

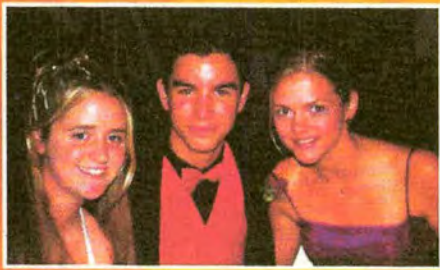

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



While we are a school located in the Bunbury region, it could be argued that our core business is education, however, we have a responsibility that goes beyond just providing a sound secular education. As the only Catholic Secondary School in this region it is imperative that we provide a sound and meaningful Catholic Education for those students enrolled in our school.

It is becoming more apparent that, for a large number of young people, the Catholic school is the only contact they have with the formal Church. With this in mind we must strive to offer students a



Catholic Education that explains and develops each student's personal faith and spirituality.

As a school we must give thanks for the team of teachers who are prepared to put themselves forward and teach Religious Education. To publicly share one's own faith and spirituality is often very difficult and as a school we are blessed with a group of staff that takes this responsibility seriously. We try to nurture the faith of our students through the celebration of class and school

Masses and liturgies. This year we welcomed to the school a new College chaplain, Fr Suranga - and although he was a newly ordained priest, he approached his role with an enthusiasm and wisdom that belied his years. Fr Suranga has been proactive in his desire to be



involved in the religious side of the school. He took the unprecedented action of inviting all Religious Education teachers to the Parish House to explore strategies on how to make the Eucharist more meaningful for our students.



Following this meeting the College instituted weekly class Masses where the students accepted the responsibility to prepare and lead the Eucharist.

We began our school year with an Opening School Mass, and additional Masses were held throughout the year to offer prayers for those in our community who were unwell or who had passed away. Also like so many others, we gathered as a community to remember those who had their lives dramatically altered by the events in Bali. Our College Community celebrates the Eucharist and paraliturgies to give us strength and comfort in times of need. We concluded the year with a very full Cathedral as we celebrated our Thanksgiving and Graduation Mass. With our increasing numbers this may be the last year that we can hold this Mass at St Patrick's Cathedral. Our

choir and musicians, under the direction of Mr. Eugene de Lima, continue to add a wonderful dimension to our worship.

This year saw the establishment of the College Remar Group that challenged participants to 'sail away from mediocrity'. These students were involved in a 'Senior Surfer' program where retired seniors were invited to step onto the technological superhighway. As part of their ministry, members of Remar also visited Ocean Star residents, a local nursing home, each Saturday morning. Playing bingo, writing letters and assisting with meals were all part of their voluntary contribution to this outreach program. Recently, Remar members led a Taize Prayer Service at Christ the Living Vine Parish in Leschenault which invited

participants to pray through song and quiet reflection. The Year 10 Red Caravel students, together with a number of the Year 12's, ran an Embarkation Camp for Year 9's interested in joining this inspiring and challenging movement. Thanks must be extended to Ms Josephine Hutcheson, Mr Paul Morris and Mr Declan Tanham who gave enormous amounts of time to ensure the success of this fledgling movement in our school.

The arrival and installation of our stained glass windows - designed by students in the Jubilee Year - has given our chapel a new look. The chapel is used often for class and staff liturgies and communion services. Students and parents are encouraged to use our school chapel for quiet prayers and reflection.

Retreat Program

We continually review our Retreat Program to ensure that we are offering a worthwhile experience to our students. The Year 12 Retreat is the only residential experience with the students being located on two sites. The Retreats are facilitated by two Marist Brothers and once again we were privileged to welcome Br Harry Prout and Br Mark Needham back to the College. Retreats at the other year levels are designed to achieve things that may not be able to be achieved in the regular classroom environment. The Year 8 Retreat, involved a community service program - a program that we hope to extend in future years. The Year 9 Retreat encouraged students to look at community needs and respond appropriately.

Academic Success

Our community was exceptionally proud when we were informed that the College Dux for 2001 was awarded a General Exhibition. Nicole Birch, a student from 1997 to 2001, finished 30th in the state, and in 2001 was the only country student to receive such an award. Our teaching staff have continued to build on our reputation of offering a first class education. Our students have excelled in local, state and national competitions. For the first time we were invited into the statewide "It's Academic". Our team of Alister Brawls, Julian Sunario, Ella Merewether and Mitchell Hill (reserve) finished a creditable second, missing out by only one question in their heat.

