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FROM THE PRINCIPAL

In 2020 our College entered an era of new beginnings and opportunities for our students and staff, coupled with unforeseen challenges presented to us in what has been described as "a year like no other" due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In January, our staff gathered to revisit 'Our Story' and to reflect on where we had come from as a school and to envision our future as a stand-alone College once more. As the year progressed, an important decision was needed; to decide upon our charism for 2021 and beyond, and this required consultation with our staff, students, Board members and parents.

After much discernment, the decision was made to adopt a single Marist Charism, enabling our students to strengthen their relationship with Jesus and Mary through the lens of St Marcellin Champagnat. While we are excited that from next year we will be strengthening our College's identity with a single Marist charism, as a community we must never forget the incredible contribution to the history and development of our College made by the Mercy Sisters who followed in the footsteps of Sr Catherine McAuley.

Our Opening Assembly celebrated the success of our 2019 cohort of leavers, with many exceptional results being realised by our Year 12 students. This year we were privileged to welcome our Kelderman Award for Excellence winner, Om Heble into the 99 Club. Om scored an ATAR of 99.25, placing him in the top 0.75% of all Year 12 students from throughout WA. Over 25% of our Year 12 ATAR students received an ATAR of 90 or above.

Each year, through the generosity of our Ex-Students' Association at Bunbury Catholic College, we acknowledge the top achieving student in Vocational Education and Training. For 2019, Amerikaz Bennell was the deserving winner of the Vocational Education and Training Award.

The effect of the March 11 declaration of the pandemic meant that we needed to adapt to a new mode of teaching and learning for the final weeks of Term 1 and the early weeks of Term 2. Students and staff learnt valuable online teaching and learning skills, enabling the continuation of our academic program with students learning from home. As a College, I am proud of the way that our staff and students showed incredible resilience and agility to adapt to online learning, enabling our teaching and learning programs to be delivered with minimal disruption.

Despite the changing world, our students have participated and excelled in academic, sporting and outdoor pursuits, faith experiences, cultural experiences, creative and performing arts and a wide range of educational experiences. Students in all year levels showed resilience and adaptability, working together to accept the changed landscape of 2020 while our staff members showed fortitude, flexibility and great care in responding to the situation as they continued to provide quality teaching and learning experiences for our students.

To all our students and in particular to our Year 12 students, your acceptance of change, dealing with some disappointments, and the ability to bounce back and adapt was inspirational for us all. Our 2020 Year 12 students, who

were the first cohort to start their secondary education in Year 7 and complete six years of schooling at the College, have shown their dedication and resilience throughout the year and we are proud of their achievements in both ATAR and VET streams.

My sincere thanks to all of our College's Student Leaders led by the College Executive, Head Girl Hannah Lowe and Head Boy Gavin Reddin supported by Executive Officers Kyden Toop and Hannah King. We extend our very best wishes and blessings to our Class of 2020 for their future and hope that they will return to BCC in the years ahead to share their successes.

This year our teachers have become skilled and students have become familiar with our newly embedded focus of Visible Learning strategies whereby students are given explicit learning intentions and success criteria for their lessons. Our Visible Learning pedagogy will continue in the years ahead with staff and students building upon the teaching and learning skills required to successfully embed this contemporary and evidence-based approach at our College.

Throughout Semester Two, the Board, staff, students and members of the College community provided valuable input for our 2021-2025 Strategic Plan which will be launched next year. As a College we strive to provide access for young adults whose parents seek a Catholic education for them. BCC's enhanced Academic, VET and STEM scholarships along with our new and exciting partnerships with MADALAH and Cross Verwijmeren Pty Ltd has meant that we can offer many new Academic, VET and STEM scholarships plus 13 scholarships

for our Aboriginal students in 2021. Our goal as a College is to double our enrolment of Aboriginal students over the coming two years and a highlight for our Indigenous students in 2020 was the launch of an Aboriginal culture room on our campus. The room is named Kaartijin Koorda Miya, meaning place of knowledge and friendships.

Our Board Chair Danny Griffin has led an incredibly talented and insightful College Board who have made excellent progress this year towards achieving their goals. The Board's Finance, Marketing and Capital Planning committees have also each made great contributions that will continue to be realised in 2021 and beyond, including the creation of a comprehensive Marketing Plan, planning for the implementation of a revised Capital Development Plan and providing valuable input for our 2021-2025 Strategic Plan.

Committee members of our Parents and Friends Association (P&F), led by President Mrs Suzanne Cross, continued to provide generous

support to enable our students to have the best possible resources. The re-fit of the Cafeteria and the provision of new furniture for our Learning Commons are greatly appreciated by our students and staff. I take this opportunity to thank Suzanne for her great contribution to the P&F over a number of years as she retires from the committee.

We value our strong relationship with the community and clergy of the Bunbury Diocese and I especially take this opportunity to sincerely thank Bishop Gerard Holohan for his great support of our College throughout 2020.

Every two years, we recognise the very important contributions made by former BCC students and staff through the Hall of Distinction. In 2020, it was wonderful to induct Mr Mark Handcock, the late Mrs Caroline Payne, Mr Colin Piacentini and Ms Denise O'Meara to this distinguished group, who are excellent role models for our BCC students.

I acknowledge the great commitment and dedication of

our College Executive and my PA Mrs Gillian Alietti. To Mr Brent Steere (Bursar), Mrs Deborah Garbutt (Deputy Principal), Mr John O'Dea (Deputy Principal) and Mrs Gobnait May (Religious Education Coordinator), my sincere thanks for your incredible team effort as we navigated our way through this year

Thank you also to all members of our Pastoral and Academic councils for your leadership and guidance of our staff and students throughout 2020. It has been a privilege to join and lead the College in its 47th year and my sincere gratitude is extended to all members of our staff for your outstanding commitment to provide the students at Bunbury Catholic College with a quality Catholic education.

BOARD REPORT



The Board Annual Report for 2020 provides evidence of the College's firm commitment to excellence in education, pastoral care, social justice and staff development, as well as the integral role families play in the life and spirit of the College. This year has tested and challenged us during the global pandemic, but it is was so typical of our rich heritage the way our staff, parents, carers and students co-operated to continue our students' education with minor disruptions.

