# Religious Education at Bunbury Catholic College

At Bunbury Catholic College education in the Catholic beliefs, values and practices takes place in all aspects of College life.

**1.Religious Education:** This is a course like any other course that you will study. Therefore, the expectations for students participating in Religious Education classes is the same as for all subject classes – a determination to learn and succeed, positive attitudes and behaviour choices, and respect for everyone who is part of the class.

In Religious Education the focus is on understanding what it means to be you in your community and in your religion. There will be assignments and, at the end of each semester, a grade is awarded.

**2. Campus Ministry:** This refers to the experiential aspect of Religious Education. Masses, liturgies, prayer events and retreats are organised in each year group or as whole school events. The focus is on spiritual experience. Students are invited to contribute to these events by sharing their talents in events management, in reading, singing, playing music, or in the creative construction of sacred space. Through participating in **Christian Service** students learn what is meant by the Gospel call to be of service to others. Campus Ministry co-ordinates service

learning opportunities that enable the students to respond to the needs of others,

3. Finally, Bunbury Catholic students are asked to choose behaviour that is grounded in Catholic values. The College motto, "To act justly, to love tenderly and to walk humbly with your God" (Micah 6:8), clearly asks that we treat all people with dignity and respect.



# Tips from our current Year 7s to the new Year 7s






When I came to BCC, I was just as nervous as you might be now. However, I just acted my normal self and that easily got me through. Good luck!

Do not stress if you do not make friends on the first day. Remember, it is everyone's first day in a new school, so everyone will be feeling nervous.


You may be in the same class as one of your primary school friends, but still try to spread yourself out to other new friendship groups. I was the only one from my school and I talked to other people and made new friends.

Using your device/managing technology 👼 Building resilience


Problem solving Maximising your social and mental well-being


#### Head of Year

# Frequently Asked Questions

#### General Administration



#### I need to contact my child during the school day. Can I send them a text?



All parents are urged not to contact students on their personal mobile phones, make arrangements to leave messages at a certain time, or ask students to call home, at any time during school hours. These actions lead to students having to contravene the ICT Policy, which has real implications for all students.

As is standard practice, it is preferable that all communication from and to students, is through the College Administration. For their own safety, a student who is unwell should report to the College Nurse in the Wellness Centre, instead of texting this information to parents. The College asks that parents do not respond to texts from their child, during the school day, but instead parents are encouraged to contact the Administration, if there is a concern.



#### I need to collect my child during school hours. What is the procedure?



When a student is to be collected from school during the school day, a note must be given to the student from a parent/guardian to present to the relevant classroom teacher. The student must meet the parent/guardian at Administration – Student Services. The student must be signed out by a parent/guardian.







#### My child is going to be absent from school. Do I need to let anyone know?



When a student is absent from school, it is required that on the day of the absence, a parent contacts the College before 9.30am. A medical certificate is required if a student is absent for a period of more than three days. On their return to school, students are to provide a written note, signed by their parent/guardian, explaining their absence.



#### Do we need to purchase a computer?



No. A school computer will be provided to your child early in Term 1, when parents will receive information regarding the devices. There is also a permission form that will need to be signed before the students are provided with a device. This document will be sent electronically during February.



#### What is SEQTA?



SEQTA is a Learning Management System. The SEQTA Suite is an all-in-one teaching and learning ecosystem that enables teachers, students and parents to work together in an interactive, supportive online community. All student course programs, assessment outlines, resources are located in SEQTA. In addition, communication occurs to and from school via SEQTA: Direqt Message. Parents will be provided with their login details in Week 3 of Term 1.



#### Where can I find copies of the policies to be followed by College students?

#### Pastoral Care and Health



#### How can my child access a counsellor at the College?



There is a form for your child to fill in at the Wellness Centre, near Administration, to request an appointment with a counsellor for the first time. Otherwise, a Homeroom Teacher, Head of Year or Class Teacher can send your child in the right direction if there is an issue. Students may also send a direct message to the College Counsellor.



#### Does BCC have a nurse on site?



Yes we have a full time College Nurse in the Wellness Centre near Administration. If your child is sick during the school day, they are to visit the nurse who will make contact with home. Students are not to call home themselves please.



#### Will my child receive any vaccinations at school?



All Year 7 students will be offered participation in the WA school-based immunisation program in 2024. A consent form will be sent to parents and must be returned by the specified date. Please contact the College Nurse on 9721 0000 if you have further questions.



#### Do I notify the school if there is a change to my child's health status?



Yes, please notify the College Nurse if your child's wellbeing differs/alters in any way whilst they are at Bunbury Catholic College. This includes the commencement of medication.



