PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

It is wonderful to be celebrating another year of education at Bunbury Catholic College, and it is with pleasure that I present the annual report.

2014 has been a year attending to the present, while planning and preparing for the future. Our students and parents are very fortunate to be part of a school community with so many dedicated and professional teachers and support staff. The past year and the challenge of planning for the exciting future of opening a second campus of the College and enrolling Year 7 students into secondary education has meant that staff members have taken on a massive workload this year and I am extremely appreciative of their efforts, enthusiasm, and wise counsel as we have worked throughout the year.

As a Catholic school in the Mercy and Marist tradition, our purpose is to educate our students to achieve their best, to provide effective pastoral care for each person and to instil in the students an understanding of Gospel values. Above all, we aim to make Jesus central in the lives of all in the community. Through the Religious Education programs, retreats, social justice action and the Christian Service Learning programs encountered in our school we hope to bring Jesus alive for our students. This is illustrated beautifully by our students who left in the early hours of the morning following Presentation Evening to work in the orphanages run by the Missionaries of Charity in Kolkata, India. Three of the students attended Presentation Evening to perform and receive awards and left early to connect with the group for their departure from Perth.

We are very fortunate to have the pastoral services of Fr Edwin Ocho, our chaplain, to assist the staff in the faith development of our students. Fr Edwin is very generous with his time and is flexible in accommodating the demands of a secondary school timetable. I am very grateful to Fr Edwin for his support throughout the year, our Religious Education teachers, and Mrs Viv McKenzie and Mrs Janet Wilson for their work in providing our

students with faith development, liturgical and retreat experiences and Christian Service Learning opportunities. This year our students have undertaken over 26,000 hours of service in the community and have raised \$14 000 to support a range of charities.

Our year commenced with reports of the outstanding academic achievement of our Class of 2013. Our students' results placed many of our Year 12 courses above the State mean; about 70% of the cohort was aiming for university entry and all of these students were offered university entry. In addition, all students who incorporated a Vocational Education Training (VET) program in their course, successfully completed the Certificate. This year our Year 11 and 12 students had the opportunity to form a course of study from over 60 WACE courses, 14 school-based Certificate courses and 8 VET courses delivered off campus. We are hoping our Class of 2014 will achieve results as impressive as our Class of 2013.

2014 saw the culmination of the work of the schools in our region in establishing the Bunbury Regional Trade Training Centre (BRITC) and the opening of the first centre on the BCC campus in March, with thirty two students enrolled in Certificate III in Plumbing and Gas Fitting. Our Year 12 Engineering students have also made use of the facility to complete their Certificate II in Engineering and used their skills to erect the safety signage in the workshops. All three centres will be opened in 2015 allowing students from the 15 schools in the greater Bunbury region access to further vocational training opportunities. Many of our students have been successful in gaining a place in their chosen course for 2015.

In addition to the opportunities to complete VET Certificate courses in the Trade Training Centre, our students completed over 300 Certificates with more than 66 000 nominal hours of training. Staff members from our Vocational and Careers Office have provided a wonderful service for our students, meeting with many students individually to develop a career pathway and



find the most suitable school or out of school training opportunities, arranged over 530 work placements, partnered with over 300 employers, organised the annual SW Careers Expo, and assisted students in gaining school-based apprenticeship or traineeship, employment or full time apprenticeship or traineeships for 2014 or 2015.

The Year 9 standardised testing in NAPLAN and the Bishops' Religious Literacy Assessment have again produced very sound results with our average above the State and National averages. With the changes to the requirements of senior students from 2015, all students are expected to meet minimum standards in literacy and numeracy in order to achieve a WACE. 95% of our Year 10 students have already achieved this standard from their Year 9 NAPLAN in 2013 or the OLNA results completed this year.

At the end of 2013 we introduced a new learning management system which enables parents and students to access online information about courses, homework, resources, assessments, reports and subject information for each course and pastoral information stored for each student. Students can 'Conect' remotely and keep up with all their school work. This software also enables parents to be real partners in their child's education, be informed about their child's application and achievement and contact teachers should the need arise.

While the academic results of the College can be assessed by the result of the graduating class, I am equally pleased to see the efforts of individual students as they make improvements with each report. Many students have attended after school homework club and tutorials conducted by the teachers throughout the year.

The achievement of our students in faith, academic, cultural, sporting and service activities are well documented in the weekly newsletters and the College Yearbook. It is heartening to see so many students take advantage of the opportunities provided by their parents and the College.

During 2014 our students have been involved in a wide variety of co-curricular activities with a large number of sporting activities, camps, a variety of academic pursuits, such as philosophy club, debating, chess, science and maths competitions and a huge range of Arts performances and displays including the very professional production of 'Oliver' and a wide range of music performances and achievements.

The College sporting commitment is extensive and the dedication of the Physical Education staff, together with support from other teachers and parents, provide our students with the opportunity to represent the school in their chosen sport. While the first aim is to encourage students to participate, our students continue to demonstrate their passion to do their best and, in doing so, win many of the competitions.

Student Leadership at BCC is a service to our school community with the Year 11 Peer Support Leaders assisting the Year 8 students in their transition to secondary school, the Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion providing support in our liturgies, and the Council of Student Leaders, SRC and House Leaders demonstrating their leadership skills in the organisation of a wide variety of initiatives. I commend the students who have taken on leadership roles in the many activities in the College and congratulate our Head Girl, Phoebe Temptra, and Head Boy, Alex Jerrard, on their excellent leadership throughout the year. To Phoebe and Alex and the Class of 2014, thank you for your contribution over the last 5 years and I wish you every blessing for a happy and fulfilling life.

The involvement of our parents, in all facets of school life, has added to the wonderful community spirit at Bunbury Catholic College. The P & F have been very active this year in providing hospitality, friend-raising and fund-raising.



I am grateful to Mr Ron Goldspink, President of our P & F, the P & F Executive, the Art Extraordinaire committee and all our parents for their efforts for the College. On behalf of our staff and students, my sincere thanks to our parents for their efforts in fundraising which have resulted in donations towards much needed resources for the College.

In line with the School Education Act and based on the Systems Agreement established with the Minister of Education, our College was successfully audited for the purpose of re-registration as a secondary school. It is through such a process that an external and an internal assessment of our policies and procedures and our implementation of the curriculum is undertaken to ensure that we maintain very high standards.

The expansion of the College has certainly presented challenges and I am very grateful for the work of our College Board, under the leadership of our Board Chair, Mr Peter Wheeler, for their encouragement, support, financial advice and action on the various projects which have been undertaken this year.

