PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

St. Patrick's Cathedral, 5th November, 1984

INTRODUCTION:

My Lord Bishop, Father Leon, distinguished guests and Members of the College Community; it is with pleasure that I present to you the Bunbury Catholic College Report for 1984.

FAITH COMMUNITY:

One of our major aims as a Catholic School is that we develop as a Faith Community. While we work hard towards achieving this goal we recognize without reservation that the family is the prime educator of our students. May I point out that while you the parents are the prime educator, you must also take responsibility for your sons and daughters. This means that we rely heavily on you the parents to involve yourself in the College and support and be loyal to us, as we are to you.

I thank the parents who have supported our development as a faith Community with their loyalty. I question parents who sometimes are less than loyal to us by engaging in rumour and inuendo. Please, if you have any concern for the College, come forward and find out the true facts of matters from the prime source of the College, namely myself.

Brother Harry has been our Religious Education Co-Ordinator for four years. He has stamped his faith, his stance and his belief on the R.E. programme in particular and on the College Community in general. Brother Harry has been transferred to join the Marist Retreat Team and we know he will do this job very well. We thank him for his time with us and certainly wish him happiness and fulfilment in his new post.

The College is blessed with a professional Senior Staff and the task of Principal is strongly supported and lightened with the quiet efficient work of our Principal Mistress Miss McDonagh and the hard working and energetic Mr. Les Fabre. To both these fellow professionals I express my appreciation.

The Staff, who have taken on the onerous task of Co-Ordinator, have worked very hard and often unseen to make our College a strong and I hope leading educational institution.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION:

Congratulations and thanks to Mrs. White and Mr. McNeill for a strong Physical Education Programme both in class time and at the Inter-School level. Our competition with the Bunbury Cathedral Grammar School continued on a healthy, friendly and competitive basis. We returned to Perth on a number of occasions this year to compete with Catholic Colleges of the Metropolitan area. These days extended our students both in their sporting abilities and in their inter-social qualities.