In 2020 we also farewelled our 'sister campus', Our Lady of Mercy to become a separate standalone College. The various committees including staff, students, parents and carers that worked so hard through the challenges to make this such an outstanding success, should be applauded. As a community we can look back proudly over the past years in establishing two Colleges, giving parents and carers an opportunity to send their children to receive a quality secondary Catholic education in Bunbury and Australind. Today we witness nearly 1500 students in the Bunbury region being provided with this excellent opportunity.

The year was also exciting as we welcomed our new Principal in 2020, Mr Michael Pepper. With his enthusiasm and positive spirit, we look forward to the continued early momentum at the College and his unending desire to get the very best outcomes for each of our students.

During the year, we engaged in a thorough consultative exercise to determine the strategy and culture of the College for the future. It was therefore wonderful to see the College adopt a Marist tradition while paying homage to the Mercy Sisters. It is with this charism underpinning the strategy that Bunbury Catholic College will now rejuvenate its own identity as a positive landmark for education within the Bunbury region.

This year our College Board formed a Marketing Committee, and this talented team have developed a Marketing Strategic Plan to guide the College's marketing and promotional activities in the coming years. Attracting and retaining student enrolments remained a high priority to the ongoing financial viability of the College and the afore mentioned plan has already allowed for some initiatives to be implemented.

Our Board's Capital Planning Committee have scoped a future engagement plan, and selected architects will soon be presenting proposals for engagement as our preferred architect for 2021+. This will enable the revisioning of our Capital Development Plan to provide the very best facilities for our students at Bunbury Catholic College.

The Board will also be launching the College's 2021-2025 Strategic Plan following extensive consultation with the staff, students and parents of our College.

An externally audited, recurrent financial statement was adopted and close focus as always to our financial management will still be needed to ensure we remain a viable financial model in the years to come.

The College upgraded various facilities for students and staff. There was a strong focus on enhancing and maintaining teaching, student and staff facilities as well as information technology, to ensure the best possible learning environment for all our students.

Key capital works undertaken during 2020 included:

- Architects engaged for future development of BCC campus and buildings
- Upgrading of Canteen facility and layout
- Sound attenuating tiles and TV screens installed in the canteen
- Upgrade of IT systems and computers

 Administration and staffroom refurbishment

Student enrolments for the year was 838. Operating costs were met from recurrent income including recurrent per capita grants from state and federal governments. Cost of curriculum, co-curricular and sport, salaries and related costs, property and grounds, information technology, administration and deprecation remained within approved budgets.

During 2020, the College managed and closely monitored its financial position and will continue to do so with soft macro-economic conditions compared to previous years.





Parents and carers are integral partners in the education process and the Board, the P&F, and other forums at our College allow this partnership to flourish. The College actively encourages parents to participate in the learning, faith, sport, co-curricular and social activities of the College and by giving their time and skills in this way makes our College life that little more rounded to benefit our fine students.

I would like to thank all the Board Members and the P&F Team. Your dedication and volunteering are the foundation of community and the very charitable instinct of our Catholic tradition.

Mental health was an area that the P&F addressed through sponsorship of mental first aid courses within the school. It raised a healthy conversation at the August meeting and we are hoping that a difference can be made with the program extending next year.



This year saw the completion of the new student lockers, a project that has been staged over the last 2 years, something that the P&F are particularly proud to have achieved by working with the College Board.

The P&F once again has financially supported sports, music and catholic youth teams who have represented Bunbury Catholic College. In addition, the school's scholarship and music programs have been assisted through the P&F funding. As you can all appreciate, the P&F role is extremely significant to the level of extra resourcing that staff, students and parents can experience at Bunbury Catholic College.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank,P&F/Board Liaison Representative Kate Turner, Treasurer Teena Manning, Secretary Anthea Turkington, and Vice President Alan Buckley.

I would also like to express my sincere gratitude for the amazing opportunity I have experienced as President of the P&F. I have always maintained that we need to be on the education journey together with our children and for me personally this is one way I have been involved the last couple of years at Bunbury Catholic College. 

FAITH, LIFE, CULTURE

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The focus of Faith, Life and Culture activities at Bunbury Catholic College centres on the Marist aim to "make Jesus known and loved. Important in directing this focus are the two main areas of this department – Religious Education classes which all students attend and Campus Ministry activities which all students participate in some capacity. The two areas are not mutually exclusive, enjoying a symbiotic relationship where they each contribute to and enhance students' capabilities, which, in turn, enable them to get the most out of their experience of Religious Education classes, Catholic liturgies, Retreats and Christian service opportunities with the ultimate aim of ensuring a real relationship between each member of the BCC community and Jesus Christ.

The Religious Education programmes are constructed to comply with the mandate of the West Australian bishops. Students from Years Seven to Twelve learn about the beliefs, teachings, structures, practices and history of the Catholic religion. While students will sometimes examine other

religions, the emphasis will remain on the Catholic Religion. Religious Education teachers also work to ensure that students are learning level appropriate cross-curriculum skills, including; written and oral responses that allow students to demonstrate their capacity in Standard English, and the use of various media and technology both to express ideas and understandings, and to effectively and ethically research information. The Religious Education teachers, in the Marist spirit of being "generous of heart, constant and persevering in our daily work, confident, visionary, decisive in meeting the needs of our community" work very hard to ensure that classes are dynamic learning environments where every effort is made to ensure that classroom cohorts are differentiated so that students' diverse learning styles are considered when designing and delivering learning. Along with all Learning Areas at BCC, Religious Education began the process of using the methodology of Visible Learning, a pedagogical tool that, in 2020, saw us emphasise the need to ensure students were clear about the Essential Learning required, and that

they acquired processes by which they would frequently interrogate their success in attaining that essential learning. We are looking forward to extending the application of Visible Learning in 2021.

