MARIST YOUTH FESTIVAL/VICTORIAN TRIP

We were, as we found out when we arrived, going to be having a very eventful week with numerous activities, workshops and heaps of great (and no so great) entertainment.

The festival included morning and evening rallies which usually started with a sing-song to get everyone in the mood and woken up. Organised

entertainment included a mini-circus at the opening rally, a bush dance, a french-style cabaret, and for a bit of culture, an Irish night in which we experienced the art of Irish dancing. On another night we all celebrated mass together which had a great reflective and unifying atmosphere.

The night activities always ended off with the late-night coffee shop. Going to this was one of the best ways of getting to know everyone and we were always entertained by the talented and not so talented.

The week that we spent in Kilmore was structured to allow many positive actions to be produced, as well as integration with other people from around Australia.

Much attention was centred around the guest speakers who spoke to the group as a whole and ran smaller workshops on their particular field of experience. Bishop Shaun O'Casey spoke to us about the deep division within the Irish nation and

the blatant abuses of human rights in El Salvador. Being an Irish bishop and having spent a number of years in El Salvador, he was able to speak firsthand about both subjects.

Indeed, he delivered a letter to us from a group of christian youths in an El Salvadorian town who asked us for our support in their struggle to remain free to practice their faith. The group put together two petitions from this — one to the government

of El Salvador, and another to the U.S. government for supporting that repressive regime.

The second speaker was Delores Leckey, from America, who spoke to us about the growing role of laity in the church.

The third speaker was Br. Andrew who worked with Mother Teresa in India. He spoke of the poverty in India.

Within these groups we discussed the different

aspects of the topics discussed by the main speakers and how they applied in our lives. These groups helped us all put the idea of justice in our own lives in perspective.

A number of workshops were run, ranging in topics from drama and meditation, to human sexuality. All of these different aspects of the youth festival showed us how we can bring world justice and peace into our own lives.



After the conference would up, we made our way to Melbourne. We stayed with the Marist Brothers at Holden Street, North Fitzroy.

For the next couple of days we each pursued our own directions in exploring Melbourne. The whole group went out to tea at a stylish little restaurant by the name of "Le Pub". Even at 3.00 a.m. there was still much activity.



To cap off a very worthwhile trip, we took the Deluxe bus route back to Perth. During this trip the driver mistook Mark Browning and Natalie Calleja for newlyweds and us for their relatives. All in all it was a great trip, which we would recommend to anyone who is contemplating going to the 1988 Marist Youth Festival in Kilmore.

LEADERSHIP DAY



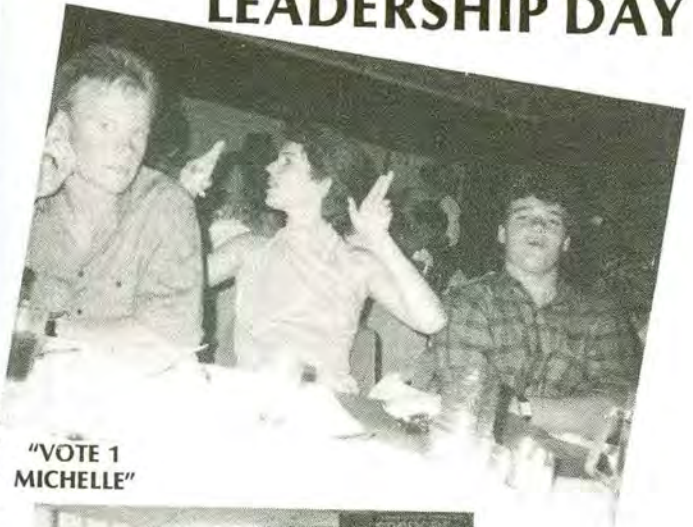

(You won't be seeing us again, I've got a hunch)

