# Principals' Report, 1981



## INTRODUCTION:

My Lord Bishop, fellow priests, distinguished guests and members of the School Community; it is with pleasure that I present to you the Bunbury Catholic College Report for 1981 — the ninth year of our College's life as a Co-educational Catholic Secondary School — a year that has witnessed the change from religious to lay leadership. I wish to look briefly on this year and to outline some hopes for the future.

I begin by acknowledging my thanks to my immediate predecessor Brother Gerard Toohey who so capably administered the College for the previous three years. Together with Senior Staff Miss. Pat McDonagh and Br. Bernard Halpin the College programme and organization was completely prepared for the year. It made stepping into the new position a pleasant and smooth process. To those people my thanks.

## RELIGIOUS EDUCATION:

Bunbury Catholic College is foremost a Christian community. The Religious Education programme is co-ordinated by Brother Harry PROUT. Emphasis on our faith is strengthened through class masses at St. Patricks, special occasion masses and

and weekly lunchtime mass on Thursdays in the Brothers Chapel. The Retreat Camp to Year 11 and 12 students adds to the above programme, the highlight of the year was the 'Jesus Invites us to Love' programme shared over a fifteen week period by Year 12 students and our Catholic community.

The specific Religious Education programme is extended and fostered in the staff and students through friendly and respectful reaction.

To the Bishop, Father Leon Russell and the community of priests who have supported our programme Thankyou. To Father Greg Chidlow our Chaplain for his efficiency and many hours of willing and sympathetic work at the College. Thankyou.

With the above programme and the preparedness of Staff to meet, openly to discuss and work towards our common goal, I feel we are truly a Catholic school. The response to Brother Marcellin Flynn by our School community and neighbouring Catholic Schools is public declaration of this fact.

## SCHOOL PROGRAMME:

While we continue to extend the very best students academically we must look to the present needs of our students. The very good T.A.E. results of the 1980 Year 12 group shows that this is happening at the College. The days are gone when boys and girls could move from school into the workforce at will. A very real need exists to cater for students after Year 10 with a terminal Year 11 course through which they can continue to learn while they actively prepare and seek employment.

Miss Carol HENDERSON is to be commended on a very successful Work Experience Programme with the Year 10 students this year.

## PARENTAL COMMUNICATION:

The response to meetings by Parents this year has been supportive. It was encouraging to have a good number at the Night on Drugs, Alcohol and the Adolescence and shows that those parents are responsible and serious about the development and knowledge of their sons and daughters. The education process will have a chance only if there is total support and communication between home and school.

## THE SCHOOL BOARD:

Under the incisive leadership of the Board Chairman, Mr. Clive Young, the efficient administration of monies through Mr. Brian Best and Mrs. Helen Williams and concerned democratic debate of the members of the School Board the operation of the College is in capable and efficient hands.

#### THE PARENTS & FRIENDS' ASSOCIATION:

It was with pride that the new School Canteen went into operation at Easter this year. A tribute to the involvement of over sixty members of the Parents & Friends' under the capable direction of Mr. Norm Howard, a very valuable facility for the College. Mr. Liam Hannon handed the reins to Mr. Peter Ross. Supported by a very enterprising group of ladies and gentlemen the association launched itself into entrepreneurial activities that would leave Michael Edgley gasping, culmination in the 'Art Extraordinaire' in August. The covered area currently under construction is witness to their financial success and I pray that the personal development derived from the involvement was equally rewarding.

#### STAFF:

The College was blessed with a good number of staff prepared to give freely of their time and talents for the benefit of the students. Mr. Les Fabre, our Sportsmaster, deserves special mention for his very hard and often thankless task of organising activities that cut across normal school programme. The enthusiasm of competitors and supporters at all School meetings are to his credit and also to the parents and teachers who supported him.

The Maths programme was acclaimed by the B.S.E. at public meetings while the success of our students in the National Mathematics competition brought a smile to the lips of our Maths Master, Mr. Miller.

