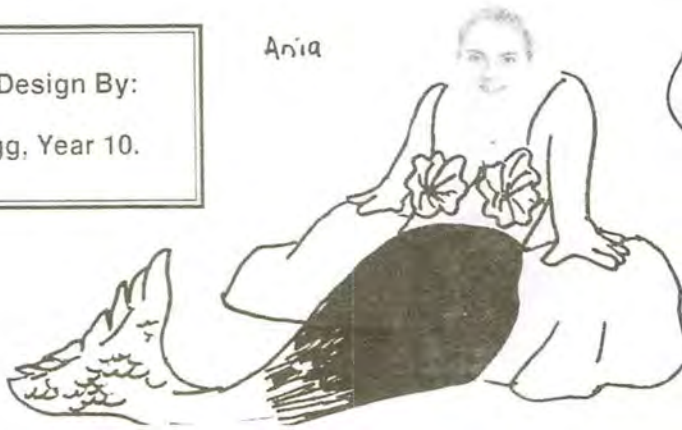

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

My Lord Bishop, members of the College community, it is my privilege to present to you the Bunbury Catholic College Report for 1992.

The past 12 months have seemed especially full, exciting and rewarding.

January saw the Bunbury Catholic Community hosting the Marist Cricket Carnival. Certainly the 10 days were very full, with the extra demands of billeting teenage cricketers, making their families and supporters welcome, catering daily for lunches, snacks and 'happy hours'; certainly they were very exciting, as each team strove to gain the victory; and certainly they were most rewarding, as the college community - students, staff, and parents - worked together to guarantee the success of the Carnival. The atmosphere engendered spilled over to the opening term, as the parent community worked to support our students and staff.

I am awed by the commitment of our P & F committee, chaired by Mr Frank Townsend, which enables our parent community to achieve so much. The commitment of our parent community is equally evident in the dedication of the members of our College Board, chaired by Mr Bryan Sykes.

In 1992, we saw the completion of the stage 1 Building Programme, moving the Administration to the Petherick Street side of the grounds, expanding our Art facility, and giving us the use of a new Science Lab, and new toilet block, including wheelchair access.

Meanwhile, since the new Administration subsumed the college Chapel, P & F, Board, Staff and students looked at the optimum location for a new Chapel. The decision was taken to convert the old Administration area, extend the frontage, and re-landscape to give the community a special place to highlight faith experiences.

No school grows in isolation, and in recognition of this, a joint Bunbury Catholic Schools' Board meeting was held in May, facilitating mutual communication and understanding and sharing issues and concerns.

Truly, a review of the contributions to the college by its parent community is a humbling experience: I am in deep debt to so many who have given freely of their talents and time and can only say . . . thank you.

With the building energies going on around them, staff

and students too were not idle. Once again, the college opening Mass celebrated our commitment to a Catholic education and re-dedicated the college community to Christ.

During the year the on-going Religious Education programme was enhanced by the contribution of five Chaplains sharing between them the heavy demands a secondary college community can make. Retreats highlighted the programme for each Year group, and we were grateful for parent and community assistance. 1992

saw a more active, participatory experience in the faith programme, with certain Year groups visiting and caring for the less able in our community. The Fast for Faith programme also explored the student commitment to the wider community, and whilst not held in house this year, nevertheless saw many student participants actively involved.

Each step forward makes demands of staff and of students, and I am keenly aware of and grateful for the talents and dedication of the college Religious Education team, led by Mrs Marie Waddingham.

Academically, staff had much to congratulate in the 1991 results.

Tim Mitchell, dux of 1991 and recipient of the Kelderman Award for Excellence, scored an aggregate well in excess of 400, as did Kellie Muir. Annette Carmichael, with 10 A grades to her credit, was awarded a Certificate of Excellence. Notable, however, was the high percentage of students who scored creditably - over 60% of the 1991 Year 12 cohort exceeded an aggregate of 300 representing a minimum average of 60% in their exams.

The dedication of good teaching staff is another essential component of success and I am indebted to a staff which is untiring in its efforts. No other school that I am aware of offers, and values, an additional tutorial session after hours. In addition, in 1992, our staff are offering supervised evening library study sessions two evenings per week in these weeks immediately preceding the T.E.E. On behalf of our Year 12 parents and students I thank each teacher involved in this voluntary programme.

