## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

2015 has been a memorable year in the history of the College and it gives me great pleasure to present the annual report.

Towards the end of 2014 we opened a College Executive meeting with a prayer from the 14th century mystic, Julien of Norwich. The prayer closes with, "Teach us to believe that by Your grace all shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well. Amen". And so it has come to pass, that all was well as we opened our school year with an additional 400 students, including 270 Year 7 students and the opening of the second campus of Bunbury Catholic College. "All shall be well" became our prayer at builders meetings when the completion of the Mercy campus for Day 1 of the school year seemed to be at risk. We continued to pray as our army of helpers moved hundreds of desks and chairs into classrooms and unpacked equipment, all within one week, and as we waited for Telstra to connect our ICT and phone services. While this work was being carried out on the Mercy campus, the outfitting and set up of the Champagnat Learning Commons on the Marist campus was also being completed in readiness for the school year. The official opening of the Champagnat Learning Commons was held in December and acknowledged the wonderful contribution this facility has made for the learning environment for students.

Praying, going to Plan B when needed, a lot of hard work and having a sense of humour have been key factors in successfully commencing the school year with students in classes, with a teacher and resources to undertake their courses. This was no mean feat as the staff worked to ensure that the transition of Year 7 and Year 8 students into secondary school went as smoothly as possible, while other students commenced their studies. To add to the stress in February, a bushfire raging in the vicinity of the camp site for the Year 7 and 8 camps added to

the complexity of the beginning of the year and worry for parents and staff. Reviewing our crisis management plans and assessing the status of the fire were essential. Fortunately, this fire was under control by the time the students embarked for their camp where they had a wonderful time and made new friends.

The expansion of the College has been a boon for our region as we are now able to accommodate the demand for catholic secondary education for students. A very positive aspect has also been to broaden opportunities for our students. This will become even more evident as the Mercy campus grows. The Stage 2 build of the Mercy campus will commence in 2016, to be opened in 2017 and, during 2016, we will review the next stage of development and maintenance on the Marist campus. The official opening of the Mercy campus Stage 1 and Stage 2 will be held with the completion on Stage 2.

Over summer our staff population also increased by an additional 30 new staff members and a number of new leadership roles were created and filled. I am very grateful to all staff members from both campuses who have worked to ensure that our new staff members have been mentored and supported in their first year in the College. Special thanks are extended to Mrs Viv McKenzie, Mrs Maree Maughan and Mr Michael Bryce who have led the Mercy campus community and to the inaugural staff on the Mercy campus who have been accommodating as builders worked around them finishing the Ursula Frayne Learning Commons and attending to the final details of construction.

While much had been planned prior to the commencement of the school year, throughout the year we have needed to assess all situations in light of our growing numbers and the bi-location of classes, make necessary adjustments to past activities or creating a new approaches to an event. All staff are to be commended for their willingness to be innovative as we trialed new ways of communicating and collaborating.

While coping with the expansion of the College, this year our teachers have been required to plan and develop the curriculum for Year 7 courses and the new programs in Years 8 to 10 to accommodate the changes introduced in the WA Curriculum Outline and Assessments. In addition, changes in the WA Certificate of Education have required new programs for all Year 11 courses for 2015 and the development of new programs for Year 12 courses for 2016. The efforts of our Heads of Learning, teachers and support staff have ensured we have successfully introduced all these changes and that our students are receiving a quality education with the opportunity to excel in many areas. Our NAPLAN results continue to place our

students above state and national averages and 99.9% of our students moving into Year 12 in 2016 have been successful in demonstrating achievement of the new requirement of literacy and numeracy for their WACE.

The 2014 WACE results saw 75% of our students achieve an ATAR, with 76% of the WACE courses above the state mean for the course. In addition, from our class of 2014, James Shepherd's outstanding examination performance in Earth and Environmental Science resulted in him being awarded the Course Exhibition for this course.

In addition to the wide variety of WACE courses offered, our students are fortunate to have access to a large range of Vocational Education and Training opportunities. While the majority of students are aiming for tertiary entry and sit the WACE examinations, this year 123 Year 12 students and 117 Year 11 students also undertook one or more Certificate courses. 30 different Certificate Courses were delivered at BCC in the normal College timetable or were undertaken by BCC students off campus. The VET staff are to be commended for their efforts, including organising the 692 work placements undertaken by our students. The success in this area can also be measured by the 15 students who have been successful in gaining an apprenticeship or traineeship during this year. The official opening of the Bunbury Regional Trade Training Centre was held during Term 4 this year with all three centres, Manea College, BCC and Eaton Community College, now available for students to access.

The College newsletters provide regular commentary on the involvement of our students in co-curricular activities in the school and in the wider community with many students being selected to represent the State. This year, for the first time, we entered teams in the Tournament of the Minds competition, successfully competed in the Philoshthon, conducted chess competitions in school, entered students in a variety of mathematics, humanities and science competitions and activities, and have students invited to attend the Science Summer Schools, to name a few of the opportunities available for students. Our Arts students continue to display their work in various exhibitions and perform at school and in community events.

On the sports field our students have had interschool success in athletics, swimming and cross country, participated in the Marist basketball, netball and cricket carnivals, our younger students have participated in autumn and winter carnivals, and in many other interschool sporting competitions.

*Students in the Spotlight* and *Mercy on Show* were two wonderful events which provided parents with the opportunity to see the standard of the work of our students across many learning areas and a forum for the exhibition of visual arts works. I am very grateful to the many staff who organised these events, in particular, Ms Brenda Della Sale and Mrs Lisa Todesco.

It has been heartening to see our students participating in our Christian Service Learning program, undertaking thousands of hours of service in the community and in their generosity in raising over \$26 000 to support a range of charities. I am very grateful to Mrs Michelle Barrow and Mrs Janet Wilson for their coordination of these activities and their preparation of our liturgies and retreats conducted throughout the year. My thanks also to Fr Edwin and Fr Jay for their support and assistance, particularly in the liturgical life of the school and Bishop Holohan, Fr Tony Chiera and Fr Jess Navarro who have celebrated special school events with us this year.

Student leadership at BCC is a service to our school community with the Year 11 Peer Support Leaders and Year 9 Mercy campus students assisting the Year 7 and 8 students in their transition to secondary school, the Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion providing support in our liturgies, and the Council of Student Leaders, SRC and House Leaders demonstrating their leadership skills in the organisation of a wide variety of activities. I commend the students who have taken on leadership roles in the many activities in the College. I am appreciative of the contribution of all leaders, especially the Student Executive members, Bianca Carbone, Hayden Tognola, Phoebe Spice and Christian Zappia, for their tireless efforts in leading our students and in introducing new initiatives.

The College Board, under the leadership of Mr Peter Wheeler, has provided wonderful encouragement, support, financial

advice and action on the various projects which have been undertaken this year. This has been particularly important with our expansion, the extent of our capital development projects and the changes to Federal and State funding to schools. The financial management of the College by Mr Brent Steere, with oversight from the Board Finance committee, ensures that the College remains in a sound financial position.

The involvement of our parents, in all facets of school life, has added to the wonderful community spirit at Bunbury Catholic College. 2015 saw the establishment of the Mercy campus P&F, with both the Mercy and Marist campus P&F committees providing hospitality, friend-raising and fund-raising. I am grateful to the Presidents of our Mercy and Marist P & F, Mrs Jodi Schroder and Mr Ron Goldspink, the P & F Executives, the Art Extraordinaire committee, the Mercy fundraising committee and all of our parents for their efforts for the College. On behalf of our staff and students, my sincere thanks to our parents for their efforts in fundraising which has resulted in donations towards much needed resources for both campuses.

The College leadership structure was changed slightly this year to assist with our growing community. The leadership and enormous contribution of our Vice Principal, Mr Eugene de Lima, Mrs Leonie Ridgway (who officially retires at the end of this year at the conclusion of her LSL), Mrs Deborah Gorbult and Mr John O'Dea (Deputy Principals on the Marist campus), Mrs Gobnait May (Religious Education Coordinator), Mr Brent Steere (Bursar) and Mrs Viv McKenzie (the Mercy campus representative) have ensured that we have been able to manage the enormous changes in the College this year. I am very appreciative of their generous support and cheerful undertaking of all facets of leadership.

