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FROM THE PRINCIPAL

As a College community, we are proud of the many achievements and talents of our students from Years 7 to Year 12. Throughout the year, our students have participated and excelled in academic, sporting and outdoor pursuits, faith and cultural experiences, creative and performing arts and a wide range of other educational experiences. To all our students and staff, your acceptance of change and the ability to adapt to new ways of living and learning during the pandemic, to which we pray is nearing an end, has been inspirational.

2022 has been both an exciting and a challenging year for our College. It has also been a year of consolidation of our Marist Charism, enabling our students to further strengthen their relationship with Jesus and Mary though the lens of St Marcellin Champagnat.

Our College's continued affiliation with the Marist Association of Australia, has enabled our staff and students to benefit from extensive professional learning and leadership opportunities because of our relationship with over 50 affiliated Marist Colleges in Australia. In 2022, our First XI Cricket Team also travelled to Canberra to compete in the 48th Marist Cricket Carnival.

With 78,000 students in 163 WA Catholic schools, CEWA has an enormous task in supporting all of our students, staff and communities; a partnership that we greatly value. We acknowledge Bishop Gerard Holohan who has recently stepped down from his role of the chair of the Catholic Education Commission of WA, a role he held for 10 years. We have been very fortunate to have our own Bishop as Chair of CECWA and we congratulate Bishop Gerard on leading this governing body's outstanding achievements for Catholic Education WA.

Our Parents and Friends, led by our P&F Chair Alan Buckley, has continued to provide generous support to enable our students to access the best possible facilities and programs at our College. The sponsorship by the P&F of our student wellbeing programs such as Teen Mental Health First Aid and The Resilience Project are just a couple

of examples of the P&F's incredible support and generosity. This year's Art Extraordinaire exhibition organised by our P&F and led by Anthea Turkington, was a great success, showcasing an immense amount of artistic talent, and an incredible group of parent volunteers to whom we extend our sincere appreciation.

This year we have seen the continued implementation of our Visible Learning approach to lessons, along with new teaching and learning initiatives that have included a targeted Literacy Intervention Program for students in Years 7-9 and the launch of our ACES — Academic Challenge and Enrichment Studies for students in Years 7-10.

All of these programs plus our rich offerings of teaching and learning, faith and personal growth opportunities for our students would not be possible without the immense dedication of our 71 teaching and 45 support staff. My sincere thanks to all staff for going above and beyond in your work to make Bunbury Catholic College the best it can be. ADVISORY COUNCIL REPORT

This 2022 Annual Report provides an insight into the progressive and caring Catholic learning community that is the Bunbury Catholic College, established in 1973. Next year, the College — a family member of Marist Schools Australia — will celebrate 50 years as a beacon of Catholic secondary education in the South West.

The Council's Annual Report for 2022 provides evidence of the College's firm commitment to excellence in education, pastoral care, social justice and staff development, as well as the integral role families play in the life and spirit of the College. During the year we have seen the College navigate the post-pandemic world and still provide a quality and consistent 'best in class' education for all our students

Our student enrolments have increased again, and there is a firm feeling of character and purpose for the College as it continues as a single campus embracing the Marist charism. This identity will further cement itself over the next year, as we look to celebrate our rich heritage across the last 50 years and adjust for the next half century with several marketing activities in 2023.

The Council throughout the year has been active through its sub-committees including finance, capital development, marketing and risk. Capital investments have occurred to continue to enhance the learning environment for our students and staff. These included:

- Upgrades to all nine C Block classrooms
- New Art room desks
- Over 80 new lockers installed
- New covered walkway built between the Administration and C Block
- New furniture fit out for the staffroom
- New kayaks, bikes and gym equipment for the Physical Education learning area
- New plasma cutter installed in Metalwork
- Hall enhancements and electrical system upgrade
- Minor landscaping works around the College

At the start of the year, we again paused and established our strategy on a page. This allowed us as a Council to set our course on achieving the critical items and allowing us to maintain focus throughout the year. It is pleasing to report that all these goals have been achieved through the collaboration of the Council members and staff.

An externally audited, recurrent financial statement was adopted and close focus, as always, on our financial management will still be needed to ensure we maintain a viable financial model in the years to come.

Student enrolments for the year were up to 926. Operating costs were met from recurrent income including recurrent per capita arants from State and Federal governments. Cost of curriculum, co-curricular and sport, salaries and related costs, property and grounds, information technology, administration and deprecation remained within approved budgets. During 2022, the College managed and closely monitored its financial position, with thanks to Catholic Education WA for their continued support and quidance.

Teena will continue to serve as a member of the Art Extraordinaire Committee and I sincerely hope that she will join us at a P&F meeting from time to time.





The BCC Ex-Students' Association has continued to examine its role and plan a way forward in building the College community into the future while celebrating the past.

Key to this period of reflection and planning is the complex and challenging task of managing connections between the eras of St Francis Xavier College (Marist Brothers Bunbury) and St Joseph's Convent (Mercy Sisters) and the contemporary College community. This has necessitated a review of the Association's membership database, which is a crucial tool in ongoing communication between past students, the association, and the College.

The management committee of the association is also reaching out to former students who were educated at the College from 1973 to the present day, to join past students from the Marist/St Joseph's eras, who have done a fantastic job in the association's first decade of service, laying the groundwork for its long-term roles:

- To promote social, cultural, intellectual, and sporting exchange between members
- To engage in activities that promote the Catholic ethos of the Association
- To engage in fundraising activities that benefit the association and the College

BCC ex-student and international swimmer Alex Saffy — known as the Bunbury Bullet — caught up with friends and teachers when he visited the College in October, bringing along his silver medal from the Commonwealth Games.

