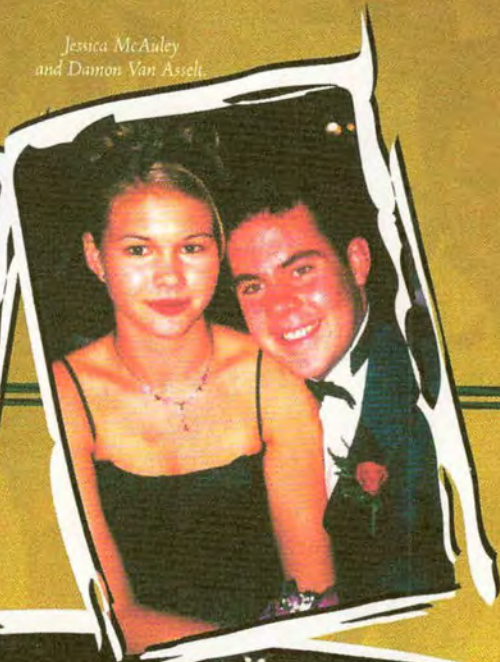

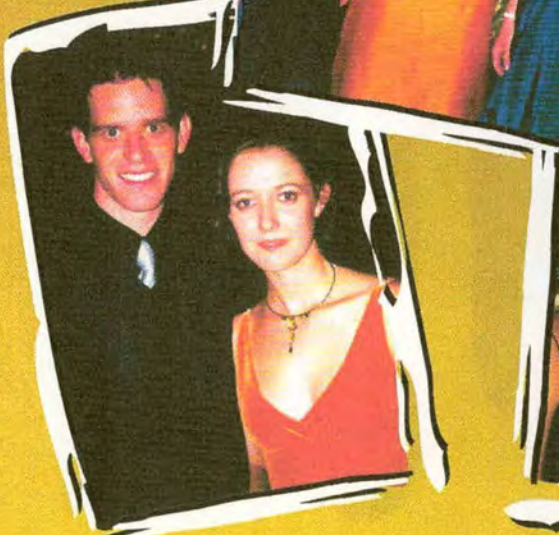

A new team

The year began with a significantly different Senior Management Team. This year joining Carmel Forest (REC) and myself were Mrs Leonie Ridgway (Deputy Principal), Mr Declan Tanham (Deputy Principal) and Mr Brent Steere (Bursar). As the Senior Management we are responsible for the day-to-day operation of the College including - Religious Ethos, Staffing, Student Welfare, Curriculum, Timetable, Budgeting and Resources as well as working with the Board to ensure that the financial and physical plant are well planned and maintained.

As we look back over this year I believe that we can be well pleased with our achievements.

As the only Catholic high school in the region we have a huge responsibility to ensure that the Catholic ethos of the school is maintained and enhanced. Our students study the Religious Education units developed by the Catholic Education Commission of Western Australia. In upper school we overlay these units with the Curriculum Council subject, "Beliefs and Values", allowing our students to achieve another subject towards Secondary Graduation. Part of our Catholicity is giving our students the opportunity to come

together for important church feasts. This year on Ash Wednesday, Holy Thursday and the Feast of the Assumption we celebrated as a community. Our students, through year groups and homerooms shared retreats and liturgies. Some of our students represented us at a number of diocesan events including those celebrations that were conducted for the Bishop. This year we said a very fond farewell to Bishop Peter Quinn. Bishop Quinn has been Bishop of the Bunbury Diocese for over 18 years and in that time was always very supportive of the College and our activities. A Mass held at the College, on the 14th March gave all schools in the diocese a chance to say farewell to Bishop Quinn. Later in the year, the College was approached to host the Episcopal Ordination of Bishop Gerard Holohan, to be followed the next day by a welcome from all schools to the new Bishop. Over 1000 people attended each of these events to witness these milestones.

The fact that we have the facilities to host such occasions affirms the planning, design and building attributes of the College Board. We began the school year with a mass and masses were held to offer prayers for those in our community who were unwell or who had passed on and we, like so many others, gathered on the 12th September to remember

those who had their lives dramatically altered by the events in New York and Washington. Our College community used the Eucharist and paraliturgies to give us strength and comfort in times of need.