To all staff members it has been a pleasure to work with you and I am confident that the College has a competent group of its future. A special farewell to Mrs. Irene Cumming who in her first year of teaching added a freshness and enthusiasm way beyond her experience that will be difficult to replace.

#### YEAR 12 STUDENTS:

To the graduating class of 1981. We are very proud of you as a group and I am confident that you will meet the challenges of adult life and that you will live out the Christian model that your parents and College have continually put before you. My personal thanks go to you for making me welcome to Bunbury, may you all have a happy life.

Bunbury Catholic College faces the future with confidence. Our steady increase in numbers will necessitate a building programme in the immediate future. The present needs of school leavers will compel us to offer an option of education in the Senior High School Section of the College. 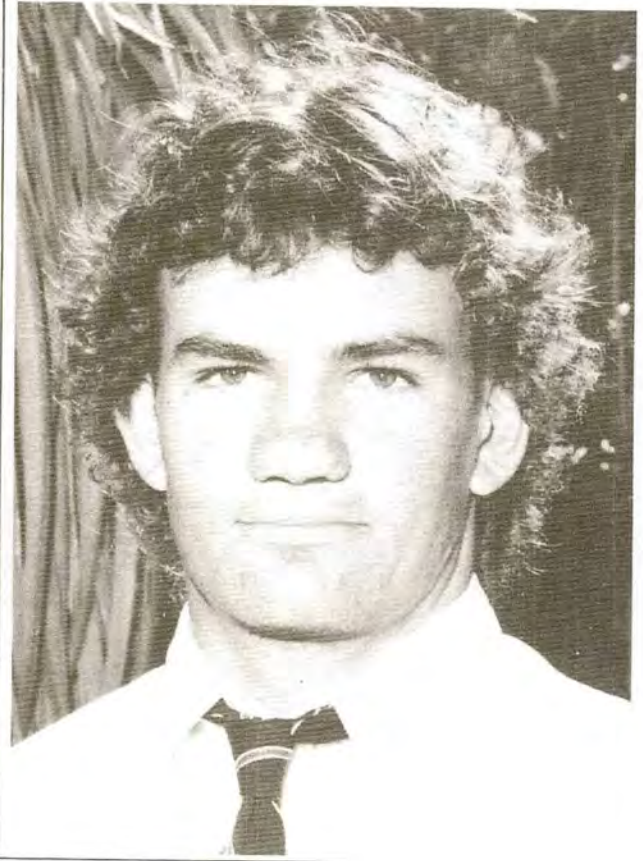