Principal Michael Pepper and Alex's Homeroom Teacher Vlad Alava were among the first to welcome Alex back to the College he attended until Year 10 in 2021.

Alex also talked with Ingrid Blandford in Year 10 - a previous squad mate from Bunbury Swimming Club who is a national swimmer.

There were smiles all round for the Commonwealth Games silver medallist who now trains with the Australian Institute of Sport in Canberra.

"It was great to see the College and catch up with students and teachers back in the classroom life," he said.

During a whirlwind year, spending 11 weeks in Europe training and competing, Alex won a bronze medal in the Men's 100 m Butterfly S10 at the World Para Swimming Championships before the main event in August when he clinched a silver medal in the 100m Butterfly S10 at the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham.

In April, as a 16-year-old WAIS para swimmer, Alex was selected in the Australian Dolphins team for the 2022 World Para Swimming Championships in Madeira where he won a bronze medal.

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In July, he battled transport logistics nightmares and COVID-19 to finally arrive in Birmingham for the Commonwealth Games where he won a silver medal in the 100m Butterfly S10.

In the early hours of Wednesday August 3, Alex's friends and former classmates at BCC linked up online to watch as he swam his medal-winning race.

Everyone at BCC is proud of Alex Saffy; at 16, he was the youngest in his race and recorded a time of 57.53 seconds, just 0.62 of a second behind fellow Australian Col Pearse who secured gold.

They were able to stream the race live from the Commonwealth Games and share the experience with each other through Facetime.

"We were all so excited," one student said. "We have watched Alex rise through the ranks with his swimming and it's amazing, he's won a silver medal at 16 in a competition at the highest level!

"It's really cool."

Having just turned 17 years old, Alex will be returning to Canberra where he plans to regain his previous form, with a weekly training regime including eight two-hour swimming sessions, gym workouts, Pilates and a massage.

In September, Alex became a recipient of a Tier 2 Scholarship from the Sport Australia Hall of Fame's Scholarship and Mentoring program for 2023.

From the SWT September 22 2022 edition:

"The scholarship adds another accolade to a breakout year for 16-year-old "Bunbury Bullet" Saffy, who claimed bronze in the 2022 Word Para Swimming Championships in Madeira in June and a silver medal in his Commonwealth Games debut in Birmingham..."

When he was 12 years old, Alex was diagnosed with dyskinetic cerebral palsy which caused him to be regularly disqualified during able-bodied swimming competitions, so in 2020 he switched to para swimming and his sights are set on the 2023 World Swimming Championships."

Ex-student Amber Lilley from the Class of 2016 was the winner of the Rural Media Association of WA's 2022 Award for Best News Coverage in Print.

Amber is a journalist at the Kalgoorlie Miner newspaper and is pleased to be the Deputy Editor working on a daily paper.

"Kalgoorlie is brilliant — it has a similar energy to Bunbury — and it's easy to write good news," she said.

"I have fond memories of BCC, especially Feast Day when we would go to the Cathedral and have lollies and finger buns and then we had a staff vs students football match on the oval.

"I've always wanted to be a journalist and I'm very thankful for the start I got at BCC and the support to follow the ATAR route I wanted."

FAITH, LIFE, CULTURE

Each year the Marist Life and Formation Team discern a theme which is used to inform and inspire the spiritual life of Marist schools and institutions. The theme for 2022 'Known and Loved-Dignity for All' was key to many activities for students and staff at Marist schools across Australia, including Bunbury Catholic College.

The theme linked the original purpose of the Marist Brothers, 'to make Jesus known and loved' with Catholic Social Teachings relating to the dignity of the human person, and the celebration of 150 years of Marist education in Australia. It was a wonderful time for all Marist communities to both reflect with gratitude on the achievements of the past and look forward with hope to the future.


For Bunbury Catholic College, the association with the Marist Brothers goes back to 1954, when they were invited to Bunbury to provide secondary education for local boys. This was significant because it meant families desiring Catholic secondary education for their sons could send them to a local school; in the truest sense, the Church and school were partnering with families to support them in the education of their children.

To educate in the Marist tradition begins with all members of the College community understanding the characteristics and features of the Marist charism/spirituality and how these features inform a Marist style of education.

To begin the year, the staff spent time considering the foundational characteristic 'In the way of Mary'; Mary said "yes" to being the mother of Jesus, and she brought Jesus to life in the world. Marists make Jesus known and loved in the world through educating, advocating and caring for the disadvantaged.

In 2022, at a whole school level, there was a focus to begin embedding the five Marist Characteristics through a daily Homeroom Prayer. The 2022 Student Leaders created symbols to represent the characteristics and the symbols featured in the prayers throughout the year. The prayer project also incorporated and supported The Resilience Project. Gratitude is part of the Christian tradition, we say grace before meals, and thank God in a multitude of prayers.

Each Friday (Thankful Friday) in Homeroom Prayer, students were asked "What are you grateful for this week?" It may have been a person, or an event, or that we live in a peaceful country — as the year progressed, the list grew.



TERM 1

In 2022, the reality of COVID-19 changed how we did things at BCC. Our Opening Mass was cancelled, due to restrictions relating to large mixed gatherings, but we were able to squeeze in the Year 7 Retreat which introduced the Marist Characteristics to our new Year 7s.

Ash Wednesday, which is always solemnly observed in homerooms, proceeded as usual, with cotton buds used to apply ashes to each student. In keeping with the Marist Characteristic of 'family spirit', the Student Leaders organised a fundraiser to support Trinity Catholic College in Lismore, which needs to be rebuilt after the devastation of floods in March.