The core academic business of Religious Education continued in 2020 despite the disruptions caused by the Global COVID-19 Pandemic. Staff continued to provide energised, dynamic and studentcentred learning opportunities for students in Religious Education, while also adapting to new modes of delivery online. The students and their parents were instrumental in the success of the online teaching/ learning opportunities created by BCC staff. Because of their unstintingly positive response to staff initiatives and directives, BCC teachers felt a very strong sense of community which made any extra work required in reconfiguring modes of delivery of learning and re-construction of Assessment schedules and weightings a great deal easier. From a personal perspective it is a privilege to work in this generous community of staff, students and parents.









An important focus of the Catholic College relates to enabling the students to establish a sense of their Catholic identity. While this is part of what all staff at BCC seek to achieve it is particularly important for Religious Education both in the classroom and in Ministry. 2020 was an historic year for our community as we became one school with a commitment to Marist values and charism. Bunbury Catholic College has always identified Mary as a model for Catholic people - as promoted by both the Marist and the Mercy religious orders. Consequently, 2020's move to a Marist focus brought no fundamental changes to BCC's values but provided an excellent opportunity for the College community to revisit, clarify and amplify those values. Religious Education and Ministry are very important in ensuring that the nomenclature and phraseology of the Marist Brothers are made familiar for students. BCC is very blessed in having Ms Smith, the College's Marist Representative, who has worked tirelessly and enthusiastically throughout 2020 to ensure that all BCC staff are fully versed in Marist characteristics, in the history of the Marist brothers and the current responses of the Marist Order to today's world and its events. This has been invaluable for Religious Education staff in the classrooms as they pass on that learning to students in this Marist school.

Teaching religious and spiritual concepts can be challenging, especially when the experience of all students does not necessarily include regular participation in or practice of religious rituals and

world view. Therefore, the BCC Campus Ministry, co-ordinated from 2020 by Ms Santoro, is a vital aspect of how students experience religion, and, for some students, this allows them to participate more effectively in learning about religious and spiritual concepts and Christian ways of seeing the world. Ms Santoro's joyful, enthusiastic and innovative approach to her new role of co-ordinating liturgies, Retreats, prayer and stewardship opportunities meant that, despite the restrictions caused by the need for COVID-19 compliance, 2020 was a wonderful year for student and staff involvement in our Catholic culture and Faith.

We would like to thank Bishop Gerard Holohan for generously giving of his time to celebrate with us at College and Year group Masses, at Feast Day and at the Year Twelve Graduation. Bishop Gerard's inclusion of students and staff in discussions about liturgies and Ministry events has been instrumental in ensuring inclusivity and connectivity in the practice of our Catholic Faith.

We are looking forward with hope to 2021. Having established good practice and community collaboration in 2020 and laid the groundwork for new and innovative approaches in the future, we fully expect that 2021 will be an excellent year at Bunbury Catholic College.

BECOMING A SINGLE CHARISM SCHOOL

In March 2019, Catholic Education Commission WA announced that the Bunbury Catholic College (BCC) Mercy Campus located in Australind would become a new secondary school with its own identity in 2020. After five years of being a two-campus school, big changes lay ahead, and the decision had significant implications for our Bunbury Catholic College Marist Campus.

On January 1, Mr Michael Pepper commenced his appointment as Principal of Bunbury Catholic College; once again the school was a single campus with a single address. A new chapter in the history of BCC was beginning and there were many questions about future directions for the College.

One important question related to the charism of the College. In 1972, Bishop Myles McKeon "took decisive action" to amalgamate the Marist Brothers' St Francis Xavier's College and the Mercy Sisters' St Joseph's School into a co-educational Catholic College and each school brought its own charism. For 47 years, both Marist and Mercy charisms have influenced the spirituality of the BCC community.

WHAT IS A CHARISM?

Marist Brother Sean Sammon FMS describes a charism as "a gift or grace given by the Holy Spirit to an individual not for their own benefit, but for the profit of the whole Church".

When we talk about charisms in a school, we are trying to describe how this gift or grace is lived out in the daily life of the school. The charism received by Marcellin Champagnat, which inspires the Marist Brothers and all their ministries today, is more than prayer and spirituality, it is the presence of the Holy Spirit working through all Marists to make 'Jesus Christ known and loved' in the world.

DISCERNMENT

During 2020, BCC began a process of discernment to determine whether it should continue as a two-charism school or focus on a single charism. BCC staff started by delving into the story of Bunbury Catholic College; to go forward, we needed to know our past.

We listened to anecdotes from Dr Les Fabre and Mrs Nan Martella regarding teaching at the College in the 1980s and 1990s, then Mr Tom Hall spoke about his long involvement with the College, working on the School Board to coordinate building works in the school.



Staff broke into groups and, using resources from the school archives and the web, developed two timelines, one for local and world events, to chart the history of the College. As a staff we learned many things about BCC, and this opened the way for conversations about our charism, a new Vision and Mission and our future.

By the middle of Semester 1, much had changed since the hot January day when we reflected on our BCC story. Throughout the world communities were dealing with the effects of COVID-19 and while Bunbury was virus free, like all West Australians there were changes regarding how to gather as we considered the charism and our Vision and Mission.

Tables were 'social distanced', morning tea was served as individual packaged portions and Julie Ryan, the Regional Director for Marist Schools in Western Australia joined the day via a Teams meeting because she was in lockdown in Victoria and the WA state border was closed to the rest of Australia. Nevertheless, staff made significant progress considering the charism, vision and mission for the school.

Change can be difficult and many in the College community expressed concern about honouring the history of the school as we move forward. If the school decided to become a single charism school in the Marist tradition, how would the Mercy connections be remembered?

The Sisters of Mercy played a significant role in establishing Catholic Education in Bunbury and staff were clear that the Sisters' contribution must remain part of the BCC story. When we examined the stories of both the Mercy Sisters and the Marist Brothers, we understood that both have always answered the call to go where they are needed.


For the Sisters of Mercy this meant, in 1883, leaving Perth for Bunbury; in 1973 it meant joining with the Marist Brothers to open BCC and now in 2020 it means inspiring the charism Our Lady of Mercy College in Australind.

Similarly, in 1954, the Marists came to offer secondary education to boys in the region and established St Francis Xavier College on the site we know as BCC; they answered the call of Bishop McKeon to amalgamate with the Mercy Sisters in 1973 and they continue to offer support and inspiration to our school because they consider it to be part of the Marist family.