While our staff have been very busy attending to the present, ensuring that our students achieve and participate fully during the year, they have also been heavily involved in the curriculum changes that take effect in 2015, preparing for the Year 7 cohort of students who will join us and the enormous undertaking of the capital works required on both the Marist and the Mercy campuses to accommodate our growing school.

The curriculum to be offered for Year 7 students has been developed, the academic course for Year 8 – 10 have been revised to incorporate the changes to the WA curriculum, and the changes to the WA Certificate of Education for senior students has seen significant syllabus changes in courses requiring a re-write of most courses.

Apart from the educational preparation, our staff has

been tackling the logistics of the additional 400 students across two campuses entering our school in 2015. A large number of teachers have assisted with the interviewing of students and families and preparing the orientation days for the new students. I am very grateful to the teachers who have assisted in this process, especially the Heads of Year: Mrs Sharon Doyle, Mrs Viv McKenzie, Mrs Wendy Morris, Mrs Maree Maughan and Mr Michael Bryce. The bulk of the work in organising the enrolment of students has fallen to our Registrar, Mrs Geraldine Bowman. The successful three days of orientation would not have been achieved without her thorough and professional application to the enrolment task.

The recruitment of new staff has almost been completed with over thirty new staff commencing across the two campuses. I have appreciated the teachers who have given hours of their personal time to assist as panel members for the large number of interviews required to select our staff.

With the first day of Term 1 2015 looming, much work is still to be completed. The building projects on both the Marist and Mercy campuses are nearing completion and will require considerable work in January to fit out the buildings with furniture and equipment. I am enormously grateful to the work of our Bursar, Mr Brent Steere, who has been managing the capital development projects, attending to the finances and resourcing and gearing up for the massive task of ensuring all facilities are available for the commencement of the school year.

I am indebted to the Pastoral and Curriculum teams and the College Executive for their considerable efforts over the last two years as we have made certain that the current programs have continued for the benefit of our students, while approaching every new challenge for 2015 with a can-do attitude, ensuring that our students and the College thrive.



As we come to the end of the school year I extend my thanks and best wishes to staff members who are leaving the College or taking a period of leave in 2015. I am very grateful for their contributions to our school life and wish them well in their new endeavours. This year we farewell several staff members who have held leadership roles in the College.

We farewell Mr Braden Famlonga for a short time as he has taken a 2 year secondment to teach at St Mary's in Broome. I am very grateful for the leadership and care that Mr Famlonga has had for our students in his role as a Head of Year.

We also farewell Mr Paul Northover, Head of Year for the last 4 years and thank him for his care and support of our Class of 2015. He leaves us to take on a similar role at MacKillop Catholic College in Busseton.

Mrs Sue Williams was our Coordinator of the Learning Centre for 5 years until she took a 3 year secondment as a Consultant in Special Needs with the Catholic Education Office (CEO). Mrs Williams has resigned from the College to continue as a Consultant with the CEO. We are indebted to her for the wonderful work she has done for our students and staff during her time at BCC.

Special thanks and farewell are extended to Mr Peter Hogan, Head of Technology, who has retired after 33 years at BCC. In addition to the many tasks undertaken by a Head of Learning and teacher, Mr Hogan introduced and managed both the administration and educational computer networks of the College, managed the increasing demands to upgrade our technology and has been at the centre of our move to a 1-1 laptop program. In all areas of his work, Mr Hogan has been very professional and thorough, always looking to provide the best for our students within the financial resources of our College and families.

Mrs Leonie Ridgway has served the BCC community as Deputy Principal for the last 14 years, managing both the pastoral and academic needs of our students. In addition, she has been a most efficient administrator, organising the timetable and the very many events that occur in the College. Mrs Ridgway is a passionate Mathematics teacher and has never allowed her administrative duties to dull her enthusiasm for the classroom and the students in her care; however, above all, Mrs Ridgway will be remembered at the College for her deep concern for students and staff. She has been easy to approach and has been confidante to both students and staff alike. Bunbury Catholic College will miss her friendly face, her no-nonsense approach to everything, and most of all her willingness to reach out and help anyone at any time. We wish her well in her retirement, happy in the knowledge that she will, at times, return to the College to volunteer her time for the benefit of our students and the College community.

I am extremely grateful to all our staff members for their dedication in providing a caring environment in which our students are able to excel in their studies and develop their talents in so many ways. The innovation and hard work of the Pastoral, Academic and senior Leaders ensures that our College continues to be dynamic. I truly appreciate the work and support of this wonderful group of people.

We are very blessed with the people in our College and I hope all in our community appreciate and value each person. I hope that the love that Jesus Christ brought to our world will find a place in your heart and in your family.

OUR SCHOOL



BOARD REPORT

The high regard in which Bunbury Catholic College is held in our community is evidenced by the continual growth in enrolments which we have seen over the years. Apart from the introduction of Year 7 students into the College next year, the enrolment pressure has resulted in an additional stream of students in Year 7 and Year 8 in 2015. Hence, as anticipated, 2014 has proved to be a year of planning and preparation for the significant developments in the College.

It is a credit to the College staff that parents and students value the spiritual, pastoral, academic and co-curricular offerings provided for each student. The high standards expected of our students equip them for success in achieving tertiary entry, further training or employment and in their involvement in the wider community.

The 2014 school year commenced with the completion of the Trade Training Centre on the BCC campus with thirty students enrolled in the Certificate III in Plumbing and Gas. This centre was the first of three centres in the Bunbury region and is open for application from students from all schools in the greater Bunbury region. The changes in the WA Certificate of Education (WACE) requirements for many students to achieve a Certificate in a training area have made these centres even more important. The Board is extremely grateful to Mr Michael Downes for his dedication, hard work and attention to detail in the development of the centre and the guidance he and his team provide for students in mapping their training pathways.

In addition to the development of the Trade Training Centre, the Board has had oversight of the other capital developments on both the Marist and Mercy campuses. The construction of the Learning Commons, the ring main and power upgrade on the Marist campus have been one focus of the Board. These new facilities will provide a wonderful learning environment that will benefit all students and open the Marist campus to further upgrades of some of our older facilities.

The Mercy campus development of three large buildings in Stage 1 has been a huge undertaking and the tight timeline has added to the pressure of providing for our expanding College for the commencement of the 2015 school year. It is pleasing to note that over 300 foundation students will call the Mercy campus their home campus and will be able to commence the year in these modern educational facilities.

With such large capital developments, it is not surprising to note that a large portion of the business of the Board, centred on the financial viability of the College to undertake this expansion. The College will receive debt servicing support from the Catholic Education Commission of WA for the Mercy campus developments and the loan required for the Marist developments are manageable within our recurrent budget for the Marist campus.