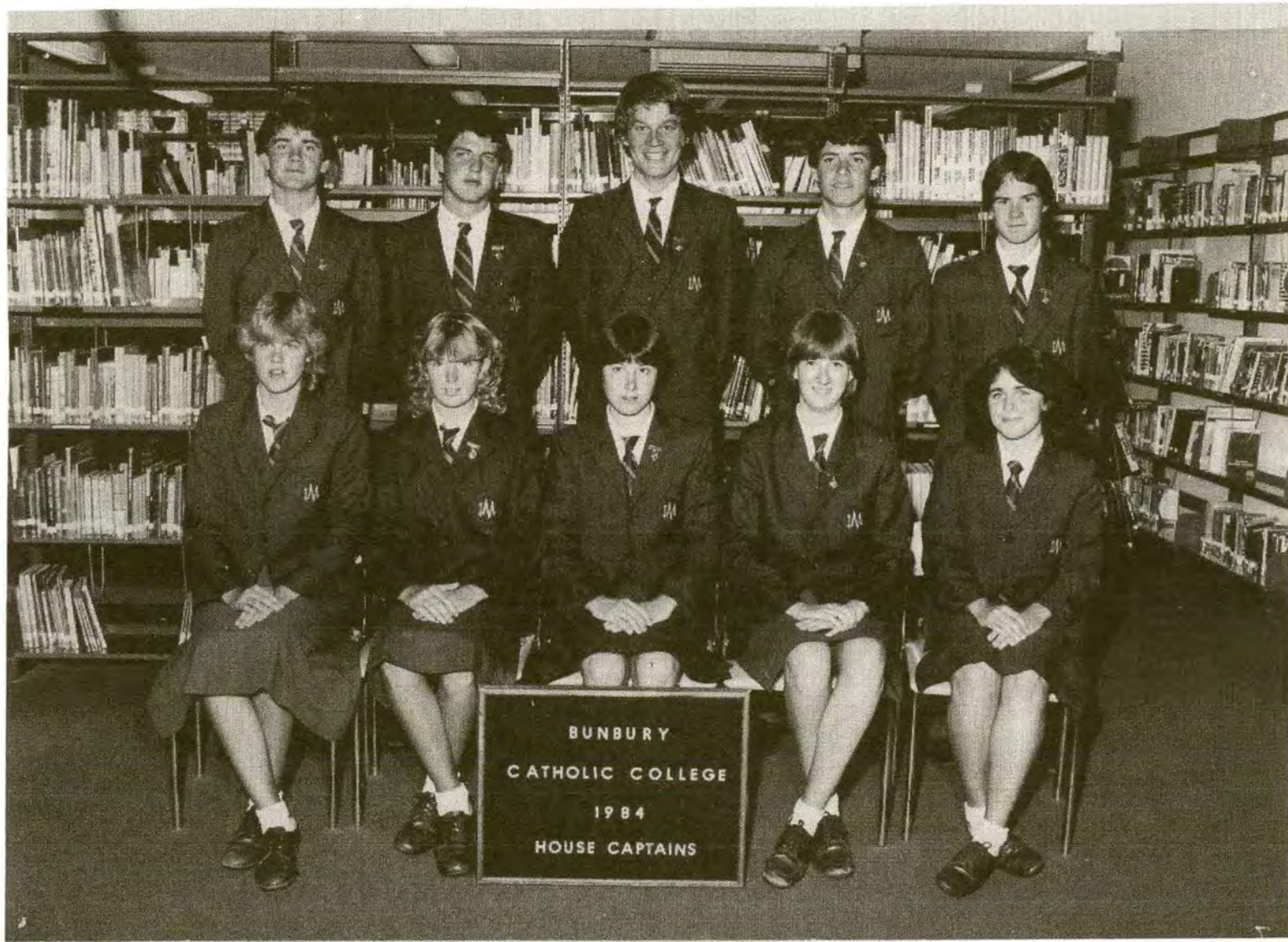

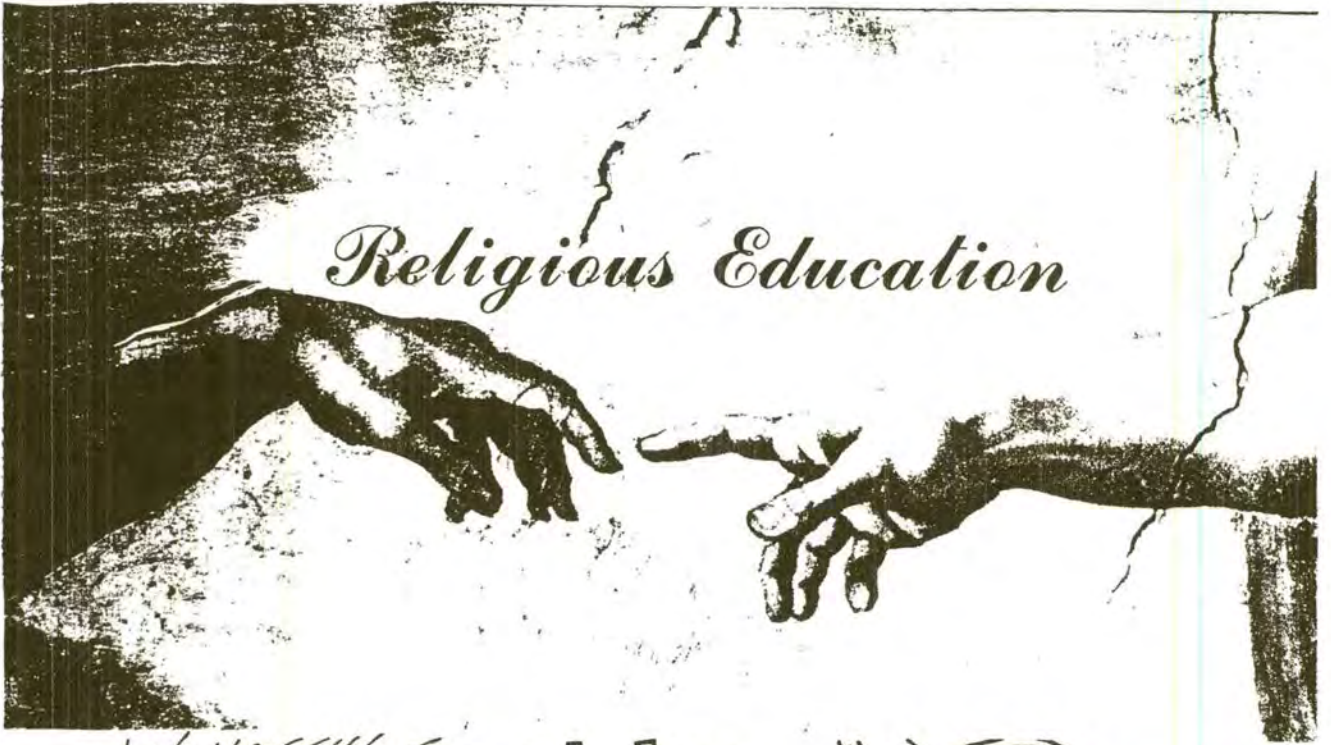

MATHEMATICS



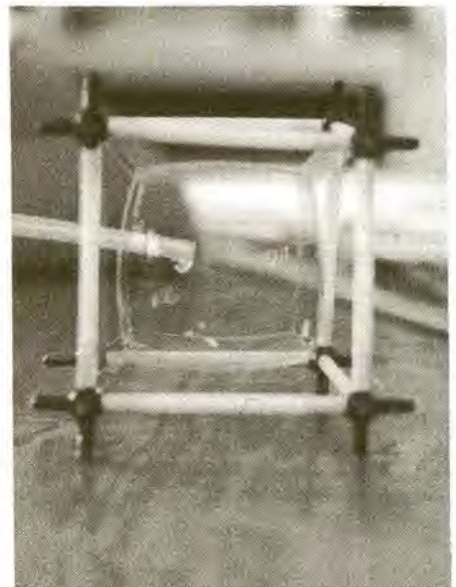
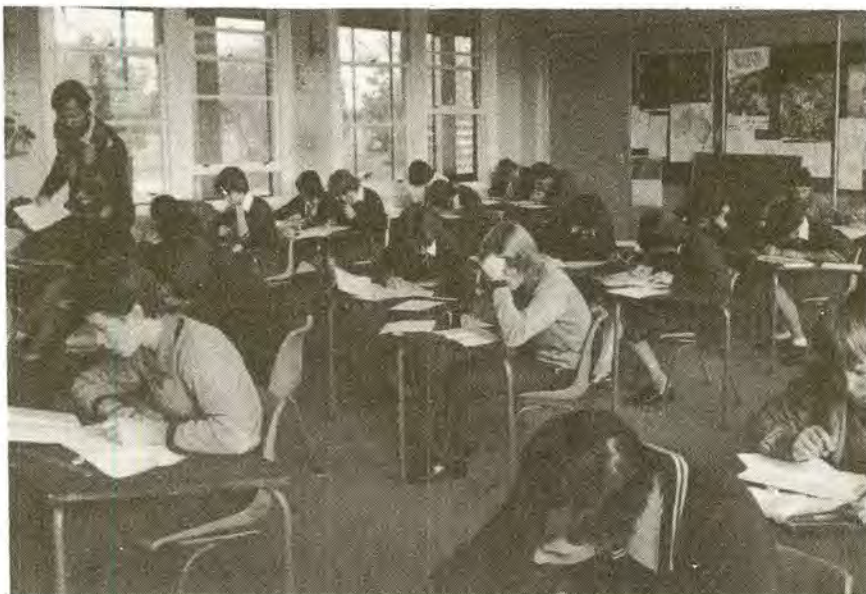
This year has seen a strong involvement by students and staff in activities and events arranged to increase awareness and appreciation of mathematics. In January of this year, Bradley Maguire, of Year Twelve, attended a course for talented mathematics students at the University of Western Australia. Anne Turner, Catherine Maguire, Ward Italiano and Tom Ryan, of Year Ten, represented our school at the annual Western Australian Mathematics Games Camp held at Point Walter. Staff from the Mathematics Department have participated strongly in meetings of the South-West Mathematics Association and the State Conference of Mathematics Educators held at Muresk Agricultural College in July. These activities and others, such as National Mathematics Week, have provided a stimulus to the teaching, learning and acceptance of mathematics within our school community.