FAMILY SPIRIT

Ultimately, when the Mercy Sisters and the Marist Brothers answered the call to educate children in the Bunbury region their focus was to provide quality Catholic education for students. In 2020 and beyond Bunbury Catholic College remains committed to their original vision.

In 2021, Bunbury Catholic College, will be a single charism school educating our students to become good Christians and good citizens in the Marist tradition. It is a tradition characterised by simplicity, presence, family spirit, love of work all done in the way of Mary. As we begin this new chapter in the story of BCC, we will discover how the characteristics can be lived everyday in the College community.

YEAR 8 HUMANITIES

Sustainable City Design

Year 8 students worked in small groups to plan and build either a 3D or 2D sustainable city, with some groups finalising their design on Minecraft.

This project builds on the Humanities skills and knowledge covered in Geography where they learnt about urbanisation, mega cities and migration. The project also integrated with the students' focus in their Mathematics lessons: 3D shapes and scale.

Students explored five areas that require planning for a city to be sustainable: waste management, transport, energy, food supply and nature.

They undertook research on these five areas and considered international examples where cities have adopted one or more sustainable features. "Designing the city to reduce pollution was our main aim. We learnt a lot about building design to reduce energy use" – Kate

Students will evaluate the models based on the following criteria:

- Consideration of social cohesion, equity and accessibility
- Reducing greenhouse gas emissions
- Protecting and preserving local flora and fauna
- Reduced pollution in water, atmosphere and soil
- Reduced waste and effective waste management systems

"It was important for our city to collect wave and wind energy for electricity so we have built it on the coast"

The students have enjoyed the hands-on application of their new understanding of sustainable design.

"Our city has facilities for all groups such as places of worship and parks for recreation. We designed the houses to be as close as possible to lots of important services so that the need for transport is reduced" – Lily



YEAR 7 HUMANITIES

Roman Artefacts

The Year 7 Humanities classes studied ancient civilisations in their History unit. This culminated in students writing a journal article from the point of view of an individual who may have lived in ancient Rome and the production of an ancient Roman artefact for a museum display. The artefacts created by the students were displayed in the Learning Commons and students who viewed the artefacts throughout the week voted on their favourite creation.

"Our Humanities history assignment was about the ancient Romans and how they lived. Our assignment took us back over 2500 years ago and explored the lives of the emperors,

slaves, soldiers and other citizens of the empire. The Romans ruled large areas of land from Britain in the west right across to Egypt in the east and continued for over 1000 years. The Romans are known for the way they governed and set up the rule of law, and they continue to be remembered as inventors and creators. Things we regularly use today, such as roads, buildings, newspapers, and even the alphabet, had their beginnings in ancient Rome. History has made us who we are today. Without ancient Romans and the advanced technology, life would be extremely different for us right now."

Year 7s testing water filters

As American Astronomer Carl Sagan once said, "We live in a society exquisitely dependent on science and technology, ...".

Never has this been more true than in 2020.

It is a year that will forever be etched in our memory, not only as the year of COVID-19, but a year in which our lives were shaped by science and scientists. In fact, we relied upon them.

Chief medical scientists dictated to governments when to close and open country borders, when to impose and to ease lockdown, social distancing and mask-wearing restrictions and when and how to quarantine infected individuals.

We have relied on scientists like epidemiologists, virologists, microbiologists, biochemists, geneticists, doctors and nurses, to name but a few, to keep us safe from the virus and to rapidly develop, disseminate and administer vaccines faster than ever before.

In 2020 we welcomed Mr Brad Dunn back onto our Science staff. Despite COVID-19 and the cancellation of some events, students completed some great work in Science and participated in many excursions and activities.



Right back in February, all our lower school (7-10) students enjoyed a SciTech experience during which they expanded their understanding of the application of science and technology 'beyond the beaker'.

At around the same time, several enthusiastic Year 8 teams competed to represent the College in the annual Solar Car Challenge. The selected team performed admirably in the regional heats, but unlike in 2019, did not progress to the state final.

Also, in February, Year 12 Biology students applied their knowledge of DNA extraction and analysis techniques looking for a gene that causes melanoma during a day in the laboratories at the Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research in Perth, while Year 11 Biology students put their knowledge of in-field sampling and testing techniques into practice during the annual ecological sampling field trip.

Our Year 7s used everyday materials to design and build water filters for use in third world countries and the filters were demonstrated at the College Open Day.

Year 9s completed a variety of STEAM projects aimed at solving real-world issues like bridge construction, shelter and insulation for survival in extreme environments, and light aircraft design. They learnt a lot about the design process and how important it is to work collaboratively and be persistent in their problem-solving efforts.

Open Day demonstrations

Later in the year, Year 11 Biology students participated in the annual Biological Science Olympiad Exam – a tough national exam covering both Year 11 and 12 content. Special mention goes to Anai Gelmi who achieved a Distinction.

Year 11 EES students again got to study the geology and ecology within Mammoth Cave in Margaret River and John Forrest National Park, east of Perth, while Year 12 EES students studied metamorphic rocks along the South West coast.

Year 11 Physics students attended the 'Physics Big Day Out' at Adventure World. Year 12 General Human Biology students studying microscopy got to visit a local laboratory and see the use of an electron microscope capable of magnifying images up to 100,000 times. Brodie Payton and Will Wright examined a wasp eye up close and personal and were surprised to see the eyes have hairs in them!

Like the Biology students earlier in the year, in Term 3 the Year 12 Human Biology students visited the Institute of Medical Research in Perth to apply their biotechnology skills. While the Year 12 Psychology and Human Biology students were unable to travel to the Perth Zoo due to COVID-19 restrictions, they were able to interact remotely in presentations from Zoo education officers about animal psychology and human evolution.

The breadth of science courses on offer and activities to be involved in at the College were on display for visitors who attended our BCC Open Day in September. Students from all year levels ably demonstrated and explained an array of different science concepts, with all visitors commenting on their enthusiasm and expertise.

As with all BCC teaching teams in 2020, the Science team have been magnificent in how quickly and competently they adapted to remote learning when required, and how many of them continued the use of technology in their classes throughout the year.