Curriculum growth in the college has responded to demonstrated student needs, as in the (again, voluntary) fitness programme for selected Year 8 students, the growth of Aboriginal studies which saw a number of Year 8 students participate in the Milbindi Forum as well as experiencing the talents of Burnum Burnum in an earlier guest session, and the development of increased



communications with TAFE, as in the programme offered to some Year 10 students to participate in a 'Trade for a Day' programme.

Bunbury Catholic College has long held a well-deserved reputation for sporting prowess, and 1992 built on the past with a range of individual and team successes. In the swimming season Bunbury Catholic College tested its skills with Bunbury Cathedral Grammar School and then went on to win the Boys' Junior, Senior, and aggregate trophies in the B-division of the ACC, the team achieving 4th place overall. Grant Novak and Richard Horner both set new records.

During the year sporting teams competed at finals and grand finals in Baseball, Water Polo, Girls' Hockey, Netball, Football, Cricket and Volleyball.

An outstanding teams' event was the Capel to Collie Classic Fun Run in August, in which the Bunbury Catholic College students won the schools' division, and the Bunbury Catholic College staff won the corporate division.

Most importantly, it was particularly pleasing to hear of the sportsmanship exhibited by so many of our students in their various events.

Student achievements are the goal of any school, and it is with much pride in them that I reflect on their sporting prowess, academic achievement, and the many other areas of student involvement in college life.

Earlier in the year a special Leadership Camp organised by staff and led by Julie Carlton and Carolyn Payne prepared our year 12 Council and House Leaders for a year of intensive involvement. The Student Councils in 1992 worked enthusiastically to develop a sense of ownership in the workings of the school and its surrounds. In particular, I congratulate the Student Representative Council under the leadership of Alison Abdo, Elliot Cross with the assistance of Mrs Julie Carlton, Mrs Sharon Johns and Mr Gregg Moxham.

The House System also extended this year to increase student participation not only in the sporting programme, but also in Public Speaking and Debating, Theatre Arts and Music, and general participation in community life. My thanks to the House Captains and Vice Captains, under the leadership of Mrs Carolyn Payne.

At the close of our 3rd term we once again celebrated together with the S.R.C. Fete, a fundraising event to raise money for others in our world community, and also to benefit our school community. The opportunity was taken to invite the parent community and our local Catholic Pre-Primary to participate in the fun of the fair.

College Assemblies have established a reputation as being 'special' events, and this year's Assemblies were no

exception. Notable experiences this year included the Lenten paraliturgy, the Anzac Day ceremony, the many celebrations of cultural, academic and sporting achievements, the drive for a growing sense of responsibility for our environment, and simply, the sense of prayer led by student groups at each Assembly.

Environmental Youth Alliance - EYA - a comparatively new group, but one making its presence felt through the energy of its student leadership, is a growing, positive movement at Bunbury Catholic College.

'Outreach' was a new programme for this year, initiated by Mrs Denise Roberts and Miss Naomi Hughes and designed to give small groups of students valuable experiences of group interactions. Students and staff combined to commit themselves to the goals of greater mutual understanding and growth.

Other special events involving students this year included the Youth Crime Forum attended by student council members, the Youth Fest at which we were represented by Bridget Ryan who gave the opening Parliamentary Address; the Emergency exercise held at the college for the S.E.S., Police, Fire Brigade, St John Ambulance, and hospitals - I believe our students made admirable patients.

As usual, much talent was explored and revealed during the year, and we rejoice with the talented catering students who supplied us with the enjoyment of our annual catering Dinner, with our Debating Students as they involved themselves in the inaugural Zonta Inter schools' debating competition, with our dancers as they performed with outstanding success at the South West Dance Festivals (Penelope Smith taking off 3rd place), and the Rock'n Roll Eisteddfod, with our drama students as they performed for us, and to Credit levels at the Catholic Performing Arts Festival, with our musicians as they took off many awards and scholarships at the South West Regional Eisteddfod, and with our artists winning exhibition places at the Visions Art Exhibition.

Every school community is a part of the wider community, and the year's activities include a number which merge into the structure and organisation and yet play a vital role. Parent Information Nights give parents the opportunity to see their child within the context of an age, a time of developmental progress with its own needs; parent teacher nights allow parents to consider their child as a unique person with unique needs and individual growth.

In today's world, parents need to deal with problems such as unemployment, depression, drugs; this year the school in conjunction with the Health Department offered a series of evenings for parents to look at the question of 'Drugs In Perspective'.

A new movement designed to give all people the opportunity to involve themselves in working for an

improved life style, a better community, has recently set up in W.A. An off shoot of the Mercy Order in conjunction with Mercy Associates, Mercy Endeavour had its inaugural Mass at the Cathedral in September. With a significant part of our heritage linked to the Mercy tradition, this may become an area of future involvement.