Late this year we began two new exciting programs that will be a big part of our College in 2002. Recently we have trained both leaders and participants for the REMAR movement. This is an international Marist youth movement that aims to develop individual students' leadership skills, service outreach and spirituality. In December we began a process of identifying and training six of our senior students to be Special Ministers of the Eucharist - this public



manifestation of their faith will serve as a wonderful example for the rest of the student body.

Whilst being an authentic Catholic School is the reason for our existence, we offer an excellent secular education delivered within a Catholic perspective.

Our secular education covers the traditional areas of academic, cultural and sporting arenas and also provides a myriad of other opportunities. I am pleased to report that our students have excelled in many different areas.

Academic success

As mentioned earlier, our students study the Curriculum Council's Subject Beliefs and Values. This year three students: Nicole Birch, Angelo Zampogna and Stephen Gordard were all nominated for Certificates of Distinction in this subject. We continue to put our students forward for State and National competitions. In the national Mathematics competition we received seven distinctions and one high distinction (awarded to Bradley de San Miguel). In the National English Competition 11 students received Distinctions with Holly Meegan, Jade McKay and Sarah Oldfield-House being awarded with High Distinctions. The overall results of our students in this Competition reflected results that were above State average. In the State Math-O-Quest competition Julian Sunario's project on the

Great Pyramid was judged best Country Project and was runner-up in the State Division. Our lower school Maths Team won the South West "Have Sum Fun" competition. In the Science area a number of students were successful in obtaining places in summer Science programs; Glenn Bidwell into UWA Engineering Camp, Alex Nietrzeba into the Murdoch Summer School, Peter Banks, Erika de Lima and Julian Sunario into the Siemens Science Summer school. Our school and our students studying Society and Environment were especially successful. The school was judged to be the top school in the State in the Australian National Geography Competition. In the Asia Wise competition 13 students received a High Distinction and 23 received Distinctions. Emily Rowe came 1st and James Taylor 2nd in the John Forrest Geography (State) competition; the Economics team came 4th out of 96 teams in the Murdoch University Share Market forecasting competition. And in the National History Challenge, one student, Julian Sunario was the winner of the Australian Heritage Section. Julian was flown to Canberra to receive his award from the Prime Minister, Mr John Howard, and Senator Margaret Reid, President of the Upper House.

Cultural success

Building on their success of last year's *Little Shop of Horrors*, our drama department presented *Annie*. Performing five shows to full houses demonstrated what a talented group of students we have. Their talent was recognised by the Catholic Performing Arts Festival who awarded them the Dominican Sisters Perpetual Trophy for the Best Musical of the Festival. Our involvement in the Festival was such that we were also awarded the Perpetual Trophy for the Best Country School involved in the Festival. Our senior drama students performed *Cosi* and in

November our Year 9 class performed a night of one-act plays.

Our music students began the year with a camp where students from year 8-12 had an opportunity to practice and perform together. Many of our music students continued to perform for others with a large number being recognised for their efforts in the Catholic Performing Arts Festival. Our wind ensemble performed at both the farewell for Bishop Quinn and the welcome for Bishop Holohan as well as the opening ceremony of the Australian Netball Carnival. In the school performance of *Annie* our music students were an integral part of the orchestra. Fifty of our students were a part of the Bunbury Eisteddfod with outstanding results from Julian Sunario (Classical Piano), Konrad Paszkudzki (Jazz Piano), Amie Thompson (Vocals). Some of our music students also provided music for Art Extraordinaire and for the Leschenault Catholic Primary School Fete. Holly Meegan has been selected for the Gohdwana Voices, a National Choir, which will tour America in October 2002.

For the first time we offered Dance as a curriculum and co-curricula subject. We entered students into the ACHPER Dance Festival and the Catholic Performing Arts Festival. Outside of school, Frances Panetta was part of the Bunbury Eisteddfod, and Adrienne Miles and Ashley Gledhill danced at the Leschenault Catholic Primary School Fete; Adrienne also danced as part of the Telethon program.

Our Art students began the year with an Art camp, and followed this up with a number of excursions to the Bunbury and Perth Art Galleries, including an opportunity to see the Monet and Rodin exhibitions. Nine students had work chosen for the Iluka Visions Student Art Exhibition. Renovations in the Art Room and Clay room, as well as a new Kiln area, have greatly improved our art facilities and even greater things are expected next year. Our students scooped the pool,

finishing first, second and third in the Coastcare Logo competition with their design destined for publicity purposes.