In addition to discussion about forward projections in our finances to manage the capital developments on the two campuses, the Finance committee provided oversight of the monthly financial papers and the 2015 budget. While the College is on a sound financial footing, going forward with funding uncertainty, it is necessary to fully scrutinise all aspects of our budget.

The 2015 recurrent budget has been drawn up and discussed at Board level as, and at this stage, we have presented a balanced budget, with a fee increase for 2015 of 5%. I thank the members of the Finance committee for their scrutiny and deliberations about the College finances. I wish to make special note of the valuable work of Mr Brent Steere, College Bursar, who has been the project manager overseeing each capital development project. He has been responsible for the financial management of the College that involves separate financial accounting for the two campuses.

I would like to thank the College P&F for their efforts in community building and fund raising. The annual Art Extraordinaire was a great success as a social event in the Bunbury community and in raising funds to contribute resources for our students.

As our year concludes, I would like to express my appreciation, on behalf of our students, for the work of the College staff and Executive: Ms Denise O'Meara – Principal, Mrs Leonie Ridgway & Mr Eugene de Lima – Deputy Principals, Mrs Gobnait May – Head of RE and Mr Brent Steere – College Bursar. A sincere thank you to all Board members for your generous contributions of time and talents to our College community: Fr Edwin Ocho, Ms Denise O'Meara, Mr Ron Goldspink (P&F Rep.), Mr Tom Hall, Mr Joseph Musitano, Mrs Cindy Power, Mr Brent Steere, Mr John Reilly and Mr Danny Griffin.

PARENTS AND FRIENDS

An exciting year has come to a close for Bunbury Catholic College with the completion of the Bunbury Regional Trade Training Centre, the Marist Learning Commons, plus the opening of the Mercy Campus for the 2015 school year.

Once again, the Parents and Friends Association started the year with a successful Sundowner for Year 8 parents.

Attendance at P&F meetings improved during 2014 with the introduction of two parent representatives from each year group volunteering to represent each year group at the meetings.

I represented BCC at the 2014 Parents and Friends Federation conference in Perth with my wife Janet.

The P&F committee authorised funds for a number of requests in 2014, including the school presentation night (\$1,500), four service learning awards (\$200 in total) and the Marist Touring Netball team (\$2,000).

The secondhand book sales continues to be a successful revenue raiser and thanks go to Marlene Leemeyer who coordinates the sales.

I wish to thank Treasurer Susan Golder, Secretary Robyn Sutton and all the parents who attended the meetings throughout the year.

