilities for students and staff. There was a strong focus on enhancing and maintaining teaching, and co-curricular and staff facilities as well as information technology, to ensure the best possible learning environment for our students.

Key capital works undertaken during 2019 included:

- Architects engaged for Mercy Stage 3 development
- Marist painting and decorating program
- Major upgrade of computers and IT related items
- Upgrading of sound system in the chapel
- Purchase of new woodwork panel saw system
- Additional upgrade of 3D printers ventilation system

Operating costs were met from recurrent income including recurrent per capita grants from state and federal governments. Cost of curriculum, co-curricular and sport, salaries and related costs, property and grounds, information technology, administration and depreciation remained within approved budgets. During 2019 the College managed and closely monitored its financial position and will continue to do so with soft macro-economic conditions compared to previous years.

I thank all the Board Members and the respective P&F teams. Your dedication and volunteering are the very essence of what makes up a progressive Catholic college. I would like to thank Kellie Hislop and Barney Dzowa who have completed their time on the board, we wish them well.

A sincere thank you to Tom Hall, who after 32 years of service on the board will at last hang up his pick and shovel. His time with us is easily seen in many of the buildings across our campuses. Through his leadership and involvement, our college always enjoyed projects finished in full and on time.

Finally, a special thank you to Ms O'Meara who retires this year after 44 years of Catholic education service. Her high standards of integrity and achievements at our college have created a culture that will endure into the future for the benefit of generations to come.

## RELIGIOUS EDUCATION





## FAITH, LIFE, CULTURE

At Bunbury Catholic College the school's first and principle focus is on Catholic faith, life and culture. The College directs this focus in three ways that are distinct and symbiotically inter-related.

Firstly, through a school community – students, parents and staff – who seek to act according to Gospel values. Secondly, through the Campus Ministry which facilitates experience of Christ through liturgies and retreats, as well as through prayer and service opportunities.

Finally, through Religious Education which, while a classroom activity and like all Learning Areas promoting learning excellence, is also 'a form of the Ministry of the Word, and unlike the other Learning Areas, (it) is an activity of Evangelisation in its own right' (Mandate, 62).

Religious Education is the first learning area in the Catholic school curriculum and focuses on the knowledge and understanding of the Gospel as it is handed on by the Catholic Church.

Throughout 2019 we have reviewed our Years 7 to 10 Religious Education programmes and assessment items with a view to ensuring that we remain in line with current Catholic Education expectations for teaching younger students. We will continue to focus on this in 2020, making use of the excellent website developed by CEWA.

In 2019 we continued to focus on developing strategies that would ensure the Year 11 and Year 12 General courses are engaging for students who are subject to the treble factors of a society that is most entertainingly distracting, an academic life that demands their most rigorous attention, and an economic climate that causes students to focus on employment advantage in their post-secondary school future.

While developing effective strategies is a complex task, it is one that we see as very important for the Catholic school and we will continue to focus on this in 2020. We are blessed to have teachers who are committed to ensuring that students in their classes are both engaged and taught the mandated Catholic content.

The ATAR courses, perhaps because of their complex ideas and skills, continue to invigorate the attitudes towards religion of those students.

We are blessed at Bunbury Catholic College to have teachers on both campuses who are trained to teach Religious Education at the ATAR level. Michelle Barrow and Daria Smith (at Marist) and Karyn Cronin (at Mercy) teach Year 11 ATAR classes and are a significant factor in the success of the students in the WACE exam in ATAR Religious Education.

As part of the whole Catholic community, Catholic Education at Bunbury Catholic College seeks to incorporate the content that allows our students to grow in their understanding of the Catholic culture into our Religious Education programmes.

Therefore, we teach about the liturgical year, Catholic responses to issues in society, events in the organisation and processes of the Catholic Church, and we draw attention to examples of where and through whom Gospel values are modelled in the current world.

Religious Education teachers create programmes and strategies that aim to ensure that all the above is taught in ways that are commensurate with their students' age and abilities.

As part of the Bunbury diocese, we are very grateful for the support we receive from Bishop Gerald Holohan both as our spiritual leader and as the presider at some of our liturgies and important College events.

We appreciate the provision of priests for College Retreats and of the Youth Ministry at the Cathedral for including us in all necessary information regarding activities provided through the diocese for young people.

We would particularly like to express our gratitude and appreciation to the Chaplains for 2019, Fr Gerald Tan and Fr Concord Bagaoisan.

Their commitment to attending liturgical and celebratory events at both campuses has been enthusiastically expressed and carried out despite their very busy schedules in their parishes. ## LITURGY

The Feast of the Assumption Mass was celebrated by Bishop Gerard Holohan at the College gymnasium for Marist students. All those present were inspired by insightful prayers, hymns and Bishop's homily which allowed one to reflect upon the meaning of the Blessed Virgin's passing into eternal life.

Each year group on the Marist campus celebrated Mass at least once throughout the year which allowed the students to create and participate in their own liturgies. # CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Bunbury Catholic College plays host to a diverse number of social, religious, pastoral and community-based projects, all of which are aimed at providing opportunities for students to develop compassionate and meaningful attitudes to the world around them.

The Faith and Mission Ministry at the College is a collaborative partnership between students, staff, parents, the Cathedral parish and Bunbury community. Members of the College community are encouraged to undertake specific ministries within the Church and serve in the community to proclaim the Gospel and witness to Christ.

The faith life and spirituality of students, staff and parents are fostered through prayer, liturgical celebrations and theological reflection. Fundraising and outreach for ministries and Catholic agencies are supported generously by the College, organisations such as Caritas, St Vincent De Paul, Mercy Works, Life link.

Social Justice campaigns and service initiatives attract students eager to enact College values. Service is a key involvement for staff and students alike with a strong emphasis on reflective practice and Marist principles put in to action.

Helping with a variety of service learning projects, all students at the College have the opportunity to learn more about themselves and others in need.

Christian Service Learning is an integral part of the College learning program. It prepares our students to recognise the needs of others and feel like they are able to contribute and make a difference to our local and broader community. It is always gratifying to hear the positive feedback from the organisers of events in which the students participate as part of their Christian Service within the community.

The Year 7 and Year 8 programs allowed the students to gain an understanding of what it means to work for others without expecting anything in return. They assisted family and friends with a variety of activities over a period of 10 hours. Students were encouraged to go out into the community and be involved in 'acts of service', and it was pleasing to note that a great number of students completed more than the required minimum hours and ventured into the community to help others.

Year 8 students were involved in the Rotary "Give a Damn, Give a Can" collection for St Vincent de Paul. All homerooms collected cans of food and drinks for the homeless. These cans were placed in a large bin that was picked up from the College to distribute to the needy in our community.