Our students continue to shine in the Design and Technology area. Each year group has the opportunity to design and create projects in increasing complexity. A number of students have built on the knowledge gained at school to enter both apprenticeships and TAFE courses.

Sporting success

The new Sports Centre added an extra dimension to our sporting program. All classes benefited from these facilities and enjoyed participating in different sports not previously offered. The College First Eleven had their most successful Marist Cricket carnival for a number of years when they toured to Adelaide. This year the College hosted the Marist Netball Carnival - 13 interstate teams journeyed to Bunbury to participate in this carnival with the College winning the Challenge Division. We continue our involvement with the SWISSA

competition; in each of the inter-school Swimming, Cross-Country and Athletics carnivals we finished third. Emma Bluett was the U15 Girls Champion (Swimming), Johnny Valastro U14 Boys Champion (Cross-country) and Ashlea Trezise U15 Girls Champion (Cross-country)

Individually our students continued to shine. Ashley Trezise (Athletics), Marnee Watson and Megan Upton (Basketball), Stuart Ryan and Reece O'Connell (Cricket), Joe Dimasi (Football), Joanne Kilfoil (Golf), Matt Anderson and Sarah Gibson (Hockey), Candice and Heidi Gelmi and Brianna Sharp (Horse Riding), Dominic Allen (Soccer), Emma Bluett and Damian Heath (Swimming), Carmelina Martella (Tae Kwon Do) all participated in State Championships with many achieving State selection. Championship status was conferred on Marcus Williams (Rifle Shooting - WA) Paul Nottle (In-line skating - National). Others to be acclaimed on a local level include Piera Usher (Captain of the Bunbury Swimming Club), Travis Maguire (South West Football), Jarrod Myers (Motor-cross), Dean Kalache (BMX).

Camps/Excursions and Outings

We have maintained our practice of having camps at Years 8, 11 and 12. For the first time our Year 8 camp was conducted based on students' houses (factions). This was a very successful way of running these camps and will be repeated next year. Once again our Year 11's went away on Outward Bound; whilst always a challenging experience, all students enjoyed this opportunity. This year for the Year 12 retreat we were fortunate to welcome two Marist Brothers as facilitators. Br Harry Prout and Br Mark Needhan were a welcome addition to the program as it is important for us to maintain connections with our founding orders.

Seventy-two of our year 11 students had the opportunity to participate in the Youth Driver Development Program to develop suitable driving habits before qualifying for a licence - with the current fatality rate in the 17 to 25 year age group, anything we can do to develop these skills is worthwhile. One of our year 12 students, Carly Davis, who graduated from this program last year was invited to speak at the State Conference on Road Safety.

Year 11 History students visited the Holocaust Institute in Perth. The Year 9 History students participated in a Mock United Nations General Assembly and also travelled to Fremantle. Our senior Geography students participated in a variety of excursions looking at land uses and land formation. Our year 8 students, under the guidance of Mrs Trish Candeias worked tirelessly to recycle the paper and cardboard that the College uses.

Catering

Throughout the year our students have polished their culinary skills, culminating in the successful catering of several school functions. Our Year 11 & 12 Food Production classes successfully catered for the Australian Netball Carnival Officials Dinner, the Catholic Secondary Principals' Association Dinner and the Year 12 Graduation Supper. All events were professionally prepared and served. The Year 10 food students invited parents to a scrumptious afternoon tea where the students displayed their skills of food preparation, service and entertaining.

Public Speaking and Debating

Our school fielded 32 speakers in seven Debating Teams for the ZONTA Inter-School Debating Competition, and performed excellently at all levels. Our Year 10 students were also involved in the Year 10 Rotary Four Way Public Speaking Contest. Our students were a great credit to themselves and to the College and demonstrated great talent and aptitude for speaking in front of a large audience. In late November Courtney Trantham was declared the Regional winner and progressed to the State final.

Leadership

As a school we try to give students an opportunity for leadership. Through the hard work of Mrs Sharon Millington and Mr Bernard Depiazzi students are encouraged to take initiative in different areas. The SRC organised four functions - two free dress days and two socials. All of these events were well supported by the wider student body. The House Captains and Vice Captains play a pivotal role in engendering house participation and morale; their leadership was especially visible at the inter-house Swimming, Cross-county and Athletics Carnivals, House activities and our Feast Day. For the first time we invited the House Vice Captains to assist with the Year 8 camps; this gave these students an opportunity to demonstrate their leadership skills with the younger students. Our student leadership team was also actively involved in *Annie*, the Marist Netball Carnival, the year 7's Orientation Day, the farewell Mass for Bishop Quinn and the Mass to welcome Bishop Holohan. Representatives also travelled to Perth to be part of Young Leaders Day where they heard from Hon Geoff Gallop and others on leadership skills and achieving their potential.



