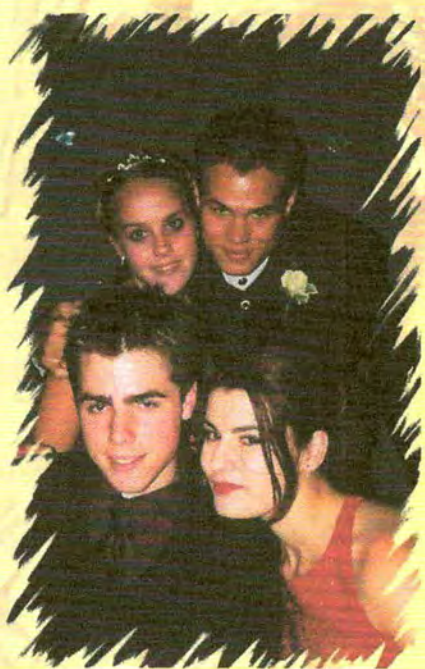

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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



Mr Ivan Banks, Principal

As we approach the end of the second millennium since the birth of Christ, I would like to think that most of us would see the true meaning of this occasion as celebrating 2000 years of Christianity, rather than as having survived a computer bug or some other secular spectacular.

This year the Catholic Church, using the themes of Fallowness, Forgiveness, Freedom, Justice, Journey and Jubilation, has celebrated the Jubilee Year and we as a Catholic school have shared in these celebrations. Our students have used the Jubilee Year to join with other students from West Australian Catholic schools to raise money for a new Catholic School in Ethiopia; they have designed new stained glass windows for our Chapel, and as a community, we have taken several opportunities to review various practices and policies within the

College. In October, the College hosted the mobile "Australians for Reconciliation Van" that is touring Western Australia. Our students were addressed by members of the Noongar Community on topics including: Aboriginal dreamtime, lifestyles, the Stolen Generation and culture. The emphasis was "Working Together" which was very appropriate theme for this the Jubilee Year.

Although this has been another good year for the staff and students of the College, I believe it will be remembered as the year that our parents reconfirmed their commitment to and involvement within our College. Therefore, I would like to begin by thanking those parents who take a leadership role within the College, be that on the school Board, the P&F executive or coaching sporting teams. I would also like to extend this gratitude to those hundreds of parents who have helped out in the canteen or the library, at Busy Bees, helped in the catering or just attended functions like the Cabaret, Art Extraordinaire or the countless parent meetings and information evenings. It may seem unusual to begin my report with thanks to the parents but without parental support the good work that the staff do is not as effective as it

could be. At this time, let me say farewell and a sincere thank you to Mrs Nola Jennings who is stepping down from the role of P&F President after three years in the position. Nola, as you look back on your involvement in the College through the P&F, the technology in the Library and the new Weights Room in the Sports Centre are a testimony to your own hard work and that of your fellow parents. To Mrs Mara Richards and Mr Frank Yates, both retiring from the Board, we thank you for your years of dedicated service.

A Catholic Education

The main reason that the College exists is to provide an authentic Catholic Education to secondary students in the greater Bunbury area and I believe that we achieve this aim. Students are exposed to both a rigorous and intensive Religious Education Course. Lower school students follow a course developed by the Archdiocese of Perth whilst upper school students study, not only the Archdiocesan course, but also the Curriculum Council course "Beliefs and Values". As a school we are blessed with a large number of staff who are prepared to witness their faith publicly and teach many students whose only contact with the Church is through this school.

Religious Education is not confined to the classroom at Bunbury Catholic College, as it permeates every dimension of the life of the College. It is, in fact, the life force of the College. An important part of the Religious Education is our Retreat Program. Except for the Year 12 Retreat, which follows a Marist Retreat format, these programs have been developed by our staff. Our students enjoy the Retreat programs as they allow them to explore a variety of issues in a non-classroom setting.

Community prayer is a vital element of the religious nature of our school.