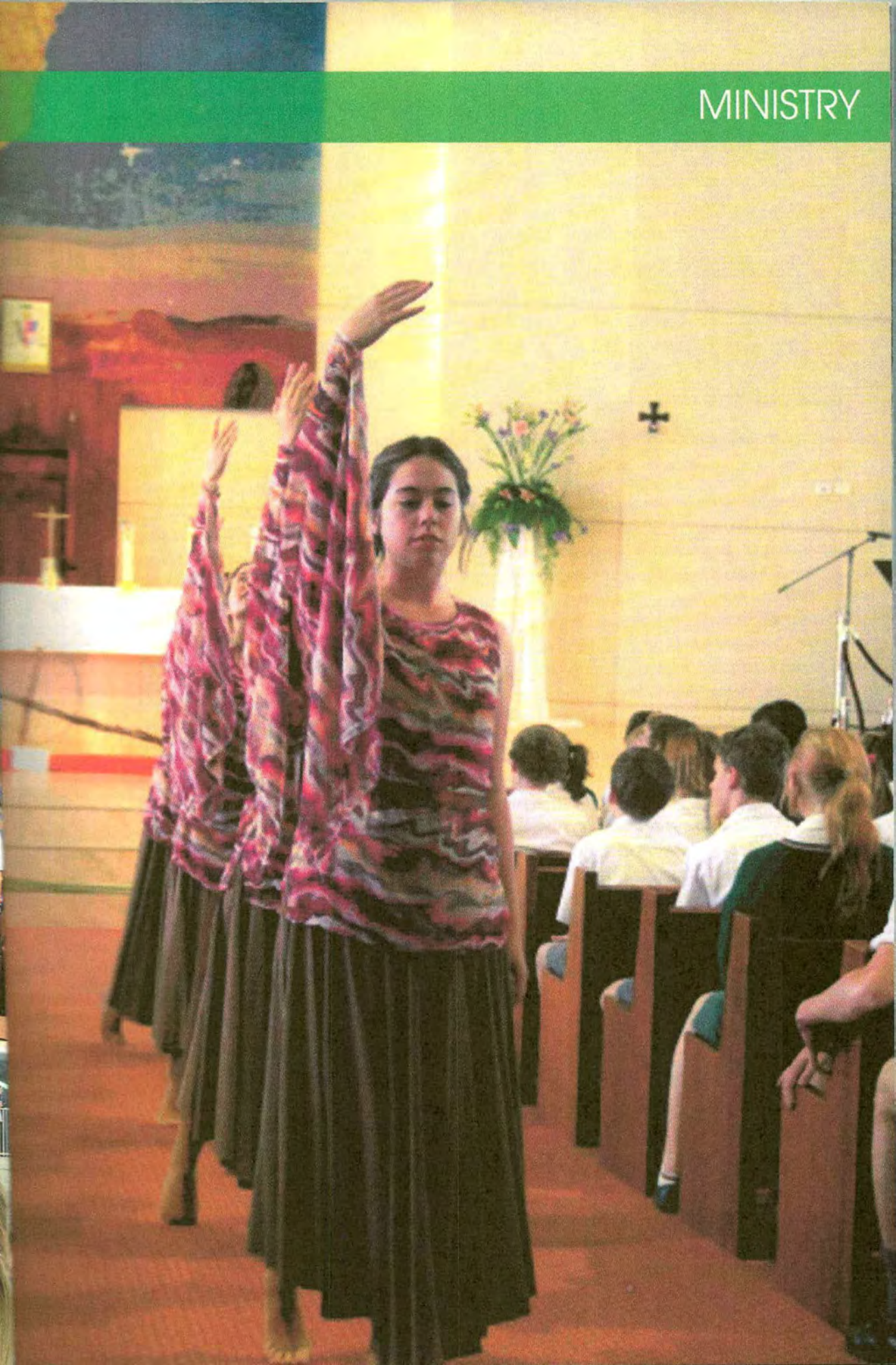

CHRISTIAN SERVICE

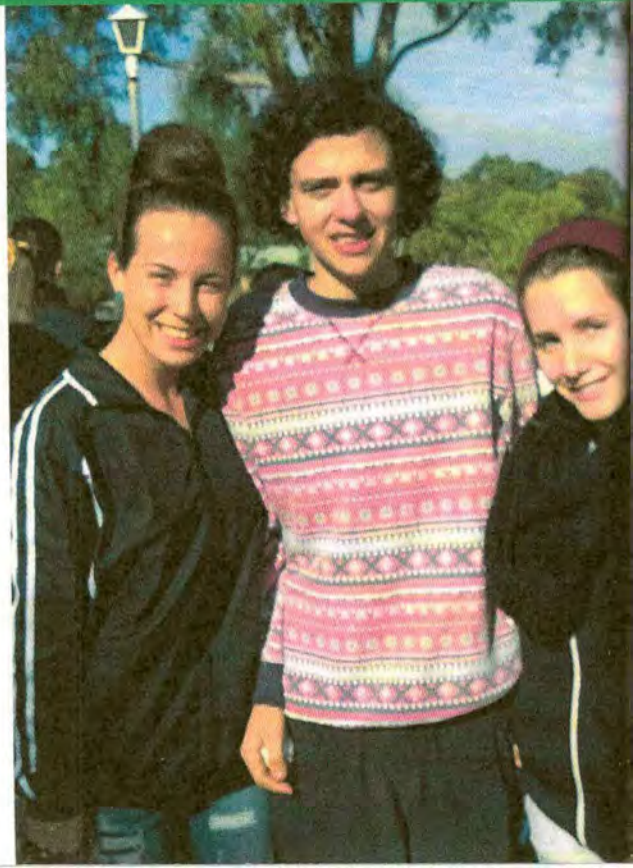
YEAR 12 - RELATIONSHIPS

THEATRE EXCURSIONS

As a part of the Dance Program at Bunbury Catholic College we like to ensure students attend at least one high quality dance performance each year. This year we were lucky enough to have a wide variety of performances for students to choose from. We started with the West Australian Ballet at the unique Quarry Amphitheatre. This open air, quadruple bill performance with the city as a backdrop was a valuable experience for the Senior students – allowing them to see what could be done in a non-traditional venue and to admire the skill and ability of the wonderful dancers.

Next we were off to see 'Fights and Flights' by Steps Youth Dance Company at the State Theatre Centre in Northbridge. This performance allowed our Senior Dance Students to observe and appreciate the professionalism and skill of many of Western Australia's most talented up and coming dancers as well as get an insight into a company we were studying.

In July, Sydney Dance Company graced the Bunbury Entertainment Centre stage-performing their work '2 One Another' It was a wonderful opportunity for our students to see one of Australia's premiere contemporary dance companies. We also attended two

performances in Perth by World Class companies Chunky Move and Bangarra Dance Theatre. The first was 'Keep Everything', by Chunky Move, and was held at the Perth Institute of Contemporary Arts (PICA). The second performance, held in the State Theatre Centre, was 'Pateyagarang'. Year 10 and Year 11 students were amazed by the fusion of contemporary and indigenous dance.

Our last live performance was The Australian Ballet Dancers Company who performed a triple bill of 'Paquita', 'Rimbombo' and Act III of 'Swan Lake'. A crowd favourite was the almost all-male performance of 'Rimbombo'. It was a fun and exciting piece that demonstrated the athleticism of the male dancers coming out of the Australian Ballet School as well as their ability to perform as such varied characters.

We also spent a couple of afternoons after school watching DVDs of dance performances by companies such as Steps Youth Dance Company and Bangarra Dance Theatre. Although the analysis of the performances was for course assessment this was offset slightly by the tasty popcorn.





LITURGICAL DANCE

DANCE AND DRAMA NIGHTS

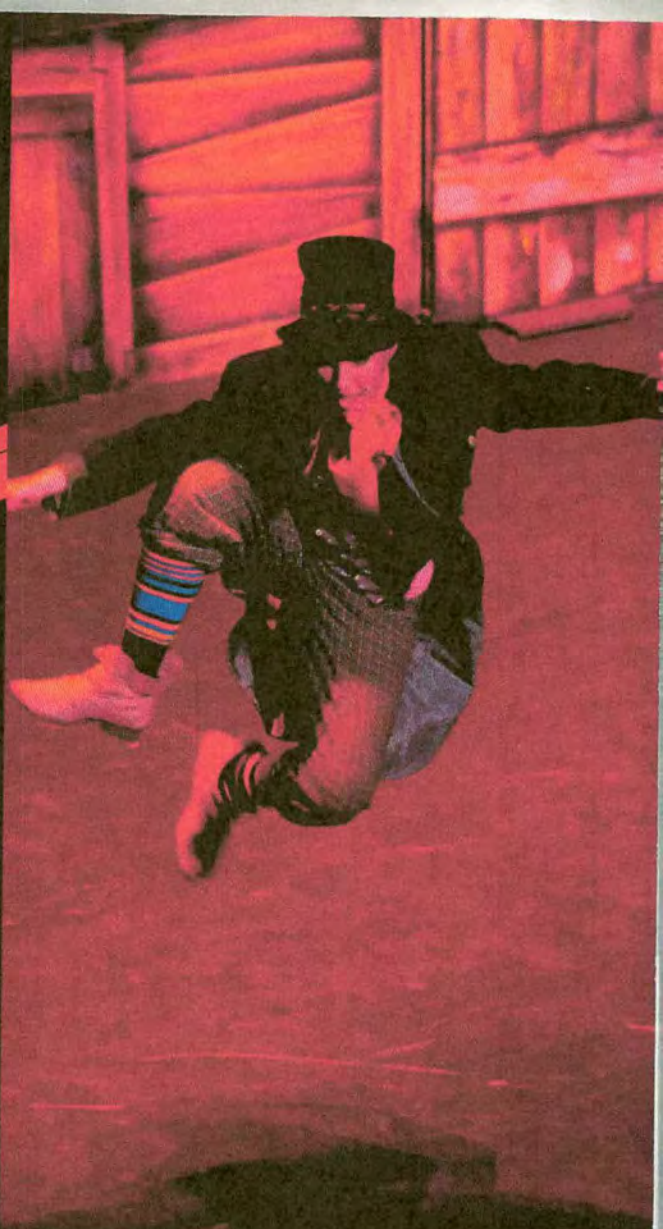
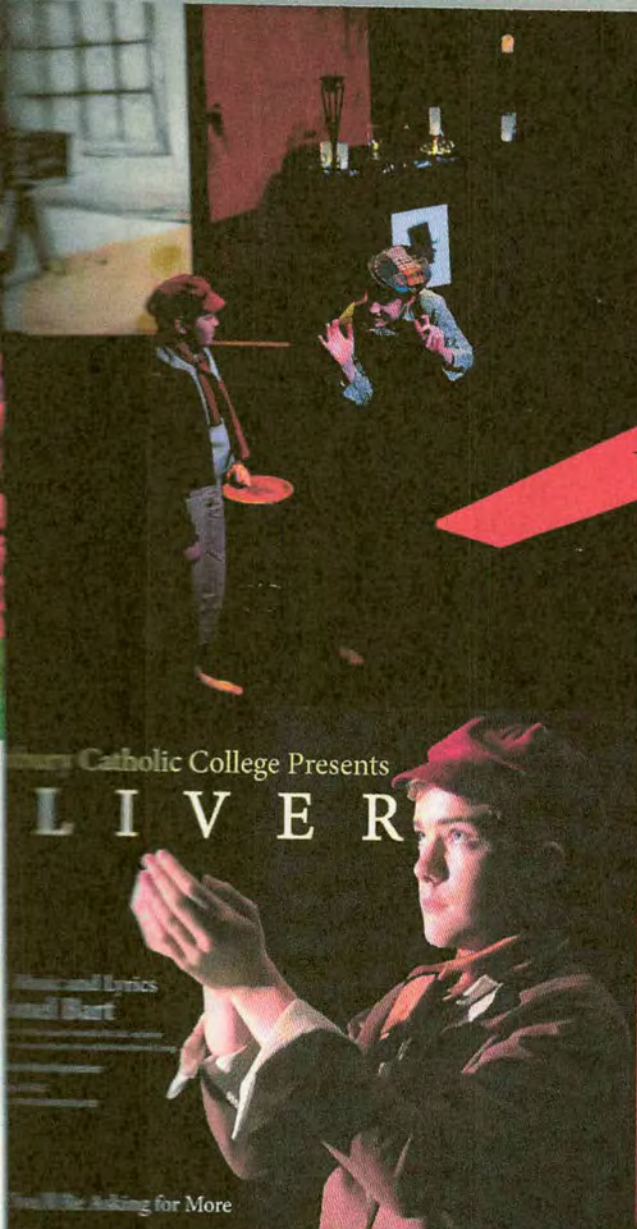