# TO THE OFFICE

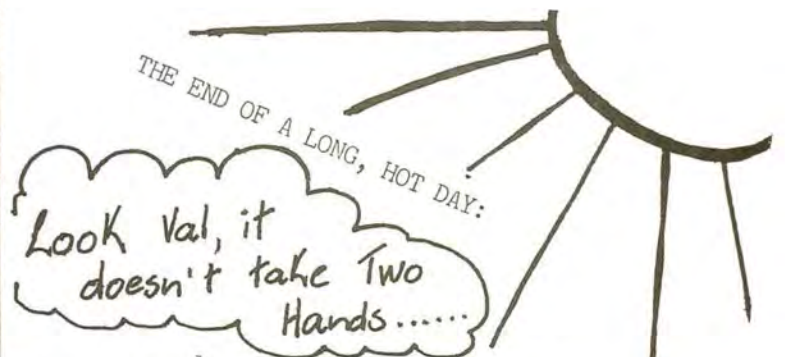

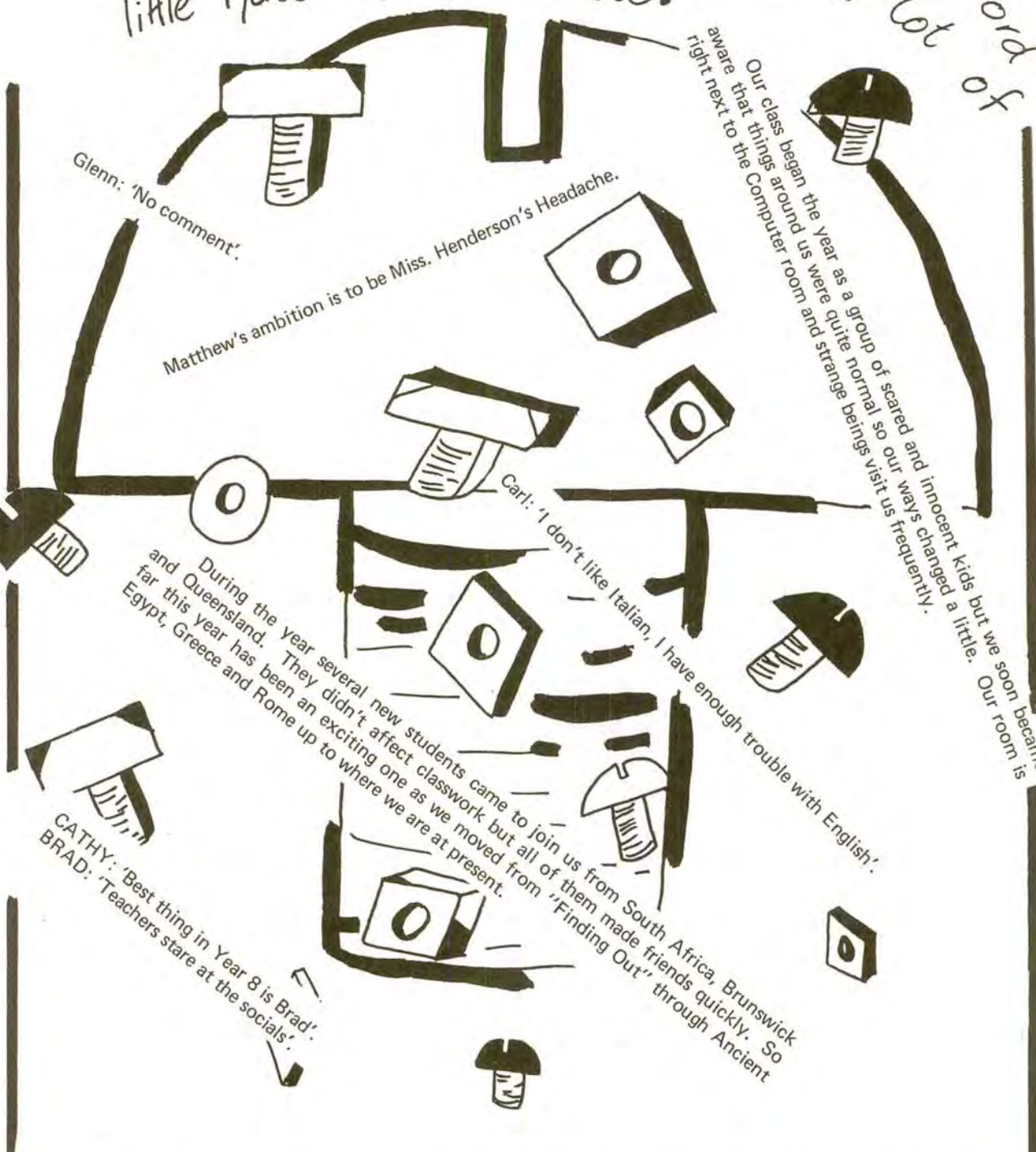

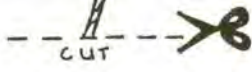
# yo-yo - scandal...

P.S. Bushbaby and Blowhole have forgotten to come to the game as usual, but Inspector Misfit has gone to inquire as to their whereabouts.