I wish to sincerely thank them for their efforts in continuing to engage and inspire their students with a love of all things science.

ARTS - DANCE

Dance at Bunbury Catholic College continues to provide students with a range of learning experiences which develop many transferrable skills. Through our courses, students experience a variety of dance genres, with this year seeing Hip Hop as a favourite among the Year 8 cohort, as well as analysis of dance works and many opportunities to work as part of a team. Our practical tasks develop confidence, physical skills, communication and problem solving skills in addition to the technique and dance choreography skill development.

The end of Term One and start of Term Two were definitely a little different this year, with online learning a new experience for us all. It was really great to see the commitment and work ethic of our students who embraced the new way of schooling and gave it their best shot. The experience of teaching in an empty room to a computer was a new one for most of us here at the College and certainly threw the practical areas into a bit of a spin. I know I certainly had trouble making sure I was still in the video while

twirling and leaping about the space, to say nothing of our wonderful students trying to emulate the movements in only about two square metres of space at home.

It was most certainly a relief when students were able to return and life could revert to a nearly normal state. Group tasks were another interesting experience for both students and teachers, with some creative solutions needing to be developed. Although not always successful we certainly managed and it was great for us all to realise what we can do when the situation is more of a challenge than usual.

COURSE WORK

It has been great to see all of the Year 7 students enjoying the dance program this year. They have learnt a variety of dance genres from Tap to Jazz to Contemporary and even had the opportunity to perform for their peers – both a scary and exhilarating situation for many. The main focus of this course continues to be exploration and creation and it is so rewarding to see the development of the students over each term.

The Year 8 and 9 programs run for a semester each and students have the opportunity to participate in either two or three lessons per week. Technical skills are developed in one or two genres, with Hip Hop being the favourite for Year 8 in 2020 and the Year 9s enjoying some Contemporary and Jazz. Performance for an audience continues to be an important part of our course, luckily we were able to continue with this even in our current environment, as it is essential in the development of confidence and dance presentation skills. Analysis is another aspect of the dance courses we offer and students develop this through viewing and dissecting both their own and others' work.

This year students were also required to devise and lead warm-ups for their classes which has certainly developed their skills in a range of ways. The posture and alignment aspect of the Year 9 course continues to hold the interest of our students as they analyse how they stand and what has impacted them individually.









PERFORMANCES

2020 has certainly thrown us a few curve balls with regards to performance and unfortunately we weren't able to evade them all. We did, however, manage to have a pretty good year despite its challenges.

Although a little light on with performances, in comparison to previous years, with our usual Eisteddfod competition cancelled and Students in the Spotlight changing to a two-yearly rotation, we did have a couple of opportunities for our students, which was more than we thought possible in the middle of April.

The Semester 1 Dance Concert came together very quickly and all students should be congratulated for their efforts in producing some wonderful performances from a restricted preparation.

We were grateful for the opportunity to have an audience for this performance and the concert was well supported by family and friends. Our Semester Two Showcase had a more traditional preparation and students certainly benefited from the uninterrupted practice.

Our Year 8 Students, not without some trepidation, performed wonderfully at the Year 6 Orientation Day, showcasing just some of the opportunities on offer at Bunbury Catholic College. Both groups got their groove on, with some Hip Hop and Urban Jazz dances that we are sure inspired the Year 6s for their workshops later in the day.

Presentation Night saw the Year 9s perform their contemporary piece which had a great message for our young female students of "the beauty within and valuing yourself". They did an amazing job and the piece was well received by the audience.

A group of Year 9 and 10 students broke away from tradition and performed the opening Prayer as a dance to the song "Our Father". It was a moving item that included the "Matilda" cast and Choir members joining the dancers on stage to sing and sign the final chorus. The students received many compliments on their performance and costumes from the audience, and there was even a tear or two from our new Ministry Coordinator Ms Rose Santoro.

Rehearsals have been going strong in Semester 2 of 2020 after our postponement of the combined Colleges production of 'Matilda'. We have a dance ensemble in the production and they have been working hard to learn a variety of genres and specialist performance sections for the show.

ARTS - DRAMA





It was wonderful to see the Performing Arts learning area continue to flourish in the face of adversity, during what was a challenging year.

My thanks go out to all Drama students who have shown a great deal of resilience and ingenuity to make the most out of their Performing Arts courses. We looked at new and innovate ways to create performance, including radio plays, online auditions for performance and the live streaming of some work online for an audience.

It was unfortunate that plans for the 2020 school production of 'Matilda – The Musical' had to be temporarily put on hold, but we are pleased to have secured dates in February 2021 to push on with this massive event. Students have been working hard to bring the show together despite the disrupted schedule. It was fantastic to be able to show a small taster of the show at the College Presentation Evening.

Year 7 Drama has seen all students get a taste of the big stage in a combined Drama, Dance and Music concert held at the conclusion of the course. Students had the opportunity to learn basic drama skills such as blocking, stage geography, characterisation and elements of performance throughout the term as well as delving into some improvisation skills. Year 7 groups worked hard on creating their own modernised versions of some of the most famous fairy tales.

Students in Year 8 took a big step up in the performance area with the challenge of staging their own class production of 'Robin the Hood' for lunchtime viewing. The play was very well received by a large number of guests including the Principal Mr Michael Pepper who was full of praise for all the students involved. This was followed by work on children's theatre which involved preparing drama activities for younger students.







In Year 9, we started to look at a variety of drama forms and styles including some interpretation of Shakespearean texts and the creation of melodrama performances. Students began working on the design elements of performance such as lighting, set, costume and sound.

The semester highlight was our public performance of 'The Wicked Prince'. It was wonderful to be able to perform to a live audience again and the students did an outstanding job at entertaining them through a full 50-minute performance.

Our Year 10s continued to work hard across a variety of Drama forms and the focus for their units this year was non-realist theatre and included work in Absurdist Theatre, Poor Theatre and Theatre of Cruelty. Students looked at both scripted and devised pieces in performance and explored a wide array of themes and stimulus. They also experimented with different types of staging and audience interaction techniques. This unit allowed for some very creative and thought-provoking performances and allowed students to adequately prepare for the rigours of upper school Drama.