As we conclude the 2015 school year I extend my thanks and best wishes to staff members who are leaving the College or taking a period of leave in 2016. In particular, I wish to thank Mrs Annabel Kanakis and Mr Rod Slater who have concluded their contracts as Heads of Learning



and will be taking leave next year. They have both led their teams for the last 11 years, have been instrumental in managing the significant curriculum changes that have occurred in that time, ensured that our students have had opportunities to excel in their courses and have assisted in the plans for the Mercy campus.

We also say farewell to Mrs Kathleen Hogan who has served the BCC community as Director of Library Services for the past 24 years, overseeing the changes that have been taking place in this area and ensuring that our students and staff are well resourced. In addition, she has been a most efficient administrator and has assisted in the planning of the Learning Commons on both the Marist and the Mercy campuses making these facilities up-to-date, welcoming learning spaces. Above all, Mrs Hogan will be remembered at the College for her deep concern for students and staff and her willingness to reach out and help anyone at any time. We wish her well in her retirement.

# OUR SCHOOL

A new Campus and Year 7 join us for the first time .





## BOARD REPORT

The planning and preparation over the last three years culminated in the College year opening with an additional 400 students as we commenced operation on the Mercy campus in Australind and welcomed Year 7 students into the College for the first time. This was an enormous undertaking for the Board, the College Executive and the staff and it is a credit to all involved that we were able to commence the school year successfully.

With 1100 students on the Marist campus, we were able to avoid overcrowding by reducing our Year 7 and 8 intake to five streams for the next few years. The opening of the Champagne Learning Commons has provided a wonderful new facility to accommodate our Year 12 classes and a bright 'library' space of learning for all students. Bishop Gerard Holohan blessed and officially opened the centre which has proven to be a wonderful additional learning space.

While the commencement of the school year on the Mercy campus was precarious with sections of the building program incomplete, the students and parents were able to attend an orientation and tour of the completed facilities prior to the first day of school. The 296 foundation students commenced on Monday 2 February with access to the Catherine McAuley Centre, the Technology and Enterprise Building and half of the Ursula Frayne Learning Commons. As the term progressed the students were soon enjoying all of the facilities on the campus and over the year we were able to provide additional facilities. The students have access to state of the art technology and enterprise rooms, outfitted with quality machinery and equipment; a commercial kitchen; art, music, dance and drama facilities, science laboratories; a learning commons; classrooms; the latest in classroom information technology systems and support services; a café; courts and playing fields.

The capital development committee has continued to work on the planning of Stage 2 on the Mercy campus, as the larger than expected enrolment applications has required bringing

this stage forward by a year. The plans for the new classroom block which will accommodate the future Year 7 and 8 students and the Science building were finalized and the project put out to tender with work to commence in January 2016 and to be finished and ready for occupancy for the 2017 school year.

Towards the end of the year the College commenced the development of our next strategic plan with the assistance of an external facilitator. Staff, parents, students and Board members were involved in the consultation process, with the plan to be finalized in 2016.

The ability of the College to successfully undertake the growth into the future can be attributed to the dedication and commitment of the College leaders and the administration, teaching and support staff. The Board is extremely appreciative of their efforts on behalf of our students in providing quality care and education while taking on the additional challenge that comes with our expansion. Throughout the year our Principal, Ms Denise O'Meara underwent her Principal Review Process and was reappointed as our Principal for a third contract period for a further four years following her endorsement from Bishop Gerard Holohan. Denise epitomizes the college values and ethos and her dedication and commitment is second to none, we are truly privileged to have a leader of her qualities and skills at the helm of our college. On behalf of the Board I would also like to pass on our appreciation to Mr Brent Steere for his ongoing management of the college's finances.

I would once again like to thank the P&F committees on both campuses. The efforts of the inaugural committee on the Mercy campus is to be commended for their hard work in community building and fund raising. Art Extraordinaire on the Marist campus was again a tremendous success as a social event in the Bunbury community and in raising funds to contribute resources for our students.



## PARENTS AND FRIENDS

A historical year comes to a close with the opening of the Mercy campus and the formation of its own P&F committee. The Marist P&F approved a \$10,000 starting float to assist the new P&F in its first year of operation.

Our year started with the annual Sundowner for Year 7 parents. Art Extraordinaire has been the major fundraiser and this year marked its 35th anniversary. Door sales were up 17 percent over last year and it is still a solid contributor to P&F funds. The committee and volunteers should be thanked and congratulated for their efforts. Thanks in particular to outgoing Chair, Peter Kerr, who has done an outstanding job over the last 5 years.

The secondhand book sales continue to be a successful revenue raiser and this wouldn't be possible without the efforts of Marlene Leemeyer who coordinates the sales.

Financial support was also provided for the Marist netball, cricket and basketball teams and Student's in the Spotlight exhibition. 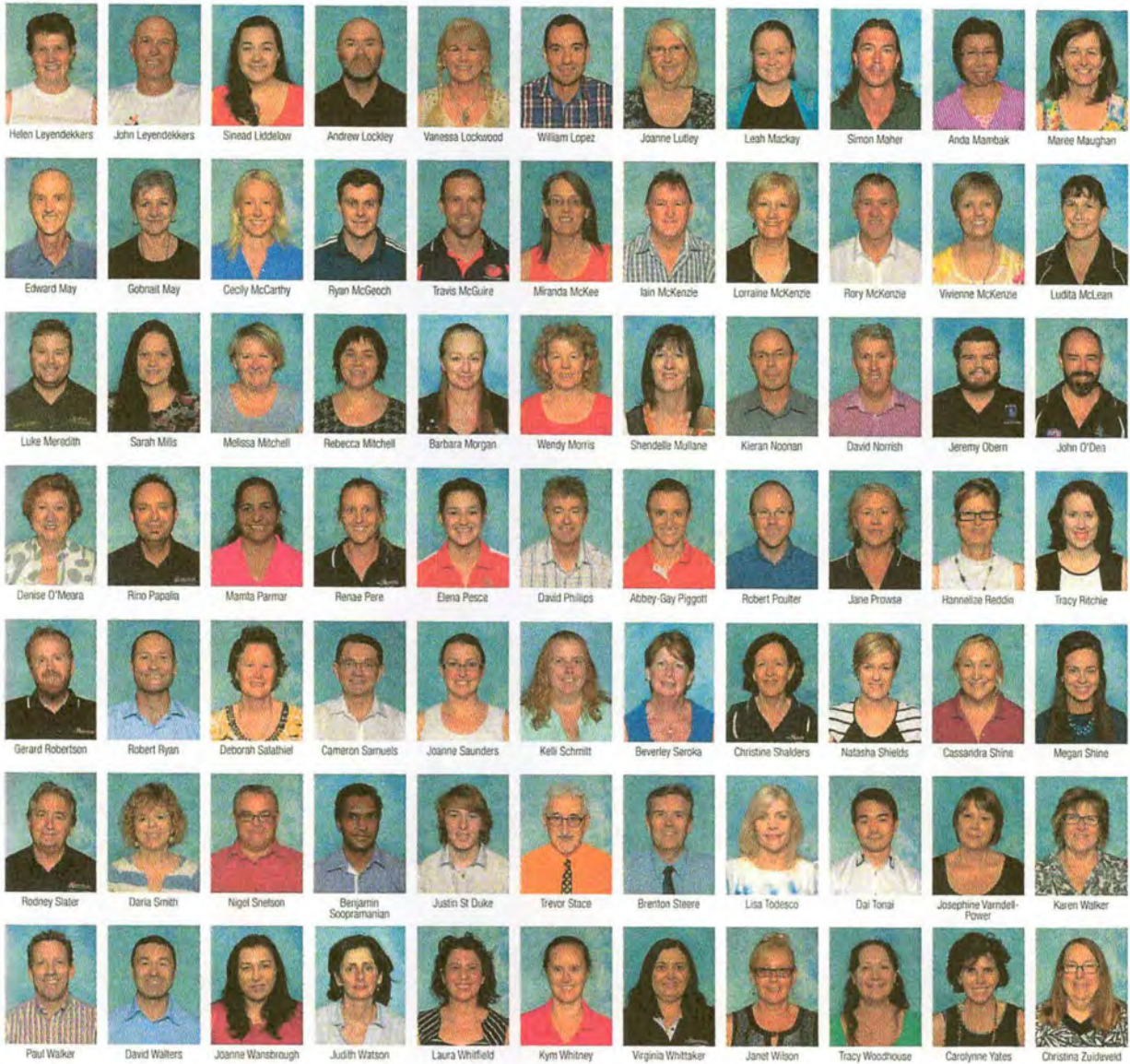