Exchange Students

Exchange students give our community a window into the wider world. This year three exchange students were welcomed to the College. Sunniva Stenmark from Moss in Norway joined Year 11 for Semester One. In Term 3, Veronica Ligabue from Reggio, Italy spent 6 weeks in 10M and in August Miriam Teuscher from Bad Sobernheim, Germany, joined 11T. Miriam will stay with us until July 2002.

School to Work Program

The South West Independent Schools link program (SWIS-link), under which our Vocational Interest Program operates, received National recognition for flexible and quality delivery. Our program enabled many students to enhance their future career and employment prospects by gaining recognised on-the-job and off-the-job training. The off-the-job component involved the opportunity for training in the choice of automotive, business and information technology, childcare, mining and engineering, hairdressing, hospitality and tourism, sport and recreation. Two students, Vaughn Higgins and Jake O'Mara were selected to be part of the South West Industry Family of Trades (SWIFT), which is a program in the Building and Construction industry. Two students, Jade O'Brien and Kate Bidwell, received Alcoa Future Women of Industry scholarships.

Building

The improvement to our physical buildings has progressed rapidly. The Sports Centre was officially blessed by Bishop Quinn and opened by Mrs Therese Temby (Director of Catholic Education) on the 24th February.

During the year two classrooms were converted into Science Labs, extensions were completed to the Library and the Art Room. Early in Term 4 work began on extending the Year 9 toilets and the building of three more classrooms. Our plans to convert the "old" Year 8 Block into a Technology Centre is well on track and should be completed by the New Year. Plans are now being developed to improve the current administration area.

Fundraising

Once again our community has been very generous raising significant sums of money for the Catholic Missions, Rotary's "Give a Damn, Give a Can" Appeal, the Leukemia Association, the Cancer Foundation through Daffodil day, Sudden Infant Death Syndrome through their Red Nose Day, Princess Margaret Hospital, Amnesty International, Remembrance Day and more recently the St Vincent de Paul Christmas Appeal. Many of our students had the opportunity to listen to Anne Bell, a lay missionary of East Timor - the information she was able to provide gave our students a

example of the standard of facilities that we provide. Working alongside the Board is our P&F Association. Led admirably by Mrs Bernadette Maguire, this group of parents, through enterprises like the canteen and Art Extraordinaire raise funds for our students. The P&F provided the weights room for the Sports Centre and have just agreed to upgrade the technology available for students in the library.

And finally the staff. Here at Bunbury Catholic College we have a wonderful staff. Both teaching and non-teaching staff consistently demonstrate their care, concern and professionalism for your children. Each year we need to say farewell to a number of staff - this year the list is quite small. To Marc de Lima, Brian Rust, Trish Candeias and Shaun Cantwell we wish you well for whatever the future holds. I thank the Senior Management Team, the Heads of Department and the Year Co-ordinators, individuals who have a strong belief that leadership is about service and doing rather than fame and glory.



BOARD REPORT

Another College year has drawn to a close with our first year as a six-stream school in Year 8, and surprisingly also in Year 10.

Under the Catholic Education Office guidelines our growth has meant increased staff, facilities, supplies and buildings. A decade of previous Board members have stood us in good stead financially for these peak times of growth. We have been able to supply adequate needs to keep us at an above average level without big increases in fees.

It is imperative that our students have the Information Technology facilities required to keep up with the world's technological growth. We are committed to a policy of supplying, upgrading and replacing I.T. equipment to achieve this.

This years building requirements have seen the upgrading of two classrooms to science laboratories, the Art centre upgrade, a 50% increase in the size of our Library and associated I.T. terminals. Currently under construction and due for completion for the new school year are two new permanent classrooms, one demountable classroom and an extension of the Year 9 toilet block.

New challenges for 2002 will be the addition of Year 9's into six-stream, with total student numbers exceeding 800. The Administration building will be extended to include a new reception area, meeting room, uniform shop, medical facilities, Principal's and secretary offices. A large portion of the College buildings will also be connected to mains sewer.