We gathered together to celebrate our Opening Mass, Ash Wednesday, Easter, the Feast of the Assumption and our Thanksgiving Mass. We also assembled for Anzac Day, our Feast Day, and to bid a fond farewell to our Year 12's. The times that we come together as a full school allow us to gain a deeper insight into the meaning of *Community* and allow our students and staff to pray, reflect and celebrate together.

This opportunity to pray together is made easier because of the support that we receive from the clergy of the Diocese. Our students come from many different parishes and while it is not possible to acknowledge each parish priest personally, I would like at least to mention and thank Bishop Peter Quinn and Fr Evan Penberthy for their support of the College. Our gratitude must also be extended to our College Chaplains, Fr Adrian van Klooster for Semester 1 and Fr Robert Romano for Semester 2.

I have mentioned our students' willingness to contribute to worthy causes. Besides donating nearly \$1000 for a new school in Ethiopia and almost \$3000 to the Catholic Missions, our students have supported such appeals as: Rotary's "Give a Damn, Give a Can" Appeal, Amnesty International, Daffodil Day, Red Nose Day, Remembrance Day and the St Vincent de Paul Christmas Appeal.

Academic Success

Academically it was another strong year for the College. We entered a number of our students into National Competitions. In Social Science, six students gained High Distinctions in the Asia Wise Competition, and a further six students received High Distinctions in the Australian Geography Competition. In the English competition four students were awarded Distinctions. In Mathematics the College received one High Distinction and 12 Distinctions,

whilst in Science two of our Year 12's received Distinctions and seven Year 11's received High Distinctions or Distinctions in the National Chemistry Competition. Out of 2000 applicants, Joanna Lamparski was selected to attend the Rio Tinto National Science Summer school in Canberra. For the first time the College also entered students in the Australian Informatics Competition.

The academic potential of our students was also recognised in State competitions: Nicole Birch won the John Forest Award for Geography while Daniel Franco, Simon Parys and Duane Mach have been selected to attend the WA Science and Engineering Summer School at Murdoch University. James Kelly was awarded the Engineering Institute Award. Not only have individuals excelled, in the Year 12 Murdoch University Economics Competition, the school teams came third and seventh out of a total of 34 teams.

In local competitions, Julian Sunario won the Spaghetti Bridge building Competition conducted by the Bunbury Branch of the Engineers' Association against 75 other teams. One of our Maths teams also finished third in the South West Regional "Have Sum Fun" competition. Both our debating teams achieved considerable success, our senior team missed out in winning their division of the Zonta Debating Competition by one point.

Talented Students

While the core academic subjects make up an important part of the curriculum that our students study, many have excelled in other areas. For the first time in four years the College put on a Drama Production. With packed audiences at every session of *Little Shop of Horrors* our community witnessed a very professional and polished production. With a cast of 30, a musical accompaniment of nine

and a support crew of over 100, it really was a huge community effort. What was especially pleasing about this production was that the four main leads came from each of the year groups from year 9 to year 12. Not only were our musicians involved in this production they also hosted their very own Irish Night and performance evenings were held for the different year groups.

Our talented music students have also been instrumental in providing our music and choral work for our Masses and assemblies. Conducted by Mr Eugene de Lima, their commitment to excellence is outstanding. On an individual level - Julian Sunario, Brigid Mills and Christina Rogerson each achieved success in the Bunbury City Eisteddfod. Ashley Gledhill, Adrienne Miles and Elise Kukulka all toured Japan with a dancing troupe. As part of the Irish Night our Food Production students catered for a sit down meal for more than 300 guests - a wonderful effort and this was just one of many instances where we tasted the rewards of their cooking. This group of students, inspired by Mrs Sandra Goerling, also catered for the Photographic Exhibition, the senior Art Exhibition, the Graduation Mass and sundry smaller occasions - I thank all involved with this aspect of the College.

As a College we also have many talented Art students. Our art students exhibited in both the Iluka Art Exhibition and the Angelico Exhibition; our senior students conducted their own exhibition to give

It is through your hard work and example that the College can provide an education that is spiritual, academic, physical, cultural, technological and promotes the development of leadership opportunities. Our staff gives enormous amounts of their time to the College and its associated activities and this can only happen because of the generosity of their spouses and families.