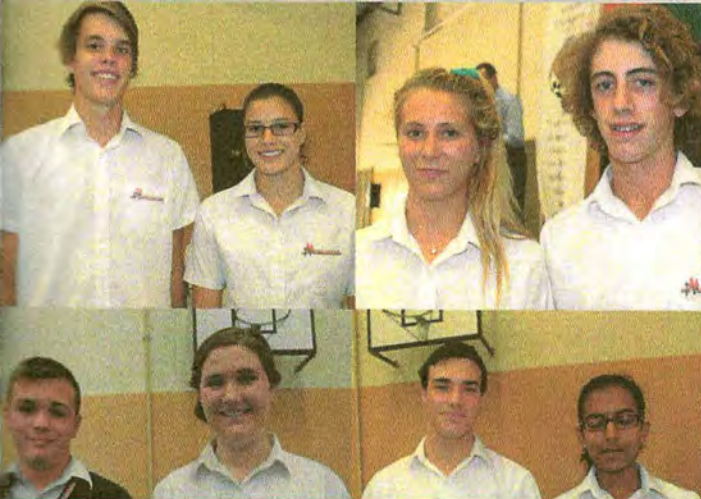

# MINISTRY





## FAITH, LIFE, CULTURE

Speaking recently at Bunbury Catholic College, Bishop Gerard Holohan summed up the mission of the Catholic school as existing to ensure that students left at the end of their time at the school with "a personal relationship with Jesus". This is the basis for the central position that Religious Education, both academic and experiential, occupies at all Catholic schools and was a vital and fundamental part of our deliberations about the identity of Bunbury Catholic College as we contemplated the setting up of a two-campus school. At Bunbury Catholic College Marist and Mercy campuses Religious Education (be that through RE classes, Ministry events, expressions of service to others or to Creation, or the everyday interaction between staff and students) seeks to make known to students the miracle of Jesus' intervention in our lives.

Mrs Michelle Barrow took on the role of co-ordinating the Campus Ministry at the College this year. Michelle brings to that role a comprehensive knowledge of Catholic beliefs, teachings and practices as well as her enthusiasm and creativity. All of this has ensured that in 2015 student and staff participation in liturgies and prayer events, in service to others and in retreats enhanced our understanding of, and commitment to our Catholic Faith. The Year Twelve final Mass held in the College Chapel highlighted how wonderfully those students reflected the Catholicity of their school. In a venue that barely contained their numbers they were inclusive of each other, joyful in their participation in the Mass, reverent towards the sacred space, grateful for all the blessings they had received and hopeful for the future. Similarly, the creation of a meditation garden by the departing Year Twelve students, spoke of those students' love for God, His creation and their Catholic school.

We are very grateful to the priests of the parish and to Bishop Holohan for their support and generous help in the provision of experiences of religious liturgies, retreats and rituals. We acknowledge their busy lives and we are in awe of their generosity of spirit.

The delivery of the academic aspect of Religious Education was quite complex in 2015. Firstly there were practical matters concerned with working across two campuses. Religious Education staff in Years Seven, Eight and Nine worked in teams to ensure that the same standard of education, as well as comparable assessment of student achievement occurred on each campus. This sometimes involved grappling with technology, traveling to meetings and copious emailing. Mostly, however, it involved generous, diligent, committed staff who worked cheerfully to ensure that students got all the support and help they needed for furthering their knowledge and understanding.

Secondly, for the first time Bunbury Catholic College welcomed Year Seven students. This meant that staff were required to become acquainted with the Year Seven Arch-diocesan Religious Education Course, adapt to pedagogy suitable for a younger cohort, practice assessing at the levels proper to Year Seven students – while all the time ensuring that those students felt welcomed into a Secondary Education institution. We were blessed by the fact that the Year Seven students who came to us in 2015 were wonderfully cheerful and friendly, but thanks must go to the Year Seven Religious Education teachers who worked indefatigably to ensure that their RE experience was a productive and enjoyable one.

2015 also saw the introduction of the new Courses of Study. These were rolled out in Year Eleven, with some students choosing to study Religion and Life GENERAL Units 1 and 2, and other students choosing to study Religion and Life ATAR. Staff worked tirelessly and cheerfully to write new programmes, develop new assessment items, find suitable resources and collaborate to ensure comparability in assessing within the guidelines of the new Courses of Study. One example of staff commitment, was the creation, by Ms Josephine Hulcheson and Mr Kieran Noonan of an excursion to New Norcia to immerse the ATAR students in Catholic concepts related to pilgrimage, religious order lifestyles, and service to those in need. This was a wonderful experience for the students, who showed their



gratitude for the opportunity by sharing what they had learned with those who were not able to attend.

In 2016, Year Twelve students will study Religion and Life GENERAL and ATAR units 3 and 4. BCC will also introduce a Religion and Life Preliminary course for students with specific learning difficulties. We would like to thank Sister Christine Clarke for her support and practical help in the introduction of these new courses as well as for delivery of very beneficial in-service opportunities for staff.

At Bunbury Catholic College we are blessed with wonderfully supportive parents as we continue to fulfil our role as co-educators (with parents and the Church) by providing students with opportunities to learn about Catholic culture, morality, Christian Service, and all that Catholics consider sacred. It has been a pleasure and a privilege to work with parents and their sons and daughters in 2015 and we look forward to continuing to do so next year.

As we move into the Catholic Church's jubilee year focusing on the mercifulness of God, we would like to wish the students of the College and their parents an inspiring and peaceful Christmas season and a relaxing summer break.