THE ARTS - VISUAL

The Visual Arts Department was bursting at the seams in 2014 with record numbers in our art classes.

YEAR 8

Each group was introduced to tonal drawing techniques which were implemented in still life drawings. These drawings were then transformed into two colour reduction lino print designs and several monotype prints.

YEAR 9

Three period group: Students produced articulate and original works including superb mixed media story books incorporating collage, monoprinting and collograph printing techniques. They turned their hand to Graphic Art, with the important task to create the 2015 BCC Birthday Card. They also created three-dimensional sculptural 'Critters' inspired by science fiction and fantasy.

Two period Craft class: Students created pencil cases using their own unique patterns from the natural and man-made environment. These patterns were converted into a repeat lino print onto handmade coloured pencil cases with an iron on transfer design they created on their computers. In Semester Two students used their excursion to the Bunbury Wildlife Park as stimulus for their carved, painted and encaustic plaster plaques.

YEAR 10

Students have been learning the Year 11 & 12 process of a visual diary and using the technique of photomontage which was developed into a mixed media painting. Their second project required them to create ceramic sculptures based upon the theme of 'Fears and Dreams'. In Semester two students created several mixed media drawings of still life in the lead up to their final design that was inspired by British Urban artist D*Face and the Pop Art movement.

YEAR 11

Year 11 Stage 2 and Certificate IV Visual Art students completed drawing and mixed media paintings at the end of Semester One and textile production pieces in Semester Two. The students have had to focus on the theme of 'Identities' where most students have incorporated techniques learned by guest artists Mel Candish and Helen Seiver.

YEAR 12

Certificate IV and Stage 3 students have completed production pieces across various disciplines. They utilised printmaking and textile techniques based upon the theme of 'Sense of Place'. They also created a work in sculpture and ceramics with an emphasis on the human form and/or our existence within society.

SCIENCE

"Although Nature needs thousands or millions of years to create a new species, man needs only a few dozen years to destroy one."

It has been an extremely busy year as we continue to prepare for and teach the vast array of topics and subjects offered in Science. We have been preparing for the advent of the new WACE courses, the introduction of Year 7 into the college, and the opening of the new Mercy campus. We have also operated and managed the Science Primary School Initiative, whereby our Catholic feeder schools have been supported in the teaching of Science to the Year 7 students to prepare them for Science in 2015. Mrs Kanakis received the CEO LEAD Award for Excellence for this project.

The Year 11 Biology students, supervised by Mr Hegney and Ms Schmitt, were involved in the Seed2Tree program and two days were spent at a site between Boyup Brook and Kojonup planting some 4000 trees. The students learned skills in plant propagation and practical conservation.

There was also the annual Year 11 Biology excursion to the Perth Zoo where students studied animal adaptations to the Australian environment. The Year 12 Human Biology classes learned about primate features and behaviour. The Year 11 Chemistry classes went to Murdoch University with Mrs Zuideveld and Mrs DeCoppi to attend the 'Be a Metallurgist for a day'. They visited university laboratories and used state-of-the-art equipment for separating important metals from rocks and minerals. Once again, students were able to apply their knowledge by "doing" science, using equipment, ores and chemicals that are not available to them in a school laboratory.

In July, Mr Hegney and Mrs Kanakis took the Biology and some Human Biology students to the Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research in Perth to learn about the applications of biotechnology and a number of important

laboratory techniques for the analysis of DNA. They conducted a hands-on laboratory investigation using these techniques to identify genetic mutations associated with cancer caused by melanoma, and analysed data generated from their investigation. The techniques they used are applicable across a wide range of forensics applications, including conservation biology. The day provided a unique opportunity for students to cement their in-class learning by applying their knowledge in a real-life laboratory activity.

Physics classes were very busy during 2014. Mr Dunn's Year 12 class went on an excursion to Scitech, where they saw the brand new Planetarium and learnt about dark matter. Year 11 Physics classes went on a day trip to Adventure World, where they learnt about various Physics principles, such as potential and kinetic energy, friction, gravity and acceleration by going on rides like the terrifying new Abyss!