Our Studies of Society and Environment Department has been very active entering students in competitions. Six students

received High Distinctions in the AsiaWise competition with Alister Brawls being awarded a Gold Certificate with a result in the top 1% of Australia; 14 students received High Distinctions in the Australian Geography Competition. In the John Forrest Geography Competitions Lindsay Young finished second in the Year 8 Category whilst Phillipa Buller finished first in the Year 10 category. This year, six of our Year 10 students participated in the Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA) held at Warnbro Community High School and at the



Harvey High School. Another seven students were involved in the Tournament of Minds. In the National History Challenge Danielle Sunario won the Year 7/8 category and Julian Sunario won the Year 9/10 category. Julian was also given the additional award of Young Historian of the Year.

High Distinctions were awarded to four students while 13 others received Distinctions in the Australian Mathematics Competition. The two teams that the College entered in the Mathematics Association 'Have

Sum Fun' competitions both performed very creditably. The Maths Department continues to develop a number of projects that encourage students to 'think outside the square' and to look for solutions to real-life projects.

In the Australian Schools English Competitions our Year 10 students were 10% above State Average with five Distinctions being received and our Year 8 students being 12 % above State Average. Jeremy Wells attained a High Distinction to add to the 10 Distinctions received by other students. The College participated in the Harvey Norman National Spelling Competition. Cindy Shraga was declared the Regional Champion after a 'Spell Off' against other students from schools in the South West. She flew to Sydney to compete in the National Final.

Our Science department continues to nominate students for experience offered by other education institutions and in January 2003 Julian Sunario has been offered a place at the UWA Science and Engineering Summer School. Science excursions have included the Dolphin Discovery Centre, the Perth Zoo, and trying to get chickens to hatch in an incubator.

Arts

This year's production of 'Bugsy Malone' played to five packed audiences, an awesome undertaking with more than 80 students on stage. If we include those involved in costumes, set construction and other areas, over 150 people were involved in this production. Our senior drama

students staged two performances of Shakespeare's 'A Midsummers Night's Dream'

as well as writing, directing and producing a 20 minute play as part of the Youth on Health Drama Festival. This festival attracted 72 entries from around the State and the adjudicators awarded the

students, Caitlyn Selkirk (photography) and Siobhan Hinton (Drawing) received awards at the Iluka Visions Exhibition. The Year 12 Art students combined with Grammar at the beginning of the year to partake in a successful Art Camp. Each year the College Birthday card is designed by a student. Congratulations to



College entry overall 1st place as well as the Alcoa Award for Best Dissemination of Health Facts. The lower school drama students staged an evening of One Act plays for parents in second semester.

Our dance students performed creditably in the ACPHER Dance Festival and Catholic Performing Arts Festival. Lower school students involved in Dance hosted two separate evenings of dance to entertain parents.

Our Art students continue to amaze us with their talent. For the first time, Andrew Frazer, a Year 12 student, entered works into Art Extraordinaire. Two other

Megan Lefroy who designed the 2002 birthday card and to Sarah Arnold whose design has been selected for next year.

Our Music program, under the guidance of Mrs Penelope Northcott, has offered TEE music for the first time. The Music in Society students gathered together an enormous array of talent for a Cabaret evening that was well supported by our parents. These students were also proactive in arranging lunchtime concerts for our students to see some of the talent that exists in the school. As part of the Kiss my Wami Festival we welcomed the Perth Band 'Gyroscope' for a lunchtime performance.

Technology

This year Mr Kieran Noonan was appointed as head of a newly created Department in the College known as the Technology and Enterprise Department. With this new direction and leadership the College has taken huge steps forward in the technology area. All students in Years 8, 9 and 10 completed two periods per cycle in the computer labs, in a program designed to enhance their technological literacy. The course sought to create a flexible, collaborative learning environment that provides the opportunity for all students to become competent,

confident and independent users of information and communications technology. Students continue to learn about technology and how to use a wide range of computer-based applications and equipment in appropriate situations. Another development is the connection to the Catholic Education Communication Network (Cathednet) that connects all Catholic Schools in Western Australia together, allowing staff and students to communicate with one another and to share resources. We were the first schools to join this network and our staff and students are beginning to see the benefits of this facility.



Design & Technology

The College is mindful of how important it is to develop this area to enable students to use machinery and tools safely. To this end, a 'state of the art' Ducted Dust Extraction unit was installed in the Woodwork Complex. In 2003 fume extraction units will be installed in the MetalWork centre. Staff are continually trying to adapt courses to meet the needs of our students. Next year the College will offer a Building and Construction Course which will develop skills suitable for this industry. Students are constantly being challenged in the area of materials technology with opportunities to design and make their own projects.