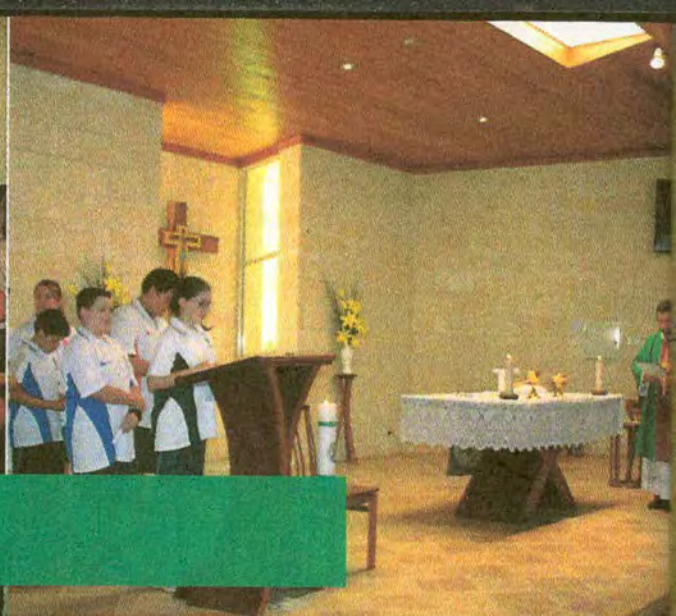

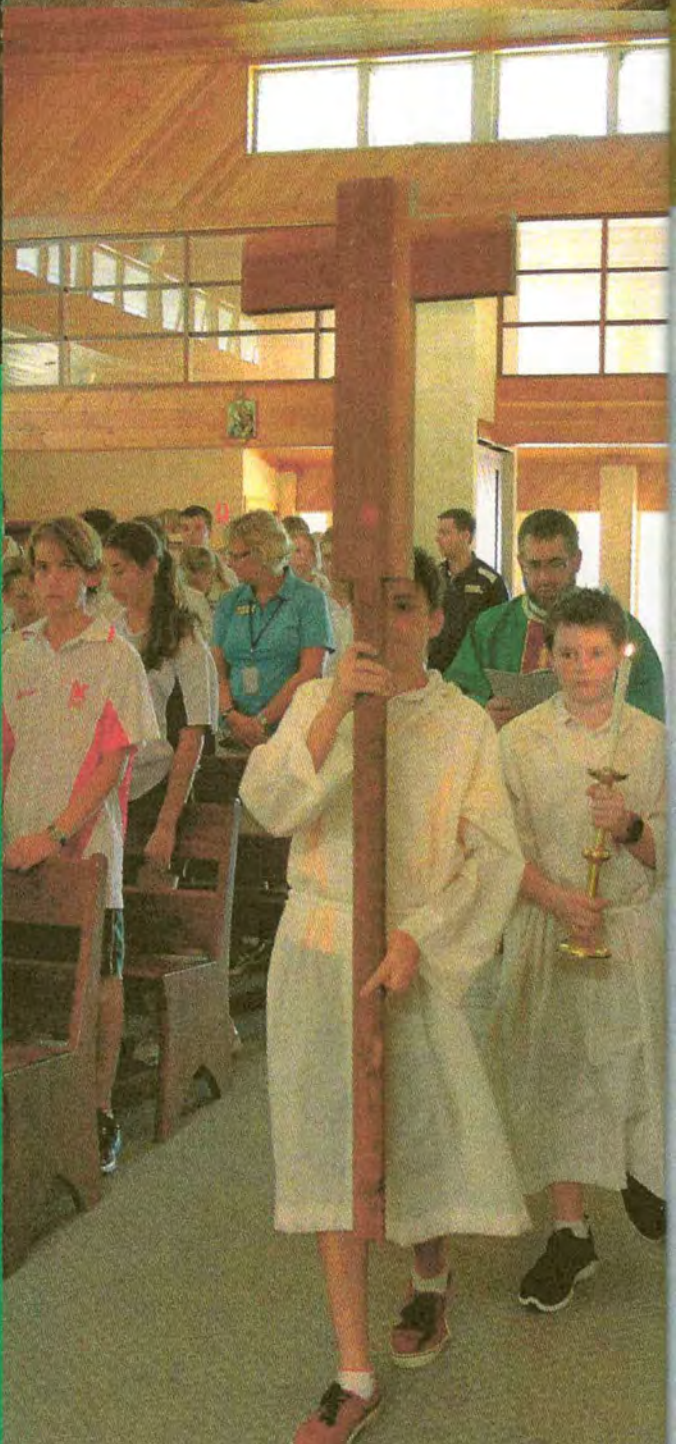

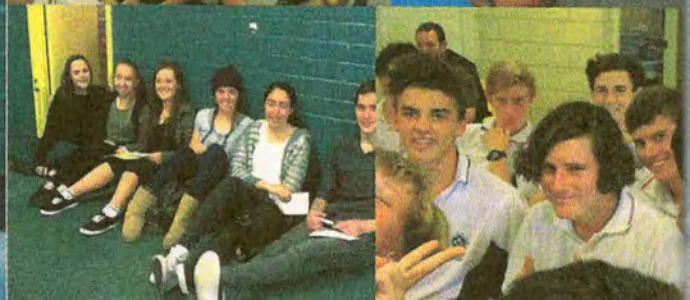

# NEW NORCIA PILGRIMAGE

It was with great excitement that we set off for Perth and New Norcia in Week 6 of Term Four with ten ATAR Year 11 Religion and Life students. Earlier in the course, we had researched the life and times of the trailblazing Benedictine monk Dom Rosendo Salvado as an 'important person in the history of a religion in Australia' who arrived in Western Australia in January of 1846 after devoting his life to the 'missions among native peoples'.

A tour of Saint Mary's Cathedral in Perth was the obvious starting point for our pilgrimage. We were met by a very knowledgeable volunteer tour guide who showed us the original cathedral in the city where Salvado would have celebrated Mass in the early days of the Swan River colony, buildings that the Benedictine monks built for the Bishop as well as a bell brought to Perth by Salvado in 1853 which hangs outside the cathedral.

We then headed north to New Norcia where we settled in to the Old Convent and Abbot John Herbert gave us an insightful and honest lecture into what it meant to be living the vocation of a Benedictine monk in 2015 in Western Australia. He welcomed us warmly and was very insightful, honest and open.

Over the next three days the group participated fully in the prayer life of the community, with daily Mass and eventually singing in Latin with the monks and one day even attending all seven prayers, starting at 5am. The group of students was very impressed with themselves after attending all seven prayers including Mass. After the last prayer of the day (Compline) at 8:30pm, one of the monks congratulated them and then challenged them to do the same thing for the next 365 days!

The visit to New Norcia enabled the students to get a very good insight into the vocation of the monks, but the thing that most surprised the students was to discover that the monks were all very individual and had different talents and skills.

The Heritage Town tour with Dom Chris Saunders took us into the building in the community and on a journey through the years since Salvado and Serra began their mission with the local indigenous tribe at New Norcia in the mid 1840's.

Christian Service Learning in the orchard with Dom Brian where we learnt about permaculture, discussed Pope Francis' latest encyclical Laudato Si and the Synod on the Family while we mulched citrus trees and built gardens and planted a summer crop of watermelons, corn and tomatoes for the community to

enjoy long after we had headed back to Bunbury. The day finished with some brave students making a late night visit to the cemetery.

The next day saw us participating in an Aboriginal art workshop, lool making and shelter building plus a visit to the Museum and Art Gallery where we were able to further appreciate the myriad of hardships faced by the European settlers to this area of the state and the vital relationships made between Salvado and the local tribe. 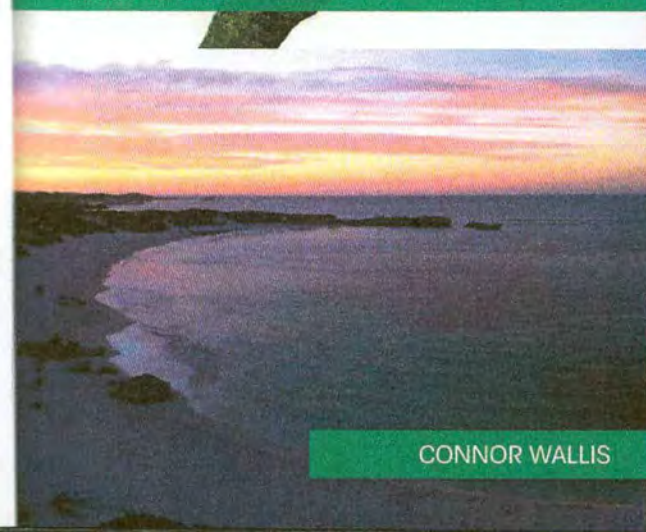

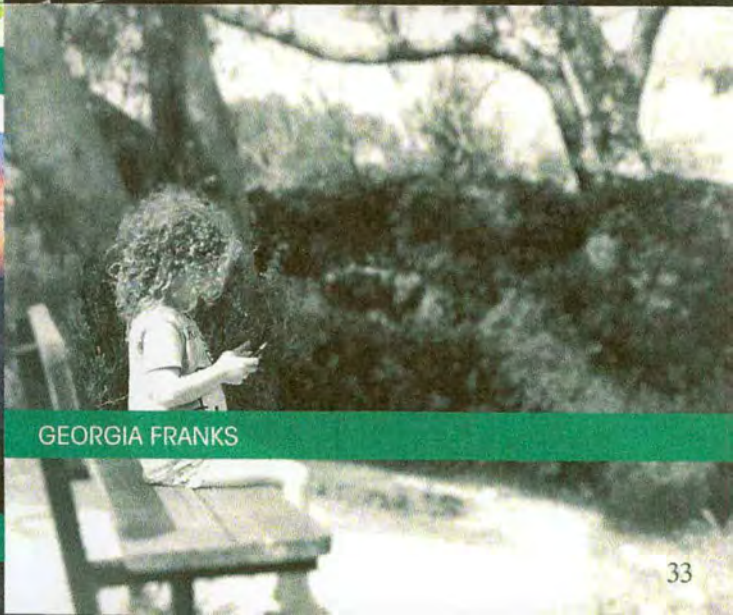

## THE ARTS - VISUAL

### YEAR 7

All Year 7 classes were introduced to the printmaking discipline this year. Marist campus students produced some articulate self portraits in lino cut. At the Mercy campus each class was inspired by a different theme including; Australian flora and fauna, sea creatures and African Animals.