Year 9 students participated in initiatives such as the Smith Family Student to Student Reading Program. This involved many of our Year 9 students reading to young students in the community with low literacy levels, particularly families who did not have the income to afford extra tutoring or help.

The programme ran for 18 weeks and students listened to their reader for two or three times a week.

Year 9 students at the Mercy campus "spread the love" on Valentine's Day by selling cards and heart chocolates.

For a small cost, students and staff could purchase a card with a secret message and a chocolate to give to friends. Cards and chocolates were delivered to homerooms by the Year 9 students.

Year 11 students organised a winter sleep-out for St Vincent de Paul and spent the evening putting together toiletry bags for the homeless and disadvantaged in our local community. The Year 11 students also supported the Ration Challenge, raising funds for refugees, while living on minimal food and drink for a week.

Students from Years 10 to 12 organised their own service activities and have supported a number of organisations in and around the Bunbury region. Some students were involved in fashion shows, festivals, church cleaning, the Bunbury and Brunswick shows, parish events and many other community events. Some students supported causes they feel passionate about such as Relay for Life or the Bunbury Foodbank.

A considerable amount of money was raised from Feast Day activities and was donated to various charities in the Bunbury community.

This year, each homeroom from Years 8 to 10 on the Marist campus donated a hamper of food to the St Vincent de Paul Society. These hampers will enable families who are struggling to have a blessed and more enjoyable Christmas season. The Year 10 students also held a Christmas Fair of items they made in Religious Education classes for Advent. All money raised went to local charities.

Students from the Mercy campus also collected items for the Australind branch of St Vincent de Paul.

Besides the usual items of tinned soups, pasta sauces and so on, students were encouraged to donate goods such as custard, fruit mince pies and bonbons in order to give the food hampers a 'touch of Christmas'.

Fourteen of our Year 11 and 12 students travelled to India to work in the orphanages in Kolkata as part of an Immersion Program. Living with the poor has been a life changing experience for these students who will continue to encourage other students in the future to do the same. Five of our students attended the Australian Catholic Youth Festival, inspired by a Youth Rally held in May at the College. This event too has encouraged our students to build a stronger relationship with God and support their peers to have conviction in their faith also.

Faith and Mission encourages students to become responsible adults who evaluate the world in light of Christ's teachings and the privileges they have been given. My heartfelt thank you goes to all students, parents and staff who are making a difference in the lives of others through acts of service.

It was a beautiful day which included a lovely morning tea where the students offered their grandparents a warm drink and a scone.

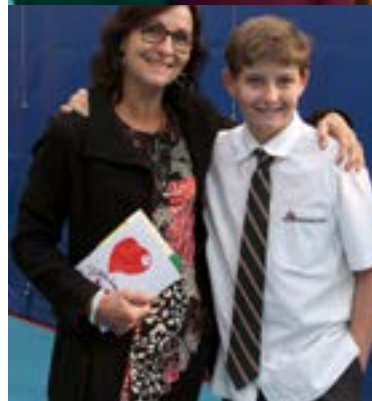

# RETREATS

“You’re my place of quiet retreat. I wait for your word to renew me.” Psalm 119.114.

Each year group is invited to participate in Retreat days. These reflection days are significant for all year groups and are aligned with the relevant Religious Education programme.

## MARIST

The Year 7 Retreat was held as a twilight retreat at the Marist Campus, where parents attend with their sons and daughters. This helped to establish a strong sense of community within the year group. Loving for Life facilitated this Retreat which was based on Catholic teachings of sexuality.

This theme was also the focus for our Year 9 Retreats that were run over two days, one day on campus and the other at an external venue. Loving for Life facilitated one day of the Retreat and the Youth Mission team ran the other day. Both days proved to be rewarding and insightful for our students.

In Year 11, we consolidate Catholic teachings of sexuality in our Retreat, which is presented and facilitated by Your Choicez Media. Both Katie and David Kobler are engaging and inspiring speakers who truly impact on the lives of our Year 11 students and the future choices they may make.

Our Year 8 Retreat this year was centred on creation, again relating to the Religious Education curriculum. This Retreat was facilitated by staff and a few outside presenters. This Retreat began with a presentation on Laudato Si’ (Pope Francis’ encyclical on creation) and continued with practical, reflective and interactive activities that inspired our young students to recognise the importance of being stewards of our land and God’s creation.

The Year 10 students engaged in a social justice day facilitated and presented by the education consultant for Caritas. This day was mixed with high energy games, drama presentations and listening to the stories of those disadvantaged in our world, as well as viewing footage of poverty-stricken situations that are occurring globally. The day allowed students to recognise and appreciate all they have, and to contemplate how they can make a difference in our world today.

Our Year 12 Retreat is a highlight for the year and consists of three days where students spend time away from their families and school life at different retreat sites. The Retreat centres on reflecting, discerning and developing relationship with God, families, sense of self and others. This significant occasion was considered as life-changing for many of our Year 12 students. I commend all the staff who were willing to give up their time to be with the students, share personal testimonies and lead retreat sessions.

## MERCY

In Year 7, the focus for Retreat was on community. Mercy students spent the day at St Patrick’s Cathedral and completed a range of activities relating to their role in their families, parish and diocese. They experienced a tour of the Cathedral, presentations from Fr Jess and Fr Con. As the Retreat was just before Mother’s Day, students also made cards, celebrated a Mother’s Day mass with their mums or other significant females and then shared a Mother’s Day afternoon tea, which was catered for by Year 8 parents.

On Friday 17 May, Year 8 students participated in a range of activities relating to the environment as part of their Retreat. They began the day by planting several thousand sedge plants aimed at stopping soil erosion, near the Tognela Rest Area on the Forrest Highway. The activity was coordinated by Jane Townsend from the Harvey River Restoration Taskforce, with support from Greening Australia. Students then returned to school for lunch.

In the afternoon, they received a presentation from Ms Daria Smith from Marist, focusing on the Papal Encyclical Laudato Si, and a presentation on endangered animals from Julie-Anne Oliver from the Department of Parks and Wildlife.

Year 9 students participated in a two-day retreat in Term 4 which focused on sexuality and respectful relationships. At Mercy, the first day of retreat was facilitated by College staff, and students participated in a range of small group activities which looked at development during adolescence. The second day was presented by the Youth Mission Team. Boys went to the Leschenault Leisure Centre and girls to the Leschenault Pavilion. Activities for the day were a combination of small and large group games, discussions and reflection time.

Justice was the theme for the Year 10 Retreat. Both campuses received a presentation from Caritas Justice Educator, Nathan Leber. Students learned about what justice means from a Catholic perspective and how they can lead a ‘just life’.

Year 11 students were once again privileged to hear from David and Katie Kobler, presenters from Your Choicez. The topics of discussion included respectful relationships, the influence of media on students’ understandings of body image and relationships and respect of self.