Our senior students worked extremely hard this year in what was a challenging time to be creating performance for exams. The Year 11s created and performed scenes from our world text 'God of Carnage' that explored relationships and the trials and tribulations of being an 'adult', while the Year 12s pushed themselves to create some very challenging pieces for their end of year performance exams.

My thanks as always go out to our performing arts assistant Mrs Karen Walker who always works hard behind the scenes to ensure that our students have the best possible resources available to them for their work.

I would also like to mention Year 9 student Logan Turner who works on most of the technical aspects of our performances. Logan has also been selected to take part in a design program in 2021 as part of the Perth Festival. The Performing Arts learning area appreciates his efforts.




ARTS - MUSIC

2020 ARTS -VISUAL



2020 was an unconventional year, challenging for staff and students alike, but the COVID-19 restrictions led to diverse and innovative online tasks being completed at home, and confirmed how much learning occurs in the physical art room.

Mr Andy Lockley's Year 7 Art class designed African Tribal mask lino prints, whilst Mrs Jeannie Lewis' Year 8 classes created colourful pencil cases with a repeat pattern print inspired by nature. Second projects included tonal portrait paintings.

Mrs Lewis' Year 9 and 10 Visual Art classes were also challenged by COVID-19 interruptions in Semester One but they managed to create architectural tower sculptures from found and recycled materials, paintings that explored perspective,

street art inspired painted 3D boxes, reminiscent of the built environment and mixed media portraits.

In Semester Two, Year 10 students were inspired by political cartoonists to create BCC Staff caricatures and their own political cartoons, Year 9s designed the College Birthday Card and ceramic vessels that both utilised the collograph technique.

The upper school ATAR and General students were lucky to attend their annual excursion to the Art Gallery of WA to view the Pulse Perspectives - an exhibition of outstanding artworks from the previous Year 12 Visual Arts students in WA.

The aim of this excursion, plus a portrait painting workshop run by local artist Sarah Mills, was to inspire our students in their production pieces for the year. This included etchings based upon the theme 'Sense of Place' and mixed media paintings where students communicated aspects of their life journey through symbolism.

Year 12 students chose to hone their drawing and painting skills after researching themes heavily based on social commentaries and personal expression. Despite the shorter timeframe to complete projects, students stepped up to complete intriguing and professional works.

























LANGUAGES









At Bunbury Catholic College, the learning of second languages has become a journey you cannot miss. Although considered by many a demanding subject, each year more and more students seem to embrace the difficult but achievable challenge.

INDONESIAN

BUNBURY CATHOLIC COLLEGE VET/CAREERS CENTRE

Our goal is to promote health, happiness and balance within all students, in order for them to embrace the future with the opportunities that are presented to them today.

As a department, we recognise that everyone has different objectives when it comes to their educational journey. With that in mind, we encourage students to create an individual pathway, one that encompasses their interests, passions, needs and wants in relation to achieving WACE, and into the future, whether that be employment, university or TAFE.

We have three rules for success:
Health – Happiness – Balance. To
foster these principles, a partnership
is created between the Student, the
Parents, and the College. We offer
individual student Career Guidance
as well as Career classes and a
week of Work Exposure for Year 10
students, one day per week Workplace
Learning, and information sessions
for parents throughout Years 9, 10, 11
and 12.

We also hosted an online South West Careers Expo and career professional networking events, creating links with the wider community, in order to open doors to further opportunities, beyond school.

We bring together resources to build a strong upper school program that promotes individual student interest, needs and abilities which will only lead to success.

Courses on Offer:

We specialise in creating an individual pathway that suits the student through school and into the future. This can be done through an ATAR or general pathway, or a combination of both. There is also the option to include certificate courses in their pathway, either through the College as a part of the students' timetable or with external providers such as South Regional TAFE or the Bunbury Regional Trade Training Centre.

Nationally recognised and industry standard qualifications are offered as stand-alone Certificate Courses within our regular school timetable. The following courses were available for Year 10, 11 & 12, throughout 2020:

- Certificate II in Business
- Certificate II in Creative Industries (Film & Photography)
- Certificate III in Early Childhood Education and Care
- Certificate II in Engineering Pathways
- Certificate III in Information and Digital Media Technology
- Certificate II & III in Music
- Certificate II in Outdoor Recreation
- Certificate IV in Preparation for Health and Nursing Studies
- Certificate II in Sport and Recreation

Additionally, short courses are offered throughout the year. These programs can greatly increase a student's opportunities to gain part-time employment and to work during a gap year. They may also be a stepping stone into further training courses.

- Senior First Aid 48 students
- AUSTSWIM Qualifications –

Off Campus Learning

External registered training organisations allow us to provide additional nationally recognised certificate courses to our students through VETDSS (VET Delivered to Secondary Students). Students who chose to study these courses were off campus one or two days per week, while still maintaining their regular school subjects.

This requires the student to be mature, self-driven and well organised to ensure they still meet their WACE graduation requirements. Both off-the-job training and practical work placement components allow students to gain knowledge, skills and a qualification in their chosen industry.

Online Courses:

In addition to the internal and external certificate courses listed above, students can also choose to undertake an online course that really holds their interest. If there is something a student is passionate about but is not available within the school timetable or through external providers, then they can seek out and complete an online certificate course that fits their interest. We work with the students and their families to discover together how it will work for them and satisfy WACE requirements.

In 2020, seven students studying at the College undertook online courses, including:

School Based Traineeships

School-Based Traineeships and School-Based Apprenticeships offer the opportunity for students to receive training towards a qualification, earn a wage and stay at school while achieving WACE.

A School Based Trainee completes four days of school with one or two days of paid work placement during the week. They must continue to achieve at school and meet graduation requirements, complete the theory components of the qualifications and on-the-job work placement and assessments. We currently have students in school-based traineeships in

- Certificate III in Retail
- Certificate II in Warehouse
 Operations

Year 10, 11 and 12 Workplace Learning

The Workplace Learning program provides the opportunity for students to gain experience and knowledge by working in several industries to













identify the right career pathway for them. Students build networks and professional relationships with employers and workplace mentors, who provide our students with industry advice and support. This gives our students a better perception of the work requirements, both day-to-day and the pathways to take to achieve their goals.