### YEAR 8

Ceramics was the chosen medium for Year 8 classes. Marist focused on "Personality Poles" based on traditional Totem Poles from various cultures. Mr Andy Lockley's class looked at the ceramic work of artist Helena Miciajewa to create wonderfully textured mobiles.

Students of the Mercy Campus designed and created incredible ceramic dragons inspired by those from Europe and China, expertly demonstrated by Mrs Lisa Todesco.

### YEAR 9

Year 9 students completed their pencil cases, Mrs Lee-Anne Abdo's class created large, colourful, papier mache dogs. The class studied contemporary Australian Artist Mai Long for inspiration and decorated their sculptures in intense colours, patterns and imagery of protective aspects of the students' environments.

In Semester 2 students had the honour of creating the 2016 BCC Birthday Card. Students also focused on silk screen printing techniques. The Year 9 Marist Craft class worked with clay to create either a ceramic bookend or an indoor pot plant holder.

### YEAR 10

Students have been learning the Year 11 & 12 process of a visual diary and using the technique of photomontage which was developed into a mixed media painting.

Students completed wire and plaster sculptures using a stylised human figure and other forms of symbolism to represent their "Fears and Dreams". We finished the course with a quick stencil graffiti project.

The three period Year 10 Art class created clay sculptures of a pair of small animals. They looked at the work of various sculptors, including WA artist Abdul Rahman Abdullah. The class decorated their ceramic pieces with underglaze and glaze. In second semester these students explored paint, with an emphasis on watercolours.

### YEAR 11 & 12

2015 has been an exciting, challenging but rewarding year for our upper school students. Year 12 Certificate III and Stage 3 WACE Visual Art students completed major productions in the printmaking, ceramic and sculpture disciplines. Their themes focused on making comment on the world around them in Semester 1 and viewing their concept from another perspective in Semester 2. Year 11 students created mixed media paintings that looked at the symbolism of animal/human hybrids. ATAR Visual Art students' second Production was informed by the theme "Identities". The Year 11 Certificate III Visual Art students also completed a Community Art Project to create three textile banners for the Mercy Campus.



Amidst the hustle and bustle of these Visual Art courses, students were fortunate to experience, explore and be inspired by local artists through Gallery exhibits and artist workshops. Our Year 11 & 12 students explored exciting and innovative painting techniques from locally renowned professional artist Jenni Doherty. In Term Two we welcomed local textile artist and lecturer Kirstie Hahn. Kirstie engaged students in several textile techniques where they were left with a wealth of ideas for their current textile productions.

The Year 12 Art Camp to Rollnest, several excursions to the Bunbury Regional Art Galleries, Sculpture by the Sea, the Art Gallery of WA, the Year 12 Perspectives exhibition and Life Drawing workshop are some of the other fantastic opportunities on offer for our Upper school students to empower them to excel in their art practice.

### METAMORPHOSIS AND ANGELICO EXHIBITION 2015

Metamorphosis is an art and design exhibition for senior secondary students presented by the Central Institute of Technology in Perth. This year works from two of our Certificate II Visual Art & Stage 3 WACE students were selected for this prestigious exhibition. Year 12 student Rebecca Allan entered her 3D mixed media work, "Love, No Labels" and fellow student Billy Elson entered his Year 11 textile piece "Clouded Mind". Congratulations is to be extended to Billy for taking out the 3D Art Award.

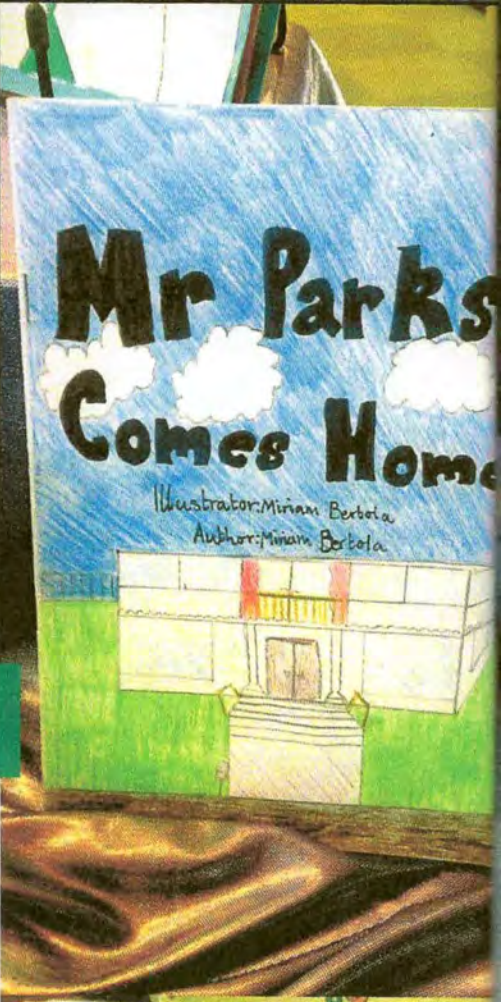
### ILUKA VISIONS EXHIBITION 2015

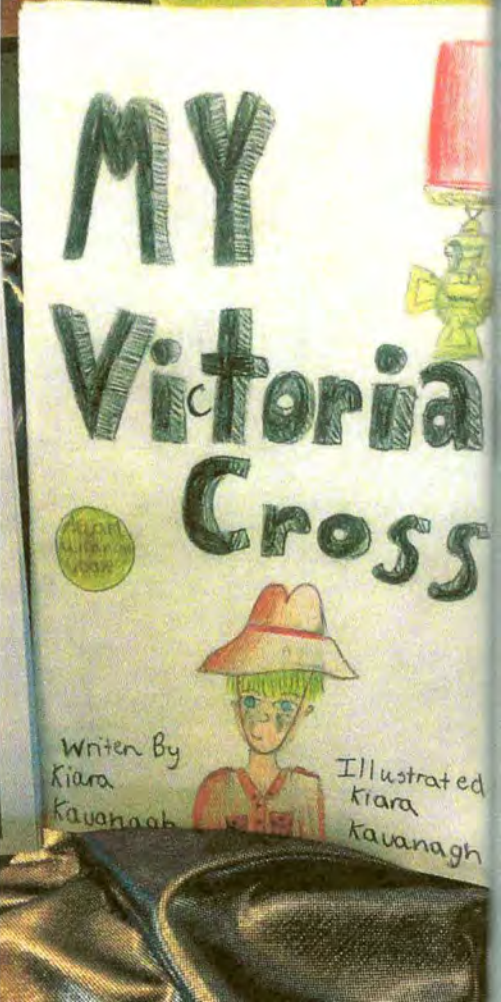

### THE TALENTED YOUNG WRITERS' PROGRAM

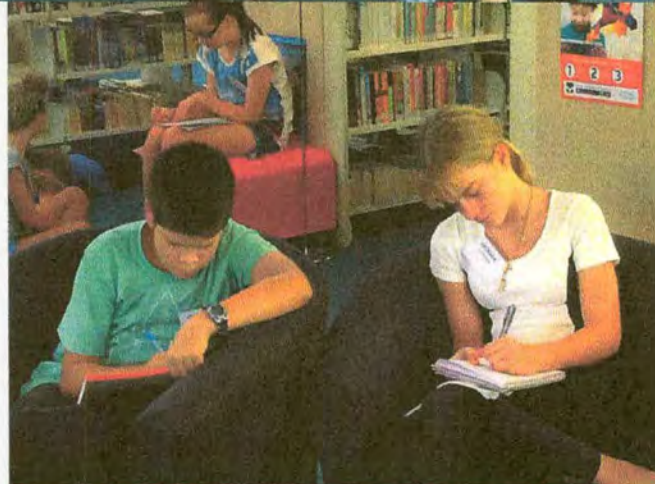

# HUMANITIES

## HANDS ON HISTORY DIG 2015

The past came to life when Year 7 Humanities students participated in a unique interactive activity undertaken as part of the History unit which they are currently completing.