As we go out into community, so too, community comes to us. Educationally each year the Secondary Education Authority examines our curriculum and practices and it is with some satisfaction that we can report exemplary progress in this respect.

Each year, we too, are called on to play our part in preparing new teachers for their future role; in 1992 we were privileged to be involved in the Notre Dame teaching practice which enables students to spend significant blocks of time in their associated school.

Finally in 1992 it was our pleasure to welcome to our community the Marist Brothers as they kindly accepted our school for their review programme. Their report is available on request, and I include their overview here: "Our impression of Catholic College, Bunbury is a very positive one. The School appears to be a pleasant educational environment where the facilities offered are of a high standard, where the students feel valued and encouraged to achieve, and where the staff should feel very satisfied with what they have been able to achieve."

In conclusion, the end of each academic year is the time for reflecting on the work accomplished, the achievements and success of the community.

As I write I am acutely aware of the dedication of our professional staff and of our parents.

To the P & F executive and members, to the Board Members, to the parents who in so many ways make my task a pleasure, my grateful thanks.

To our staff who give so freely of their time, energy and skill, and especially to my deputies Les Fabre and Pat McDonagh, thanks from me, and I feel sure, from parents and students.

Let us not overlook the workers in the office who keep the structure together; thanks to each of you, and in particular to Ana de Gooijer, who works tirelessly and efficiently to ensure that our needs are met.

Sadly, at the end of each year it is also time for farewells; and we farewell a number of staff each of whom has been companion to us on our journey and will be very much missed. We ask God's blessings for Naomi Hughes, Marie Waddingham, Julie Carlton, Mandy Moore and wish each of them and each of us, much happiness in the coming year.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

COME JOURNEY WITH US...

On the eve of my departure from Bunbury Catholic

College, I find myself reflectively glancing back over the past four years. In many ways it seems just like yesterday that I accepted the responsibility for continuing the work of Religious Education that had been the task of many dedicated others before me. Alternatively, the nature of this challenge has been so absorbing, that I sometimes feel that I have never been anywhere else.



An evolutionary change of approach to Religious Education has been gradually occurring. A gentle

distinction between religious Education and Campus Ministry is now evident. The work in classrooms has an educational intent. Campus Ministry alternatively, provides an opportunity for students to experience something of the mystery of God and the Christian Community, in and through prayer, retreats and liturgical celebrations. I am sat-

isfied that the integrity of these offerings to students, come from the very best of human endeavor.

To the teachers of Religious Education, my heartfelt gratitude. As a companion on the journey, I am very well aware of the fortitude and generosity that has been required of you. Three times a cycle, you have stood before or among a class of students and offered them an opportunity to reflect on Christian wisdom as a means for better understanding the mystery of God and life. The task is not without its difficulties. My wish for each of you, as dedicated co-workers- is that you could see the fruits of your labour. We know this will not always be. It takes great courage to continue working without obvious results. I'm convinced that as teacher's, the highest high's and the lowest lows are experienced in Religious Education. Thank you for your endurance and response to the call of the Gospel to "go out and teach the Good News". You have the promise of good reward.

In 1992, we have seen some changes.

Each year group received its own Chaplain. Father Pat, Leon, Evan, David and Tony have provided contact and care to Years 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 respectively. The diversity of approach has undoubtedly brought richness to College life.

The R.E. Resource centre was moved from the Brother's House to a more central location on the Campus. Additionally, the new chapel is currently in the process of being built. It's completion is anticipated by the end of the year. It will be a welcome addition to the College that for most of the year, has been without the blessed Sacrament or a sacred place in which to pray.

Unfortunately, Fast for Faith did not proceed as planned this year. Although there were a substantial number of students who were willing to fast for 24 hours, inadequate adult supervision saw the cancellation of the project. A good number of students fasted at home and raised funds for our twin mission of Catarman in the Phillipines. Such gracious and selfless concern for other's is a significant sign within the school community. Other fundraising for a variety of needs evident in the local community, were initiated by the Year Co-ordinators.