Home Economics

All students in Year 8 are introduced to the areas of Food and Textiles. In subsequent years students can opt to study these topics more fully. This year the



Year 10 students hosted two international luncheons as well as creating gift hampers and exquisite Mothers' Day gifts. Our senior students are enrolled in the Curriculum Council course: Food Production. Part of this course requires these students to experience the 'joys' of catering. The staff certainly experienced their creative talents with a fully catered luncheon on a Professional Development day and breakfast on our Feast Day. These students also catered for the Music in Society's Cabaret Evening, the Year 12 Graduation Supper and the October meeting of the Catholic Secondary Schools Deputy Principals' Association.

Students in the Years 10 - 12 courses have enjoyed looking after Jaxon, our virtual baby, so much so that we hope that he will have a 'virtual' little brother or sister next year.

Students in Focus evening

As part of the Art & Design course the students held an exhibition of works. However, rather than just limiting this to their own work, the exhibition included woodwork, fabrics, technology, photography and music. This event gave our students an opportunity to display their creative efforts. Judging from the positive comments received from the parents who viewed this exhibition the evening was an outstanding success. Our Library also used this opportunity for a display and donation of books.

Physical Education

The development of an appropriate attitude and value towards physical activities continues to be a priority of the Physical Education department. Students across all year levels have Physical Education as a compulsory subject. Students with a special interest in this subject can enrol in elective units (Lower School) or Physical Education Studies (Upper School). This year we added, for the first time, specialist Netball and specialist Cricket to our Elective offerings. Our Lower school students also had the opportunity to participate in Outdoor Education, with our Year 10 students attending two camps throughout the year. Our Year 11 Physical Education Studies students achieved their Bronze medallion, whilst the Year 12 Physical Education Studies students participated in the 'Sportsfun Program' through which they coached the Year 5 students at St Joseph's Catholic Primary School, Bunbury.



Sport

For the first time the College appointed a staff member in the role of Sports Co-ordinator. Jason Reid, who was appointed to this position, has met its challenges with vigour and organized all the interschool sports in the College. This year our students have participated in Athletics, Badminton, Basketball, Cricket, Cross-country, Football, Golf, Netball, Rowing, Soccer, Swimming, Tennis and Volleyball.

School carnivals continue to be an important opportunity for students to demonstrate their sporting

talent. For the first time we held our Swimming Carnival after hours which enabled a large number of parents to support this event.

After years of trying, our Athletics team won the South West Independent Schools Sports Association athletics carnival. The school was also awarded the Overall SWISSA Trophy as a culmination of all SWISSA sport played this year.

Individually, students have excelled in a number of pursuits. Ben Loverock (State Surf Lifesaving), James Monks (U/15 State Soccer Team), Reece O'Connell (U/19 State Cricket Squad), Andrew Reale (U/14 State Soccer Team), Matthew Riley (U/14 Country Soccer Team), Stuart Ryan (U/17 State Cricket Squad) and Matthew Waycott (U/16 Country Soccer Team).

In the Marist Carnivals, the cricketers had their best results for a number of years in the January carnival held in Melbourne. Along with three wins, Reece O'Connell was chosen as Captain of the All Australian Marist Team. This team is now headed to Auckland for the next carnival. In July the netballers journeyed to Lismore, NSW, and made the championship division for the first time finishing 8th overall.

Debating and Public Speaking

This year we entered five teams in the *Zonta Debating Competition*. From the College teams involved, Rikki Pearce (Year 11/12 category) and Justin Logue (Year 8/10 category) were acknowledged as most consistent debaters. Rikki Pearce and Courtney Trantham both competed in the *Plain English Speaking Award*, with Rikki

narrowly missing out on a position in the State Final. In the *Rotary 4 Way Test Public Speaking Competition* five students represented the College. Peter Banks won the Bunbury Competition and will now compete in the regional final early next year.

Vocational Education.

Our school is part of the SWIS-link cluster providing both on-the-job and off-the-job training; this program has at its heart the individual career interests of the students and a flexible training delivery style. Students have an opportunity to explore the areas of Automotive, Building and Construction, Hospitality, Tourism and Travel, Beauty Retail, Community Services and Health and Information Technology. These courses have been very successful in providing students with information and apprenticeships in a number of these areas.

Leadership

As a school we try to give students a number of opportunities to display their leadership abilities. This leadership can be demonstrated in a variety of ways - our Eucharistic Ministers, Remar Leaders, Student Representative Council, House Captains and Vice Captains. Through the hard work of Mrs Sharon Millington students are encouraged to demonstrate initiative in different areas. The SRC organised four functions during the year: two free dress days and two socials. All of these events were well supported by the wider student body. Our student leadership team was also actively involved in *'Bugsy Malone'*, the Marist Netball Carnival, and the



Year 7's Orientation Day. This year the SRC invited Mr John Coutis to speak to the student body. John is a motivational speaker who has had both legs amputated. His message, style and perception of our students, was well received by all. Their fundraising this year has been put to use providing a shaded area outside S5 & S6. This SRC also initiated an upper school social with Bunbury Cathedral Grammar - a very successful event.