Students learnt about the work of Archaeologists and Historians by creating their own archaeological site, which they then excavated and analysed, producing a report of their findings.

Students had a lot of fun collecting their own artefacts, creating their 'site', and working as part of a team to 'dig up' and 'discover' the artefacts.

There were quite a few surprises with the changes which occurred in some of the artefacts creating a great deal of excitement with students producing a written report of their observations.

Studying the climate and its impacts on the natural and human environments has allowed us to further develop our understanding of how climatic conditions have been effecting our planet. We also explored how humans have and continue to affect the climate in a negative way. We went on an excursion around the Greater Bunbury Region to discover if Bunbury is ready for Climate Change. # INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

2015 has been a year full of challenges in Information Technology. The opening of the Mercy campus has presented some technical hurdles to overcome in order to provide access to resources and communication to staff and students between the two campuses. In addition to this our new Year 7 and 8 students were supplied with their devices and have been coming to grips with the use of and care of their classroom technology.

This year saw the introduction of Microsoft Surface devices for the current round of retired devices and for new students. With high resolution displays and excellent digital drawing support, these devices have opened up new possibilities for creation of content and interaction with learning resources.

With the inevitable shift to online teaching and assessment, the Bishops' Religious Literacy Assessment was completed by our Year 9 students as well as OLNA testing again being carried out by our Year 10 students as part of their progress towards graduation. We have seen several new online and hybrid resources being made available to students in many subject areas.

The exciting aspect of Information Technology is how it evolves, transforming our practice and presenting endless new opportunities for teaching and learning for both students and staff. The challenging part is making sure it all works when we need it.

The Help Desk staff at both campuses have been kept busy by the increase in students and devices (now almost at 1400 as well as those provided to staff) as well as the additional demands from shifting to wireless projection in classrooms which, while providing for added flexibility of delivery and unchaining teacher devices from the desk, also provide their own set of challenges for testing and support. Our thanks go out to Matthew Fitzgerald and Kieran Blaney Murphy at Mercy, and Barney Arvidson, Jarrod Emmott, Mitchell Jenkins and Justin St. Duke at Marist, with Greg Everitt overseeing both campuses and IT policy.

ASDAN programmes, which are targeted for our Learning Centre students, have also grown in number and popularity this year. Some of the programmes involved are Independent Living

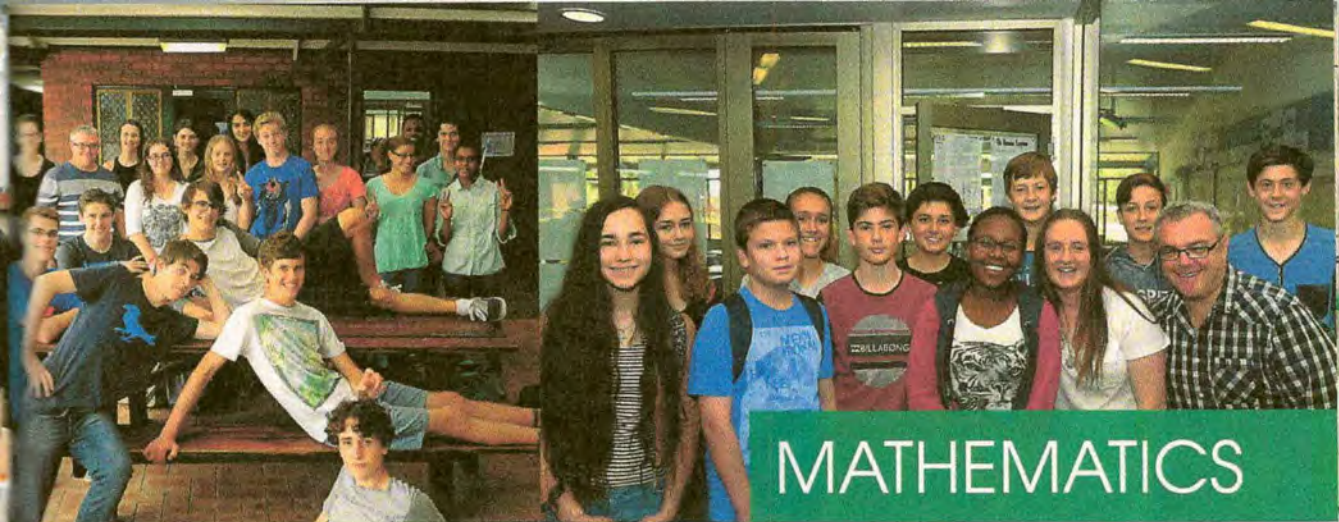
Skills, Work Right, Performing Arts and Business Enterprise. These programmes are also targeted to help our students transition into life after school.

## SCIENCE

It has been an extremely busy year in the department as we introduced the new WACE courses to Year 11, and we welcomed Year 7 into the college. The opening of the new Mercy campus and temporary Science Laboratories was challenging, but successful. We welcomed four new staff members to our department; Anda Mambak, Trudy Goff, Ben Soopramanian and Paul Walker. We have purchased many additional resources for the Mercy campus Science Department and the walls of the labs are full of colourful and informative posters. We have so many resources there that Ms Schmitt finds it difficult to find places to store them!

Apart from the many new undertakings, 2015 saw many activities and events undertaken by the students and staff. Some Year 10 students attended the "Get into Mining" workshops in Perth, organised by the Resources Industry to stimulate their interest in Earth and Environmental Science and other important fields of Science. There was also the annual Year 11 Biology excursion to the Perth Zoo where students studied animal adaptations to the Australian environment. The Year 11 AIAR Chemistry classes went to Murdoch University with Mr Fewster and Mrs DeCoppi to attend the 'Be a Metallurgist for a day' in June. They visited university laboratories and used state-of-the-art equipment for separating important metals from rocks and minerals. Once again, students were able to apply their knowledge by "doing" science, using equipment, ores and chemicals that are not available to them in a school laboratory.

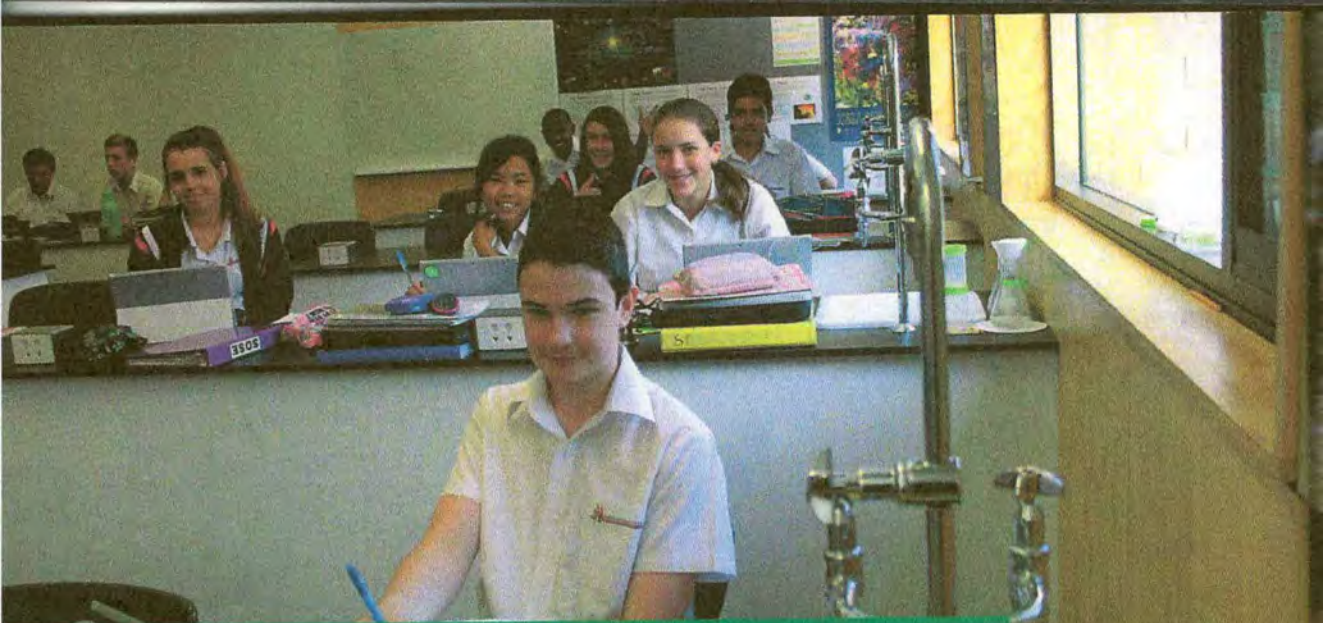
In August over two days, Mr Hegney, Miss Saunders, Mrs Brown and Mrs Kanakis took the Biology 3A/3B and Human Biology 3A/3B students to the Harry Perkins Institute of Medical Research in Perth to learn about the applications of biotechnology and to learn first hand about a number of important laboratory techniques for the analysis of DNA. They conducted a

hands-on laboratory investigation using these techniques to identify genetic mutations associated with cancer caused by melanoma, and analysed data generated from their investigation. The techniques they used are applicable across a wide range of forensic applications, including conservation biology. Each day provided a unique opportunity for students to cement their in-class learning by applying their knowledge in a real-life laboratory activity. They were exposed to real scientists and learned about careers in this vital and recent area of technology.