Each year level Retreat has taken on it's own flavour. A variety of experiences, appropriate for the age of the students, appears to have been comfortably established into meaningful programmes. Although the style of retreats offered to students is very different from a contemplative adult model, the benefits of the programmes are captured in the following comments:

"I loved it a million percent better than I thought I would. Thanks for everything. This should be compulsory for both Year 11 & 12. I learnt a lot here that I will never forget. I don't want to go home! I want to stay!" (Year 12 student)

"I would like to thank all the teachers who helped coordinate this retreat. It has helped me to be myself and not just a trendy exterior" (Year 10 student)

"On the retreat I think I was given the opportunity to express how I felt. Whether I did or not was up to me, but I was given the opportunity" (Year 9 student)

As in most human activity, there are moments of joy springing from sustained periods of toil. The 1992 Thanksgiving Mass theme of Journey...and Jesus walked along with them... captures the spirit of the Religious Education endeavour. As a pilgrim people we are always moving. Nothing is ever certain or secure. Our hope rests in the God who calls us to respond.

I farewell the College community knowing that I have served you with energy and love. God is blessing each one of us.

In addition to these, students at the College gained 15 distinctions and 29 credits. Jason Szymkowski gained a high distinction which places him in the top 1%.

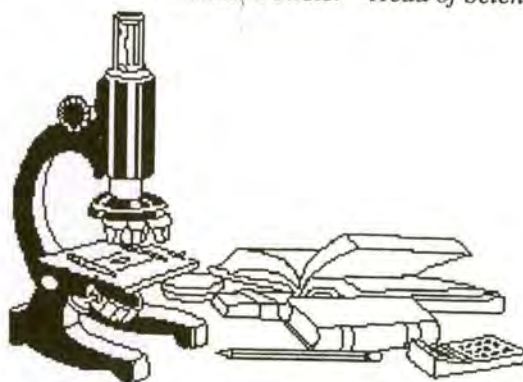
Our new science laboratory was opened up for use in term 3. The laboratory is now fully stocked and is being fully utilised.

MATHS REPORT

1992 sees the culmination of years of change, across the school, in the Mathematics Curriculum. The year Twelve students of 1992 were the first year group to undertake the new Unit Curriculum courses, as Year Eights, in 1988. They were the first to select from the new Upper School Mathematics courses in 1991. This period of change has resulted in a set of courses from Year eight to Year Twelve which is cohesive, sequential and more in tune with student needs in the nineties, whether they are intending to progress to tertiary studies, seek apprenticeships or enter the work force.

Earlier in the year a small group of students, identified from results in the Westpac Maths Competition, participated in a National Mathematics Extension and Challenge programme. Although the student results were not outstanding the participation and problem solving skills acquired was reward enough.

This year 118 students entered the Westpac Maths Competition with excellent results. Vincent Smith from year 8 achieved a prize which places him in the top 0.1% of the state. Other results included 21 students performing at a distinction level and 54 students performing at a credit level.

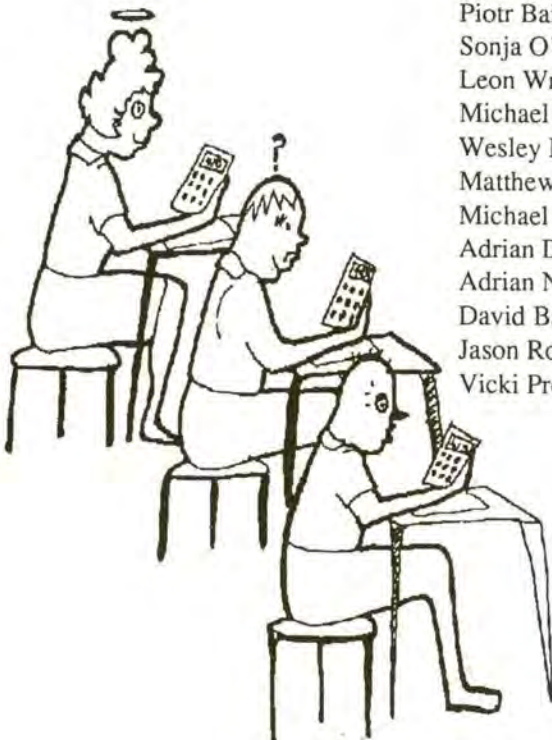

That night, Canal Rocks Caravan Park was a much quieter and more peaceful place than it was the night before, because we were all in bed by nine o'clock.

Sunday morning began with another early surf, but since we had to leave by ten o'clock, we returned to clean the campsite and pack up by nine o'clock. Mr O'Brien arrived at 11.30 to drive us home so we had lunch then prepared to leave. The main food consumed by the boardriders was "Fruit Loops". The Boardriders committee had bought eight packets and they comprised the breakfast, lunch and tea for several surfers. By the end of the weekend everyone was so sick of them, the phrase "Loopey, loopey, loopey!" had taken on a completely new meaning!