As the term finished, Ministry Coordinator Rose Santoro resourcefully created a Holy Week liturgy and the entire school joined in a Teams call to reflect on the meaning of Jesus' death and resurrection. Deputy Principal Murray Hegney and I were able to join in from Sydney, where we were attending the 150th Anniversary celebrations to mark the opening of the first Marist school at the Rocks in 1872.

TERM 2

In Term 2, COVID restrictions were eased in relation to large gatherings; on May 6 we were happy to welcome our Year 7 mothers to join with their children for a liturgy and breakfast. On June 7, the whole school gathered, albeit masked, with Bishop Gerard Holohan to celebrate the Feast of St Marcellin Champagnat with Mass in the Gymnasium. Later, on the same day, the Year 12s departed BCC for their retreat.

Early in the term, some staff members attended, online, the annual Marian Lecture. Each year, the Marist Association facilitates the lecture to inspire, inform and challenge people of faith. In 2022, Fr Frank Brennan asked listeners to ponder the question "Human Dignity — an Aussie value?" A thoughtful and sometimes spirited discussion post lecture affirmed Fr Frank met the KPIs of informing, inspiring and challenging his listeners.

TERM 3

Term 3 was very busy! Staff began with a retreat focused on human dignity facilitated by Marist Mission and Life Team member Mark O'Farrell. The day was an opportunity for staff to reflect on how we respect the dignity of our students and all people in the community. On August 12, Bishop Gerard Holohan joined us to celebrate the Feast of the Assumption of Mary, a special day for all Marists and our school Feast Day. On September 2, the Year 8 students welcomed their dads to the College and gave thanks for their fathers in prayer, shared breakfast and then had some fun playing soccer in the Gym.

The Year 9 students coordinated the 'Give a Damn – Give a Can' project for the school and the Year 9s and Year 11s participated in retreats — both were themed around respectful relationships; and a group of Year 11s slept out to raise awareness around homelessness and make care packs for homeless people.

At the end of term, it was time to farewell our Year 12 students. For the final time they gathered in the Chapel for Mass with Bishop Gerard; they began the Mass by processing symbols of their time at the College and offered prayers of thanks for their parents, teachers and friends.

TERM 4

The Year 12 Graduation ceremony occurred at St Patrick's Cathedral in Term 4, where students, families and teachers celebrated their achievements and gave thanks for their time at the College. For other year groups, Term 4 was a time of consolidation with final tasks and exams, but there was still time to think of others.

Year 9 students were instrumental in two important outreach events. They promoted 'Socktober', a fundraiser for Catholic Missions and under the enthusiastic guidance of their Head of Year Wendy Morris, they coordinated the annual St Vincent de Paul Christmas Hamper collection for staff and students. Tinsel-bejewelled laundry baskets were distributed to homerooms and all were filled to overflowing with donations, to the delight and gratitude of the "Vinnies" volunteers who collected the hampers.

The Year 8 students concluded the year with an Advent retreat which focused on 'everyday leadership', with Mary as a model of humble leadership. It was a day of 'seeing' Christ in others and the students prepared beautiful banners to adorn the Gym for the final Mass of the year celebrated by Bishop Gerard.

Despite COVID, there were many reasons to be grateful:

- For students who asked interesting questions and completed their work with pride;
- For the teachers of Religious
 Education who worked hard to bring
 the Gospel to life in their classes;
- For our Ministry Captain Lily Murphy who was always prepared to have a go, whether it was crafting prayers for Assembly, leading the Student Ministry Team, or ensuring that Marist Characteristics were fostered in the Student Leadership Council;
- For Ministry Assistant Virginia McLaren who supported both Ministry and Pastoral teams in all manner of ways;
- For all in our BCC community who work together to integrate the mission of Jesus, to bring the Good News to all within the College and beyond, in their lessons and in their homerooms, by always recognising the face of Christ in others.

Finally, there was quite a bit of movement in the RE Department during 2022...we farewelled Rose Santoro at the end of Term 1 after more than two years as Ministry Coordinator; at the end of Term 2 we said goodbye to Science Teacher Lorraine McKenzie and PE Teacher Travis McGuire, while in Term 3 we welcomed Aboriginal Liaison Officer Rosie Frain and welcomed back RE Teacher Eugene de Lima; and we farewelled Head of Year 11 Vlad Alava in Term 4.

After many years as Religious Education Coordinator Gobnait May decided to step down from her position but continued to teach RE and kept busy with preparations for our 50th Anniversary celebrations in 2023. There were definitely challenges this year, but we made it!

STAFF RETREAT 2022



In keeping with the 2022 national Marist theme, 'Known and Loved – dignity for all' was the theme of the Staff Retreat for all BCC staff at the start of Term 3. The retreat used resources developed by the Marist Mission and Life Formation Team (MLF), and Mark O'Farrell from the team facilitated the day with assistance from deputy Principal Deborah Garbutt, Anthony Blee, Vicki Dewar, Emma Lynas and myself.

Staff spent the day considering how the deepest desire of every human being is to be heard, listened to, and accepted. To be heard is to be known and loved. This captured what is at the heart of the Gospel message: that every human being, no matter who they are and no matter where they come from, possesses dignity because they are created in the image of God. It is one thing to read the message, but the aim in Catholic teaching is to live the Gospel each day.

Staff engaged with ideas and examples relating to human dignity by participating in a series of forums exploring issues such as poverty, invisibility in the digital world, gender and mental health. Later they reflected on how ideas relating to these issues might translate in our daily interactions in the classroom and the staffroom,


the playground and the sporting field. Ultimately, Marist communities strive to be places where everyone, especially the least, lost and invisible are 'known and loved'; places where each person's voice is heard and respected, where their dignity is recognised and honoured. We know that we are called to move beyond simply recognising human dignity, but to act accordingly.