Throughout the year Mrs Morris has led the way in Earth and Environmental Science, taking both the Year 11 and 12 classes on several excursions and a camp so that they could truly appreciate their subject matter outside the classroom. Experiencing the geology of WA, mining, metallurgy and environmental science hands-on is essential to the students having a truly deep understanding and interest in the course, allowing them to pursue possible careers in many aspects of the industry. The camps to Kalgoorlie were enjoyed by all including Mr Steere and Mr Lopez who gave up several days out of the office to experience the wonders of the goldfields and being a "teacher and supervisor". Other excursions included a trip to the Iluka Mineral Sands sites, caves in Margaret River and the Australian Petroleum Production and Exploration Association Oil and Gas Careers and Industry Awareness workshop. Lower School students didn't miss out, as some Year 10 students attended the "Get into Mining" workshops in Perth.

Year 12 students Caitlin Blunden and Maddison Matthews were selected to attend the 2014 Women in Resources



Awards breakfast at the Perth Convention Centre as part of the CME Inspiring Girls Initiative.

The Year 8 students were able to experience biology first hand when they dissected sheep hearts, and their models of cells were very imaginative. They were also treated to a geology incursion run by Jo Watkins where they were shown how to identify different types of rocks and minerals, and they experienced the wonders of frozen carbon dioxide! The Year 11 Human Biology students made DNA out of lollies, and then extracted the real thing from strawberries. Year 9 students made fantastic models of tectonic plates between continents and ocean ridges, some of which were interactive. The Year 9 students also constructed musical instruments out of recycled materials they brought from home. Former BCC student Tristan Clemons gave a very interesting and motivational workshop about his journey through his studies of science, both at school and university, as well as providing some Year 11 and 12 classes with a fascinating presentation about nanotechnology. They learned about tiny particles that can be used in all areas of Science and technology, such as their use for delivering chemotherapy to specific cells to treat cancer.

"Food For Our Future" was the theme for this year's National Science Week. A Homeroom quiz ran each day, and there were quizzes and displays in the library highlighting "raw" food and bringing the "sugar consumption" issue to the students' attention by asking them to guess the number of teaspoons of sugar incorporated into some of the food they eat on a regular basis. It also highlighted the universal Diabetes problem faces by people across the globe today and into the future. The staff were treated to morning tea where they were asked to vote on the taste of various cakes and savouries. During that week, Mrs Brown took eight students to The Science Café, a morning tea hosted by WA scientists and engineers from CSIRO, Engineers Australia, the WA Museum, the state's universities and various industry bodies.

Several students, under the supervision of Mrs Morris, sat the EES Olympiad Exam in August. Four students were awarded certificates of Distinction which was an amazing achievement given the high level of understanding required. Thomas Fitzgerald, Regan Dale, Dane Vincent and Jorel Paddick were our winners. This means they were in the top 30% of all students Australia wide who sat it. Our students also did very well in the Australian Science Innovations Big Science Competition held during extended Homeroom in May. It was a one hour, thirty multiple choice question competition, testing their knowledge, critical thinking and problem-solving skills. There are three categories: Junior (Year 8), Intermediate (Years 9 and 10), and Senior (Years 11 and 12). BCC had 92 students sit the test and three received a High Distinction, 9 received a Distinction, and 29 students were awarded a Credit.

Other exciting Science news includes the acceptance of Lakshana Parameswari to attend the National Science Youth Forum in January 2015. This is a great credit to both Lakshana, who always strives for the highest standard in her work, and the College to be recognised in this way. The NYSF is a worldwide program that exposes students to real hands-on Science at Universities throughout Australia, and involves about 300 students from Australia, South Africa, New Zealand, Canada and Sweden. It is a twelve day intensive program, but the real benefits come from the networking with other students and the academics who present the sessions, and the future possibilities and programs that NYSF has to offer.

This year we welcomed Mrs Jacky Brown to our team. She has fitted into the department with ease and has already made enormous contributions to Science and the College. I would like to thank the Science staff, including our Science technicians, for the incredible amount of work and effort they put into making Science such a strong and popular subject in the College.

SOCIETY AND ENVIRONMENT

YEAR 9

The Year 9 class of Bunbury Catholic College visited the Bunbury Magistrate's Court. The students experienced what it was like to be in court and viewed two trials.

The first case was one where a man had six accounts of drug possession as well as stealing a trailer. The second case involved a woman harassing security at a local hotel.

The students saw that being in court is much more serious than what is shown on TV. We learnt that the court has high levels of security and strict dress code. We were able to witness the clerks hand the information to the judge and see that the court only allowed a certain amount of viewers in the courts at once. We learnt so much more which we will remember for life. We all enjoyed our time at the courts, experiencing the reality of crime and justice.

YEAR 10 GEOGRAPHY

Students from Mr Norrish's Year 9 Geography Skills class created a scale-model of the Leeuwin-Naturaliste coastline in the long jump pit. Year 9 Geography students studied the landform regions of Australia, land use practices such as mining and farming, topographic mapping and urban development.

ENVIRONMENTAL CHANGE AND FOREST MANAGEMENT

The Year 10 Society and Environment class went to Wellington Discovery Forest to experience the change people make to Jarrah and Marri forests. It was a great way to witness and help in tasks that can make the forest more sustainable. We heard from John and Julz who are experts in forest reservation and sustainability, and Troy Bennell about how his Noongar ancestors helped change the land. We learnt about the native flora and fauna and the biodiversity of the Jarrah forest.

We took part in a prac to measure the leaf litter, the humus, the depth of the top soil and the PH of the soil. This gave us the chance to experience the job of looking after a forest. We learnt about the risk of fires and how they actually help the forest plants to rejuvenate and grow.

First stop: Bunbury Tower! There we were greeted by a panoramic view of Bunbury's inner mixed and residential zones. After spending some time questioning and discussing the concepts that the Department plans to put in place to hopefully minimise the impacts of climate change, we left the tower with greater appreciation of the consequences of human actions than when we first

arrived. From there we once again boarded the mass transport vehicle and embarked on a tour of the City. The expedition stops included the Back Beach, the Marlston Water front and the Bunbury Storm Surge Barrier which gave us the opportunity to analyse the impact of the projected sea level rises on the cultural and natural factors of the environment. The fieldtrip concluded on the banks of Five Mile Brook where the exhaustion of the day's events caught up to the eleven pupils. The bus returned back to school in time for the lunch bell.