Year 12 Retreat is always a highlight for students and the Mercy Class of 2019 went to St Mary’s in Metricup.

# ENGLISH

It is no secret that English teachers love books. We like to talk about them long after we have read them, or while we are in the middle. ## YOUNG WRITERS

In 2019, students from various year groups again participated in Young Writers workshops. The Creative Writing program, run by The Literature Centre in Fremantle, travels the regions with some of the best Young Adult authors of the day and students picking up some invaluable writing skills.

The first of these, with author James Roy, was extremely well received and student comments afterwards included:

"He was so funny! He was practising his stand-up comedy routine while we were learning about writing I'm sure."

"I'm thinking of buying one of his books because he has such a great sense of humour."

"He really is quite a unique writer – entertaining, engaging yet still teaching us so much about writing."

Another Young Writers workshop combined music and literature with 'The Sound of Picture Books'. The Literature Centre, in partnership with the WA Symphony Orchestra, presented a performance of John Marsden and Matt Ottley's confronting book, *Home and Away*.

We were privileged to have illustrator and composer Matt Ottley give us an emotional and heartfelt introduction to the book and his music. What followed was a moving and extremely powerful performance of the book, featuring large illustration, the superb WASO string quintet (featuring a \$30 000 double bass), and a teenage soprano.

In 2019 we welcomed two new staff to our department, Dr Tracey Arthur on the Marist campus and Mr Gerry Simpson on the Mercy campus. It was a very busy and successful year in science for both students and staff.

## SOLAR CAR AND SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING CHALLENGES

The year got off to a great start with two teams of Year 8 students, one from each campus, competing in the South West division of the Synergy Solar Car Challenge.

Both teams performed admirably, with the Marist team of Logan Turner, Angus Park, Christian Higgins and Liam George winning on the day. They went on to compete in the state finals at Optus Stadium in Perth where they came a commendable third.

In April, teams of Year 10 students from each campus competed in the annual Science and Engineering challenge against other South West secondary schools. While neither team came away winners, they again represented the College with pride.

## VISITING ASTROPHYSICIST

In May, the College was fortunate to host a visit from Dr Brad Tucker, renowned Astrophysicist from the Australian National University. He spoke to large groups of students and at an evening public forum relating some of the latest developments in astrophysics impacting our understanding of the universe, including newly discovered planets around other stars and the likelihood of man visiting other planets. It was wonderful to see the sense of awe on our student's faces as they discussed these and other topics with Dr Tucker first hand.

## NATIONAL SCIENCE WEEK, SCIENCE FAIR AND MERCY ON SHOW

National Science Week was celebrated with great excitement on both campuses. At Marist, a wonderful array of student STEM research and design projects were presented to the public at a huge Science Fair. In the lead up to the fair, lower school students completed a range of STEM projects. The Year 7 students demonstrated their water filtration projects while the Year 8 students designed and presented their model human habitats for long-term survival on Mars.

Similarly, Year 9 students presented projects in which they had investigated various aspects of bee ecology and factors affecting bee survival. Finally, the Year 10 students presented projects, including some wonderful video presentations, on the problem of antibiotic resistance, how it develops and what can be done to prevent it.

At the Mercy campus, Science Week coincided with Mercy on Show during which lower school students presented the various STEM projects mentioned above, and at the end of the week made and launched a range of different rockets.

## UPPER SCHOOL STUDENTS OUT OF THE SCIENCE LAB

To enhance their learning, many upper school science classes participated in a range of excursion experiences.

These included Year 11 biology students practicing their skills in ecological measurement at a local coastal bushland site and studying animal adaptations at the Perth Zoo. Year 11 earth and environmental science students studied the geology of rock formations along the Swan River and Perth coastal locations, and Year 12 EES students studied rock formations on the South West coast and forest ecology in the Wellington Forest.

Year 11 physics students again attended the 'Physics Big Day Out' at Adventure World while Year 11 integrated science students studied the local marine environment on the water in Koombana Bay and Dolphin Discovery Centre. Year 12 biology and human biology students put their knowledge of DNA and biotechnology into practice as they isolated genes for skin cancer during a day at the Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research in Perth. Our Year 12 human biology and psychology students studied human evolution and applications of psychological theory at Perth Zoo and Curtin University.

## SCIENCE OUTREACH

Students and teachers from the College participated in science outreach programs during the year, firstly at a local primary school, and at Leonardo Day, which is designed to engage primary students in fun activities that hopefully spark their interest in science and lay a foundation for their enthusiastic participation in science once they arrive at Bunbury Catholic College.

Finally, I wish to acknowledge and express my sincere thanks to our highly dedicated and professional team of science teachers and technicians. Their tireless efforts throughout the year ensure there are opportunities for all students to discover and better understand the world and universe in which they live.

The Year 10 students performed at the Year 6 Orientation Assembly on the Marist campus, coming back after over a term's break to re-energise their award-winning dance 'Sail' for the entertainment of our new students.

We also saw both classes of Year 9 students perform at Presentation Evening.

Our Mercy students provided a beautiful liturgical-style piece to launch the evening and our Marist students entertained with an upbeat jazz item to break up the awards.

## STUDENTS IN THE SPOTLIGHT AND MERCY ON SHOW

Students in the Spotlight, held in week eight of Term 3, provides an alternative performance opportunity for our students and a chance for our parents and community members to get an insight into the classroom with our classwork demonstration.

This year, the Year 8 Dance class performed their contemporary class exercises for a packed opening night of the Spotlight exhibition.

At Mercy on Show, the Year 9 Dance students performed their class dance.

This lyrical item was performed to parents, students and community members in the courtyard.

The outside performing space was a great venue for students to adapt to and they performed wonderfully in.

## DANCE WORKSHOPS

Semester 2 at the Marist Campus saw our first all-boys Year 8 Dance class.

To get the boys motivated and interested, we brought in local dancer and teacher Ashley Gledhill to run some hip-hop workshops.

These were very successful with the boys keen for Ashley to come back and run some more sessions with them.

Year 6 Orientation saw some of our Year 7, 2020 students participate in a short dance workshop where they learned some simple movement phrases and completed some creative movement tasks in groups.

This was a fun and interactive activity that helped students from different schools get to know each other and their Peer Support Leaders.

## VIEWING EXPERIENCES

This year, our students have had the opportunity to attend a number of dance performances as a part of their dance courses.

In Semester 1, the Year 9 students from both campuses travelled to Mandurah for 'A Gala Evening with the WA Ballet'.

This performance consisted of a number of excerpts and full length works in a variety of genres, from purely classical ballet to tribal contemporary.

The Year 10 students were lucky enough to attend two performances through their course.