The day concluded with staff sitting with the 'Known and Loved' theme image, 'Our Lady of Loreto, with the mantle of refugees' painted by a young Italian artist Margherita Gallucci. The artwork is dedicated to "the sacredness of human life, to the sacredness and dignity of all those who are victims of brutality, war and racism" and captures a contemporary "Visitation of Mary", who is the defender of the displaced, and accompanier of the lost, the least and the lonely. As staff contemplated the image, they were invited to call to mind the name of someone who needed to be wrapped in dignity, and to write the person's name on a ribbon, which was then placed at the base of the image, we then prayed together for all in our community to be 'Known and Loved'.

2022 was another wonderful year for the Mathematics Department. Teachers Steve Flavel and Kim Mortimer joined us at the start of the year and soon proved to be productive additions to our team. All of the wonderful resources and opportunities continued despite ongoing COVID absences. Our Maths tutorials were still well attended and teaching and learning continued, both in class and online.

The commencement of 2022 was particularly exciting with Bunbury Catholic College being awarded a Gold Level Maths Active School status by the Maths Association of WA (MAWA). This is the highest level that a school can receive and is awarded to schools which actively extend students and teachers beyond the mathematics classroom.

BCC students continued to represent our College in Mathematics competitions. Zavier Noonan in Year 11 competed in the invite-only AMOC Competition and teams of students competed in Have Sum Fun and WAJO – West Australian Junior Maths Olympiad. We excelled in the

WAJO in 2022, with our Year 9s winning Most Outstanding Individual and Team.

Once again, BCC hosted the Have Sum Fun Maths Competition on behalf of MAWA and students in Years 5 to 12 travelled to BCC from all over the South West. Maths and snacks were the focus of this quiz-night style competition and all our teams performed well on the evenings.

Members of the Maths Team could be seen out and about in the College Community. Matthew Caden, Iain McKenzie, Mike Hearne, Kim Mortimer and all-rounder Michael Chappell regularly represented teachers in the sporting arena, Kate Wright continued to oversee our Peer Support Leaders, Hannelize Reddin took on the role of managing our Student Leaders and I could regularly be found running STEAM Brains sessions for prospective students.

HUMANITIES

GROWING THE PASSION FOR HUMANITIES



The Humanities department encourages students with a passion for the four subjects we cover – Geography, History, Economics and Civics & Citizenship – to extend themselves by taking part in national competitions.

In 2022, students were selected to participate in the National Geography and History competitions as well as the Simpson Prize.

The National Geography Competition was held in April, with students from Years 8 and 9 selected to compete based on their 2021 performance in Geography.

Then, in May, our top Year 10 History students were selected for the Australian History Competition. Year 9 students with a flair for essay writing were invited to submit an essay about World War I for the annual Simpson Prize.

Many certificates of High Distinction and Distinction were presented to the participants at a College Assembly in Term 3.





ASX SHAREMARKET GAME

Year 11 Economics ATAR students competed in the national ASX Schools Sharemarket Game with the syndicate 'Ayew Joking' winning top spot in the class at the end of the 10-week period with the highest portfolio gains.

Syndicate managers Noah Allen and Jacob Orsi used their research of companies listed on the ASX and discovered the importance of wise investment decisions.

Jacob said the key to their success was "investment in lithium mines". Noah likened investing in the sharemarket to "being akin to gambling".

All students benefitted by developing their knowledge of the sharemarket, observing the impact of economic and world events on shares and learning about investment decision-making which will be beneficial for their futures.



VISITING PROFESSOR

Interest rates and commodity prices are central to Economics and were two of many topics raised by Professor Steven Kemp who visited our College campus in September.

Professor Kemp is an Economist from Curtin University who delivered a revision presentation for our Year 12 Economics students, as well as visiting students from Bunbury Cathedral Grammar School, St Mary Mackillop College in Busselton and Our Lady of Mercy College in Australind.

The Year 12 students commented that they valued the opportunity to hear from Professor Kemp who is the author of their textbooks 'Discovering Economics' and 'Investigating Macroeconomics'.

Artefacts represent our cultural and history. Next year, the College will be showcasing artefacts from a very different era, through several displays being curated to mark the 50th Anniversary of our College in 2023.

Ancient Wonders

Wonders from the Ancient Worlds of Egypt, Rome and Greece were recreated by our young historians and turned into a fascinating display for the College Library in November.

The artefacts were made by Year 7 Humanities students who used their imagination, ingenuity and bit of luck in finding items to achieve their results.

We had made some water lilies (out of paper) that have been preserved in a simple chest in Khufu's ship since 2500 B.C. – 4522 years. The bundle of water lilies were placed on the ship by King Khufu's family as a gift to send him to the afterlife peacefully, and the water lilies symbolised Upper Egypt which is where Khufu settled and built The Great Pyramid of Giza.

We also made Khufu's Ship (out of pop sticks) which is one of the oldest, largest and best-preserved ships in history. It is also most known as the 'Solar Barge' and it measures to 43.6m long and 5.9m wide. What we both enjoyed about this project are the challenges we went through and looking at the final product.

SCIENCE





Throughout 2022 scientists around the world continued to persevere through the pandemic related challenges set in the preceding two years. While only slightly less groundbreaking, teachers all around the College found new ways to recognise mask-wearing students, and Science teachers developed innovative ways to combine face masks and safety glasses so that students could actually see their experiments. On the positive side, some of our Science learning, such as classifying different groups of organisms, and virus and disease transmission, has never been so relevant.