While acknowledging the hard work and dedication of our staff, I would like to take this opportunity of focussing on the efforts of two extraordinary staff members. The end of this year sees a "changing of the guard" where we will see new faces in the role of Deputy Principals next year.

Farewell's

Dr Les Fabre is leaving the College to take up a position at Aranmore Catholic College. Commencing here in 1978, Les has been a Teacher, Year Co-ordinator, Head of Department, Senior Master and Deputy. In his role of Deputy, which began in 1984, Les has overseen a number of changes to the educational environment - he had the onerous task of implementing Unit Curriculum - a model designed to give students choice in both their subjects and the degree of the subject's difficulty. Les is a very learned man, gaining his Doctorate of Philosophy in 1999, he has clearly demonstrated to the education community the importance of continuing one's own education and learning. Les is a very spiritual man - a spirituality from within and a spirituality that he is always willing to share. Les has given extraordinary service to Bunbury Catholic College and I would like to take this opportunity to thank him.

Miss Pat McDonagh began at the College two years before Dr Fabre in 1976. In 1977 she introduced Integrated Studies into the College curriculum, a model that continues to this day. This model has been copied by many other schools proving that 'imitation is indeed the highest form of flattery'. In 1979 she was appointed Deputy Principal, although I believe in those days the title used was Principal Mistress and I understand that she negotiated to have this title changed to what exists today. Over the years, her main responsibility was that of Pastoral Care and Pat has the ability to talk to students regarding issues and incidents with a sincerity and a sense of justice that has been really appreciated by them. The number of past students who visit the school with stories of Pat are a testament to the impact that she has had on the lives of so many people. Four years ago, she applied for one year's leave for 2001 under the Deferred Salary program. I am sure

The millennium year has been another busy year for the College community. It is with pride that the Board thanks our students, teaching staff, administration staff, ground staff, the P&F and parent volunteers for their support and help throughout the year. With a budget in excess of \$4,500,000 I am pleased to report with thanks to the Bursar, Brent Steere and the finance committee, that the budget was achieved. Major development expenses this year include:

Science Block Upgrade	\$ 66,000
Staff Room Rebuild	\$ 48,000
The Body Shop	\$ 11,500

The Capital Development committee has had an enormous year. Plans for next year include a major alteration and addition to the

Library/Technology Centre, with another Science Lab upgrade. With the new Sports Centre completed, it has facilitated moves in other areas with work programmed in the Arts, Music and Drama rooms.

The new Sports Centre opened for use in November 2000 to be officially opened in early 2001. This magnificent building gives the College an all weather sports floor with many other uses and rounds off the overall site facilities.

Our special thanks to Max Hannell - Architect, Ernie Turpin - Best Constructions, Gavin Bell - Site Supervisor. To Tom Hall, your voluntary effort on this project is unequalled - the College really does love you!

After three years as P&F President, I will not be seeking re-election next year. I am grateful for the assistance and support given to me during my term and thank everyone concerned.

A TWOFOLD TRIBUTE

2001 will see a 'changing of the guards' at Bunbury Catholic College as Miss Pat Mc Donagh and Dr Les Fabre take their leave as Deputy Principals. The enormity of their combined contribution to the education, development and pastoral care of hundreds of BCC students, spanning 48 years between them, is difficult to confine to a few paragraphs. However, staff members Gobi May, Ed Taylor and Peter Hogan were given the task of doing just that.

Reflections of a Scholar / Gentleman / Educator / Family Man

The culture and ethos of a School is not contained in the bricks and mortar of the buildings, nor are they contained in the printed records and archives, but rather in the strong personalities that stamp a presence on the lives of those that have been educated and influenced within its walls. With the departure of Dr Les Fabre from Bunbury Catholic College, at the end of this year, an era will come to an end.

Dr Fabre, then Mr Les Fabre, arrived at BCC in 1978 in his trusty white Holden Belmont. In those early days Les was primarily involved with teaching Integrated Studies and Physical Education. He also led the upper school as the Year 11 Coordinator and then Year 12 Coordinator.