YOUTH PARLIAMENT

2014 marked my second year as the local Youth Member for Collie-Preston in the YMCA Western Australian Youth Parliament. This year I was accompanied by 6 other regional members. I worked as a member of the Regional Development Committee to construct a bill targeted at regional students seeking financial support in higher levels of education. BCC have also continued their work with the Seed2Tree program run by 'The Hot Rock' organisation. This is an initiative that engages students in propagating and planting native trees and shrubs on degraded farmland, to enhance bushland and re-establish vegetation corridors

in order to conserve local flora and fauna. They began at the end of last year by germinating native seeds and have been caring for 4000 of the seedlings until they were ready to be planted out. The Sustainability Education program at BCC has been busy starting new initiatives and developing programs. A \$10 000 grant from the City of Bunbury was received for our plan to redevelop the school grounds using the six Noongar seasons as a guide. This money has been put toward relocating the shade house and shed. In August, Jason from Stratham Bobcat and Excavators cleared the site for our new shed from Outdoor World. The shed will be used to store all our equipment needed to continue our work of replanting the school grounds with water wise plants and maintain the food garden and orchard. Brian from Instant Racking installed tables in our new greenhouse so that the students have the opportunity to grow the seedlings for the school grounds. Students can soon start to germinate the seeds that will be used for next year's replanting.

Each year has seen BCC's commitment to sustainability education grow and strengthen. Students and staff have shown a real pleasure and enthusiasm in the learning journey and it has been a privilege to assist them in their pursuits.

TECHNOLOGY AND ENTERPRISE

CHILD DEVELOPMENT

Year Ten students who chose the Child Development elective this year, commenced by researching the types of family units in Australia. In the foods area, the students developed basic food handling skills, recipe interpretation, an introduction to nutrition and the use of various food preparation utensils and appliances. Their final challenge was planning and preparing their own

"Stuffed Spud" creation.

In Textiles, the students became proficient at the basic operation of the sewing machine, culminating in each student designing and creating their own unique decorative cushion.

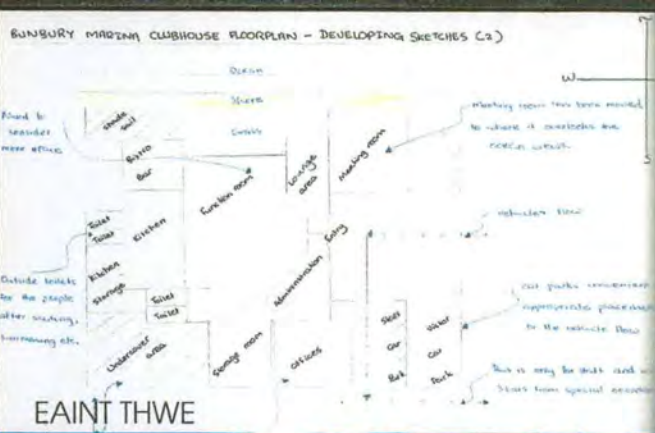

OFF CAMPUS LEARNING

Some students have also accessed other Certificate Courses with other training providers. Students are off campus for 1 or 2 days and maintain their school subjects, which requires a student to be self-driven and mature to ensure they still graduate.

A school based Traineeship completes 4 days of school with 1 or 2 days of paid workplacement during the week. They must continue to achieve at school and meet graduation requirements, complete the theory components of the qualifications and on-the-job workplacement and assessment.

Certificate II Plumbing and Gas Fitting
Certificate II in Automotive Vehicle Servicing
Certificate III Education Support
Certificate IV Education Support

Certificate II in Electrotechnology
Certificate II in Engineering

These Courses are run off the BCC campus and usually require the students to attend one or two days a week with both off the job training and on the job work placement within each industry.



YEAR 10 CAREERS AND WORK EXPOSURE WEEK

Year 10 Career Classes and a week of Work Exposure gave our year 10 students an insight in to what the work place entails and have gained experience in areas that may challenge them. By completing work books and attending a work place for a period of one week, the students have gained knowledge of Basic Communication Skills, Preparing for work in the Community Sector and Participate in Work Health and Safety Practices.

All Year 10 students participated in one week's work exposure within many diverse industries and varied locations. Most of our students secured places to work with local businesses from family/friends/contacts, many looking at their possible career path. Some students were able to be placed and participate in activities with the Water Corporation, South West Crime Prevention, Darling Range Wildlife Shelter and Number 2 Flying Training School. Others jetted off to places like Echuca in Victoria.

Students completed a log book recording their major tasks/observations and hours. The employer also completed an assessment giving students feedback on their week of work. This will become a valuable resource for their portfolio and resume.

There were many comments from Students such as: "...I don't want to wash another dog ever again, "... I met a lot of lovely people....", "... I would love to continue Work Exposure in the future." "The amount of planning and organisation required is crazy..... I have been offered part-time employment".

Well done Year 10 students and thank you to all the businesses for their continuous support of this valued program.

WORKPLACE LEARNING

Workplace Learning is a one day a week opportunity for any student in years 10, 11 or 12 to go out into the workplace and experience future career paths first hand. Students quickly discover where their talents, interests and passion lies and it is with this knowledge that they can now move forward with greater purpose through school and securing employment, or future training. In nearly all cases when it comes to employers the one thing that they look for within a future employee is a person's attitude. The words of one employer which has stuck in my mind: "I can teach the skills, but I do not have time to teach the attitude."

In 2014 this program has seen a large number of workplace learning students securing their Apprenticeship Traineeships and/or full-time employment.