EVENTS AND COMPETIONS

Unfortunately, a number of events and competitions normally held at the beginning of the year were cancelled due to COVID restrictions. Some, such as the Year 10 Science and Engineering Challenge, were able to be rescheduled but others, including the Year 8 Synergy Solar

Car Challenge, were not. We are cautiously optimistic that we will be able to provide more of these engaging activities for our students in 2023.

Regardless of these difficulties, we did see particular success in the Big Science Competition and Brain Bee Challenge.

BIG SCIENCE COMPETITION

A number of Year 7, 8 and 9 students took part in the Big Science Competition. This is an Australia-wide competition that tests students on science knowledge, critical-thinking and problem-solving skills. Over 700 schools took part in the Big Science Competition in 2022.

Our results in the competition were strong, with a large number of credit and distinction certificates awarded. Year 7 student Joshua Mack, and Year 9 student Devon Pope, received a high distinction, placing them in the top five percent of all participants.

In addition, Year 9 student Matilda Skerman was recognised as a high achiever and was selected for Curious Minds — a program that aims to provide STEM opportunities for girls and regional students.

BRAIN BEE CHALLENGE

For the second year in a row, students from Bunbury Catholic College won the People's Choice award for the Brain Bee film competition. The Australian Brain Bee Challenge is an Australia-wide competition for students in Year 10 which helps them to learn about the brain and its functions. As part of the competition teammates, Ingrid Blandford and Amy Hunt, spent many lunchtimes making plasticine models of the brain, drawing intricate neurons and even wrote a song to create their 3-minute film, with assistance from Year 11 students Bailey Parker (Psychology) and Ashleen Moore (Media).





OPEN DAY

Once again, the Science laboratories were opened to the community to showcase the wide range of Science projects and activities undertaken through the year. Among many displays and activities, visitors enjoyed handling and learning about the science department stick insects, guessing the content of our mineral samples and watching the 'fireworks' display.

UPPER SCHOOL OUT AND ABOUT

Field and laboratory excursions are an integral part of our Year 11 and 12 science subjects. Being able to see and experience real-world examples, such as medical research procedures, in situ geology and examples of our local biodiversity, help students cement their classroom learning.

On a trip to Perth Zoo, our Biology students had first-hand experience of just how much effort it takes to harvest enough to feed a numbat that consumes up to 20,000 termites a day! They also learned about the vital conservation work that the Perth Zoo undertakes through a number of captive breeding programs.

Earth and Environmental Science students visited various sites to study local geology and past geological processes as well as utilising the amazing displays in the WA Museum Boola Bardip to investigate how Earth processes and biodiversity can be linked to historical climate change.

While a trip to the Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research could not go ahead, Human Biology and Biology students participated in a trial online workshop that has helped Harry Perkins take its outreach program to even more schools.

Closer to home, Psychology students were able to study childhood behaviours through classroom incursions and chemistry students spent a fun evening practising their titration skills, something they rarely have time to engage in during standard lesson times.

My sincere thanks to staff that take the extra time and effort to organise such valuable experiences for our students.

Jodi Lang has been the Learning Centre Coordinator this year and was joined by Education Support Teachers Sandra Hearne and Elyece Robertson. Our building was refurbished into a dedicated small group workspace, complete with partitions and 'Calm Area' including a daybed and beanbags for students to gather themselves or rest when needed.

This year saw the establishment of 'Social Skills' lessons and the purchasing of multiple Social Skills picture books, which help ASD students to learn about different emotions and develop resilience. We have also introduced the program 'A 5 is Against the Law' and established some common language about behaviours across the Centre.

Our Year 10 students had a big year; they attended the Year 10 Outdoor Adventure camp, an excursion to 'Proudly

Productive', and participated in Work Exposure at different locations supported by our Education Assistants. We would like to acknowledge the Bunbury Port, Spud Shed, St Vincent de Paul and the Bunbury City Library for welcoming our students and assisting them to develop new skills. Our Year 11 student Darcie Halkyard has also attended Work Placements at Advocacy WA and Morrissey Homestead. Darcie is very thankful for the opportunities presented to her at these establishments.

A number of our students have achieved success in the Arts this year; Lawson Traill (Year 10) received recognition for his magnificent artwork and both Hugh O'Carrigan (Year 9) and Emma Young (Year 10) were selected to perform in next year's 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory' Musical. We wish them all the best and look forward to all our new students joining us in 2023.






ARTS - DANCE

EXCURSIONS AND WORKSHOPS



Later in the year, our Year 8, 11 and 12 Dance students made the most of world renowned Bangarra Dance Theatre's Australian tour to watch 'Sandsong' at our very own Bunbury Regional Entertainment Centre. It was a fantastic opportunity to view a Contemporary Indigenous Dance work in our own backyard and learn more about Aboriginal culture and Australian history.

We engaged in several workshop opportunities throughout the year, starting with our Year 11 and 12 students participating in an all-day workshop to learn the Set Solo for their practical ATAR dance exams. Students gave up their Sunday to participate in a gruelling four hours of dance to learn the solo that every ATAR student in the state is required to perform. Professional dancer April Vardy travelled from Perth to put our students through their paces and was very impressed with both their work ethic and their skills

During Country Week – yes, it did actually happen in 2022, seven of our best dancers had the opportunity to participate in 12 one-hour workshops over the course of a week. These workshops were delivered by national and international performance artists in a range of genres; from Contemporary Indian to Hip Hop and the Japanese martial art of Aikido. They were pushed to their limits of both skill and brain power when they had to learn, remember, rework and perform three dances by the end of the week. It was an intense and challenging time, but definitely worth the effort.