The House Captains and Vice Captains, under the guidance of Mr Bernard Depiazzi, play a pivotal role in engendering house participation and support. Their leadership was especially visible at the inter-house Swimming, Cross-country and Athletics Carnivals and for other House activities. This year we invited the House Vice Captains to assist with the Year 8 camps. This gave these students an opportunity to demonstrate their leadership skills with the younger students.

Exchange Students

The welcoming of exchange students into our community gives our students a glimpse of the wider world. This year three exchange students have been at the College: Miriam Teuscher from Germany, Mercedes Moreno from Argentina and Sari Ahman from Finland. Our community has been enriched by their presence and willingness to share in College life.

Fundraising

Once again our community has been very generous raising significant sums of money for the Catholic Missions, Rotary's 'Give a Damn, Give a Can' Appeal, the Leukemia Association, the Cancer Foundation through Daffodil Day, Sudden Infant Death Syndrome through their Red Nose Day, Princess Margaret Hospital, Amnesty International, Remembrance Day and more

recently the St Vincent de Paul Christmas Appeal. These fundraising events, besides raising money, raise the consciousness of students about their responsibility to assist those less privileged than themselves.

Building

This year saw the first of our Architecturally Designed Pre-builts arrive - essentially to cater for the temporary sixth stream. It was the first full year for our community to enjoy the facilities of our extended library and in September we moved into the new Administration Extensions. The installation of the next two Architecturally Designed Pre-builts has started, hopefully ready for February 2003. Future plans prioritised by the Board are the design and building of an Education Support Unit to be ready for February 2004. This Unit will be the first such unit in a Catholic school outside the metropolitan area.

Thanks

As a school we continue to go from strength to strength. Students and parents appreciate our broad academic programs and varied co-curricular offerings. However it is not possible to be the school we are, without involvement from the wider community. I would like to acknowledge formally a number of individuals and groups.

Firstly our thanks must be extended to Bishop Gerard Holohan and the clergy of the diocese. As I have mentioned previously, the College was assigned a new chaplain this year. Fr Suranga has been a blessing to the College being young, energetic and proactive, his smiling face is often seen around our school. He has a tremendous commitment and passion for Catholic education and we were pleased to have him as Chaplain this year. I thank the Bishop, Fr Suranga and all the clergy for their support of the College and all of our activities.

Parent Involvement

Here at the College we are blessed with parents who share the belief that their involvement makes the education of their child more successful. This year we have had over 160 parents serve on the

canteen, 100 involved with the School Production and countless others involved in sport and other co-curricular events. The P&F oversee the operation of the school canteen, Art Extraordinaire and the sale of second-hand books - three very successful ventures. This year sees the retirement of Mrs Bernadette Maguire and we especially thank her for her leadership.

The College Board is another area in which the College seeks parental involvement, and I want to say a very sincere thank you to everyone involved with the Board or the sub-committees. The constant building and improvements that have happened give some indication of their vision and management. After five years on the Board, the last four as Board Chairman, Mr Kerry Thomas has provided a strong model of leadership based on service. He would often put in countless hours to make sure that the next building project was being planned, designed and built well. Kerry retires from the Board at the end of this year and I know that Kerry's presence on our Board will be sadly missed.

Thank you to our staff

Bunbury Catholic College is blessed with a wonderful staff. Both teaching and non-teaching staff consistently demonstrate their care, concern and professionalism for your children. Each year we need to say farewell to a number of staff and this year, due to different circumstances, we need to farewell the following permanent staff Melissa Farrell, Pam Harris, Sharon Millington,

Rachel Moore, Paul Morris, and Nigel Stewart. Three staff that have been on contract positions are concluding their contracts at the end of the year and we say goodbye and thank you to Susan Grist, Peter Kenny and Erik Pretorius. We thank all the staff that have touched the lives of our community and wish you well for whatever the future holds. I thank the Senior Management Team, the Heads of Department, the Year Co-ordinators and all the staff; all have often gone the extra mile for the students at the College

I firmly believe that the College is in a strong position as we head into 2003. I believe that as long as we continue to work together as parents, clergy, students and staff, your children will receive not only a first class academic education but one that will challenge and nurture them in their journey of faith. BOARD REPORT



2002 has been a year of great expansion; 200 plus Year 8 students requiring 7 streams. The consolidation of 6 streams in Year 9 and a pleasing retention rate in Years 11 and 12. Forward building planning has seen the College cope with these numbers and although numbers will increase as these streams move through the College (250 students in 2003) a period of consolidation over the next few years is predicted.

