#### CREST

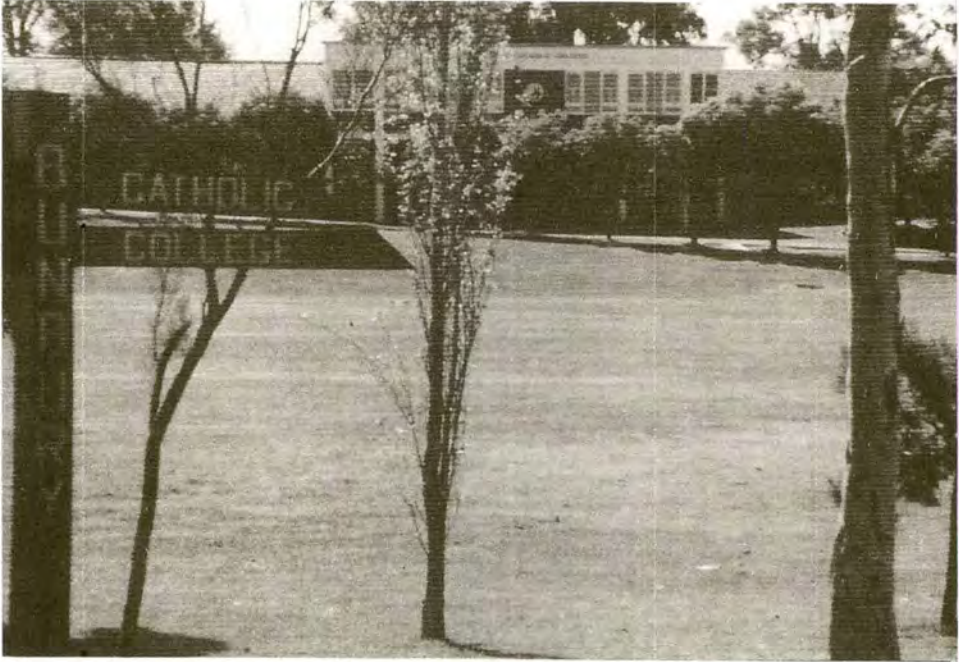

# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT - NOVEMBER, 1982

## INTRODUCTION:

My Lord Bishop, distinguished guests and members of the School community; it is with pleasure that I present to you the Bunbury Catholic College Report 1982:

Last year my report touched on a number of points. These included:

- \* The need that Bunbury Catholic College be a thoroughly Catholic School;
- \* The need for another course at the College other than the T.A.E. stream;
- \* The need for a building programme.

## THE CATHOLIC SCHOOL:

Last year, I smugly stated that our Religious Education Programme, co-ordinated by Br. Harry Prout and strongly supported by the Clergy, together with the spirit within the College indicated that we were indeed a Catholic School. This year, I would like to direct my attention to those students who have difficulty supporting the Catholic Ethos of the School. We have a few students whose own personal value system revolves around themselves and they appear incapable of accepting any form of discipline or responsibility. The faith development of the majority of the College is sometimes being jeopardised by the negative attitudes of these vocal few.

I expect full support of the home when there is a need to discipline these students and I pay tribute to those parents who have strongly supported me in the discipline of the students as the need has arisen this year.

May I acknowledge the work done by our Principal Mistress in the area of Pastoral Care and discipline in the College. She is a great support with the energy completeness and sensitivity that she pursues in her role as guardian and counsellor of the girls of our College.

Our College Chaplain, Father Greg Chidlow, is a bonus to the Students as well as Staff with his continual presence on the Campus, his easy access and his willingness to participate in every aspect of the School Programme.

## PARENTAL PARTICIPATION:

I have strongly encouraged parental participation and involvement in the College. This year you the parents have kept us informed of your feelings through replies to our reports, attendances at Parent nights and interviews and incidental appearances at the College, including the constant stream of helpers through our School Canteen. More direct participation is evidenced in our Work Experience Programme and Camp support. It was pleasing to see fathers giving their time to support these extra curricular areas.

May I again clearly state that the College belongs to all members of the School Community and we welcome your support, your views and your presence.

## BUILDING PROGRAMME:

With our increase in enrolments and the introduction of a fourth stream it was necessary to apply to the Federal Government for support to expand the facilities of the College. We have just been informed that they will subsidize the building of a Home Economics facility, a new Science block, new toilets and associated verandahs and covered walkways. Work on these buildings will commence shortly and have been made possible by a grant from the Bishop and very favourable borrowing terms from the Diocesan Development Fund.

We still need new classrooms, an Art/Craft facility and a Clothing/Fabric facility. Application is currently being made for these extensions.

## TRANSITION EDUCATION:

A Transition Class was commenced this year and filled the need for those particular students who wished to remain at the College but did not wish to pursue the T.A.E. Course of Studies.

## STAFF:

The College was again blessed with a stable staff that was prepared to give its time and energy beyond that normally expected. This was evidenced with the work of our Co-Ordinators in Br. Harry, Mr. Miller, Mr. Cahalin and Mr. Whitelaw who keep our Curriculum at an excellent, innovative level. Our Physical Education and Sport Programme which epitomizes the spirit of Bunbury Catholic College, was kept at peak efficiency through the efforts of Mr. Les Fabre. The Work Experience Programme saw over 100 students experience the work situation, this was capably co-ordinated by our Careers Advisor, Miss Carol Henderson. A special thanks to the Sheet Anchor of the College in our Senior Maths Master, Br. Bernard Halpin, and to the Principal's Advisor and Consoler of Students Sr. Martha.