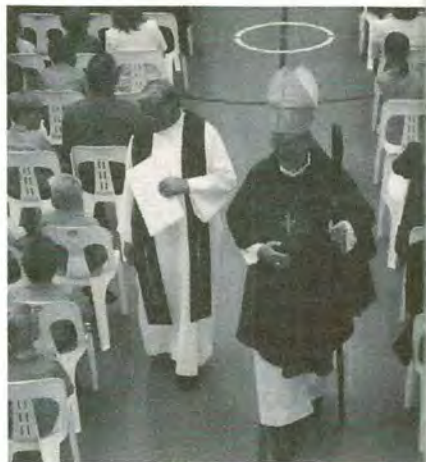

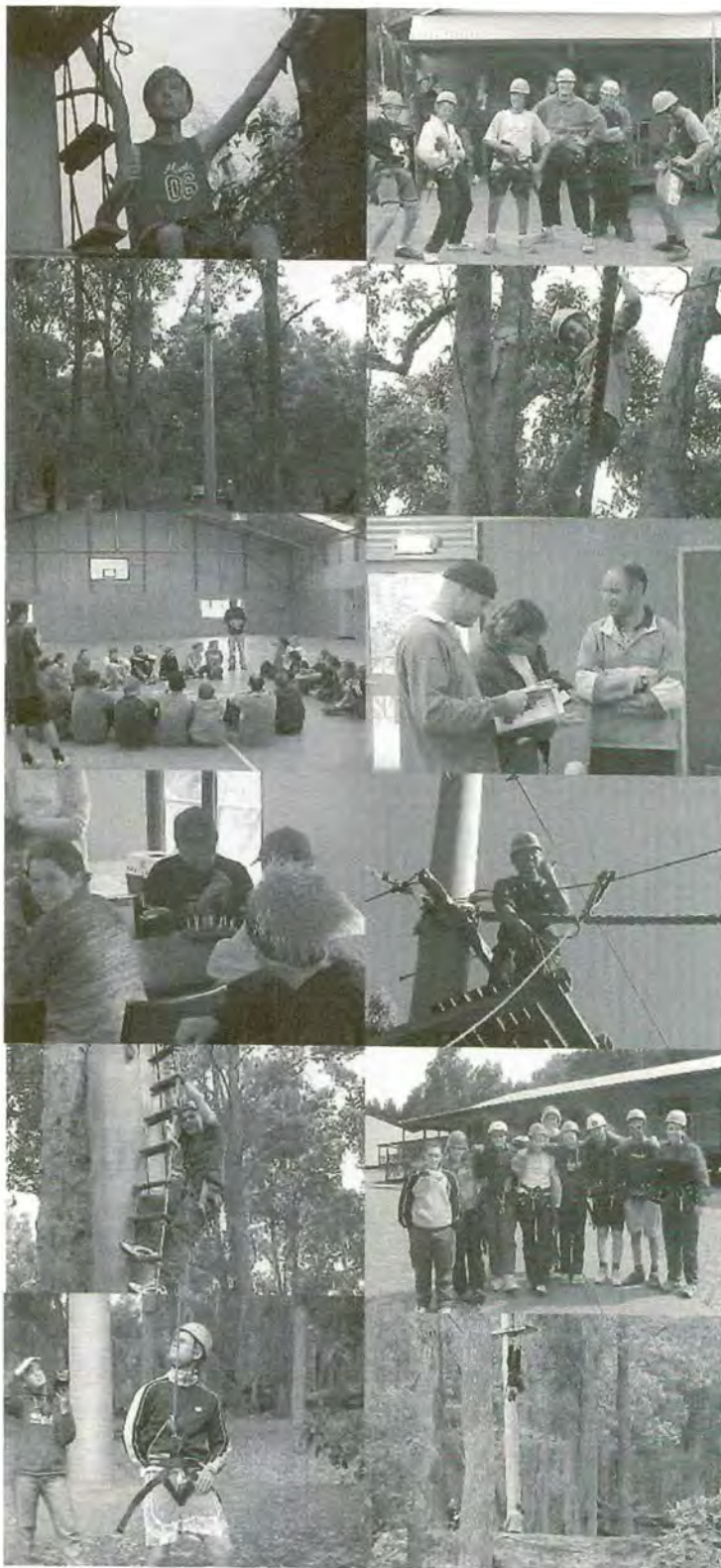

In 1975 the Bunbury Catholic College Library was purpose built to cater for 360 students.