The Board's involvement in day to day running is minimal, but special mention must be made of the Management Team, Administration Staff and Teaching Staff (many of whom are new to the College) whose huge effort has seen the smooth implementation of growth policies in the last three years. Well done!

We have a wonderful College that we should all be proud of and to enhance our daily involvement the Board has this year formed a Property Development Committee to plan the general flow, aesthetics and property areas. Some Garden Development has already taken place and landscape planning is in progress.

Capital works have again taken place with the completion of the Library, 3 classrooms, Year 9 toilets for 2002 use and the recently opened Administration Building with added Uniform Shop and Medical Rooms. On the drawing board for 2003 construction is a special education unit.

In the past six years Information Technology requirements have increased ten fold and in 2003 a budget approximately the equivalent of one third of parents school fees will be expended in this area, a huge undertaking that will bring us to the required level of one terminal for every five students. Future annual replacement will be based on three year cycles.

All of the above, of course, is focused on providing our students with a learning environment that brings out the best in them and some enjoyment and satisfaction in their time at Bunbury Catholic College.

To those students leaving this year, we wish you every success and may your graduation assist you in your future.

Special thanks to our Staff for those 'extra' things you do, our Parents and Friends for their tireless contribution and to my fellow Board Members for their involvement and friendship.

After six years I must acknowledge the super efforts made by some special friends: Tom Hall (volunteer), Brent Steere (Bursar) and Ivan Banks (Principal). Your advice, assistance, mateship and good humour is wonderful. May all students, staff and parents have a successful 2003.

In April the long-awaited Jubilee 2000 stained glass windows were installed in our Chapel. Deborah Francis, a local artist, had worked with us over a 12 month period until we had developed a design suitable for our College. Students did the fundraising and suggested features to appear in the windows: water and sea life, a dove, rainbow, grapes and wheat. Staff added the School crest and a Marist motto "we are strong in faith".

Our stained glass windows in the chapel tell the story of why we are people of faith. We have God's promises supporting us:

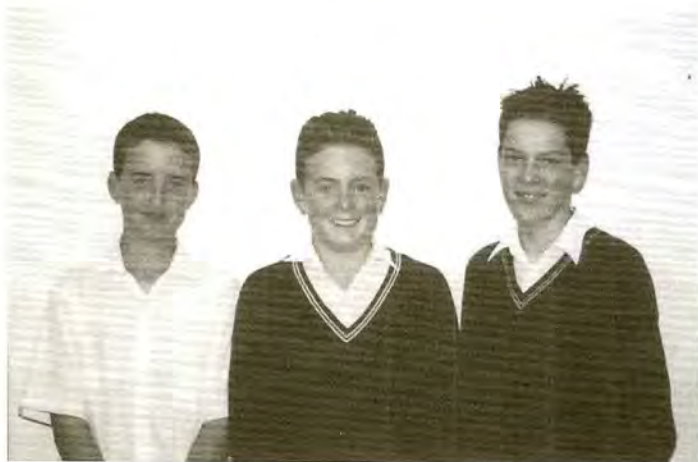

Two projects in particular were completed which gave students a chance to show the school community that their mathematical skills applied to practical situations could benefit students, staff and the wider school community.

The first of these projects was called "Senior Students Outdoor Common Room" and called upon students to not only design a practical way to utilize the area outside S1 but to also budget for the building of a structure of their choice to provide shade, seating and garden areas. What has resulted is a 'spin off' from the Maths in Practice class an area where students can gather and sit in the shade and talk.

The second project was the result of a direct request from Mr Banks that our students investigate the possibility of a car parking area between the staff house and the wood/metal rooms. Once again the students set about finding out all relevant information from a variety of sources including the Bunbury City Council. After some weeks of investigating the number of cars, a variety of ways of parking, the width of the car park and the width of driveways between parked vehicles, the students each completed a diagram of the way they thought would be best for our car park. A selection of diagrams were presented to the School Board and one student's design has been chosen as the basis for the new design.

Next year should see the fulfillment of this project (with appropriate modifications) and staff and parents should benefit from the efforts of the Mathematics in Practice class. Other practical projects await students who choose to use their talents in a practical way and join the Mathematics in Practice class in Year 11.