Throughout the year our Dance Fitness students participated in workshops lead by Zumba instructor Gizelle Salame, which were both high energy and exhausting as well as fun and uplifting. It was a great opportunity to engage in a real-world dance fitness class and provided them with knowledge of what is in a Zumba workout as well as how they were structured and delivered. UPPER SCHOOL ART

Upper school Art programs started the year with COVID management in mind and a SCSA decision to require a reduced number of Arts projects from students. While COVID certainly had an impact, the students nevertheless worked hard to produce an impressive volume of work and create some diverse and thought-provoking pieces.

Year 12 students produced works in painting and textiles with threedimensional elements, and digital graphics, responding to themes of 'Commentaries' and 'Inspirations'. The Year 11s completed etchings, then combined etched images with painting to produce of body of related works. We spent time drawing and responding to the environment at Horseshoe Lake in order to develop etchings that conveyed a sense of place. Some of these students then chose to create a single painting on stretched calico and others chose to express their ideas through the production of a book, incorporating etched and painted elements.

In May, the Year 11 Visual Art students travelled to Perth to view the Pulse Perspectives exhibition at the Art Gallery of WA (AGWA) with students from Our Lady of Mercy College. The Pulse Perspectives exhibition comprises an elite selection of artworks by Year 12 2021 WACE students from across the state.

It showcases a broad range of styles and techniques in a variety of artforms and provides a benchmark of excellence for current students to aspire to. We were inspired by the incredible skill and creativity on display and the students honed their analysis skills as they responded to artworks through activities and discussions. We then explored the permanent collections of the gallery and visited the new rooftop space at AGWA before returning home to put all that inspiration into action.

The Year 12 class had their opportunity to visit the gallery washed away in a wild storm; however, they were thankfully able to view the exhibition anyway, courtesy of modern technology and the virtual gallery tour experience offered through the AGWA website.








LANGUAGES

It is undeniable and proven by many researchers that studying a second language improves analytical skills and increases creativity – developing problem solving skills and the ability to deal with abstract concepts.

Though COVID has unfortunately continued to restrict our travel possibilities this year, students have had the opportunity to explore Italy and Indonesia inside the Italian and Indonesian classrooms and have immersed themselves in these cultures through a variety of activities.

INDONESIAN

Indonesian classes offer a variety of ways to engage students in language and culture during the year.

Year 9 students had the opportunity to learn the Indonesian Language by solving Crime Mysteries, creating a virtual tour of the City of Bunbury and then becoming tour guides, putting together an informative video describing the place where they live, and of course, enjoyed a dining experience at the warung – the Indonesian Class café!

We have also had a traditional becak (rickshaw) on display and in use at our College when the Year 8 students were learning about travelling and modes of transport.

Year 10 students visited the Perth Zoo to work on a collaborative task, with students from Wesley College, creating a map of the zoo featuring interactive points of interest where users can call up videos of students describing the animals and their mannerisms.

They had an opportunity to speak in Bahasa Indonesia with fellow students from different schools. Students from Year 9 to 11 also sat the Assessment of Language Competence and achieved very pleasing results across the board.

ITALIAN

Across all year levels, technology has enriched the students' Italian learning experience. Through the incorporation of interactive tools and programs such as One Note, Education Perfect and Microsoft Teams, Italian students have had the chance to experiment with innovative ways of learning, allowing them to consolidate language skills acquired through individual or group tasks.

The Year 7 students started their new journey in the acquisition of a second language with incredible enthusiasm, demonstrating throughout the year their willingness to learn and grow.

Beginner tasks like greetings and personal introductions led to more complex components of the language, like describing families, friends and interests. The final challenges – an essay and an interview in Italian on the topics learnt throughout the year – were handled superbly.

The Year 8s continued improving their linguistic skills, through topics like school, focusing on the differences between Italian and Australian school systems and free time.

In Semester 2, the topic Facciamo la spesa (Let's go grocery shopping) allowed the students to explore Italian food speciality shops. They learnt how to apply singular and plural nouns and the use of proper expressions when shopping. As a conclusion, students performed a magnificent play 'Al Supermercato' using their original dialogue and performed as if they were in an Italian supermarket.

In respect to a more traditional way of communicating, Year 9 and 10 Italian classes have been part of Caffé Italia, a language immersion activity where students had the opportunity to share their knowledge of language while sampling delicious Italian coffee and food.

The exceptional Year 9 and Year 10 classes continued to develop their language skills by exploring more difficult content and grammar through the topic Tutto su di me (All about me) which analyses their immediate surroundings, home and town and the daily life of an adolescent.

Year 10 students took part in an experimental pilot project based on pre-Unit 1 and 2 in preparation for Year 11 ATAR Italian. Clearly, at this level, the journey becomes more complex and the tasks more difficult, however the class embraced this challenge with amazing results.

The Year 11 students got straight into their ATAR content and enjoyed their learning throughout the year, using existing and new language skills to discuss relationships with families and friends, Italian celebrations and technologies in their lives. In Semester 2, the students focused on travel-related content and had the opportunity to visit Italy through virtual reality.

Last but not least, the Year 12 ATAR students displayed resilience and commitment to embrace the unexpected COVID challenge. They are to be congratulated on the dedication they have shown to their Italian studies, and we wish them well for their future.

Finally, next year, we look forward to re-opening our Italian exchange program and strengthening our partnership with our sister school Istituto Salesiano in Milan. These opportunities for enriched learning have been greatly missed by the students, staff and College community and their return is much anticipated.