Year 11 AIAR Physics classes went on a day trip to Adventure World in July, where they learnt about various Physics principles, such as potential and kinetic energy, friction, gravity and acceleration by going on rides like the terrifying Abyss! They were very grateful to Mrs Zuidveld for organizing this fantastic and fun learning experience.

Mrs Morris and her pre-service teacher, Dr Kelly Usher, have led the way in Earth and Environmental Science, taking both the Year 11 and 12 classes on several excursions and camps so that they could truly appreciate their subject matter outside the classroom. Experiencing the geology of WA, mining, metallurgy and environmental science hands on is essential to the students having a truly deep understanding and interest in the course.

Year 11 students, Emma Waller and Sophie Taylor, were selected to attend the 2014 Women in Resources Awards breakfast at the Perth Convention Centre as part of the CME Inspiring Girls Initiative. The Year 7 students have been growing crystals in Earth and Space Science and the Year 8 students experienced real biology first hand when they dissected sheep hearts and lungs. Both campuses have been treated to geology incursions where they were shown how to identify different types of rocks and minerals, and they experienced the wonders of frozen carbon dioxide! Year 9 students made fantastic models of tectonic plates between continents and ocean ridges, some of which were interactive and displayed in Students in the Spotlight.



# SCIENCE

Year 10 students at Marist attended an incursion provided by Murdoch University, where they became Metallurgists for an hour and separated minerals, electroplating the solutions to produce pure copper. They were then treated to the thermomite reaction which is spectacular, both in terms of the heat and light energy produced.

During Science Week, Ms Langley took eight students to The Science Café, a morning tea hosted by WA scientists and engineers from CSIRO, Engineers Australia, the WA Museum, the state's universities and various industry bodies. This presents opportunities to aspiring young scientists to see the wide range of science careers and to communicate with leading members of the scientific community. A highlight was meeting Dr Derek Muller-creator of YouTube channel Veritasium ('The Element of Truth'), and presenter of the recent SBS documentary 'Uranium: Twisting The Dragon's Tale'.

Several students, under the supervision of Mrs Morris, sat the ILS Olympiad Exam in August. Gabriel Grzelka (Yr 11), Dane Vincent (Yr 12) and Joshua White (Yr 11) each achieved a High Distinction. Gabriel and Joshua have been invited to attend the Australian Science Olympiad Summer School held at the Australian National University in Canberra in January.

In August, Year 9 Mercy students together with Mr Paul Walker visited St Anne's School, Harvey to participate in the Carbon Kids workshop. The workshop, organised by SciTech, was aimed at students teaching each other in practical and meaningful ways.

Another highlight for this year was organised by Mrs Morris for forty enthusiastic Year 10 science students who were given the opportunity to try a number of different science activities at ECU in Joondalup. LabRats is a community engagement initiative for Years 10 and 11 secondary school students conducted at ECU's Joondalup Campus.

During the year they ran a Waste Wise Week in which they performed a waste audit to identify how we can cut down on our waste. They also organised an Animal Action Week and Emergency Wildlife Rescue Bunbury visited the campus and brought in some special friends, speaking about the work they do to rescue our native animals. The students enjoyed cuddles with George the crush tail possum, Sadie the joey and the other animals. Before we embarked on the mammoth task of completing our projects, we conducted research into aspects of furniture manufacture such as joining techniques, adhesive strength and timber finishes.

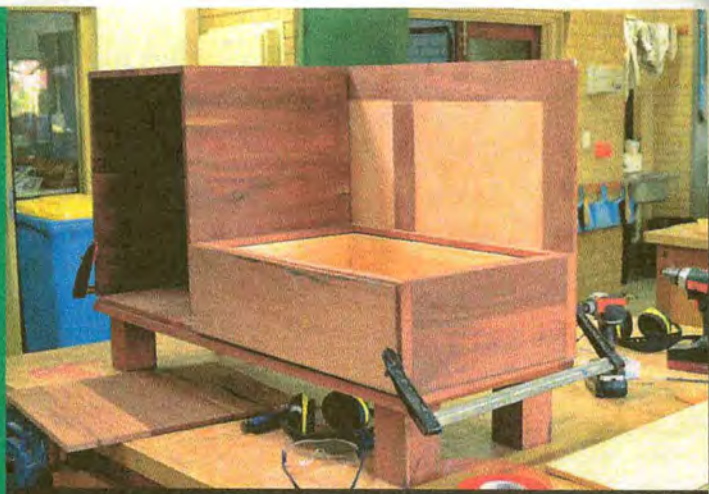

## OFF CAMPUS LEARNING

Groups of students from Collie High, Donnybrook High, Bunbury Catholic College Mercy Campus, Dalryellup College, SEDA and Hope Christian College attended the Expo, and most local schools were represented through individual parent and student visits. A large number of the general public also attended the Expo, with a significant increase in the number of mature age people looking for career direction.

## YEAR 10 CAREERS AND WORK EXPOSURE WEEK

This gave our Year 10 students an insight into what the work place entails and they gained experience in areas that may challenge them. By completing work books and attending a work place for a period of one week, the students have gained knowledge of Basic Communication Skills, Preparing for work in the Community Sector and Participating in Work Health and Safety Practices.

All Year 10 students participated in one week's work exposure within many diverse industries and varied locations. Most of our students secured places to work with local businesses from family/friends/contacts, many looking at their possible career path. Some students were able to be placed and participate in activities with the West Coast Eagles Football Club, Southwest Crime Prevention, Radio West/Hot FM and a Squadron 10th Light Horse Battalion. Others jetted off to places like The Alfred Hospital in Victoria.

Students completed a log book recording their major tasks/ observations and hours. The employer also completed an assessment giving students feedback on their week of work. This will become a valuable resource for their portfolio and resume.