VIP Coordinators Report 2002

The driving force behind the program is the vocational interests of our Year 11 and 12 students. The 2002 program has shown a significant growth in the types of opportunities available for participants with a strong interest and commitment. This year's program has closely focused on individual career interests and flexible training delivery. This in turn has provided employment and career opportunities for many Year 11 and 12 students.

Features of 2002

Automotive Training Australia has granted scholarships to Year 11 students, Jayden Edwards and Kale Battle. Both of these lads have featured in several training industry publications. We also have four Year 10 applicants for the 2003 Automotive Scholarships.

The Southwest Independent Schools Link Cluster now has a website, www.swislink.wa.edu.au. This great site promotes our program to the school, training and employer communities. It also provides valuable information on training opportunities and important dates.

Glen Wishart is the first student at BCC to undertake a School Based Traineeship. Glen attends as a regular Year 11 student, who every Wednesday, works at Lucon Engineering and completes selected modules of his off-the-job training through the SWISLink training programs. Glen hopes that the two year traineeship will lead to a trade certificate in boiler making welding.

The VIP Training Program 2002

Typically a VIP student in the course of a year will attend a day long induction program, complete a senior First Aid Certificate, participate in at least a week long training course suited to their vocational interest and career path. This is also complemented by 120 hours on the job training suited to similar interests and employment. There has been a strong demand for training in Community Services & Health and Beauty Retail Courses for 2002. This of course is in addition to the standard upper school study program and gives such students a huge competitive advantage for traineeships, apprenticeships and employment. Five of our 2001 VIP group gained apprenticeships and traineeships through their training and work placement and this year we anticipate a similar result. The Workplace Training Briefs on the following page is an outstanding witness to the efforts and commitment of our students.

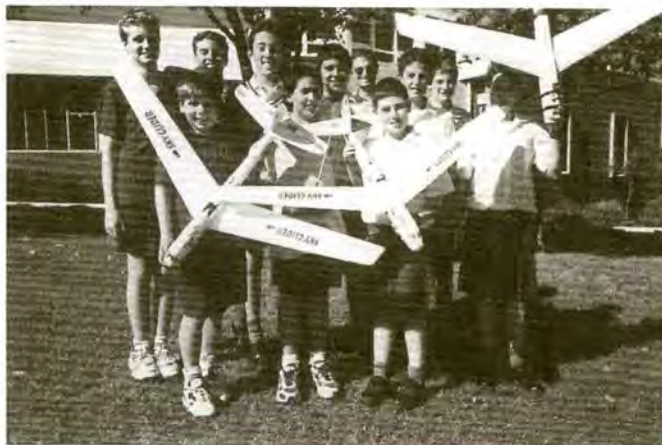
AERO-MODELLING CLUB

DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY



YR 9 AND 10 MODEL DESIGN

Students in 2002 had a productive time down in the workshop. They showed enthusiasm in constructing a variety of Balsa gliders. The test flights on the front oval were a bit hazardous, where their construction techniques were put to the test. The maintenance crew (Mr Depiazzi) had to be called in for repairs and adjustments after some maiden flights went wrong. We also tried out the aerodynamics of the boomerang using a more modern three-wing design where the importance of correct wing shaping became obvious as well as the need to keep your eye on the boomerang!



There was also a wood component where students had to design and construct according to set tasks. We looked at the principles of articulation and the use of the wood lathe, as well as the importance of procedures in constructing a model. One of the tasks was to construct a child's toy and it was pleasing to see such a variety of ideas. Overall much was learnt, sawn, sanded, glued, flown, crashed, tested, cut, planed, painted and designed.



YR 9 AND 10 WOOD DESIGN

Students discovered the enjoyment of working with wood in our courses. We explored the balance between aesthetics and functionality in our project designs. A variety of projects were constructed such as clocks, marimbas, boxes of various designs, mirrors, intarsia (wooden images), racks and salad servers turned on the lathe. Each project was able to be adapted to the individual's personal style and some very good items were produced. This year much of the work could be seen in the library front display area, something we will continue to do next year.

A big thanks must be given to Mrs. Northcott who made it possible for the band to visit the school, and with the interest shown by students, it is hoped that this will become an annual event.