Courses on Offer

We specialise in creating an individual pathway that suits each student through school and into the future. This can be done through an ATAR or general pathway, or a combination of both. There is also the option for students to complete nationally recognised and industry standard qualifications



through the College as part of their everyday timetable. Students studied the following certificates in 2022:

- Certificate III in Business 20 students
- Certificate II in Creative Industries (Film & Photography) – 26 students
- Certificate III in Early Childhood Education and Care – 5 students
- Certificate II in Engineering Pathways 20 students
- Certificate III in Music 4 students
- Certificate II in Outdoor Recreation 71 students
- Certificate IV in Preparation for Health and Nursing Studies – 47 students
- Certificate III in Sport and Recreation 28 students

Additionally, short courses are offered throughout the year. These programs can greatly increase students' opportunities for part-time or casual employment or can be used as a stepping stone into other training courses. Courses included:

- Work Ready Barista Program (Hospitality) 31 students
- Construction Industry White Card 40 Students
- Provide First Aid 42 students
- Royal Life Saving Society Bronze Medallion 23 students
- AUSTSWIM Qualifications 12 Students





Off Campus Learning

External registered training organisations allow us to provide additional nationally recognised certificate courses to our students through VETDSS (VET Delivered to Secondary Students). Students who choose to study these courses attend classes off campus for one or two days per week, while still maintaining their regular school subjects.

This requires the student to be mature, self-driven and well organised to ensure they still meet their WACE graduation requirements. Both off-the-job training and practical work placement allow students to gain knowledge, skills, and a qualification in their chosen industry. Students in Year 11 and 12 studied the following external certificate courses off campus in 2022:

- Certificate III In Aviation
- Certificate III in Education Support
- Certificate III in Community Services
- Certificate III in Music (Sound Production)
- Certificate II in Electrotechnology

Online Courses

We work with our students and their families to discover together how these courses can work for them while satisfying their WACE requirements. We had five students in

School Based Traineeships


School-Based Traineeships and School-Based Apprenticeships offer the opportunity for students to receive training towards a qualification, earn a wage and stay at school while achieving WACE. A School-Based Trainee completes four days of school with one or two days of paid work placement during the week. They must continue to achieve at school and meet graduation requirements, complete the theory components of the qualifications and on-the-job work placement and assessments.

Year 10, 11 and 12 Work Place Learning

The Work Place Learning program has once again provided the opportunity for students to discover the right career pathway for themselves by experiencing work in a number of fields. The advice and support of their workplace mentors and co-workers has given our students a better perception of what the job requires day-to-day and what paths to take to achieve their goals.

In 2022 we created almost 400 work placements for students with the help of nearly 300 employers! Our strong links with local businesses within the greater Bunbury region gives students prime opportunities to not only reinforce their future goal but also, with the right attitude, make it a reality. The support we receive from local businesses is what helps to keep these programs running as well as creating apprenticeships, traineeships and future employees. The College extends a sincere thank you to all these businesses for their continued support to our programs, as well as to students and families.

Year 11 & 12 Design Technical Graphics and Year 9 & 10 Design

Design teaches the process of design from identifying the problem to creating multiple solutions. Throughout the design process, students learn to be logical thinkers and problem solvers. Skills in brainstorming, sketching, computer-aided design, evaluating designs and self-evaluation are addressed.

Students use the latest industry standard software and equipment to draw their designs. This allows for an easier transition from school into a working environment. They learn these skills through teacher interaction and by having the opportunity to work individually and collaboratively.

Working individually is necessary and can help to ensure a personal grasp of concepts, processes and skills. Working with peers enables students to be challenged by the views of others, clarify ideas, and interpret and use appropriate language.

Students can produce prototypes of their design solution using the 3D printing or laser cutting machines located in the Design Technology area. They can then evaluate this design and, if required make modifications, or produce completed designs using these methods or more traditional metalwork or woodwork skills.

Learning experiences are structured so that students can learn not only from their immediate peers and teachers but from family and community members and people from other parts of the world. This enables them to see things from different perspectives; to stand outside their own culture and their own society, to value and respect diversity, and to be critical of and able to analyse different points of view.

Students develop skills and processes for current and future industry and employment markets. They are equipped with the knowledge and skills to understand design principles and processes, analyse problems and devise innovative strategies through projects.



LIBRARY



In 2022 our Library was an inviting and welcoming space for all BCC students. It provided 'Room to Read', a quiet space for study or to complete assessments, a space to be curious, to engage with other students, to play games, build puzzles, listen to music and find a quiet place when the 'crowd got too madding'.

Reading and books remain our core business and a focus was to develop and sustain a robust reading culture at BCC, giving students regular opportunities to read for pleasure.

In Term 1 we launched 'Choose Your Challenge' which encouraged students to read from a range of genres which supported capabilities such as developing empathy, cultural understanding, diversity and inclusivity. This incentive-based challenge encouraged students to venture beyond their comfort zones and read more widely.

Guest Authors

Guest authors are a valuable part of our library program, and we were privileged to welcome four award winning WA authors this year.

Our first guest, a great friend of our Library, was Dianne Wolfer, author of the Year 8 study novel 'A Dog with Seven Names'. All Year 8s were privileged to attend a workshop with Dianne. A select group, who had accepted the 'Read a Dianne Wolfer novel' challenge, were invited to share a morning tea with Dianne.

Her novel is set in the Pilbara during World War II and library staff created a series of displays to enhance students' understanding of the setting and context of the novel. They had the opportunity to participate in a number of extension activities such as creating a resource for the displays and designing a new cover for the novel. Dianne selected the winning design.