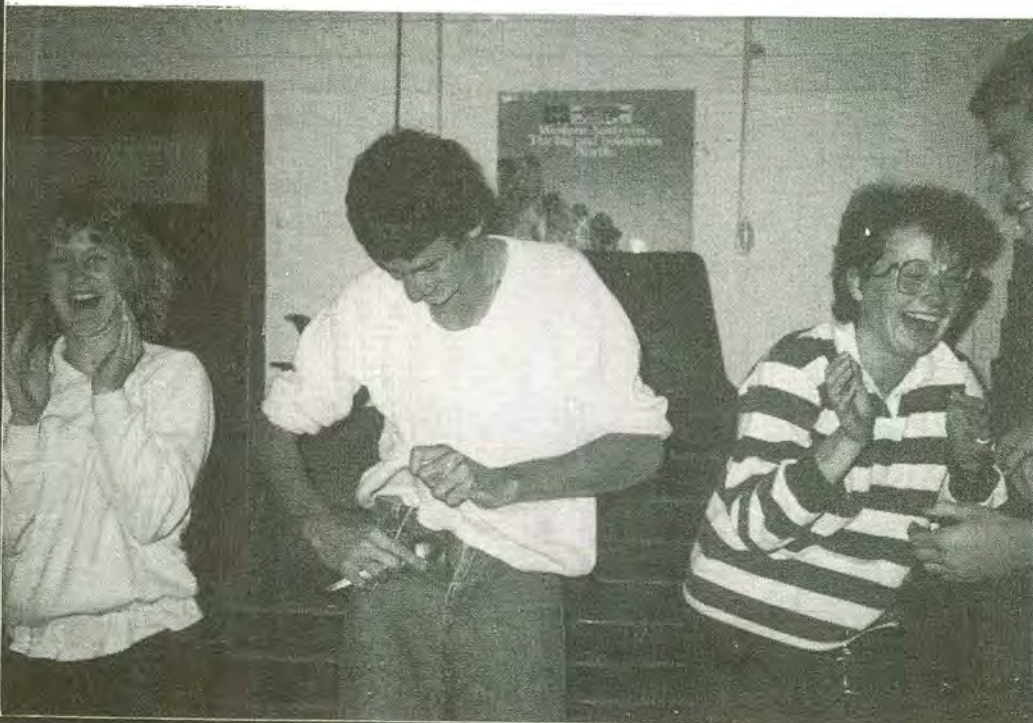
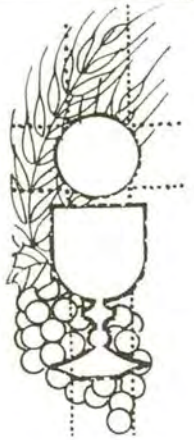

COMPUTING DEPARTMENT

School started with a sparkle this year as the College's computing facilities were updated. For the students there was the excitement of unpacking the Apple II computers and setting them up for the first time and as the year progressed, it became evident that the micro computers were indeed better suited to the students needs than our previous mini computer "Frieda". Much thanks is due to the Parents & Friends Association who raised roughly half the necessary money to buy the machines.

The new machines have allowed the material taught in the courses to be updated and it is intended that this development continue into 1987. For the first time in the school, students were able to have hands on experience in the use of database and electronic spreadsheet software as well as wordprocessing software. Education in this area is of increasing importance as computer based occupations utilizing these skills are increasing at 22% per year.

In addition, having modern programming languages has made it possible to teach the modern methods of structured programming to those students doing the twelve month courses in Years 9 and 10. Since this is possible, we are well placed to teach the new T.E.E. Computing course. This T.E.E. computing course creates a well defined career

path for students aiming for a professional career in computing. As these occupations continue to grow at about 12% per year, the job prospects in this area are excellent.

After "Frieda" was given to the school in 1978 through a Federal Grant by the efforts of Br. Bernard, he wrote several administration packages to help in the administration of the school. At that time the programs had to be run by skilled personnel operating from the computer room.

In November, 1985, the school decided to buy a Macintosh computer to replace these packages. By the start of Term 1 this year, the programs were operating and with Mr. Les Fabre's continued support have been improved and worked effectively this year to provide assistance in course timetabling, student records and the production of class notes and booklets.

At the end of third term, two machines were purchased for the Maths and Science staff to use in preparing their lesson and exam materials, as well as being a tool to analyse the students' semester grades. These have been well received though the benefits from them will not be seen until the 1987 school year.

Finally, a system was needed for use in the school's office.