Physical education was a passion for Les. He lived and breathed the art of human endurance and bestowed many aspects of a thorough physical education programme into his students, both boys and girls. His ability to compromise effectively and to utilise what limited resources our Catholic College possessed was remarkable. The original obstacle course was in what is now the car park

for the new sports centre. Mr Fabre constructed this testing course from gym mats, bamboo poles, tyres and whatever else came to hand. Each student was timed and then encouraged, with enthusiasm and loud voice, to improve on their own best efforts. The kids loved the challenge.

The cross-country course was 'ACROSS COUNTRY', unfortunately the Ring Road and large trucks now have priority. The course took in the by-pass road near the Preston River, the flood plains and a huge sand hill. Students AND staff were loudly exhorted to put in their best efforts. One, then, young staff member recalls with great embarrassment that his best efforts meant he lost his breakfast.

The Outward Bound programme was begun "Fabre-style" with students being dropped-off in various locations in the Wellington Dam region and then making their way to Honeymoon Pool, tramping, falling, getting cold, being wet, miserable and gaining a sense of achievement as they went. The Year 11 Orientation experience also enjoyed this environment, as a means of starting the new year.

Sports training on the front oval would have 60-70 students running and jumping from 7.30am. There was no need for inducements or pressure. The students loved the involvement and commitment. Physical education was a

place and a time where the students were challenged. They were out there come rain or shine; fair weather or foul and they were there for Les Fabre as much as themselves.

And who can ever forget the famous "gum-boot" dance - with the accompanying "RA TA TA...". Perhaps an insight into the life that Les left behind him in South Africa.

Under the guidance of Val Murphy, Les accepted the challenging role in administration as Deputy Principal in 1984, a position that he was somewhat reluctant to take on because he thoroughly enjoyed the many and varied experiences of working directly with students. However, in the true spirit of Catholic education Les accepted the role with renewed energy. In the mid 1980's, responsibility for the planning, implementation and creative energy that went into Unit Curriculum at BCC fell to Les. He developed a system that was peculiar to our school and was clearly student-centred. A student now had choice in subjects to be studied and levels of achievement as their goal.

Les is a true exemplar of a Catholic educator living our Catholic values. Throughout his years at this College, he has maintained a position of one who is willing to listen to others, learn from them and to respond to their needs in a non-conflicting manner. Les has always paid attention to the human element rather than succumbing to the demands of materialistic concerns.

Thank you, Dr. Fabre, for many years of friendship, guidance, laughter, companionship and support as a colleague. Bricks and mortar are short lived, but true friendship is timeless.

As you and your family move to Perth for a new start, goodbye, God Bless and travel well with our prayers and thoughts in tow.

Shalom, Pat

My first thought on writing this is that Pat McDonagh will find it terribly embarrassing. But some things need to be said as Pat's departure on leave affords us the opportunity to comment on her valuable contribution to BCC since she came here as a young woman in 1976 from Liverpool, UK.

Pat initiated Integrated Studies in 1977 and was appointed Deputy Principal in 1979. Since that time she has worked with all five Bunbury Catholic College Principal's, Brother Vincent Ryan, Brother Gerard Toohey, Mr Val Murphy, Mrs Britt McGowan and Mr Ivan Banks. When her contract ended this year, she chose not to reapply for the position of Deputy, opting to take a years leave for travel and study instead.

As a teacher of English, Pat is inspirational. She has taught every English course at every level during her time at BCC. Her gift as a teacher stems from a profound insight into texts and communication and from an ability to motivate and engage students so that they learn in a very natural and dynamic way. Her deeply held beliefs in the dignity of the human person mean that all students are accorded her undivided attention so that their personal weaknesses are addressed while their strengths are reinforced. Pat never makes the mistake of thinking that her ambitions should also be the ambitions of her students. What matters most to her is witnessing students achieve their own

She has an awe inspiring ability to create, with a few carefully chosen words or questions, the environment and atmosphere that enables students to express their concerns and to make healthy choices. I have witnessed her compassionate approach to students and learned much about the value of being short on advice and criticism and long on listening.