Star author Meg McKinlay joined us to celebrate Book Week. Students had the opportunity to be part of a year-long 'Be a Reading Star' challenge to celebrate Meg's novel 'Catch a Falling Star'. All our Reading Stars were invited to a workshop with Meg and had the opportunity to meet and chat with her.

The Year 7s completed a picture book as an English assessment task and they were fortunate to enjoy a visit by the talented author and illustrator Frane Lessac. Frane shared her insights into creating

picture books and inspired and encouraged our aspiring Year 7 student authors. She delighted her audience by producing an illustration for them as part of her presentation.

The Year 7s were inspired to fill the Library with their marvellous creations which were displayed and enjoyed by their peers and the College community. Library staff selected 12 picture books and these were accessioned into our collection to inspire future student authors. Our 2017 student authors were reunited with their Year 7 picture books, and they left words of wisdom for our prospective authors.

The amazing AJ Betts paid the Library a flying visit in anticipation of her role as our 2023 Book Week guest author. Our final visitor for the year was Holden Sheppard who presented a workshop to students as part of the Fremantle Literature Centre's Young Writers Collective. This was our inaugural year of hosting the annual event which is attended by students from other local schools. Author visits are the highlight of the library calendar, and our students were privileged to spend time with such talented, engaging, warm and generous visitors.

Book Week

We do not limit Book Week to a week — our celebration of all things books and reading continued until the end of Term 3. We celebrated the official CBCA Book Week, 'Dreaming with Eyes Open' with a promotion of the short-listed books, but as part of our extended Book Week the library space was transformed into Hogwarts to celebrate 25 years of Harry Potter, the wizard who is unsurpassed at inspiring young adults to read.

Harry had not lost his appeal and he enticed our students to "chill" in the Hogwarts Common Room and be reminded that "If you don't like to read, you haven't found the right book," J K Rowling.

In a nostalgic nod to the Australian tradition of dressing as a book character, students and staff were invited be part of our first 'Dress as a Literary Character' Book Week event to celebrate all things reading. Our Library became a vibrant colourful space for the parade during recess. Students and staff outdid themselves in demonstrating their love of books, and we even had a guest appearance by Princess Fiona from Shrek.





Room to Read

Room to Read is an annual event where our College pauses for an hour to read. We have aligned this with the not-for-profit Room to Read Organisation which promotes literacy in the developing world. Authors Dianne Wolfer and Tristan Bancks are ambassadors for Room to Read and both found time to send our students encouraging video messages.

Our students were asked to read for those who cannot and to donate a gold coin to Room to Read. It was a wonderful opportunity for our students to pause and reflect on how privileged we are to have a well-resourced Library.

Western Australia Young Readers Book Association is an integral part of our Library year. Under the enthusiastic guidance of Library Officer Sharon Castelli, students participated in a year-long celebration of reading called Escape with a Book, which was embraced with great enthusiasm.

This promotion is unique in that the shortlist of books is compiled from ones nominated by students in the previous year. Students read the shortlisted books, voted for the winners, and had the opportunity to nominate the shortlist for 2023, which gives our students a voice in selecting books that are promoted across WA.

Students were challenged to read the shortlisted books and complete quizzes and activities, and rewarded with morning teas in the Library, which were opportunities to mingle with other avid readers.

Big Summer Read

Our last promotion was to reward students for their voracious reading. Our Library did not close for the summer; instead, students were invited to participate in the Big Summer Read where they filled a large Dymocks bag with books to read over the summer. Thirtyeight students elected to participate, and they left for the holidays with 435 books between them.

Year 6 Orientation

The Library was abuzz with enthusiastic future readers when next year's incoming Year 7s spent a day at the College. Students were introduced to our genrefied collection, and completed a Know Your

Genre quiz. Each student was provided with a bookmark and invited to explore our fiction section and select the first book they wished to read when they arrived at the College.

Our guests were treated to a taste of Year 7, as they visited our displays and had their photos taken in Ancient Rome, on 'Jack's Island' and with Library favourites 'The Diary of a Wimpy Kid' and 'Harry Potter'. It was a fun day to welcome our next generation of BCC readers.

Library Displays

The Library strives to connect literature with curriculum and celebrate significant people, dates, and events throughout the year. Our displays included 'Twosday', Epic Reads — a celebration of the classics with a visit from Jane Austen, the Act for Peace Ration Challenge and an annual favourite, the Ancient Rome Museum, populated with artefacts made by students.

Bee Kind Bee Inclusive

A collaboration with the students from the Learning Centre to promote kindness and inclusivity with our Bee Kind project ended the year. Bee Kind honey and inspirational items created by the Library Craft Club were on sale at the Bee Kind market, in a bid to remind us to Bee Kind and Bee Inclusive.

Our beautiful Library is a space for all our students to enjoy in different ways — a warm welcoming space before school on a cold winter's day, respite from the heat of a summer's day, and a quiet place to wait or study after school.

Our College recognises the importance of building a strong reading culture and the Library seeks to find opportunities to support the English department and promote reading for pleasure through the Rostered Reading Program, which has seen our borrowing numbers for Years 7 and 8 soar. Our students borrowed a total of 5611 titles this year and our Most Voracious Reader was Pippa Bouteloup who read 136 books.

We look forward to another year of finding the right book for every reader, creating time and space to allow students to read for pleasure and to support them in developing a lifelong love of reading.

It has been a pleasure and a privilege to work with this group of students.



It has been a true pleasure for me to watch them grow since our first day together in 2018. Thank you as well to the families of these remarkable Year 11s. I wish everything well for all of you.