Today with 750 students using its facilities, it has become all too apparent that the original building was not adequate to meet the demands of a changing curriculum and increased student enrolment.

At the beginning of term 3 building and renovation began in earnest, replacing the courtyard space near the canteen with a second library class/fiction area. The 'walkway' between the old Year 8 block and library was enclosed creating space for a formal entry/display area, reception desk, media room and additional offices, with direct access to four computer labs.

Interior renovations have sought to retain some of the features of the original buildings appearance, whilst a 'fresh look' has been achieved with new furniture, carpet and the replacement and painting of those very 70's orange shelves!

The disruption and noise of the past two terms are now a vague memory. In 2002 the new school year will herald a fully functioning library and technology centre for the educational benefit of students and staff in the years to come.

SOCIETY & ENVIRONMENT.

Students and staff have worked extremely hard to make the study of Society and Environment come alive at Bunbury Catholic College. As a department we have made every effort to broaden the minds and experiences of our students. Entering competitions is one way to do this. 2001 saw great achievements both at a state and national level. Geography students were involved in the Asia Wise competition, John Forrest Award and the Australian Geography competition. History students had the opportunity to participate in the National History Challenge and economics students took part in the Murdoch University school of Economics Competition.

Geography

The *Asia Wise Competition* is a research-based competition held across Australia and New Zealand. BCC students received an average mark of 75% in comparison with the competition average of 60%. The following students received high distinctions: Erika deLima, Claire Plint, & Lauren Clarke (97%), Alister Brawls, Rebekah Cahill, Sam Carton, Mitchell Hill, Kristen Nietrzeba, Janice Nietrzeba, Christian Pitcher, Jessica Smith and Julian Sunario (94%), Gemma Holst (91%). There were also 23 distinctions and 7 credits achieved.

The *Australian Geography Competition* is a multiple-choice test held nationwide with questions being based on geographical knowledge, analysis and interpretation. Students from Bunbury Catholic College were awarded the highest school result in WA. The schools top 10 students scored an average of 80%, way above the national average of 47.5%. More than 60,000 students from 719 schools across Australia took part in the competition that is organised by The Royal Geography Society of Queensland, the Australian Geography Teacher Association and the National Geography Channel.

The *John Forrest Award* is an annual Geography competition. The students are to annotate a cross-section, using the 2002 TEE topographic map of Deloraine. From the cross-section, students are to describe the changes in topography, landforms, drainage and natural vegetation. The Year 11 Geography class competed in this competition with much success. *Laura Rowe* won the competition and *James Taylor* was placed second for the Year 11 category.

Economics

The *Murdoch University School Of Economics Competition* is a challenge to forecast indicators such as inflation, unemployment, interest rates and the value of the Australian dollar for a six month period. The Year 12 team of Robert Epiro, Andrew Power, Bryon Hutton and Carley Woods were placed fourth in the state out of 96 teams. Their team won \$750, half of which was presented to the school, with the remaining half being divided between the four competitors.

History

The National History Competition challenges students to research diverse topics within a chosen theme. The theme for 2001 was 'Making Our Nations'. Year 9 student, Julian Sunario won the category for "Australian Heritage" and was chosen to represent WA in Canberra in December.

The theme for 2002 is "Explorers". Next year interested students can exhibit their work in four different formats: an individual research paper, a three-dimensional museum display, a multimedia presentation or a performance.

Excursions and extension activities are another method teachers have employed within the department to allow for Society and Environment to come alive. Mrs May and the Year 11 History students visited the Holocaust Institute in Perth where they listened to a survivor's account of event's during WWII. Year 9 History students participated in a Mock United Nations General Assembly where they debated global issues such as economic assistance to Afghanistan, the plight of the Middle Eastern Refugees, how to promote peace in Israel and changing the structure of UNO. The meeting allowed students to actively learn how a UN General Assembly is run, to understand how and why countries vote a certain way and to practice debating and public speaking skills. Year 9 History students went on a day trip to Fremantle. While in Fremantle students discovered, through primary source material, how life was for the early settlers of WA. Students visited the maritime Museum, Fremantle Gaol and lunched at Cicerellos.