CERTIFICATE III IN VISUAL ART

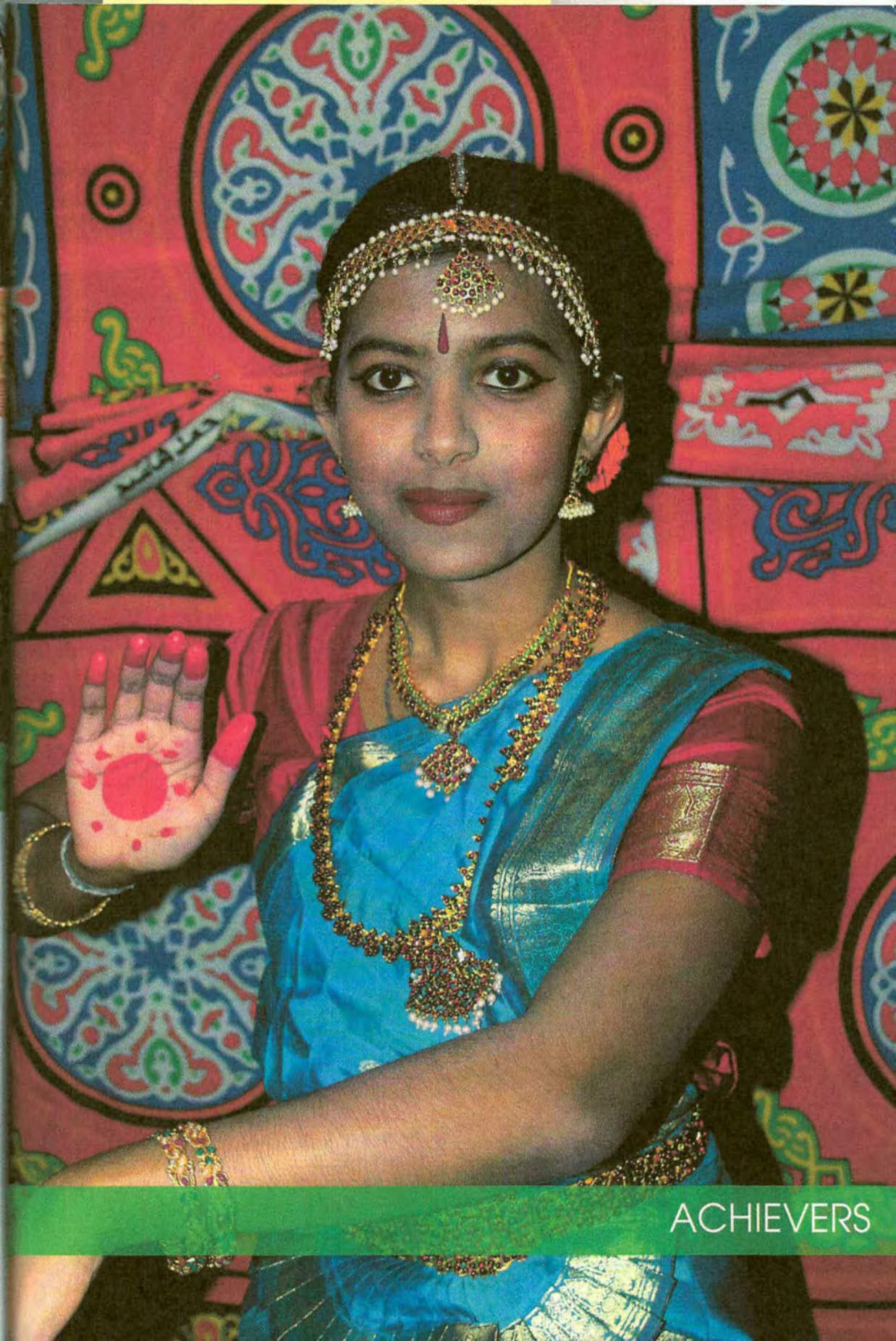

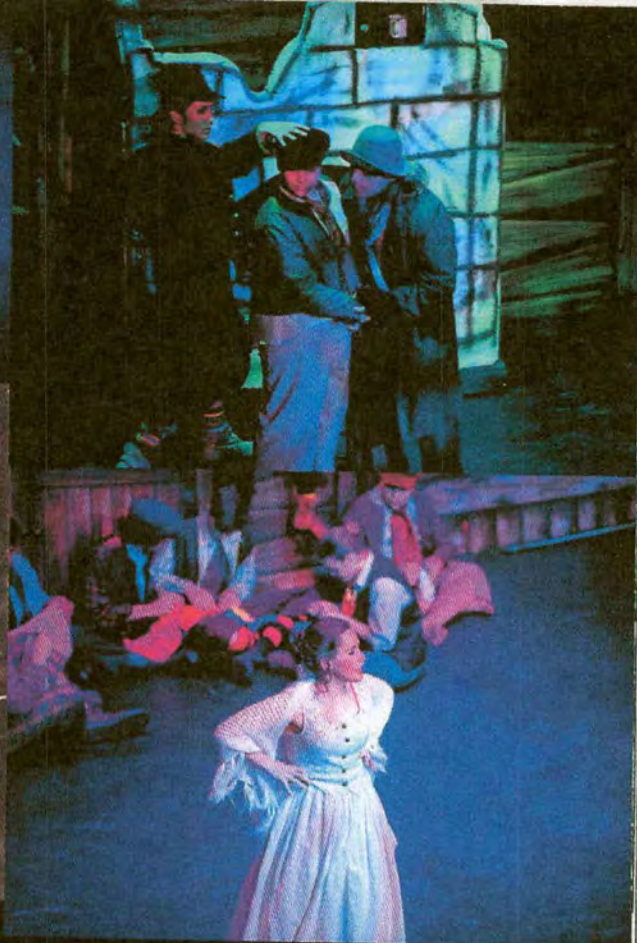

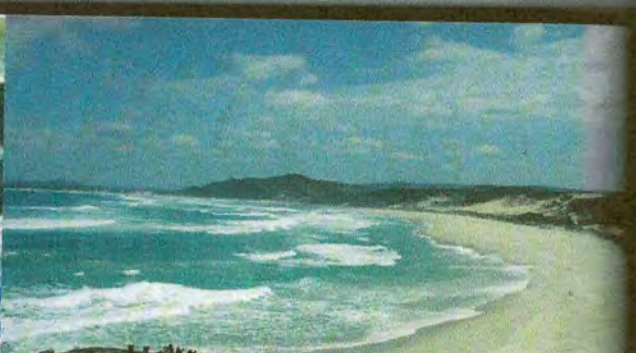
JULIA BIELZER 10W - GERMANY

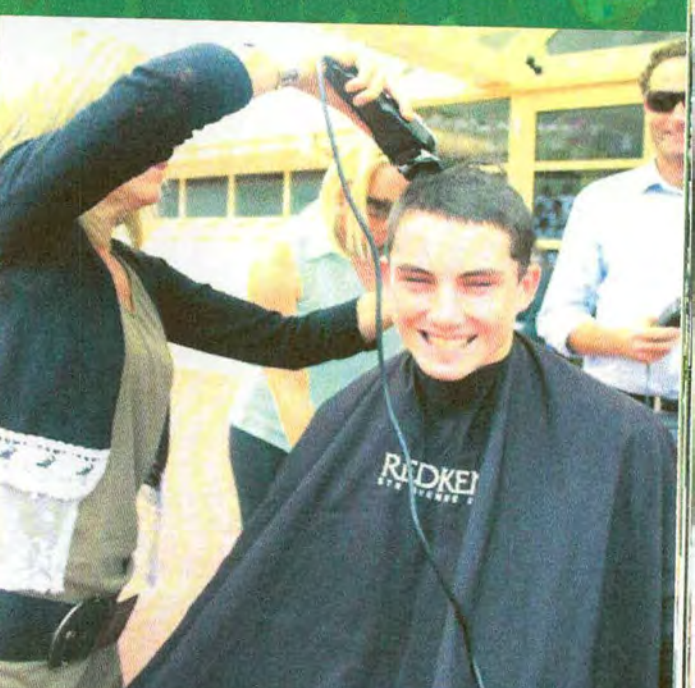

EARTH AND ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE- KALGOORLIE