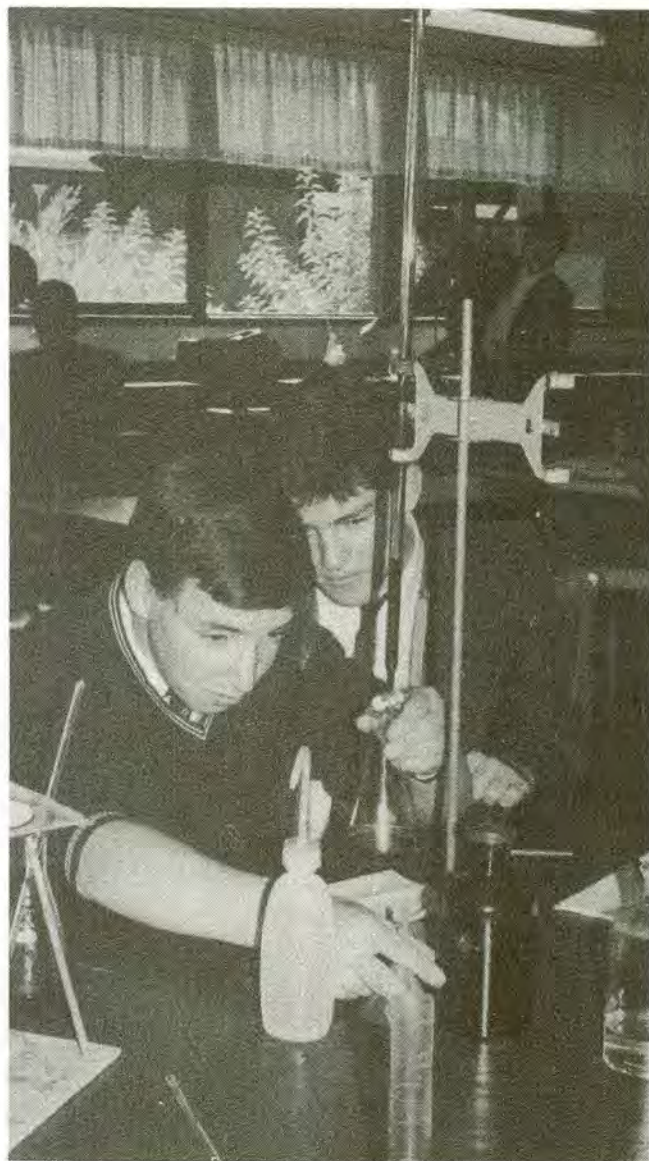
COMPETITIONS:

This year our students entered two competitions, the University of N.S.W. Science Competition and the Titration Stakes run by the Royal Australian Chemical Institute. The former is a competition open to Lower School students and attracts some 5,000 entries from about 200 schools from all over Australia.

Although we didn't win any national or state prizes, we had some creditable results, especially from our Year 8's. Six students from Year 8 finished in the top 10% of entries from the state. The winners from the school were Amanda Hodgson and Mathew Martella from Year 8, Clare Kelderman from Year 9 and David Wardle from Year 10 who also finished in the top 10% in the state.

The Titration Stakes (a titration, by the way, is a process for chemical analysis of a solution) is open to Upper School Chemistry students, and is also an Australia-wide competition. B.C.C. entered two teams. The team of Tom Ryan, Mark Sykes and Iain Clark were our best performers and they finished fifth out of 28 teams in the South-West division of the competition, and about 18th in the state in what was a very tight finish involving extremely small inaccuracies.

Congratulations to all competitors from our school for the enthusiasm with which they competed, and better luck for next year.