The first of these was 'The Line' by Co3, where they learned some of WA's less than stellar history with regards to the treatment of our indigenous people, and the second a dance theatre and parkour combination by Dauntless Movement Crew which was performed here in Bunbury.

Both pieces gave students an insight into other people's lives and helped them to have a broader understanding of our community.

In Semester 2, the Year 9 students travelled to Perth to watch WA Ballet perform 'Alice in Wonderland'.

This was an entertaining show and the students also enjoyed seeing the beautiful grandeur of His Majesty's Theatre.

## COURSEWORK

We had a change to the Year 7 dance program this year where students now have the opportunity to participate in two lessons per week for the term.

This enabled us to fit more in the year while still maintaining the focus of exploration and creation.

It is great to see all our students enthusiastically participate in both the skill development and choreography sessions.

The Year 8, 9 and 10 programs run for the semester with students participating in two or three lessons per week.

These courses work to develop skills in one or two genres of dance as well as more extensive choreographic skills.

As part of these courses, students are expected to create and perform dance works for an audience.

They also develop their analysis skills, through viewing and reviewing both their own and others' work, learn about safe dance practices, such as posture and alignment, and develop their design skills.







# THE ARTS - MEDIA



Plenty of amazing talent was on show in Year 8 Media this year. With a focus on photography, the students captured some wonderful 'Water Art' images for the Aqwest Photography Competition and were rewarded for their creativity with Stephanie Congdon finishing in third place and two other students, Gabrielle Crowley and Sophie Oliver, named as finalists.

The Year 9 students also enjoyed Aqwest competition success, with Luke Blee taking out second prize and Abby Coulson and Michela Villani teaming up as Board Prize runners-up. The Year 9 students have also worked as desktop publishers, crafting professional looking magazine covers.

Film-making has been the focus for Year 10 Media students and they have created entertaining thrillers and inspiring biographical pieces.

Year 11 student Hannah Lowe was judged the overall winner of the Aqwest Photography Competition, which continues a fine level of performance from our College. All four winners in the 13-17 years category were College students, while we had a number of finalists and board prize winners from both campuses. 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# THE ARTS - MUSIC

## INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC

Our dedicated music tutors work alongside the students to help them develop their passion for music and to guide them towards their musical goals.

Music students get to enjoy camps, tours and many other performance opportunities throughout the year. Our students have had the opportunity to perform in several community events this year; these events include the Bunbury Eisteddfod, Catholic Performing Arts Carnevale and performances with the Philharmonic South West.

There are spaces available for any students wanting to learn a musical instrument. Simply visit the College website and fill out an enrolment form.

## GUITAR ENSEMBLE

The guitar ensembles at both Marist and Mercy have developed their repertoire in preparation for more performances. With a solid collection of at least eight pieces, each group has had the opportunity to go out into the community and show off their skills. They have performed at the Learning Commons on each campus and at BCC's major music events.

## PERCUSSION ENSEMBLE

# THE ARTS - VISUAL

## MARIST

Art Camps, Sculpture by the Sea, excursions to the Art Gallery of WA and numerous projects designed to challenge, inspire and upskill art students through various mediums and disciplines defined 2019.

Year 7 students crafted ceramic masks inspired by African tribal works, which were embellished with graffiti patterns and coloured glazes.

Year 8 students once again honed their lino cutting skills and focused on pattern making and colour theory to produce colourful pencil cases. In Year 9, students wowed audiences with their mandala pattern inspired skateboards, surfboards and matching fins.

Year 10 students produced painted plaster carvings inspired by animal symbolism plus a Surrealist inspired collograph print. In Semester Two, they created multi-faceted, mixed media portraits and tranquil murals to decorate the College sick bay.

Our Year 11 ATAR and General students learned the printmaking technique of etching to inform their first projects. In Semester Two, mixed media artworks exploring themes of 'differences' and 'experiences' formed the practical component of their course, while Australian artists and artworks from the 1940s to 1960s was the basis of the theoretical and written component.

In Year 12, both ATAR and General visual art students explored themes of 'commentaries', 'points of view', 'inspirations' and 'investigations', incorporating the art disciplines of printmaking, drawing, paper cut, sculpture and mixed media. These students should be very proud of their achievements in a very busy and challenging year.

## MERCY

2019 has seen Mercy Visual Arts students produce many creative and highly polished artworks. These have come to fruition through meticulous planning and hours spent not only during class but at lunchtimes, after school and on weekends.

As we continue to celebrate many firsts for the Mercy campus, our first group of Year 12 ATAR and General visual arts students completed their courses. The Year 12 students are to be commended for their dedication and perseverance in all aspects of completing their course and they have been tremendous role models for their Year 11 counterparts and lower school students.

Production pieces based on the themes of 'Commentaries' and 'Points of View' for ATAR students have communicated heartfelt messages and experiences felt by the youth of today. The themes of 'Inspirations' and 'Investigations' for General students were interpreted individually, with each student producing a unique etching and painting ranging in diverse imagery from Freddie Mercury, to Manga, to Australian landscapes.

Year 11 ATAR and General students have been very fortunate to participate in printmaking and mixed media workshops. Techniques and processes learned were utilised in their production pieces for both semesters. The students also had the privilege of drawing a kangaroo and possum, which were brought into the classroom. This was a fantastic and memorable drawing experience for all students.

Lower school students have explored a variety of mediums and themes in both written and practical work throughout the year.

"I love doing Art for two periods a week. The classroom atmosphere is really cool and relaxing. We made pencil cases, which were fun to design and create, and I like the fact that we can actually use the final product. "Year 9 Art has been packed with interesting and engaging concepts, styles and projects. In the two-period class we learnt about the Indonesian art technique of Batik, which involves tracing a design onto fabric with hot wax and dying it a multitude of colours. The three-period class was given the opportunity to design next year's birthday card. 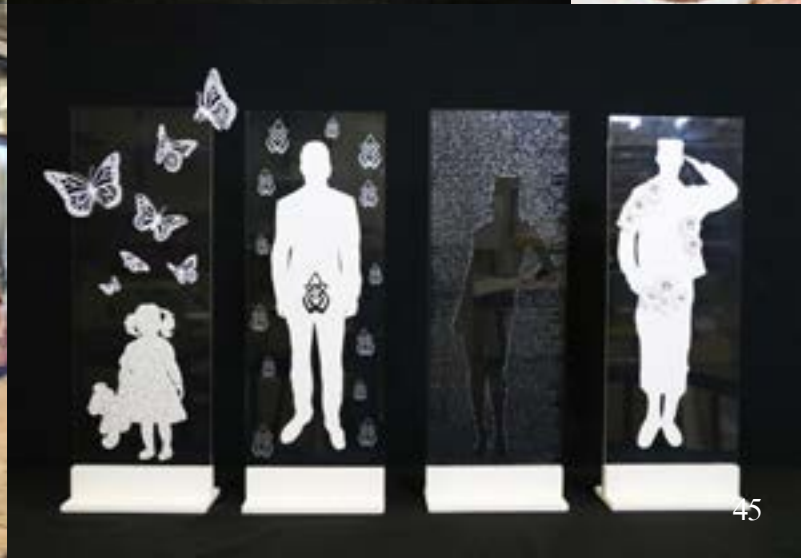

## THE ARTS - DRAMA

2019 was another big year of building the profile of Drama and we continued to unveil a wealth of talent on both campuses.

