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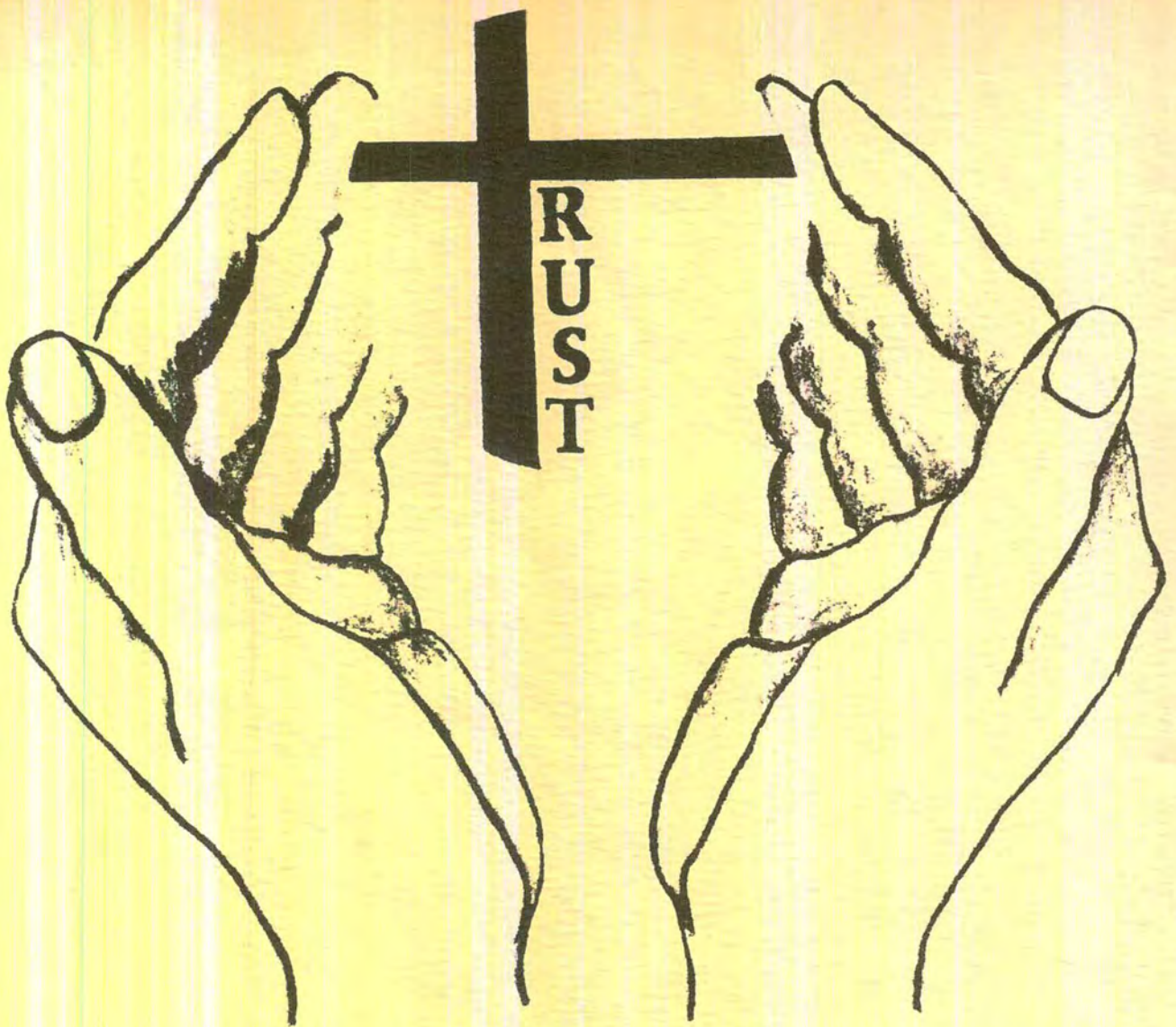

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

St. Patrick's Cathedral, 7th November, 1983

INTRODUCTION:

My Lord Bishop, Father Leon, distinguished guests and members of the School Community; it is with pleasure that I present to you the Bunbury Catholic College Report 1983.

It is difficult to touch on all aspects of a school year and its total involvement. Without attempting the complete spectrum of the year I will touch on a number of aspects of the life of the College and their impact, on the students in particular, and the total school community in general.

THE COLLEGE SPIRIT

Last year I expressed concern that a few negative students were jeopardising the faith development of the majority. While accepting that we still have some of these students in the College, I highly praise the majority of students who during this year have carried the College Spirit forward. Their openness, their respect for each other and school life participation and all that it entails have engendered an atmosphere of care and true Christian generosity. Of this majority I am, as you should also be, justifiably proud.

This is encouraged in no small manner by the support of parents, particularly when it comes to the difficult discipline concerns.

In an era of changing times we are very fortunate to have a supportive Clergy: Bishop Peter Quinn, a man of balance and knowledge and very approachable in all matters, Bishop Myles McKeon, recently retired but still very active in our College, Father Greg Chidlow until August was a constant presence and strength with the students and Staff. My deep appreciation goes to these men on your behalf.