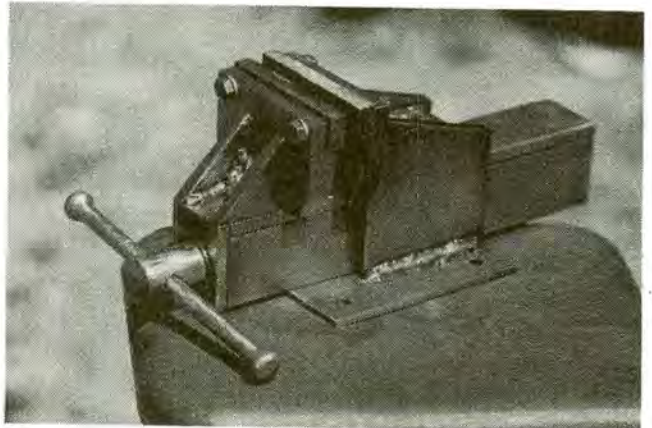

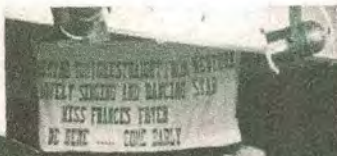

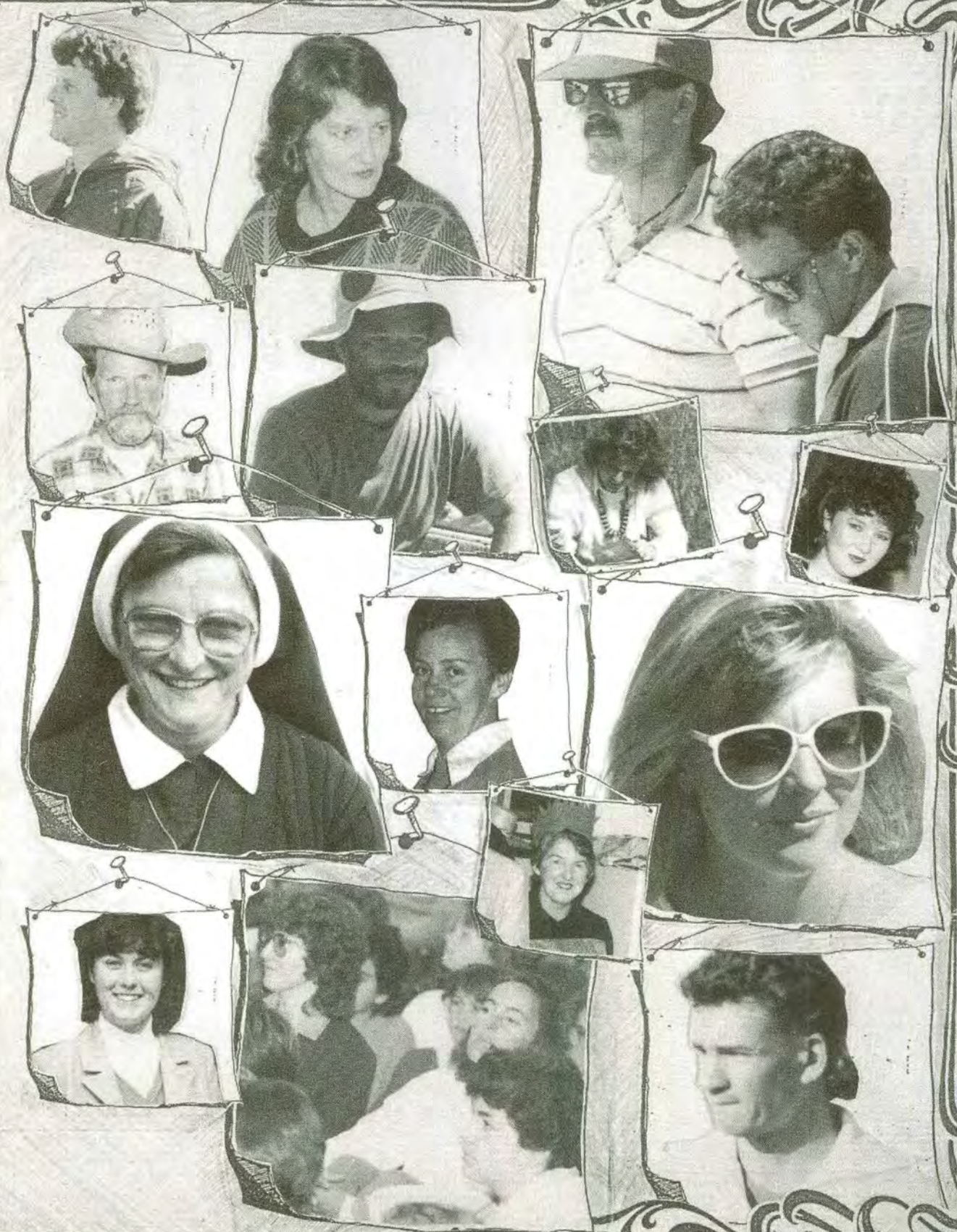

Bunbury Catholic College hosted the thirteenth Australian Marist Cricket Carnival in January.