Year 12 Geography students visited Harris' farm as part of their study on agriculture in the South West. Year 11 Geography students studied the erosion problem at Bunbury's Back Beach plus geomorphic processes at Bunkers Bay, Yallingup and Canal Rocks. The Year 12 Practical Geography class examined local area leisure locations with particular emphasis being placed on the resort development at the Jetty Baths,

Dolphin Discovery Centre and Sykes Foreshore. Students were to design creative ideas to upgrade or renovate existing leisure areas in environmentally friendly ways.

Mrs Candeias has worked tirelessly to make Bunbury Catholic College more environmentally aware. She has developed a recycling programme at the College with the help of her Year 8 class. The Year 8's flatten the huge quantity of cardboard that passes through the College each day. It is hoped the school will gain funding in 2002 for the transportation of cardboard to the Halifax recycling depot and that the Year 8's will take on this project as a whole year group. We thank Mrs Candeias for her professionalism and commitment to a subject area in which she loves and wish her every success in Perth.

The 2001 Vocational Interest Program has again enabled many students to enhance their future career and employment prospects by gaining nationally recognised off-the-job and on-the-job training whilst completing their upper school courses.

Registered training providers such as the West Australian Institute of Management, Jobs South West, South West Regional College of TAFE, and The Traineeship Company have all participated in delivering units of competency to VIP students. Students had the opportunity to pursue their particular vocational interests by completing training in Hospitality and Tourism, Sport and Recreation, Information Technology, Engineering and Mining, Hairdressing, Childcare, Building and Construction and Automotive Servicing.

Highlights of this year's program were:

- The national recognition given to the South West Independent Schools link program (SWIS-link) for flexible and quality delivery of training to participating students. Jocelyn Hope who coordinates this has an outstanding ability to manage the needs and training delivery requirements of participating schools; Bunbury Catholic College, Bunbury Cathedral Grammar, Kearnan Catholic College Manjimup and

- The commencement of the South West Industry Family of Trades program which provided two of our students the opportunity to complete training in the areas of concreting, tiling, painting and carpentry. The Building and Construction Industry Training Fund sponsors the SWIFT program.
- The Alcoa Future Women of Industry (FWOI) scholarship generously provided two students the opportunity to explore and participate in a program designed to encourage women into the mining industry in technical and professional levels.
- The number of employment, traineeship and apprenticeship opportunities generated by students actively promoting their employability whilst participating in Structured Workplace Learning.
- Automotive Training Australia's initiatives to encourage suitably skilled apprentices into Trades.

In conclusion our VIP student's enthusiasm and willingness to accept and overcome personal challenges has been the key ingredient to the success of VIP 2001.

MATHEMATICS

THERE WERE A NUMBER OF SIGNIFICANT ACHIEVEMENTS IN MATHEMATICS BY STUDENTS DURING THE YEAR

There were a number of significant achievements in mathematics by students during the year.

During first term, two teams contested the Have Sum Fun competition - a problem solving competition with an entertaining quiz night format. Competing against teams from other high schools in the South West region, the Bunbury Catholic College team comprising Bradley De San Miguel, Gemma Holst, Julian Sunario, Ellin Hogan and Ashley Davis placed first. The team of Sherry Wong, Tahni Froudust, Alistair Brawls, Travis Ward, Jessica Rowson and Anna Taylor were only moved out of third place on a tie-break. An excellent result from all concerned!

In second term, students sat for the Australian Mathematics Competition and even though the results took a long time to arrive, they were worth waiting for. Bradley de San Miguel placed in the top 1% of students in the state and was awarded a High Distinction. Distinctions went to Mark Plint, Nicole Birch, Simon Parys, Paul Woodroof, Sherry Wong, Julian Sunario and Jake Cornwall. Credit certificates were awarded to a further 26 students.

Congratulations to all who participated.

In third term Julian Sunario achieved excellent results in the Math-O-Quest, a talent quest that required students to work on a project with the topic set by the Mathematics Association of WA. Julian's work on the Great Pyramids of Egypt and construction of a scale model was placed second in the state, first in the individual Year 9 category and best country entry in Western Australia. As the best individual project in Year 9, Julian's entry also represented WA at the National competition in fourth term. Well done, Julian.

In fourth term we also look forward to successful results in the TEE from our Year 12 students and wish them well in the future. May some of them become teachers of mathematics and see the classroom from the other side!

Thanks also to the great work done throughout the year by the staff of the mathematics department. My first year here has been a learning experience and your support and efforts have been appreciated.