I obtain courage from the support and direct contact of the clergy and in no small way they underwrite the Catholic and pastoral spirit of Bunbury Catholic College.

DEVELOPMENTS

This year the fourth stream of students progressed into Year 9. The Year 11 Transition Class continued and the building programme saw the completion of the Home Economics facilities, extra Science facilities and associated covered ways and toilets. Work has commenced on the Industrial Arts Centre and the Stage Four programme is waiting final approval by Canberra.

SCHOOL EVALUATION

The increase in students and buildings has necessitated a Self Evaluation of the College. The Staff



have worked for six months openly and honestly to adapt the College to the new need. I thank the parents who contributed to this evaluation and I hope our plans for 1984, as a result of the evaluation, will be to the benefit of the total College. The major area of change is the structuring of Year 10 to give special consideration to the needs of that group. Secondly is the introduction of subjects into Year 11 that will cater for the increased number of students staying at School.

STAFF

I thank my Senior Staff for the leadership they have given the College. The Co-Ordination of each subject area has been up to date, accurate and in many cases innovative. The continuous search for efficient programmes rests with the Co-Ordinator. While accepting the excellent work being done by the Senior Staff and experienced teachers I would like to pay particular tribute to the new breed of young Catholic teacher who is electing to enter the Catholic Education System.

Our Year 9 Co-Ordinator, Mr. Mark Browning has shown us with his enthusiasm and caring administration that Catholic Education is in good hands.

Danny Dunn who took over as Year 8 Co-Ordinator in May, Mrs. Julie Zappa, Miss Christine Naylor, Miss Natalie Calleja and our new Art Co-Ordinator Miss Elvia Giometti have all breathed fresh life into the College and have returned the trust you the parents and I have placed in them. To all new staff to the College this year I praise you for your efforts. I would wish Mrs. Potter a safe journey to Canada and thank her for her contribution; in just two short terms her students are certainly the better.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

I feel special mention should be made of the physical education programme in the College. Mr. Fabre was joined this year by Miss Julie O'Neill and together with other members of the Physical Education Staff promoted the spirit of the College with fitness and eagerness to participate. The competition with Bunbury Cathedral Grammar School was revamped to each sporting event being an entity. The competition between the two schools was spirited and healthy and in this I judge our success for the year. Hard, continuous effort earned its reward.

CULTURE

The highlight of the year was the production of Jesus Christ Superstar. The quality of this performance was of the highest order. Thanks Brother Harry and all participants.

SCHOOL BOARD

Another smooth, efficient year of Administration of the College. Thank you.

PARENTS

The P. & F. Association again gave us an exciting year of activity. Lead by our Lady President, Elaine Cahalin and efficiently administered by our Secretary, Moya Macquarie, this organisation is now an integral part of our College life.

I thank all parents who strongly supported the parent meetings this year. The high percentage of attendance would be the envy of many a school.

FAREWELL BR. BERNARD

It was with regret we learnt that Brother Bernard was to be transferred. We thank Brother for his work as a person in the College, his presence and his willingness to do anything and everything asked of him. The Computer Centre at Bunbury Catholic College will be his living memory.

CLASS OF '83

The graduating class have matured well over their final years at the College and I feel confident of their ability to enter a society, that is beset by gloomy forecasts, with confidence and versatility.

I thank the whole class for their leadership throughout the year and wish them well and pray that they will be members who live by their convictions in the community.

CONCLUSION

1984 will witness the further growth of the College to an enrolment of 470 students, continued development of facilities and the continuing adaption of the College to meet the needs of all the students.

I thank Miss McDonagh for her strong support and professional style of operation. I welcome Mr. Fabre as Senior Master and with confidence and excitement look forward to next year.

Dabbling in debating is decidedly diligent.

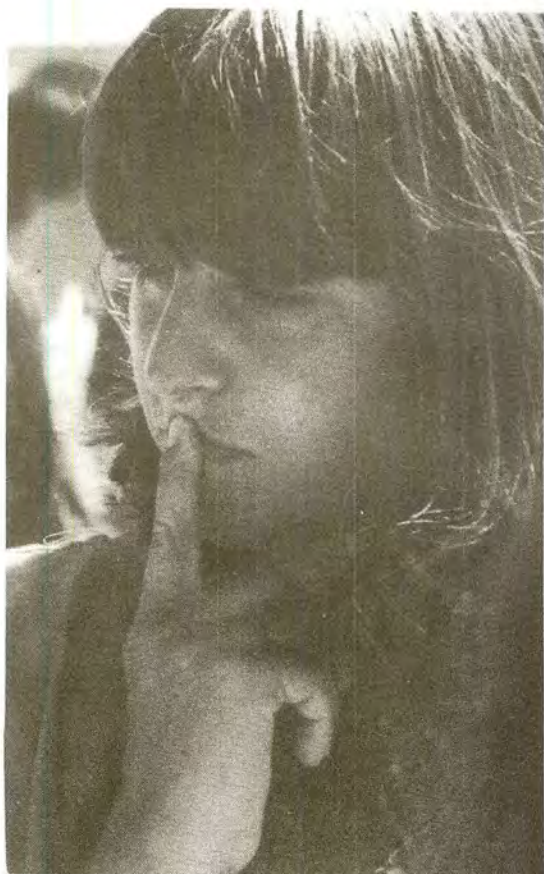

LIBRARY NOTES

Libraries are a place where fascinating snippets of information can be found.