There were a few repeated events on the calendar but also a significant amount of trail blazing and firsts, particularly on the Mercy campus.

With 2019 being the 'off' year between whole school productions, one of the highlights was the combined Year 11 and 12 camp in August that combined students from both campuses. This was a successful trip and will be on the agenda in the future.

We managed to see three productions, which were Medea at the Heath Ledger Theatre, Bring It On (the musical) at His Majesty's Theatre and The Big Hoo Haa! at Lazy Susan's Comedy Den. We also managed to sneak in an improvisation workshop with Libby Klysz as well as plenty of walking between events. This was all capped off with attending the ECU/WAAPA Open Day.

Both campuses also had plenty of highlights during the year.

### MERCY

The most exciting 'new thing' for Drama was our inaugural upper school class, which consisted of three Year 11 ATAR students and two Year 12 General students. Having an upper school Drama class in the school was a huge boost for the subject and an excellent opportunity for younger students to see how Drama develops in Years 11 and 12 and secondly how the subject's status is equal to any other in upper school.

Another first for Mercy and specifically this upper school class was to perform their Semester One monologues at the WA Performing Arts Eisteddfod at the Bunbury Regional Entertainment Centre. Taking something that is created for a Drama room space and reworking it and repurposing it to suit a large professional venue such as the BREC was a huge accomplishment. The Year 11 students took out the top three places in their section and one of our Year 12s placed third in a very competitive category.

The Year 10 class participated in the YOHFest performance competition, which meant combining with Marist and committing to weekly after-school rehearsals. The students embraced this choice and through a lot of devised workshops and bouncing ideas back and forth came up with a sophisticated performance, which earned them the "Artistic Integrity Award" on the night.

Year 10 students gallantly attempted an outdoor performance of a modern version of Romeo and Juliet, based in a high school setting. Students worked tirelessly at putting the show together including recruiting talent from the Year 9 Drama class to help make up cast numbers and choreographing a dance for the "school ball"/Capulet party scene. Unfortunately the acoustics of the performance area weren't favourable and an eager audience struggled to hear. Then when our Juliet come down with the flu we all knew it was time to call it quits. An incredible effort and a bounty of creative ideas did not go unnoticed.





The year was capped off with an outstanding Year 9 production of Robin the Hood performed at Marist's Performing Arts Centre. Although this is an annual performance, this was the first time it was performed so late in the year and without combining with Marist's Year 9 students Drama performances. It was clear there is plenty of talent coming through in this year group.

2019 was a huge year for Mercy Drama and I really would like to thank everyone who supported us and helped to embrace the growing performance culture.

## MARIST

Under the guidance of Mrs Jeannie Lewis, our Year 7 students were busy learning the ropes and spent their 'taster' term learning important skills such as vocal and movement skills, stage presence and blocking. This culminated in a group performance with the Dance and Music classes. It was fantastic to see the three disciplines combining.

Year 8 students spent their semester focusing on children's theatre. They read storybooks and created plays and games for Year 1 students. The group then moved into their first whole-class production which included an introduction to design and featured costumes, lighting and sound.

In Year 9, students started expanding their skills and forged ahead with improvisation and play building. The highlight of the semester was the creation of full scale Melodrama performances which saw the students push themselves by creating larger-than-life characters and adding comedy to their skillset.

Our Year 10 students took on the challenge of exploring Australian theatre and looked at a range of plays and styles. They branched out to look at absurdist theatre and other non-realist forms. In the second half of the course, students took on a challenge to plan, prepare and present their scripted monologues. For many students, this was a massive challenge and it was pleasing to see everyone get in and tackle this task with enthusiasm and perform to a very high standard.

# LANGUAGES

At Bunbury Catholic College, the learning of second languages has become a journey you cannot miss. This has been confirmed by the large number of students selecting Languages as their Year 9 elective subject.

The many cognitive benefits of learning languages are undeniable. People who speak more than one language have improved memory, problem-solving and critical-thinking skills, enhanced concentration, an ability to multitask and enjoy better listening skills. They also display signs of greater creativity and flexibility.

Language software-based programs have been implemented across both the Italian and Indonesian languages courses, allowing students to consolidate language skills acquired through individual or in group-based tasks. Languages-based activities in digital and face-to-face mode have also been part of the 2019 Languages curriculum delivery

Finally, on the Italian front, Italian language students in Years 11 and 12 have participated in the annual WAATI (Western Australia Association Teachers of Italian) Italian State examinations with excellent results. In Year 12, Lachlan Brown and Matthew Clarke are to be congratulated on their outstanding result of a Distinction. # VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING

**The 4 Knows: Employers don't want to know what you know, they want to know what you can do with what you know.**

As a Department, we strive for each individual student to create their own unique educational pathway by opening the doors to possibilities and looking to what exists in the wider community.

We focus on three main individual student goals of health, happiness and a balanced lifestyle. We seek to discover where a student's passions, interests, needs and wants are in relation to achieving WACE and then moving forward to the future whether it may be university, TAFE or work. To do this we form a partnership between the Student, the Parent and the College through continuous individual Student Career Guidance, Year 10 Careers Classes and a week of Work Exposure for every Year 10 student.

Included in this is one day per week of Workplace Learning and parent information sessions throughout Years 9, 10, 11 and 12 as well as the annual South West Careers Expo and careers professional networking, all coming together to build an upper school program that allows for individual student success.

## COURSES ON OFFER

Students may choose an ATAR or general pathway but may do a combination of both. They may wish to include one, two or three certificate courses. These certificate courses are undertaken within the student's timetable or externally at TAFE or the Bunbury Regional Trade Training Centre, off campus, one or two days a week.

Nationally recognised and industry standard qualifications are offered as stand-alone Certificate Courses within our regular school timetable.

The following courses were available for Year 10, 11 and 12 students throughout 2019:

- Certificate II in Business
- Certificate II in Creative Industries (Film & Photography)
- Certificate III in Early Childhood Education and Care
- Certificate II in Engineering Pathways
- Certificate II in Hospitality
- Certificate III in Information and Digital Media Technology
- Certificate II in Music
- Certificate III in Music
- Certificate II in Outdoor Recreation
- Certificate IV in Preparation for Health and Nursing Studies
- Certificate II in Sport and Recreation
- Work Ready Barista Program (Hospitality)

## OFF CAMPUS LEARNING

Students have also accessed other Certificate Courses with external registered training providers. Students are off campus for one or two days per week with both off the job training and on the job work placement within the chosen industry as well as maintaining their normal school subjects.