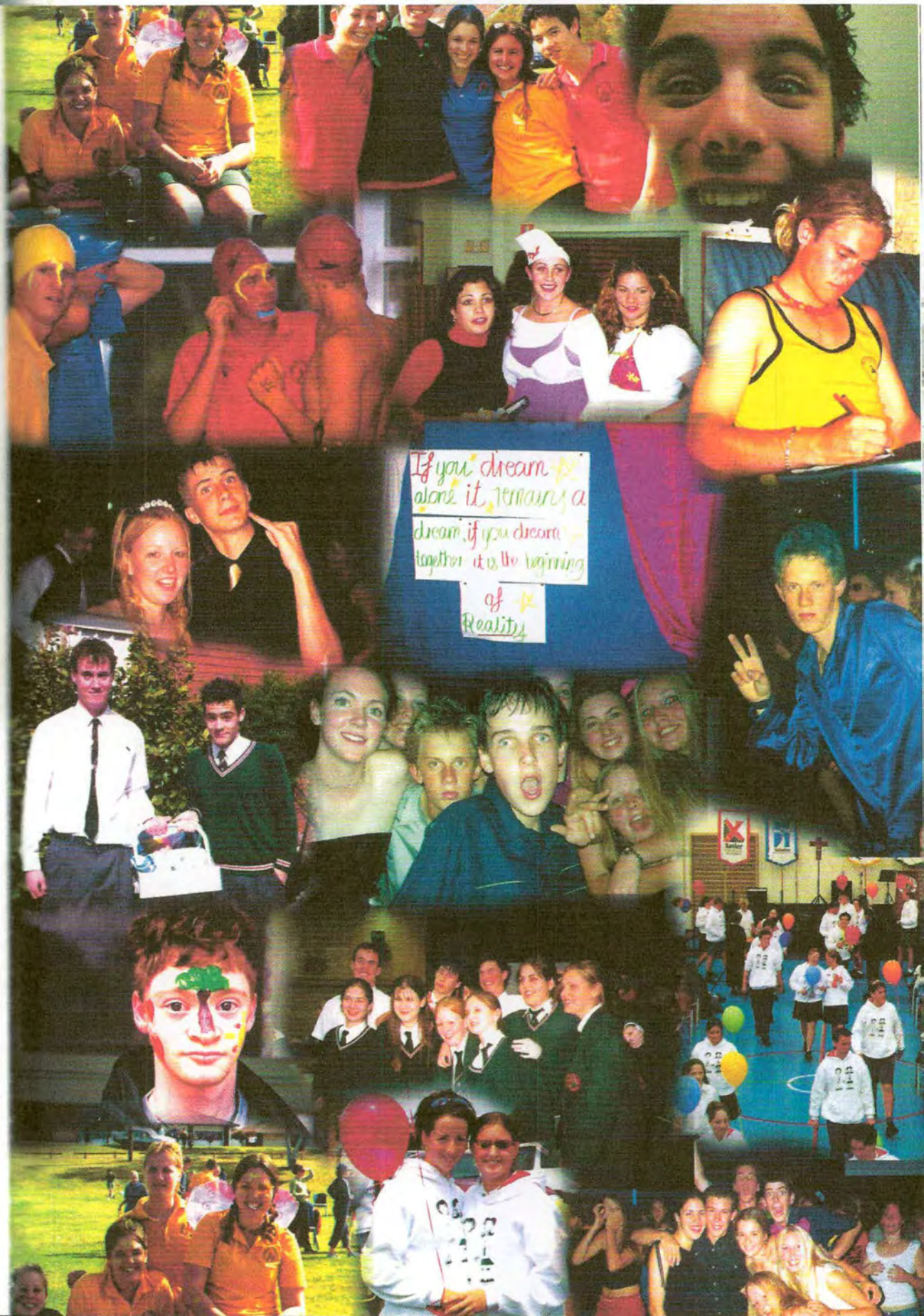
YEAR 12 LEAVERS 2002!

Youth Driver Development Program

Thankfully, the year has been rather incident free, allowing students to settle down and get on with the tasks at hand throughout the year. It has been a trial year for me, being my first year as Year 11 Coordinator. My goal was to run the year as smoothly as possible in the way it has been running for a number of years. Through the support, experience and professionalism of the homeroom teachers this was achieved.

There have been two messages I have been trying to convey over the year. One has been on setting goals and then putting actions in place to move towards achieving those goals. The biggest stumbling block students have with this is thinking that they must stay with their chosen goal. I refute that and encourage students to change their goals to their needs. The important thing is to be doing something towards a goal, relevancy in learning makes learning easier.

The other concept was the idea of an initiation process and that the two years of upper school is one way of passing through this phase of youth to adult. Year 11 is but one half of this journey and that the subject teachers, homeroom teachers, outward bound instructors, year coordinators and others are all here to provide guidance, knowledge and experience on passing through this phase and it is up to the students to use this support. A current Year 11 student made a comment on Outward Bound that I have used on many occasions since, "To learn from a mistake is normal; to learn from someone else's mistake is being smart; to keep on making the same mistake that's just stupid." There are many smart

students in Year 11 with a thirst to utilize this network of mentors. If you are in Year 11 and you haven't been asking for help from teachers or listening to advice, then you aren't being smart.