SCIENCE

Year 8 - Growing Tomatoes

Topic: Life Processes

In this particular topic we talked about that really embarrassing subject, reproduction. 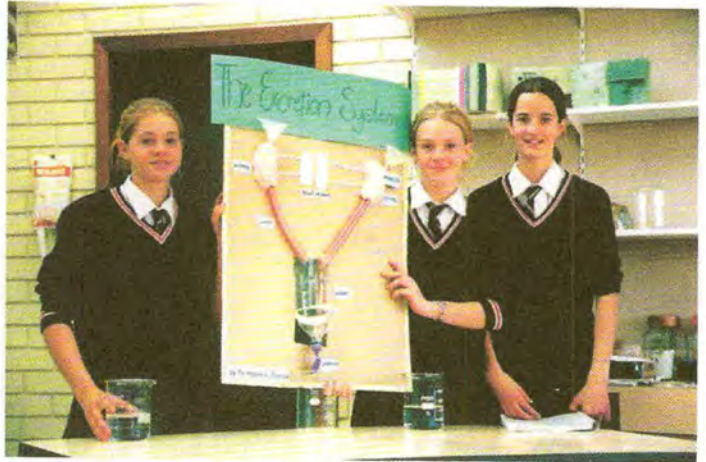

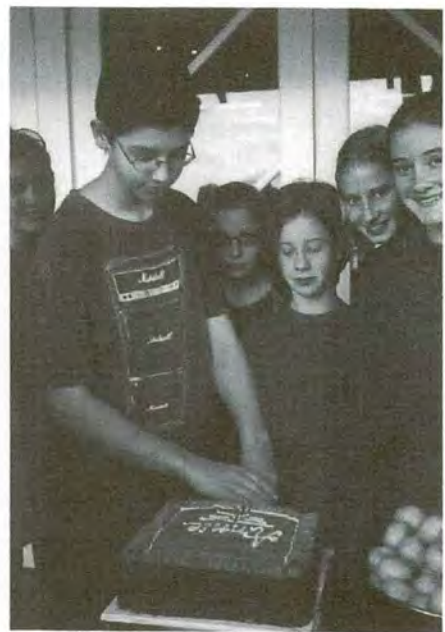

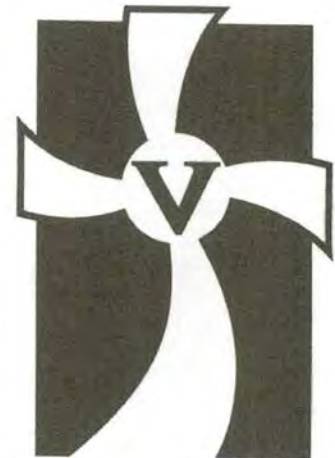

Students are encouraged to use the facilities in the new weights room before, during and after school, allowing them to work at their own level.

Physical Education at the College is 'outcome' based where students continually monitor and record their own progress and suggest ways in which they can improve their performance levels. The BCC Institute of Sport has been set up to encourage further commitment from those students who are looking for that extra 1% to give them the edge in their chosen sport.

"Students are asked to make decisions and set aims for what they wish to achieve in Physical Education classes. This is done in the hope that our students are better prepared to live a healthy lifestyle once they leave school. This includes physical activities, healthy eating habits and positive recreational choices. Students are presented with a range of information to equip them to make informed decisions", said Head of Physical Education Mr Joe Sciorilli.

"Physical Education for upper school allows freedom and flexibility where we can do what we feel comfortable with. The new Sports Centre has excellent facilities that allow us more options to choose from, such as sports including basketball, volleyball, badminton and indoor soccer. We also have a fully equipped weights room that we are able to use, with during and after school programs on offer." *Lauren McDonnell*

"The Physical Education department at BCC is introducing new opportunities for students following the opening of the new College Sports Centre earlier this year. The weights room is in continuous use with teachers instructing students on the proper use of equipment according to their own personal fitness program." *Leah Kay*

"During Physical Education we have been doing some really fun things including a series of fitness tests. We are all aiming to improve them by working towards our personal best. We are learning a lot about swimming and survival in the water, including canoeing, which is fun while at the same time being educational. I think PE at BCC is great!" *Steven*

"During first term Physical Education classes, we have learnt survival skills for swimming. Each lesson we have caught the bus to Koombana Bay where we usually do a run-swim-run activity. We have also learnt a lot about different rescue techniques and first aid equipment."