This requires a student to be mature, self-driven and well organised to ensure they still meet Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) graduation requirements.

The following external Certificate Courses were chosen and undertaken by students in Years 11 and 12 throughout 2019 from a list of 50 available courses on offer to BCC students.

### SCHOOL BASED TRAINEESHIPS

You can earn a qualification, a wage and stay at school while achieving WACE through a School Based Traineeship or a School Based Apprenticeship.

A School Based Trainee completes four days of school with one or two days of paid work placement during the week. They must continue to achieve at school and meet graduation requirements, complete the theory components of the qualifications and on-the-job work placement and assessments. We currently have students in school-based traineeships in:

- Certificate II in Building and Construction
- Certificate II in Business Administration
- Certificate II in Engineering
- Certificate III in Retail
- Certificate II in Warehouse Operations

### YEAR 10, 11 AND 12 WORK PLACE LEARNING

The Work Place Learning Program has once again provided the opportunity for students to discover the right career pathway for themselves by experiencing work in a number of fields. The advice and support of their workplace mentors and co-workers has given our students a better perception of what the job requires day-to-day and which paths to take to achieve their goals.

In 2019 we created over 700 work placements for students with the help of nearly 400 employers! Our strong links with local businesses within the greater Bunbury region gives students prime opportunity to not only reinforce their future goal but also with the right attitude, make it a reality. The support we receive from local businesses is what helps to keep these programs running as well as creating apprenticeships, traineeships and future employees. The College extends a sincere thank you to all the businesses for their continued support to our programs, as well as students and families.

### YEAR 10 CAREERS AND WORK EXPOSURE WEEK

Career Classes and a week of Work Exposure gave our Year 10 students an insight into what workplaces entail. Work

Exposure for students is often the first exposure to a real work environment. It's a great opportunity for students to learn about their interests, and different industries. By completing work books and attending a workplace for a period of one week, the students have gained knowledge of:

- Basic communication skills
- Preparing for work in the community sector
- Participating in work health and safety practices
- Future subject and career pathways

All Year 10 students participated in one week's Work Exposure in a diverse range of industries in varied locations. Most of our students secured places to work with local businesses from family, friends or contacts, many looking at their possible career path.

Some students were able to be placed and participate in activities within Pathology Centres, Pharmacies, Butchers, Cafes, schools and childcare centres while others participated in the GREaT (Get Real Experience and Try) Work Experience Program with the WA Department of Health, giving them an insight into the work of nurses and midwives.

A number of students were lucky enough to travel interstate to places such as the Austin Hospital and Eastern Regional Medical Centre in Melbourne for their work exposure placements.

Students completed a logbook recording their major tasks, observations and hours. The employer also completed an assessment giving students feedback on their week of work. This will become a valuable resource for their portfolio and resume. There were many comments from students such as:

"There are heaps of precautions and safety checks before you can start."

"You need to know how to communicate. Ask questions whenever you need help."

"So much time, effort and cleaning goes into looking after the animals and the workplace"

"I found the large aspect of hand hygiene quite interesting as it is such an involved process."

"I enjoyed the variety of tasks I was able to do."

"I learnt how to disassemble tractor parts and diagnose the problem."

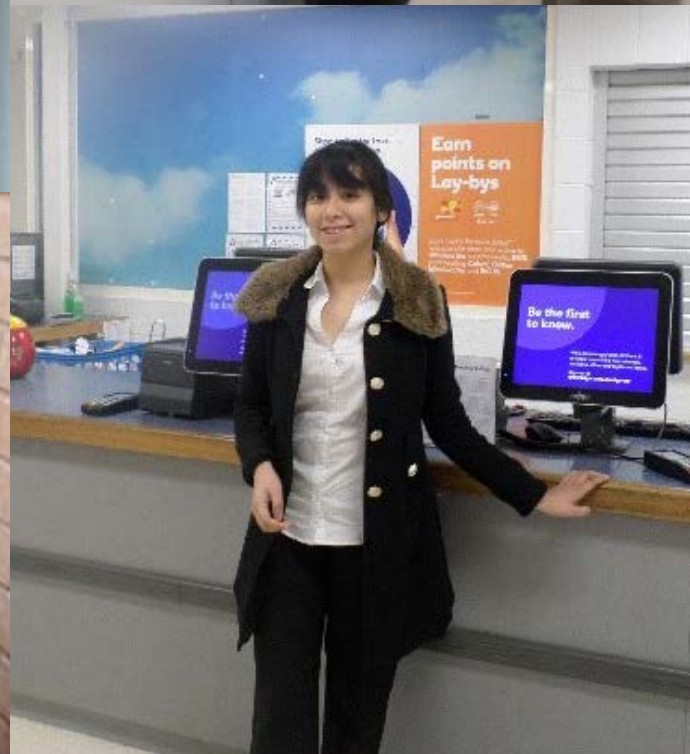

## CERTIFICATE IV NURSING PREPARATION

On Tuesday 3 September, the Certificate IV Nursing Preparation class visited the School of Nursing at the ECU South West campus.

Students were welcomed by Georgina Ferreira, the future student coordinator, before being taken into the teaching wards in nursing.

The students monitored the simulated patient's heart and breathing rates in the third-year ward, which has computer programmed manikins that can simulate any type of health emergency to ensure student nurses get plenty of practice for the stress of real emergency situations.

Our students were taught how to dress in PPE when dealing with patients with infectious disease, or when nursing patients who are immunocompromised.

We were then taken to the midwifery ward where students observed the pregnant manikins and babies used to simulate birth and post-natal care.

The students were able to monitor the position of a baby in the pregnant 'mother' and were taught how to listen to and monitor the baby's heart rate.

The second-year nursing ward was full of simulated patients, enabling students to practice all types of common procedures such as inserting nasogastric tubes and changing dressings.

Our nursing students were captivated by the amazing facilities that are potentially available to them for future study at the university.

The nursing teaching staff were very welcoming and accommodating, allowing our students to get a real feel for what they could study in the future.

Georgina then discussed pathways that will enable our students to further their nursing studies.

## CERTIFICATE III INFORMATION, DIGITAL MEDIA AND TECHNOLOGIES

In 2019 the first group of Year 12 students completed their Certificate III Information, Digital Media and Technologies.

This has comprised of a mixture of working with industry-standard media applications such as web authoring with Adobe Dreamweaver and animation with AutoDesk 3ds Max and Adobe Animate, as well as fundamental technology skills such as hardware and software troubleshooting and support for computers and peripherals.