#### If my child has an EpiPen, what do I need to do?



You will need to provide a current action plan from your GP and an EpiPen (x1) which will be stored in the Wellness Centre. If the student attends any activity off campus, their action plan and EpiPen will be given to the supervising staff member attending the activity.









#### Can I take the EpiPen home during the school holidays?



Absolutely ... just remember to bring it back when school recommences.



If my child takes medication prior to commencing the school day and they forget to have it, what can I do?



The College Nurse encourages parents to supply a small amount (no more than three tablets) for such occasions.

Medications are stored in a locked draw and are only accessed by the College Nurse. Parent/Guardians will need to contact the College prior to the administration of the 'missed' medication, by either phone, email or SEQTA: Direqt Message.



#### Will my child need to do any assessments in their language class?




Yes, language courses attract a number of assessments: speaking, writing and listening. Constant revision is required in order to build vocabulary and become familiar with new grammar structures.



#### What is Education Perfect?



Education Perfect is an online learning and assessment tool that will be used extensively as part of the teaching program. It enables students to make use of their computer devices to engage with interactive learning modules, participate in learning at their own pace, both in school and at home, to test their knowledge and receive immediate feedback, and to participate in some within-class and national competitions.









#### Are the Year 7 classes streamed in Mathematics?



Mathematics at Bunbury Catholic College is streamed in the second semester of Year 7. This means that Mathematics teachers will collect a lot of data in the first two terms of 2024 in order to decide the best place for each student commencing in Term 3. We endeavour to meet the needs of each student in their Mathematics class, therefore movement can happen at any point of the year following Semester 1.



#### Will I see all my child's Mathematics assessments?



Some of the assessments in Year 7 Mathematics do not leave the classroom and all students are encouraged to review these tasks in the room with their teacher and peers.



#### How can I help my child succeed in Mathematics?

Mathematics, as one of the core subjects, is likely to be taught with greater frequency and time each week than students coming from primary school are accustomed to. This can mean that greater content is covered and this can be a challenge for students. It is important that students develop a strict study routine early in Year 7 to ensure that they do not fall behind in the completion of homework, study, assessments and assessment preparation.

Mathematics tutorials are held after school every Thursday from 3:00pm to 4:00pm. Students of all ability levels are encouraged to attend.

Mathematics is a fun and exciting, yet challenging, subject. Students are provided the opportunity to thrive and enjoy this learning area. Therefore, it is important that the attitudes towards Mathematics that they are exposed to, in and out of school, are positive, allowing all students to connect with Mathematics and generate an opinion of their own.





## **Academic Support**



My child has been receiving extra literacy support in primary school. I would like my child to continue receiving literacy support in Year 7, instead of learning a Language. Is this a possibility?



The literacy level of all in-coming students will be assessed by the English department, using standardised testing, during Term 1. If your child is identified as requiring additional literacy support, they may be offered a place in an English Acceleration program, focusing on the development of functional literacy, to help them catch up on lagging skills. If your child has a diagnosed learning disability or difficulty, subject to assessment of their literacy level, they may be eligible to participate in a dedicated literacy support group.



#### My child has a diagnosed learning disability. Who do I see to discuss this?

Information concerning learning difficulties is requested and provided during the enrolment process. Information is also obtained during BCC staff transition visits to primary schools prior to new Year 7 students commencing at the College. If, after completion of the enrolment process, your child receives a new or updated diagnosis, it is important that parents provide this new information to the College so that we can best meet the needs of your child. A staff member from the Learning Centre will then be in contact with you to discuss the new information.





#### **Electives**



#### What Year 7 electives are offered at Bunbury Catholic College?



All Year 7 students at Bunbury Catholic College have the opportunity to complete **eight electives** over the year. Electives are varied, fun, engaging and provide practical, hands on 'Taster Courses' from the Arts and Technologies learning areas. Students will be placed into mixed groups and will complete **two different electives** each term.



#### What are the Arts learning area courses in Year 7?



Drama, Dance, Music and Visual Arts.



#### What are the Technologies learning area courses in Year 7?



Food Technology, Metal Design, Wood Design and Robotics.



#### Do I get changed for Dance?



Yes, you need to wear your Physical Education uniform so you can move comfortably. You will change from your school uniform in the PE change rooms. You may not come to school in your PE uniform if you have Dance in period 1 of that day but may go home in PE uniform if you have Dance in period 6.

#### Does the College Cafeteria need volunteers?

#### How do lunch orders work?

#### How can my child pay for their lunch?