**SCHOOL BOARD:**

The efficiency of the School Board saw a very smooth administrative year for the College. I would congratulate the present School Board and those of the past years associated with the planning of the new St. Josephs. It is a fine educational structure. May I pay tribute to Br. Justin for his executive work in this area as well as the help he has given me as a fellow Principal in the Bunbury Catholic Schools System.

**PARENTS & FRIENDS:**

The P. & F. Association continued on their active way, with the construction of the covered area for the College and a new Bus is now a certainty for the beginning of 1983. It was pleasing to see members of the P. & F. prepared to discuss issues related to the College, outside finance, and to grow as a group of supportive and concerned parents.

**THE GRADUATING CLASS OF '82:**

To the Year 12 class, I specially recommend to you as a very mature group of students with whom I am proud to have been associated. From the week-end they gave up to attend a Leadership Camp at the beginning of the year, they have given a strong example to the rest of the College.

I wish them well in their final examinations and the strength and courage of their convictions to cope with life after school.

**CONCLUSION:**

1983 will see a continued increase in enrolments, the expansion of the facilities in the College and I pray the maturing of the College as a Catholic School in its tenth year as a Co-Educational Catholic Secondary School.

Towards the end of first term the Year 10 classes had their annual venture to Busselton to the Four Square, Roelands Village and Catholic Youth Camp.

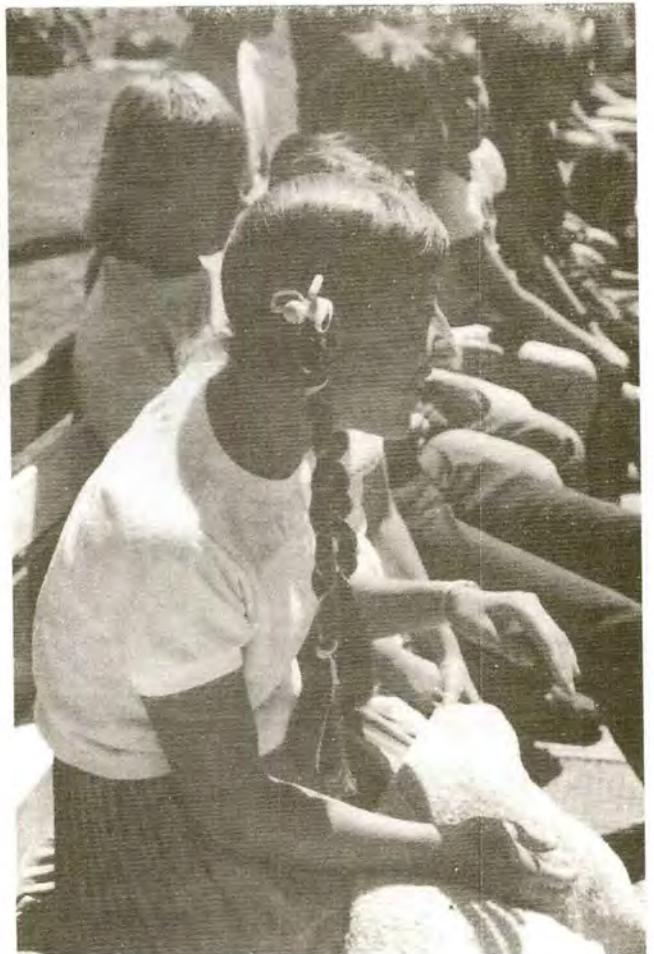

We have taken part in almost every aspect of College life since we started, and we can honestly say we have enjoyed our first year at B.C.C.



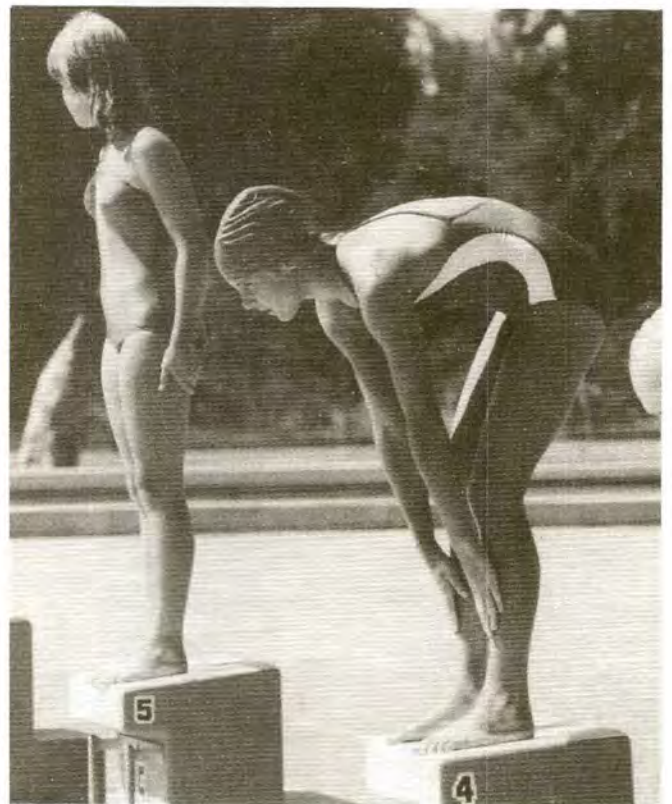