We arrived back in Bunbury after an extremely successful camp. The only negative aspects were that one unfortunate surfer lost his board and wetsuit on the way back to Bunbury, and that after living with each other for the past 48hrs there was quite a bit of tension in the boardriders group!

Alas! There is a class in the stressful lives of twenty wonderful young students, where it is enjoyable to do hard **work!**

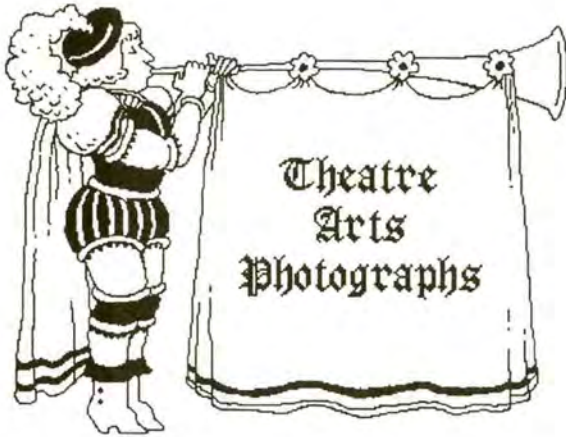

HALL REPORT

The Bunbury Catholic College Hall was built in 1987 and officially opened by Bishop Quinn at a ceremony in February 1988. Since that time the Hall has been the focus of community involvement with the College.

The Hall receives a great deal of use throughout the year. Most hall use is by the students and staff of the College. Some Physical Education, Drama, Music and Religious Education classes are scheduled to use the hall, along with many College functions - Masses, theatrical presentations, parent information nights and the like. The Bunbury Catholic Diocese makes regular use of the hall for many purposes, as do many of the regional Catholic primary schools.

St Joseph's, St Mary's and Leschenault Catholic Primary schools all have their end of year speech nights at the hall.

As one of the main function venues in the region, the hall is also used by a large variety of community groups throughout the year. Groups are charged a hire fee which enables the hall to be self-funding in respect of capital equipment such as heaters and sound equipment. Enough money is also generated to purchase sound and music equipment for other departments in the school.

Me: Look, I really have to get something written for the magazine or else....Uhhh!

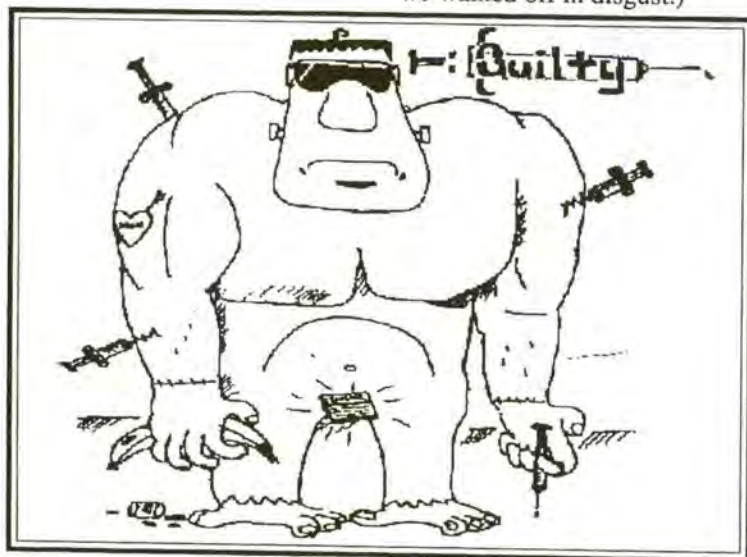
My face and the White line were suddenly locked in a passionate embrace as a basketball from the nearby game slammed into the back of my head.

Meanwhile the remaining 51 delegates assembled at Channel 7 studio's, to film "Face the Press", for SBS. At 2pm, these delegates also arrived at Parliament House.

Over the next 25 minutes, the 3 party spokespeople responded to each of our speeches.

A formal motion was moved by Kirsty Holding and seconded by Samantha Rees. The motion was agreed to unanimously by all present.

The day finished with afternoon tea in the Cabinet Dining Room, the handing out of certificates to all the Summit delegates and a mass group photo's and address exchanges.

EMERGENCY DISASTER AT B.C.C.