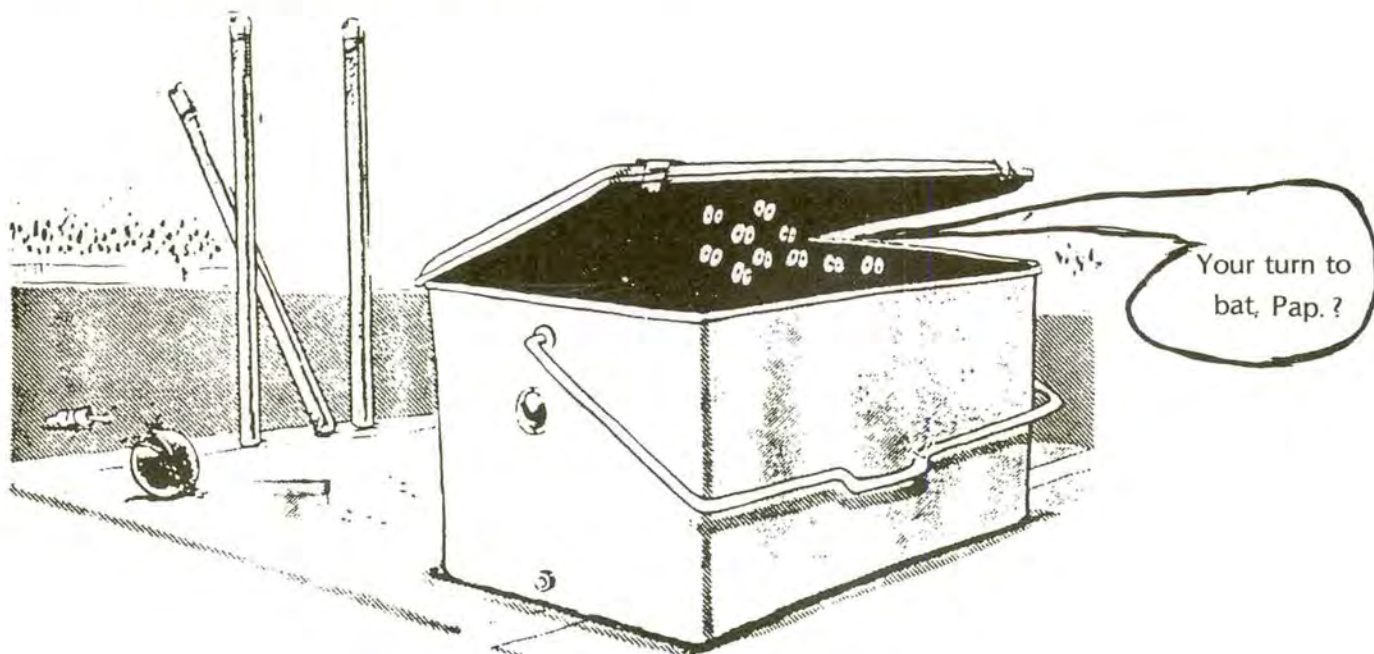
In temperatures that stayed in the high 30's all week, the 1st XI's from every state in Australia battled for the Stan McCabe Trophy.