The school result obtained in the Australian Mathematics Competition again proved to be outstanding. We obtained twenty two distinctions and fifty two credit certificates from a school entry of one hundred and sixteen students. Nicholas Maher, Iain Clarke and Jason Hislop obtained the best overall results. All three students came within 2% of winning a prize in this competition.

We were also visited by the Board of Secondary Education Mathematics Moderator during term one. His highly favourable report, when coupled with our Mathematics Competition result, indicate that our course content is correct and that our standards of assessment compare most favourably with all other Western Australian secondary schools. The past year has provided many challenges and rewards for the mathematics students of Bunbury Catholic College. I would like to thank the school community for its support of mathematics and to encourage its continuance.

WORK EXPERIENCE

This year 127 Year 10 and 11 transition students were out on work experience from August 13th to 23rd. There were only six students we were not able to place in the job that was their first choice job area. These included such jobs as Police work, Doctor, Public relations, Advertising and Pilots.

We are very fortunate to have employers who are so generous with their time and energy to accept students for work experience. We are very grateful to them for the valuable, realistic insight they provide our students with into the world of work.

In an effort to make the work experience more meaningful to the students we required the students to organise themselves as they would in a real life job situation. They were required to make an interview time, discuss with their parents their choices of jobs, complete a work experience application form, apply in writing for a job, phone the employers and go through an interview with their employer.

With the co-operation of the staff we conducted a debriefing morning on Friday, 24th August. At this the students were encouraged to discuss their experiences and evaluate the time they had spent at work. We considered such questions as what their job involved, the tasks they performed, how they coped with these tasks and mixing with staff, was the job as they imagined, did they need any special skills, and what changes will they now make as a result of work experience. Most important, was what they had learnt about themselves.

It has been a pleasure to read the reports from all employers. Our students are to be congratulated on their presentation, application and behaviour. They have followed well in the footsteps of previous Year 10 and 11 to uphold the good name of our school in the community.

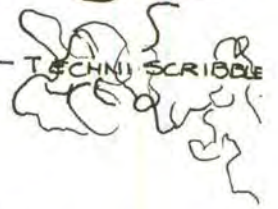

A great trip and the boys finished the tour by being part of the 86,000 people at the M.C.G. when the West Indies played Australia.