Following on from their success in creating interactive web pages for the Learning Commons in 2018, the Year 12 students again worked with the Learning Commons staff to create a Book Genre quiz, challenging students to guess the genre of books based on their covers.



Variations included working against a time limit, true or false choices, and allowing students to compete for high scores.

Students also learned about the basics of 3D modelling and both 2D and 3D animation, creating short animated intro videos for use in web pages or as introductory videos for longer online streaming content.

## CERTIFICATE II AND III MUSIC INDUSTRY

The Certificate II and III in Music Industry courses are offered in partnership with Bunbury Catholic College and the College of Sound and Music Production (COSAMP).

They are designed to help students get a foot in the door of the contemporary music industry. Students from both Marist and Mercy campuses this year organised, operated and performed in lunchtime concerts, at assemblies, the annual Marist music showcase 'That 70's Showcase' and Mercy on Show, plus various community events.

# DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES

## MARIST

2019 has been an exciting year for Digital Technologies at Bunbury Catholic College.

Different aspects of the new curriculum have been implemented throughout Years 7 to 10, from the broad focus of the core subject in Year 7 and 8 to specialising in Year 8 and 9 Robotics and investigating Data Science in Year 10 with Informatics.

Year 7 students continued to use Minecraft: Education Edition to great effect to explore the application of algorithms to a virtual world, writing programs to spawn animals, create customisable geometric shapes, and examine and interact with the environment to automatically explore and solve mazes.

Highlights from the Year 8 Digital Technologies course involved students utilising BBC Micro:bits (a tiny, pocket-sized computer) to use physical computing in order to learn about computer networking, privacy and security, and use their devices to hunt through the Learning Commons for hidden Bluetooth radio beacons. The Year 8 students also used their understanding of algorithms to develop virtual pets in the style of the classic Tamagotchi.

Year 8 and 9 Robotics students demonstrated their creativity by creating animatronic robots, incorporating paper-craft, recycled cardboard, and the laser cutter. Their creations used sound, movement, and light to affect the real world and respond to the environment by using infrared motion detectors, vibration sensors, microphones, and temperature and light intensity sensors.

2019 was the first time the College has offered an Informatics course, in which students learned about Data Science and using computer programming to extract information from large real-world data sets. Projects from this subject included analysis of the Australian Government Hansard to investigate what topics our politicians really show they care about. In addition, students performed sentiment analysis on text to determine whether it is positive or negative and its degree, which can be used in identifying good and bad product reviews or identifying potential online bullying.

## MERCY

Digital Technologies offered a range of computing subjects throughout Years 7 to 10. Students were provided with practical opportunities to develop design thinking, computing knowledge and to become innovative developers of digital solutions.

Digital Technology is compulsory for Year 7 and 8 students, who participated in one class per week for the whole year. Students had fun learning about digital citizenship, digital systems, networking and basic coding and programing skills using a micro:bit. In Year 7, all students participated in the Robotics elective using Edison robots. They used creative thinking and problem solving to bring coding to life in a hands-on way and investigated how robots could improve our lives by creating a prototype 'household helper' robot, using the Edison robots as a starting point.

In Years 8 to 10, elective classes ran for one semester. Students enjoyed learning a range of skills in the following courses:

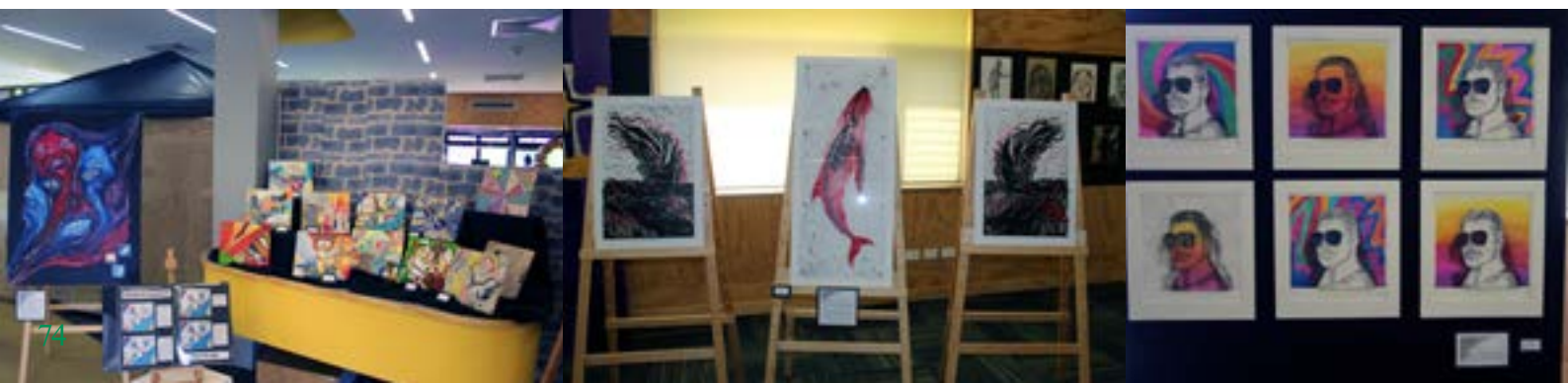

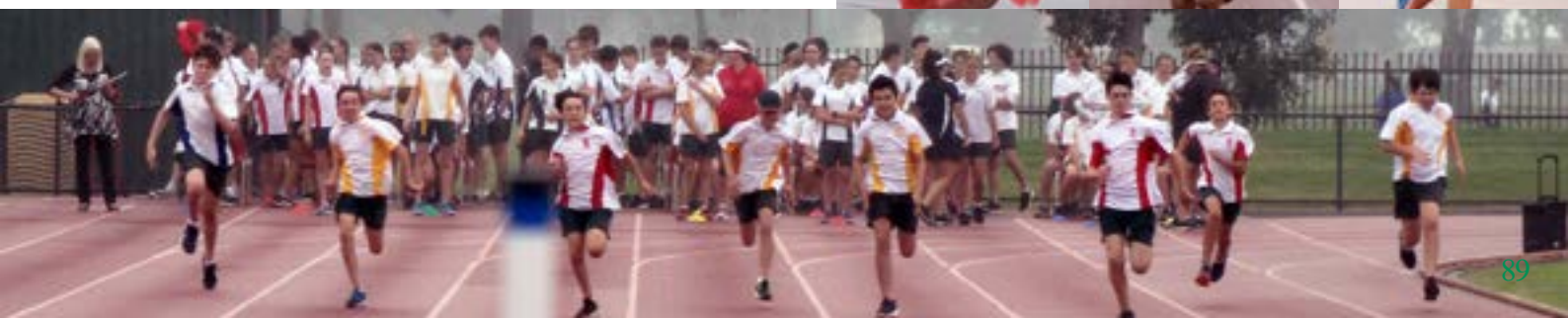
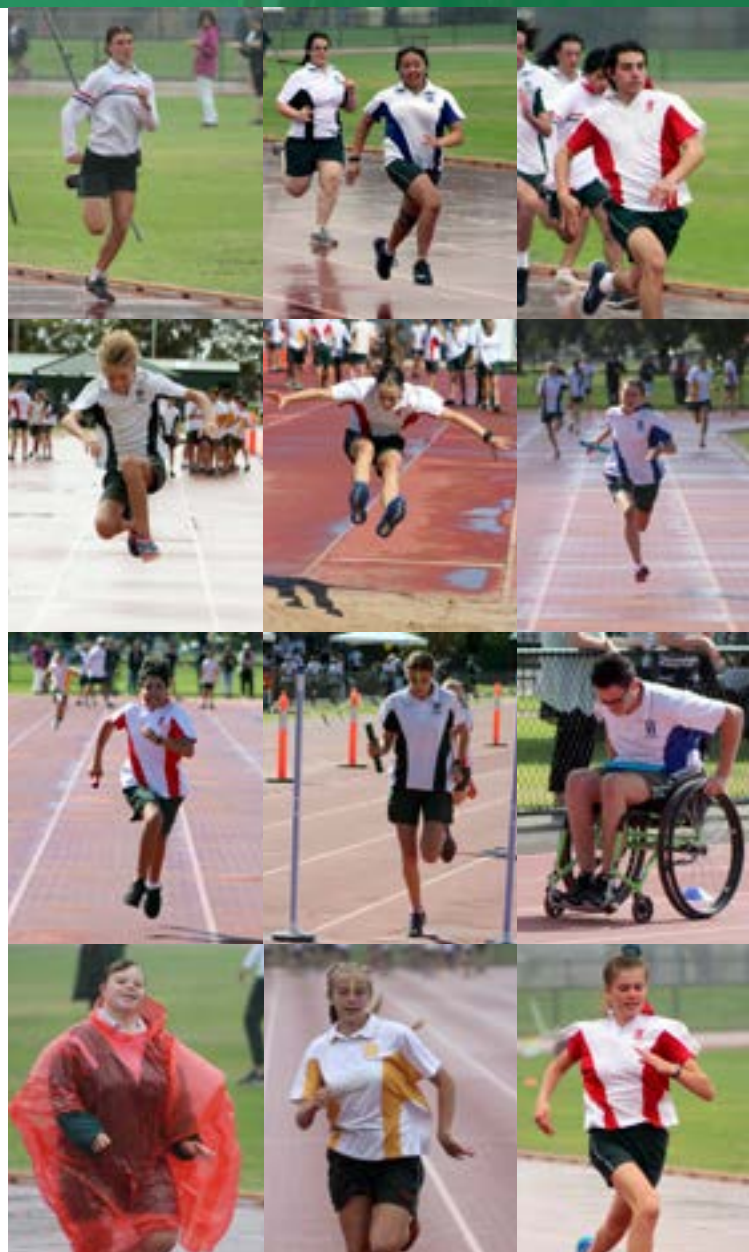

# BASKETBALL

Our basketball touring teams travelled to Bendigo in Victoria during the last week of Term 1 for this year's Australian Marist Carnival.

Our girls took out the Plate Division Grand Final, a fantastic feat considering we were one of the youngest and smallest teams at the carnival, and our team last year was winless.

The girls played against strong schools in the pool matches and lost all three on the opening day.

Day two started with another loss before wins over Trinity Catholic College (47-17) and Trinity College Beenleigh (49-28) meant we finished fifth in the group.

The girls' improvement continued on day three in the Plate competition.

A big 47-19 win over St Teresa's Catholic College Noosaville was followed by a 41-27 win over Cardijn College which meant we qualified for the grand final.

In a match which was live streamed on the internet enabling parents to tune in, our girls recorded their second win against Trinity College Beenleigh (46-38) in an exciting game to finish the carnival with five straight wins and a trophy.

It is a testament to their hard work; their improved team play and skills and their energy.

Leah York was also named into the Marist 10 Allstar team, selected by an independent panel of judges watching the pool games.

The boys played extremely well all carnival and were unfortunate to not come away with a win this year against bigger and stronger opposition.

During their matches in the Spirit Cup competition, as was the case for the whole week, the boys were not able to capitalise on the opportunities they had and gave away substantial leads to their opposition which they then needed to try to peg back.

Some bright moments in each game were enough to give the boys a bit of a look in, however, inconsistent shooting, defence and intensity proved their undoing.

### LEARNING

As part of the curriculum, students participated in the RAP (Research Analysis Project) program. This allowed students to use their research and creative skills to undertake a project of their choice. 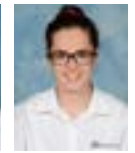

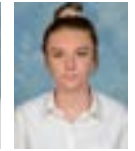

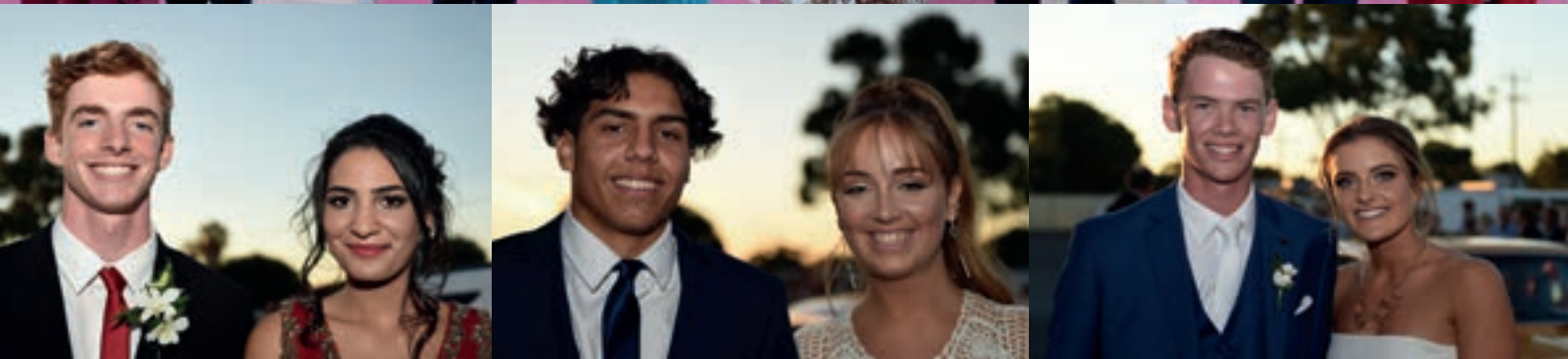