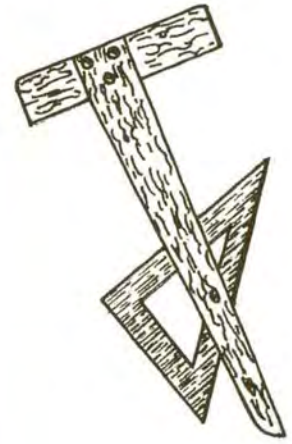

### TECHNICAL DRAWING – YEAR 12

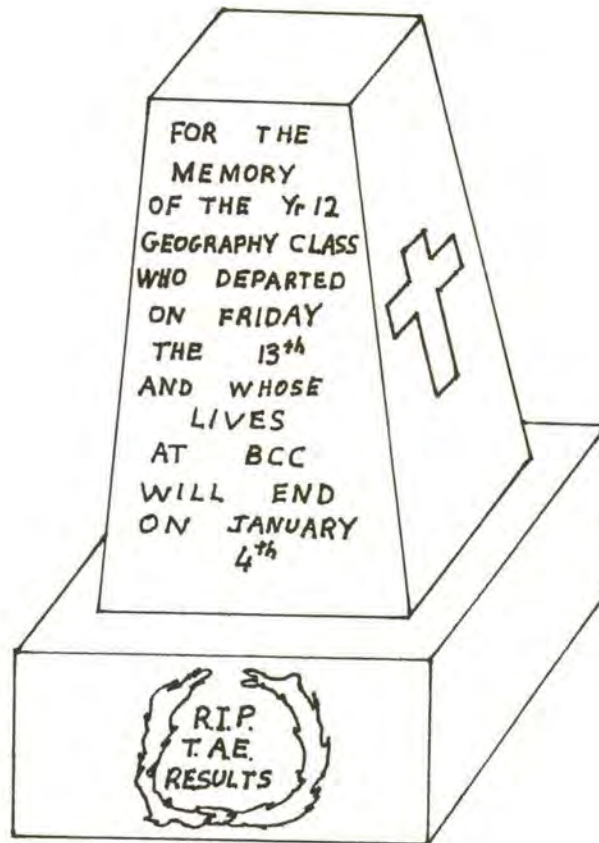
The year 12 students have taken part in a unique class project. The estate agency of Sandford and Hancock presented them with the task of designing a family home within a set price range, as well as producing house plans and presentation drawings of their selected design.

A building block, for which the house was to be designed, was selected at Sandridge Park. After many months of research, design and modification to plans, a final house design emerged. 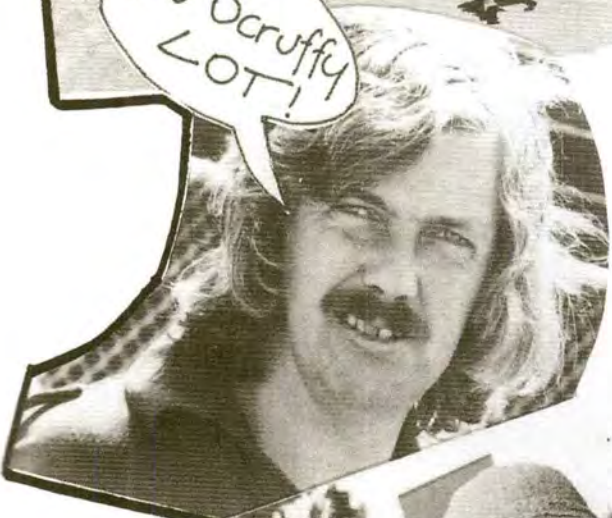

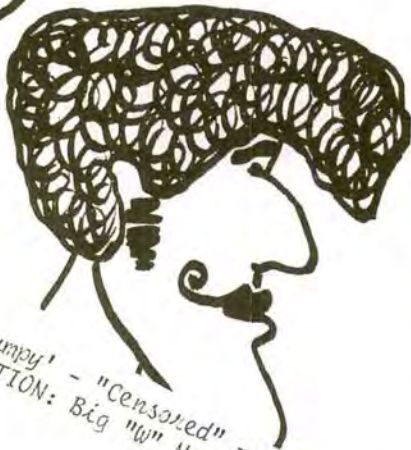