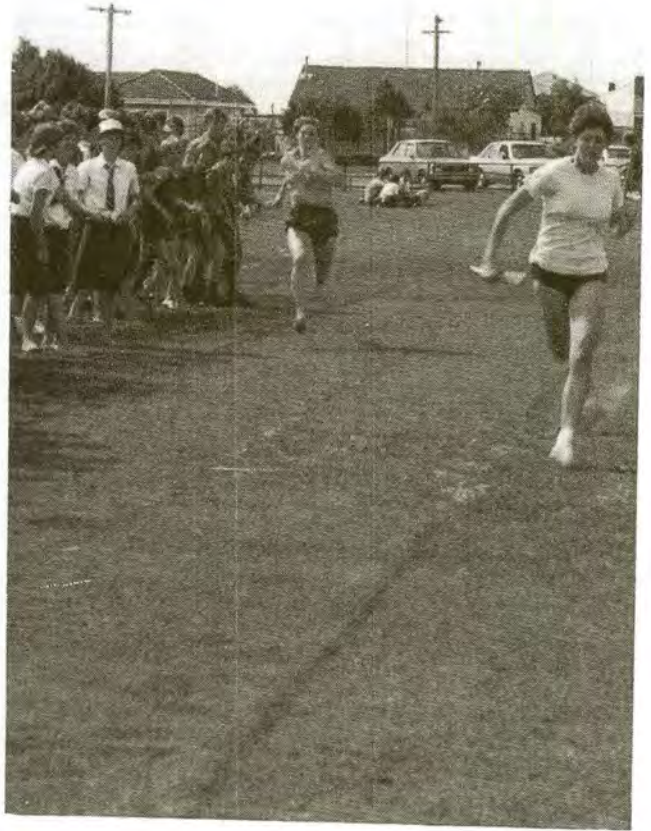

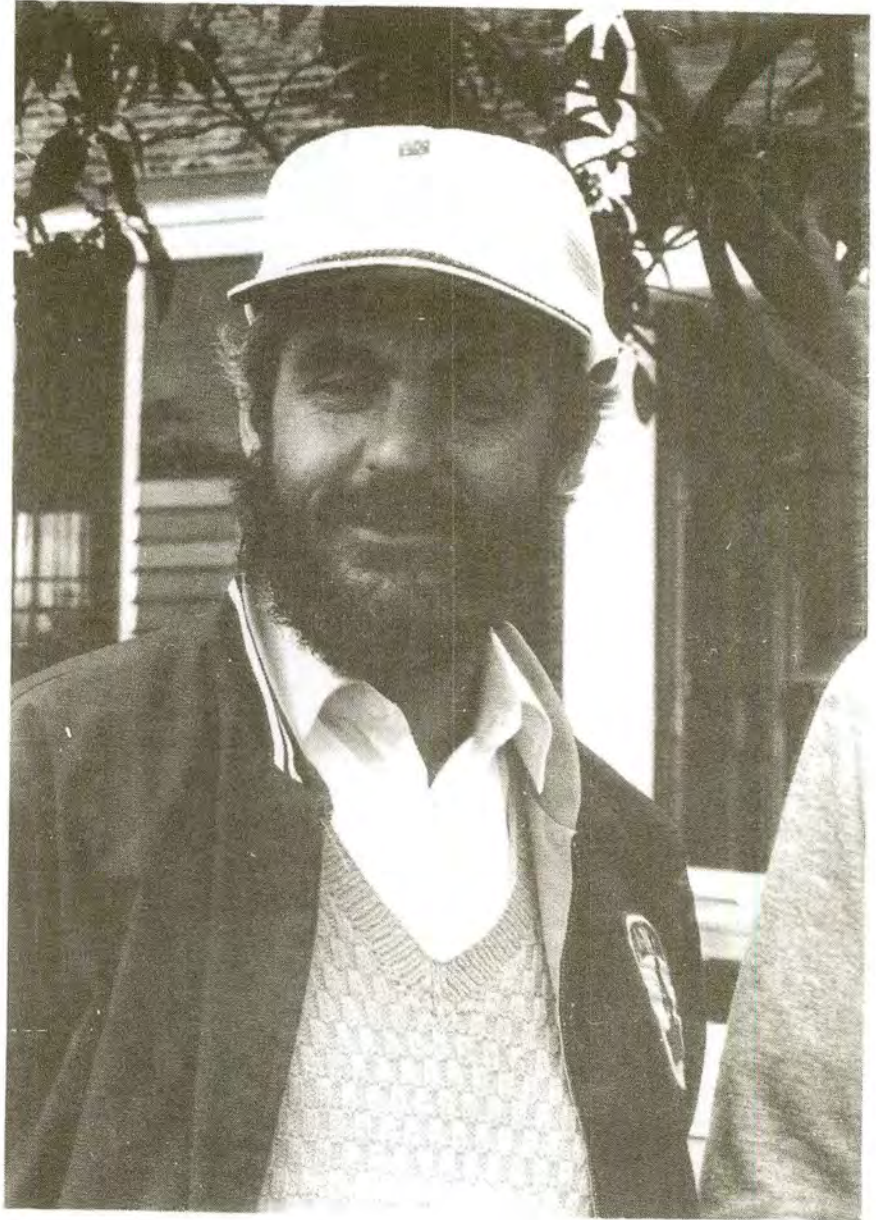