Pat McDonagh's approach to education is very professional (though I believe that she becomes prone to heavy duty house work at the sight of a pile of marking!). That professionalism, her integrity and her deep commitment to Christian values make her the epitome of the Catholic teacher. Her sense of humour keeps her young at heart and undefeated by the mundane in our profession. Her compassion for everyone is an example to all of us. I will miss her wisdom next year and look forward very much to teaching with her again when she returns from leave. Shalom, Pat.

The Catholic Education Commission approved the Capital Development Plan devised by the Bunbury Catholic College Board that paved the way for the construction of our new Sports Centre this year.

Following extensive consultation with staff, students and parents, plans were developed for a multi-use building to be constructed between the old change rooms and the hockey oval located on the Rodsted side of the College.

The total floor area of 1890sqm includes court area for basketball, netball, volleyball, badminton and indoor soccer. There are two classrooms, a kitchen and large store. New change rooms include one designed for the disabled with the old change rooms also incorporated into the design.

The upper level houses a separate weights room and Physical Education staff offices, with a viewing window to below. A bridge and covered walkway link current school buildings to the Sports Centre and the new car park services both the Sports Centre and the College Hall.

This development heralds an exciting time for Physical Education and Sport at the College.

Year 9 Government and Law students developed their own political parties and held a mock election, while **Economic** students in year 9 developed their own products which they had to market with suitable packaging and advertising.

During the course of 2000 a number of students were actively involved in Mathematics Competitions and extension activities. BCC hosted the "Have Sum Fun" competition for both Primary and Junior Secondary.

The team consisting of Duane Mach, Paul Woodroof, Sherry Wong, Jade McKay, David Raper and Tessa Costello were placed third out of 14 teams.

Eighty nine of our years 8, 9 and 10 students entered the Challenge Bank Mathematics Competition held in August. Their achievements did themselves and BCC proud. 1 High Distinction, 12 Distinctions and 50 Credits were gained, with 71% of our students receiving an award. Jake Cornwall achieved the highest overall score placing him in the top 2% of the state.

The Australian Mathematics Trust conducted two competitions this year. Our year nine students participated in the Australian Mathematics Enrichment program. Three year ten students, James Taylor, Duane Mach and Simon Parys also competed in the Informatics Competition, which focussed on computer programming and problem solving.

There are many opportunities for students to participate in extension activities in Mathematics and we will be looking to increase the participation in 2001.

VOCATIONAL INTEREST PROGRAM

The 2000 Vocational Interest Program has been a challenging and rewarding entry for many of our year 11 and 12 students who have found for themselves new career directions, additional qualifications and employment whilst completing their upper school studies. This year has seen a focus on providing our VIP students with work place opportunities and training directly linked to their career interests and employability in these fields.

Bunbury Catholic College is part of a cluster of five independent schools in the South West region called SWIS-link. Other participating schools are Bunbury Cathedral Grammar, Collie Catholic College, MacKillop College and Kearnan Catholic College. By pooling resources and students a diverse and interesting variety of training opportunities are possible that complement the Structured Workplace Learning. All training courses are industry based and recognised Australia wide. Students participated in the following training units according to their particular vocational interest:

Building and Construction: Small plant and concrete formwork, metal gouging, thermal welding, gas metal arc and oxy acetylene welding.

Business Studies: Electronic communications, record security, occupational health and safety, data management, telephone technique and communications.

Information Technology: web page design, database and computer operations.

Hospitality & Tourism: Workplace hygiene, customer service and relations.

Retail Studies: Sales and customer service, workplace safety.

Community & Human Services: Scalp massage, long hair braiding, creative play and care and accident prevention for young children.

These SWIS-link courses are delivered at a variety of training facilities: The Apprenticeship and Traineeship Company, Jobs South West, The Training and Skills Company, South West Regional College and Busselton TAFE.

In addition to the above selected students have participated in the Jobs Pathways Program, Saint John Ambulance First Aid Course and Structured Workplace Learning, a program that requires 120 hours of on-the-job workplace training under supervision.

The many students who have accessed employment and identified their career direction for the future best measure the success of this year's program. This has required hard work and commitment to the program whilst completing a full year 11 course.