One of the volunteer "victims" of the Multi-Service Emergency exercise, Matthew Hall, of Year 9, writes about the event:

On May 17th Bunbury Catholic College along with the Bunbury Fire Brigade, St John of God Hospital, Bunbury Regional Hospital, Police, St John Ambulance and Bunbury State Emergency Service took part in an exercise to demonstrate the skills and organisation of the many rescue services of the South West Region. The exercise involved about 60 students from B.C.C. Those who were selected arrived early on Sunday morning to be instructed by Bunbury Ambulance Station Officer Clive Williams. We were told that a truck holding a large container of poisonous gas had been pierced outside of rooms one and two, and that we must pretend to have been crushed by other students trying to get out, or to have suffocated by the poisonous gas. About six smoke bombs were set off to represent the gas. After about 15 minutes, four officers from the Fire Brigade came along in their chemical and gas-proof training suits and breathing apparatus to start moving the bodies. The students were carried to the main driveway to be labelled as either walking wounded, top priority, or dead. These were separated, and those who were top priority were taken by ambulance to hospital for treatment. They were then brought back to school by bus. The exercise was a big success in sorting out any problems in the way that the services handle emergency situations.

As a member of the Search and Rescue team of the Bunbury S.E.S., I was asked by my Unit Co-ordinator, Ray Hall, to recruit sixty College students to play the role of casualties in a disaster to be enacted somewhere in Bunbury, sometime on the weekend of 16/17th of May. I knew that this wouldn't be too difficult. My stories of train versus bus accidents, petrol tanker rollovers, or planes crashing into the Bunbury Tower enthralled the students to the point where we had over ninety of them wanting to be involved. My job was just to get them to a briefing on the Friday afternoon before the weekend of the exercise - I was not allowed to be present when Ray Hall and Clive Williams briefed the "victims" on where and when they were to gather. Secrecy was important to the exercise - emergency service personnel were to be taken by surprise on the weekend. I certainly was - when I was woken early on Sunday morning and instructed to be at the S.E.S. Centre in uniform within 10 minutes for a briefing on the accident - only to be told that a chlorine gas tanker had leaked outside some classrooms at Bunbury Catholic College.

Thank-you to the students who gave up their time on the Sunday morning to assist in the exercise. Bunbury Catholic College is pleased to be of assistance to the Emergency Services of Bunbury in this way, and also through the provision of fitness training facilities to the S.E.S.

MILBINDI

On Thursday, 15 October 1992, 30 Year Eights, 6 from each class, went to a recording of a special edition of *Milbindi*. This edition of *Milbindi* involved the producers asking different schools in Bunbury if they would like to bring a group of students to the filming and participate in a discussion with different Aboriginal Authorities on Aboriginal issues such as land rights, self-determination, sacred sites and various other topics.

Each school selected two spokespersons. The two students from our group were Naomi McManus and Michael Cooper. The question asked on behalf of our school was "How much of WA is Sacred Sites?", and "How can they tell which places are Sacred Sites?"

After the filming there was a free question time before posters and folders on Aboriginal issues were handed out and the school groups left. Other examples of questions asked are 'Why is the Swan Brewery site sacred to Aboriginals?' and 'If the Aboriginals gained the rights to the Swan Brewery, what did they plan to do with it?' These questions were answered by qualified people who deal with and know what Aboriginals want. At the end of the day I think a lot of people came away knowing more about the Aboriginals' land claims, their Dreamtime, self-determination and Aboriginals in general.

BARNUM BARNUM VISIT

In term three all five Year Eight groups were visited by a travelling Aboriginal actor called Barnum Barnum. He had been in nine movies and in seven of them he had died or been killed. He didn't only talk to us about acting and being in movies, he also talked to us about times when people were racist against him. An example of this was a time he went into a bar with a group of friends. While his friends were drinking their second drinks he still hadn't received his first drink. He went up to the waitress and made an inquiry into why his beverage had not been sent, and she replied that they didn't serve Aboriginals in this bar. He also demonstrated, using children from the audience, the story of how the turtle was created in the dreamtime.

Barnum Barnum has given up movies and now just travels around Australia visiting High schools and telling of the events in his life that are significant to him. He has a long white beard that looked like an unravelling birds nest, and he carried with him a possum fur rug. After his stories he allows the students to examine both his beard and the possum skin rug.