HISTORIES OF LIBRARIES

The oldest known books in the world were made of clay. Earthen Tablets, on which were written symbols, were imprinted and baked. These 'books' were used for recording land deeds and business transactions by the Babylonians five thousand years before movable type was invented by the West.

The great libraries of Ancient Egypt, Greece and Rome all consisted of collections of papyrus scrolls.

For example: The Dead Sea Scrolls, belonged to the library of a Jewish religious group called the Essenes.

Christian monasteries made major contributions to the preservation of libraries and learning during the early Middle Ages. Monks copied manuscripts of religious works, to keep in monastery libraries.

During the Renaissance, Europeans acquired a great desire for the arts and learning. This interest led many aristocrats to develop private libraries.

With the invention of movable type in the mid 1400's, printed books brought changes to libraries. Books gradually replaced handwritten manuscripts. By 1600's libraries had started to look like present day libraries.

Today libraries form an important part of the world's systems of Communications and Education. They offer, not only books, but films, recordings, microfiche, magazines, newspapers, pamphlets, photographs, computerised information, paintings, musical scores and maps.

Libraries have kept pace with the changing information formats in order to serve as many people as possible within the community.

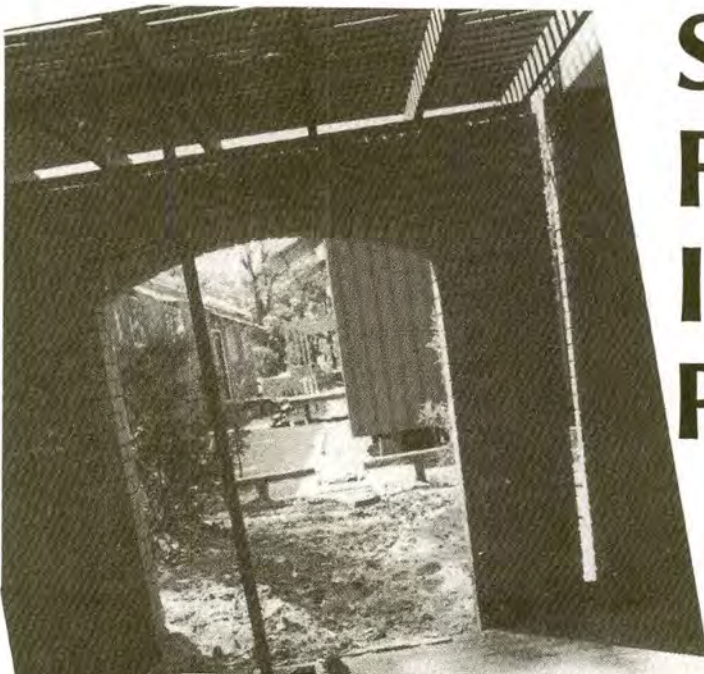

MULTICULTURAL ACTIVITIES AT BUNBURY CATHOLIC COLLEGE AND BUNBURY

This year, there have been several cultural and multicultural activities at Bunbury Catholic College. Below is a selection of some of the activities.

(1) **YEAR 8 I.S.** — “Communities”: The students studied the community of Bunbury and how the early migrants influenced its growth (in the farming and wine industries of the South-West). Students also have been studying the civilizations of Rome, Greece and Egypt — their impact on our present-day civilization.

(2) **YEAR 9 I.S.** — “Aborigines”: As part of the Integrated Studies Programme, Aboriginal speakers from Bunbury Technical College spoke to the students about the culture, customs and food habits. They also cooked damper and kangaroo tails on an “open B.B.Q.”.

Students also studied the INFLUENCE OF MIGRANTS before and after WW1 and 2, in Australia.

(3) **YEAR 10 I.S.:** Students have been studying the culture, peoples and politics of various countries, e.g. Russia, China, Japan, U.S.A., Indonesia, Central America, Middle-East and the United Nations.

(4) **YEAR 9 ITALIAN:**

1. “Easter Customs”: Mrs. Buoro spoke to the children about Easter Foods and customs in Italy. The children then cooked “RISOTTO MILANESE” and “BISCOTTI AL LIMONE”.

2. “Italian Puppet Plays” — The students worked in groups to prepare an Italian puppet play. These were presented to the Years 2—7 students at St. Michael’s Primary, Brunswick.

(5) **SWISS FONDUE COOKING AND TALK:** Alan REINHARDT (a Swiss-American student at BCC) gave a talk on Switzerland to the Year 6 class at Bunbury Catholic Primary. He spoke of his country’s customs, languages and culture — how they were similar and different to Australia’s.

Two weeks later, he showed the students how to make Swiss Cheese and Beef Bourguignonne Fondues. Their comments were very interesting and everyone learnt something from the exercise.