Outward Bound plays a big role in Year 11 with developing the above ideas. Below is an excerpt written by some of the students who attended. Other specific Year 11 events in the year were the Youth Driver Development Program and the Year 11 Retreat Day lead by the Youth Disciples Mission Team. Of course there were the usual whole school activities such as socials, carnivals, debating and interschool sport in which the Year 11 group can be proud of their participation level.

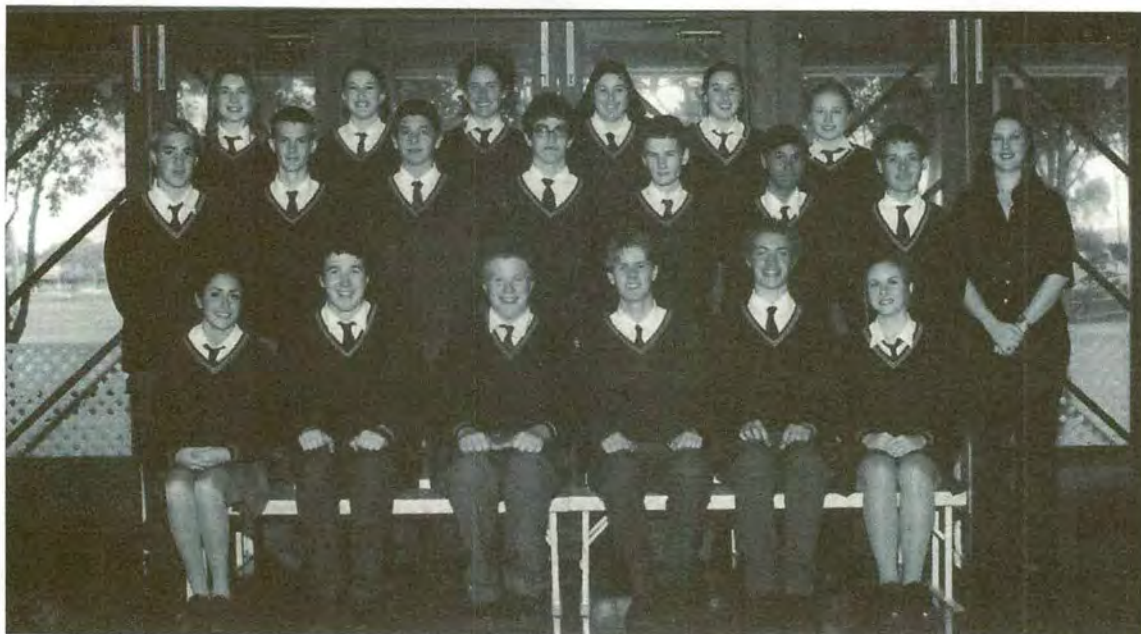

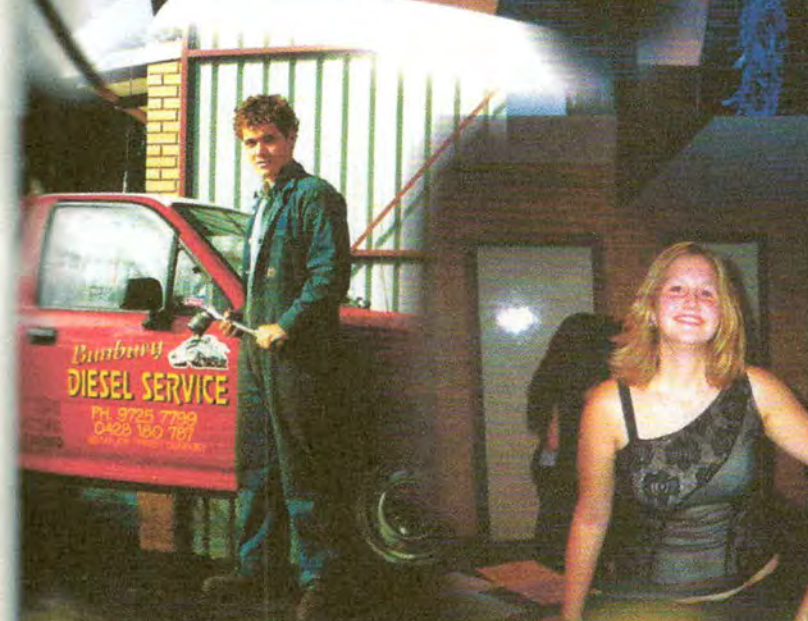