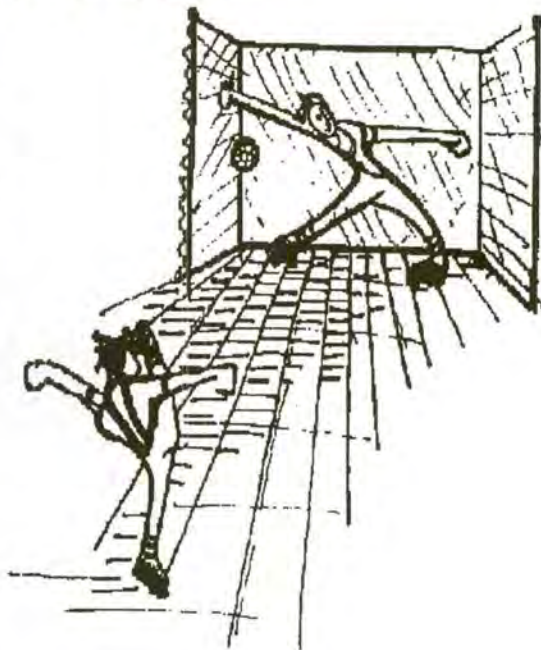

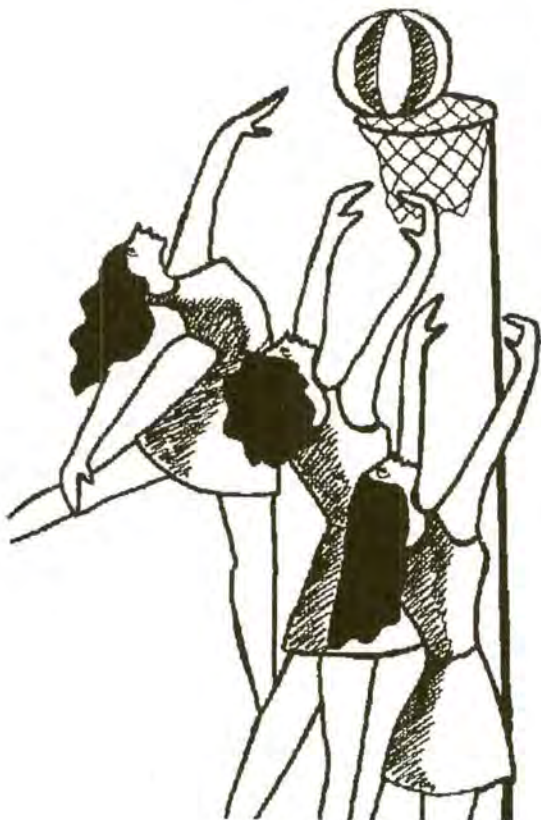
Grading was held during T.A.F.T. in term two 1992. The attendance was outstanding and skills shown were of a very high standard. 104 girls were battling for places in College teams.

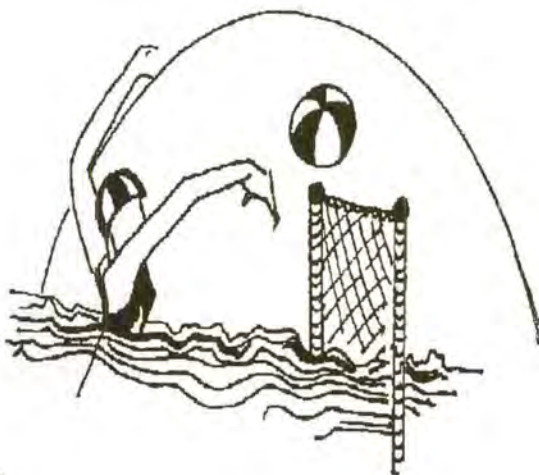
Coca-Cola Netball

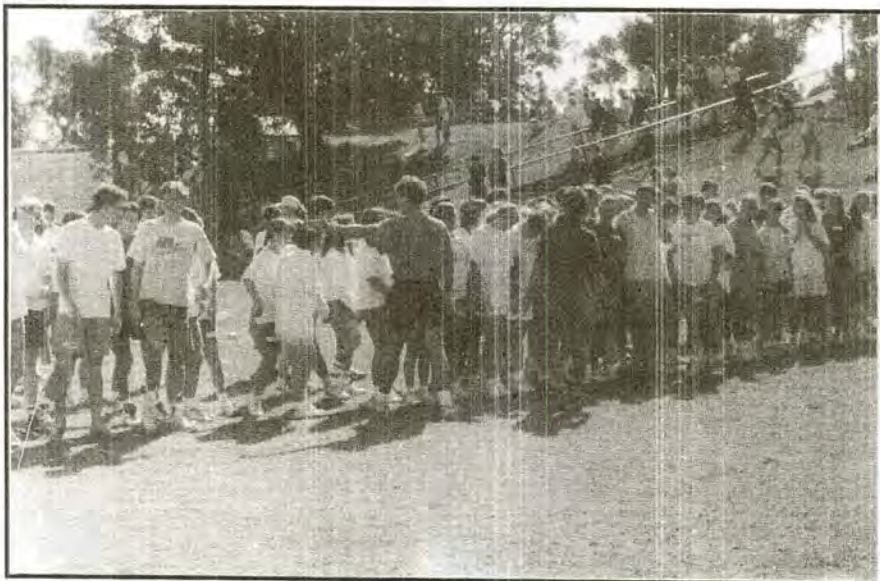
Tuesday, September 2nd, School bus stops, car parks and driveways were packed full of various methods of transport, unloading BCC's budding Olympians.