2020 saw all work placements postponed at the height of the pandemic but our 230 strong employer network welcomed our students back as soon as it was safe to do so. Even with a global pandemic we created over 450 work placements this year! A credit to our students' work ethic and commitment, and our College's positive reputation with employers.

Our links with local businesses within Bunbury and surrounding areas, give students prime opportunities to reinforce their career goals and, with the right attitude, turn it into a reality. The support of these businesses allows us to continue running our Workplace Learning programs and, in turn, develop work-ready students.

We have been amazed at the huge number of employment opportunities in 2020. We have promoted over 60 jobs to our students including apprenticeships, traineeships, casual, part-time, gap year and full-time positions. We have had a large number of students successfully secure an apprenticeship in 2020. Congratulations to these students!

Year 10 Careers and Work Exposure Week

Our Careers and Work Exposure programs offer our students insight into what the workplace entails. These programs provide a wonderful opportunity for students to learn about their interests and different industries as well as preparing them for the workplace. Work Exposure is often the first time students are exposed to a real work environment. Students complete a careers workbook throughout the year and attend a workplace for a period of one week and in doing so, students gain knowledge of:

- Communication Skills
- Preparing for work in a real work environment
- Participating in Work Health and Safety Practices
- Future subject and career pathways
- Networking

Along with many other significant events in 2020, our Work Exposure week had to be postponed. However, we were lucky that only 4 months later, our students were out into the workplace. Given the travel restrictions, most students secured their placements with local businesses in industries such as hospitality. education and retail. Some students were lucky enough to travel to Perth and beyond, even to Kalgoorlie and Exmouth! All students completed a Work Exposure logbook recording tasks, observations and hours. Their workplace supervisors completed an assessment providing feedback on the student's week of work. This will become a very valuable resource for their portfolio and resume.















Work Exposure is a learning experience and students made comments on their time in the workplace;

"It gave me a good idea on how many workplaces there are, and the day to day life of a working person."

"It helped me to communicate better, be organised and get up early to be ready for the work day."

"It has helped me define what I want to do. I enjoyed the whole week!"

"I enjoyed being able to complete a job and have it working at the end of the day."

"Without communication, nothing would get done and hazards and risks would become substantially higher."

Try-A-Trade Program

Try-A-Trade Programs have become very popular over recent years. These programs are organised by the Bunbury Regional Trade Training Centre and South Regional TAFE. They provide an opportunity for our Year 9 and 10 Students to experience trade areas, allowing the students to discover if that trade area is something they wish to study in upper school or beyond. This year we had students undertake three-day Try-A-Trade programs in Construction, Plumbing, and Engineering. Unfortunately, COVID-19 meant many more of these programs were cancelled. We look forward to providing more of these programs to our students in 2021.



















CERTIFICATE II AND III IN MUSIC

The Certificate II and III in Music Industry courses are offered through a Bunbury Catholic College partnership with the College of Sound and Music Production (COSAMP).

They are designed to help students get a foot in the door of the contemporary music industry.
Students this year organised, operated and performed in BCC lunchtime concerts, at assemblies and the annual Feast Day concert. Students worked on original music with some spending time in the recording studio creating their first music demo.

YEAR 11 AND 12 CERTIFICATE II IN FILM AND PHOTOGRAPHY

We started off the year with a full list of excursions and incursions planned, full of fun, footage and filming! We welcomed two talented ex-students back to BCC to inspire us! Former BCC student and current Murdoch Film student, Alex Szabadics, visited the Year 11 and 12 Cert II Film and Photography classes and provided some great feedback on their major project for the year, their Cinefest film.

Alex, who graduated in 2016, is now studying film-making at Murdoch University. (Youtube at Alex Szabadics Media). Alex was runner-up in the Cinefest Film Competition in his final year, so was able to provide some invaluable advice on their story line, script and setting ideas.

Cinematographer and past BCC student, Reilly Stewart, also visited the two classes to discuss cinematography; the art of photography and camerawork in film making. Reilly has been working as a cinematographer for the past two years, after graduating from UWA in Psychology.

And then COVID-19 hit! What a challenging year for the film and photography industries on the whole, with film and entertainment some of the industries hardest-hit by the fallout from COVID-19. With this in mind, our students have done extremely well despite cancelled excursions and workshops to produce quality film projects and submit photographic work to three photo competitions.

CinefestOz gave students the opportunity to create short films inspired by the theme 'Suitcase', which they developed in small 'crews' and shot in a variety of locations from the school grounds to Boranup Forest. The Year 11 class also worked as a larger film crew to produce a documentary on 'Year 11 Life', while the Year 12 class did the same to create the 'Year 12 Breakfast Video' which was screened at the traditional end-of-year breakfast.

Our photographic escapades had students contributing creative photography to the Aqwest photo competition, with Rory O'Connor successful in having his work printed in the 2021 Aqwest calendar. The Chevron photo competition asked budding photographers to showcase Western Australian biodiversity through photography and research. Students also entered work in the ATOM photo competition which this year followed the theme 'Fragility'.

The Certificate IV Preparation for Nursing and Health course continued into Year 12 at Bunbury Catholic College this year. In Year 11, students had completed between three and four modules out of seven, so the challenge was on to complete the remaining modules by September. While the COVID-19 pandemic presented some challenges, fortunately the Nursing course was completely online so the students

fortunately the Nursing course was completely online so the students could continue their studies at home during the lockdown. Unfortunately, it meant that we were unable to undertake a planned excursion to Curtin University to visit the Nursing Education facilities.

One of the modules to be completed was Maths in Nursing. This involved students becoming proficient at reading patient charts and learning to calculate the correct doses of drugs to administer to patients.

As this is an extremely important

skill, I gave supplementary lessons for this module, and students were encouraged to practise their calculations given various scenarios.

The other modules involved less exciting, but essential skills such as research, report writing, mind mapping, creation of PowerPoints and posters, and time management. They learned about curating information from the internet, journals and other sources to prepare them for their future studies in Nursing. Students worked in teams to produce posters dealing with health issues that could be presented to the public for education purposes.