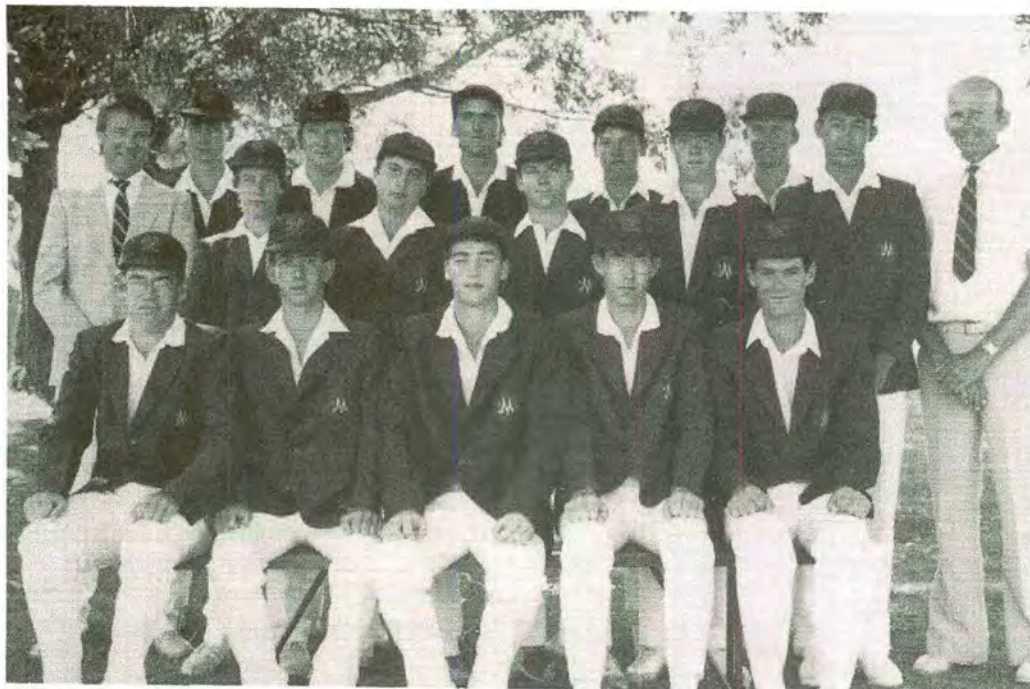

The visiting teams were exemplary ambassadors of their Colleges and the Marist spirit permeated every aspect of the Carnival.

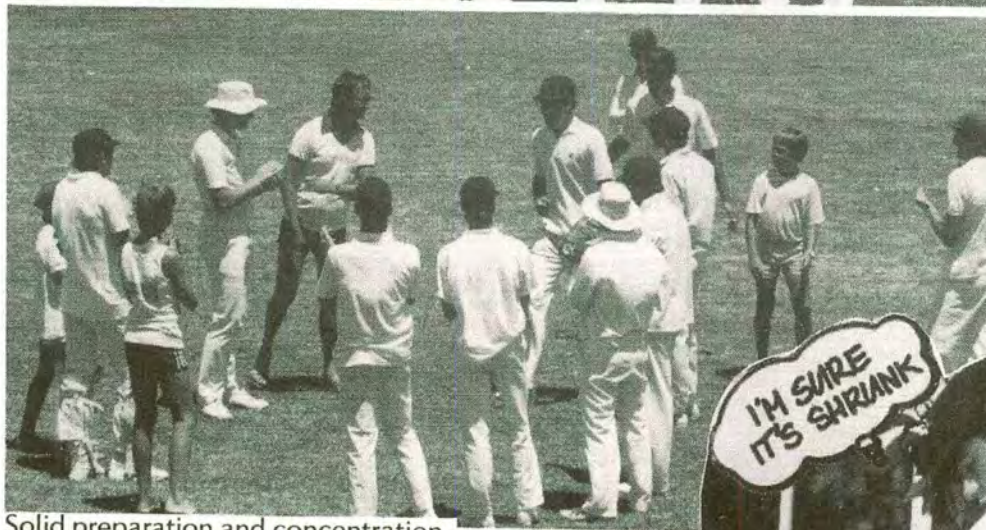

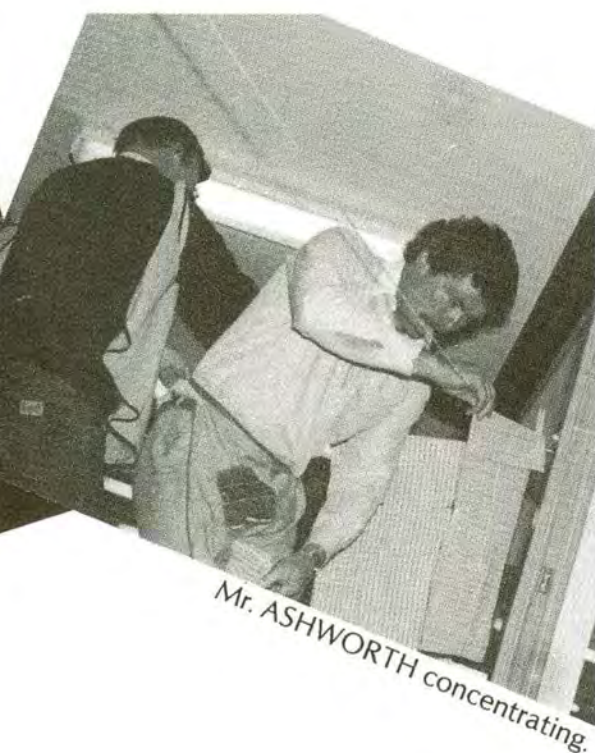