At 6.30am on Monday, September the 21st, the school's premier bunch of athletes departed for Perth to compete in the annual A.C.C athletics carnival.

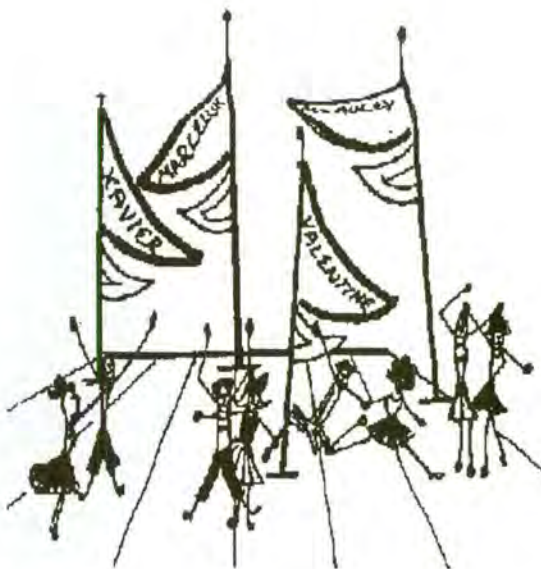
If nothing else, our team spirit, endeavour and good sportsmanship shone through, fields in which we left all other schools for dead.

College A.C.C. Team Vs. B.C.G.S. Swim Meet.

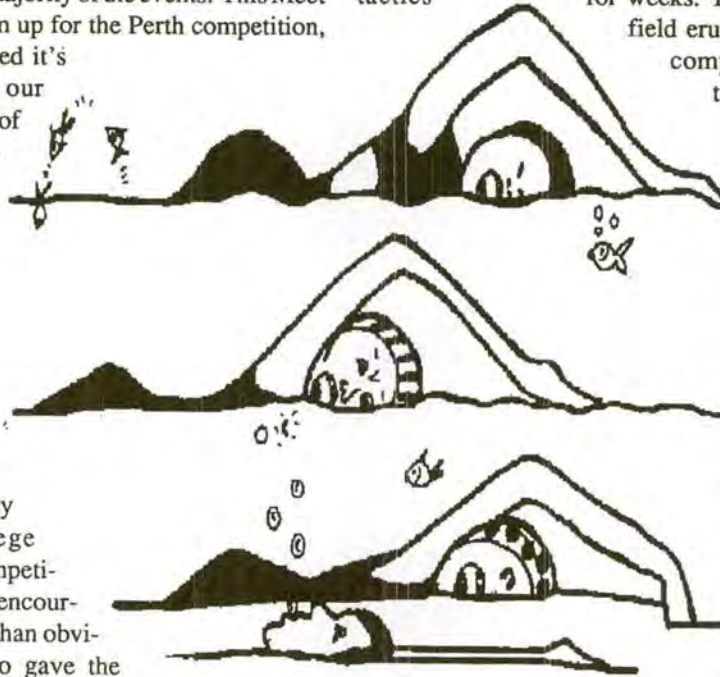

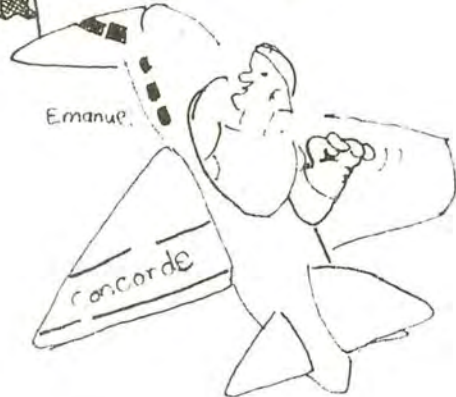