This year Bunbury Catholic College hosted an Open Day and the Nursing students were keen to get involved. Since part of their course was about educating people about health issues, they put together a presentation that dealt with the COVID-19 crisis.







Students made models of bacteria and viruses to demonstrate the difference between the two pathogens, since many people simply think of them as "germs" and don't understand why viruses are so difficult to treat or to find a vaccine for. They also designed and developed posters highlighting the nature of COVID-19 and how it is spread.

During the day they set up a display in the café area, wore PPE donated by ECU, and demonstrated to visitors how to sanitise their hands properly and the need for social distancing. They also researched the difference between influenza and COVID-19 viruses and found that, since the hygiene practices had been in place for COVID-19, cases of influenza had decreased dramatically from previous years, demonstrating that people should be observing these practices to prevent all diseases.

I am proud to say that all of my students completed the full course and received their Certificate IV before October. This gives them the opportunity to apply for a Bachelor of Nursing course in any university that they choose.

TECHNOLOGIES







The Technologies Learning Area includes two main subjects: Design and Technologies and Digital Technologies.

Design and Technologies has a strong focus on design thinking, the application of the design process and producing (making) solutions to design products, services and environments.

In Digital Technologies, the focus is on the use of digital systems, information and computational thinking to create solutions for identified needs and opportunities.

STEM is an approach to learning and development that integrates the areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics.

The T in STEM stands for Technologies which allow students to develop key STEM skills including, problem solving; creativity; critical analysis; teamwork; collaborative learning; independent thinking; initiative; communication and digital literacy.

STEM empowers individuals with the skills to succeed and adapt to this changing world.

Technologies education allows our students to engage in design thinking, where they create, design, develop and produce innovative technological solutions.

It allows them to explore and analyse real-world problems and play an active role in real life matters. Through our varied courses, students learn to use higher order thinking skills to design and conduct investigations, predict outcomes, trial and experiment and reflect and evaluate.

This year our students have been able to engage in many varied courses within the Technologies Learning Area. In Years 7 – 10, these included: Robotics, Wood, Metal, Materials & Food Technology, Jewellery, Materials, CAD (Computer Aided Design), Child Development, Architecture, Technical Graphics and 3D Modelling.

In Years 11 & 12, students have engaged in Building & Construction,

Design, Computer Science, MTD Wood, Engineering, Early Childhood Education and Accounting & Finance.

Working in these courses allows students to develop a sense of pride, satisfaction and enjoyment in producing projects that are functional and aesthetically pleasing.

It always amazes me and gives me a sense of pride when I visit classes in action and see students engaging in practical hands on activities; who are engaging in design thinking; trialling solutions and processes; reflecting and critiquing their work.

These are the skills of the future, empowering students to succeed and adapt to this changing world — so I ask that you look past the final product produced (food item, wood project, metal sculpture or 3D model) to consider the process that your child has worked through to get to that final product and those valuable skills acquired along the way.






















































































































































































DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES

The challenges presented in 2020 highlighted our reliance on Digital Technologies in effective communication as well as in coordinating global supply chains of both necessities and luxuries.

This gave our students a number of case studies to examine how technology has been instrumental in the response of communities and governments have taken throughout this very long year.

Year 7 and 8 Digital Technologies students gained an understanding of global computer networks and how they perform, as well as investigating the techniques which bad actors use to harvest our information and de-anonymise the media which we share online.

Students used the Minecraft and Micro:bit platforms to learn about

coding and how to automate systems by using a range of sensors to detect aspects of the environment such as obstacles, temperature, and light levels.

The Year 8 Robotics groups created robot prototypes aligned with the United Nations Global Goals. The robots were designed to improve life on Earth in some way, such as assisting in more efficient agriculture by monitoring soil conditions or automating planting, dispense food to livestock or fauna in a regulated manner, detect and collect rubbish, or dispense hand sanitiser without the need to touch bottles and pumps, amongst other ideas.

Year 10 Data Science students took a bigger picture approach and analysed data from the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organisation to investigate global trends in pollution, farming and population, using a range of tools to learn about Big Data and the unique problems of dealing with massive amounts of information.

They also used worldwide mobility data released by Apple and Google to monitor how the COVID-19 pandemic had affected travel at a local level, allowing them to see the effects that lockdowns and working from home had on the methods of transportation people used and which types of locations they visited.

In Year 11, Computer Science students learned about the software engineering process, from systems analysis to data management to coding, culminating in the production of an original piece of software encompassing each of the aspects of the course.



















































PRESENTATION EVENING




















PROFESSIONAL LEARNING

TEACHERS IMMERSED IN LEARNING

This year has presented many challenges not the least of which occurred when COVID-19 caused us to have to deliver lessons online.

Both teachers and students had to acquire skills very quickly as we dealt with different learning platforms and the challenge of teaching effectively without having the students in the room.

We were fortunate to have several staff who shared their expertise during a gruelling day in April when we learned how to use Teams, OneNote, SEQTA and other platforms more successfully to enable engaging and relevant lessons for our students to relate with online.

This year has also seen the introduction and establishing of Visible Learning. A team of three HOLAs and myself attended a two-day workshop in Perth at the beginning of the year. Subsequently we have presented two workshops to staff to enable the implementation of strategies that make learning more "visible" and clear to students.

All classrooms now have magnetic strips that allow teachers to clearly

state the Learning Intentions and Success Criteria for each lesson. Both staff and students are benefiting from more clarity and direction.

The staff have been reviewing and workshopping Mandatory Reporting, the requirements for the NCCD and the Child Safe Framework. We are also working towards establishing our strategic plan for the future and have had several presentations that helped to guide us in making sound decisions.

Our mission and vision have been key areas of focus, as we worked with Julie Ryan online from Melbourne and Jeff Thorne at the College to establish our identity as a Marist school.

Staff wellbeing was another focus and, in February, little did we know how much we were going to need as much assistance with this as we did!

Apart from the Wellbeing in the Workplace and Searching for Wellbeing workshops, staff were able to choose from several relaxing and fun activities to come together in groups with similar interests that didn't involve curriculum.


































































































































YEAR 7