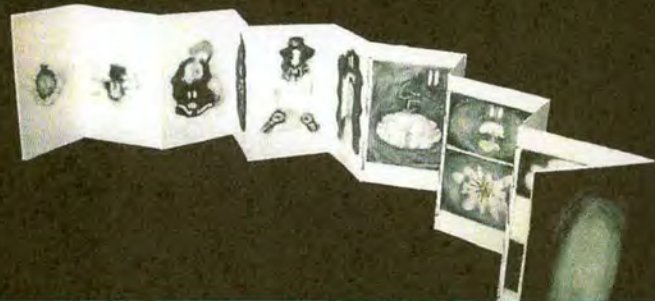

## WORK READY

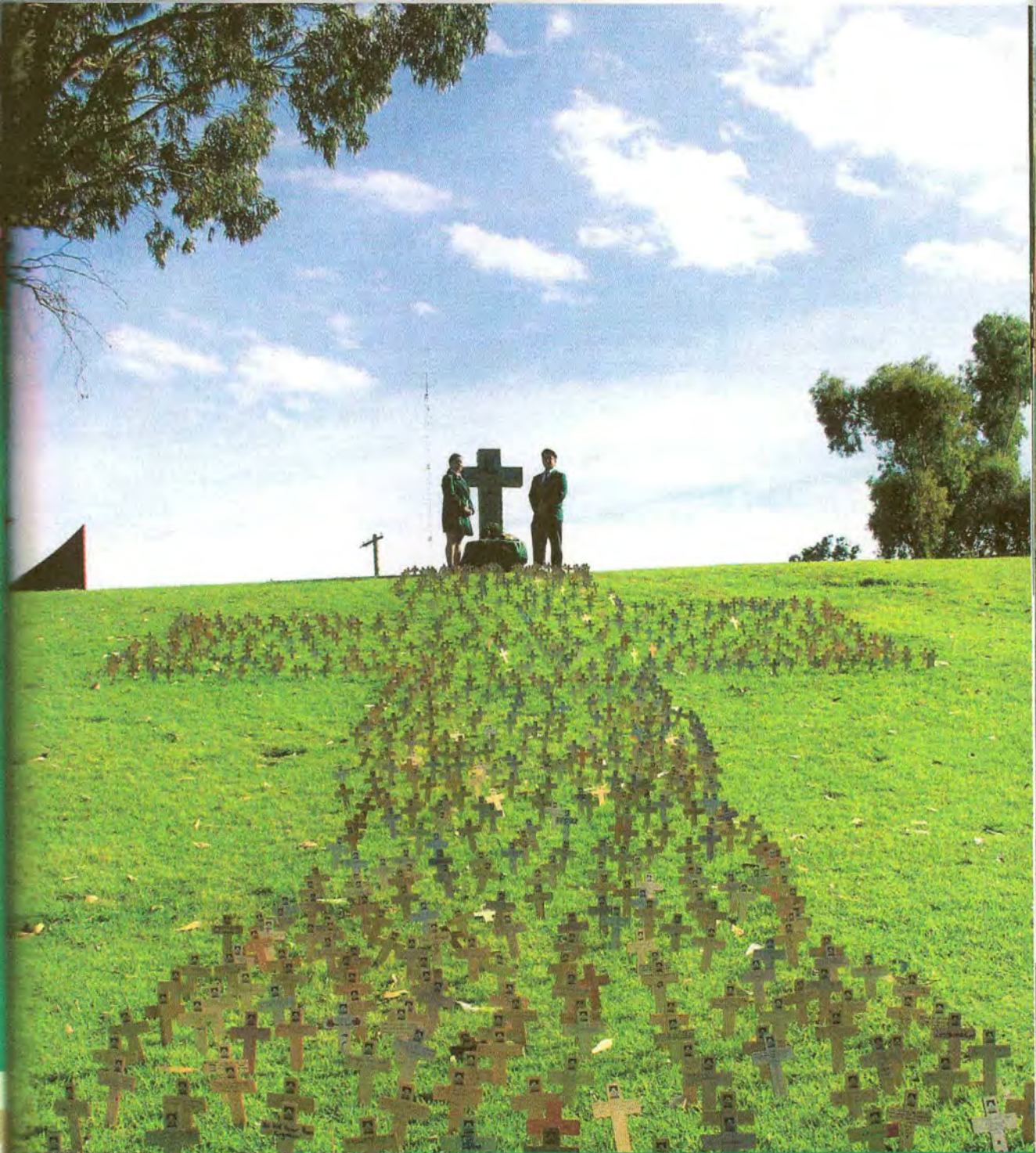

# ANZAC DAY CENTENARY

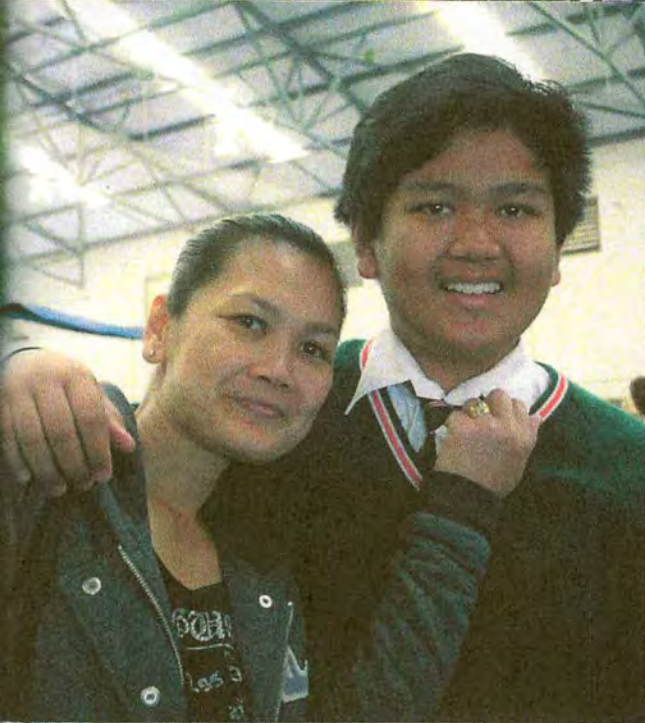


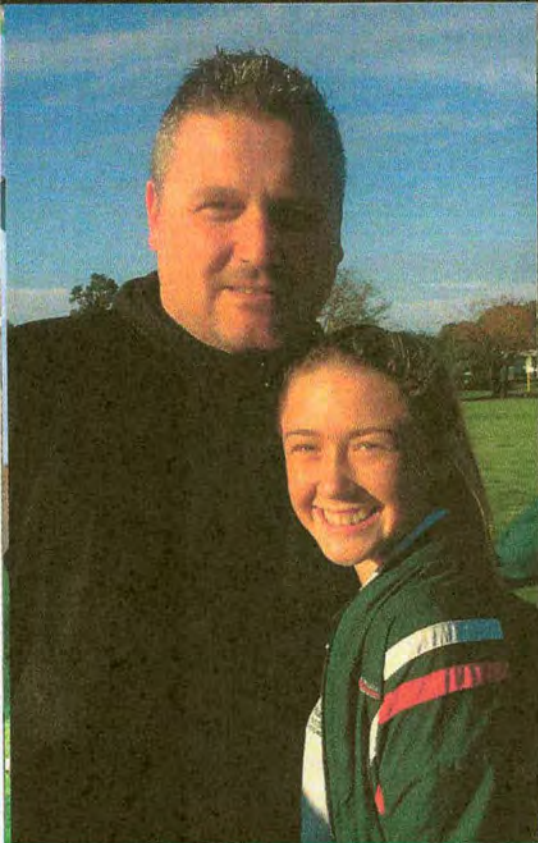
The ANZAC Day Centenary was marked with a special service, followed by the placement of a small wooden cross by each student. At the Marist Campus the crosses formed the shape of a cross on the Albert Oval bank. At the Mercy Campus, each cross was placed on the raised grass area and these provided a fitting and a moving reminder of the lives which have been lost in armed conflicts over the years. Students had previously written personalised messages on these crosses. The concept for this project originated in late 2010, when a group of individuals based in Australia and Britain sought to pay their respects to those who had died while on active service, by placing a small wooden cross on war graves across the former Western Front battlefields of Belgium and France.

The Australian War Memorial arranged for these crosses to be laid on war graves and memorials where Australian servicemen and women are buried in countries such as Turkey, France, Belgium, Malaysia, Singapore, Greece, South Africa and the Middle East.

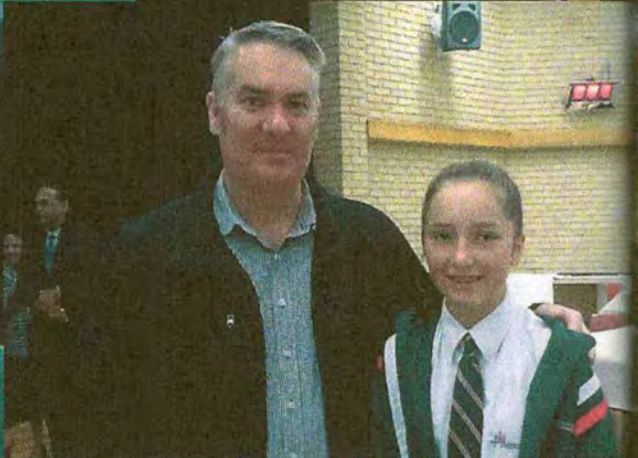


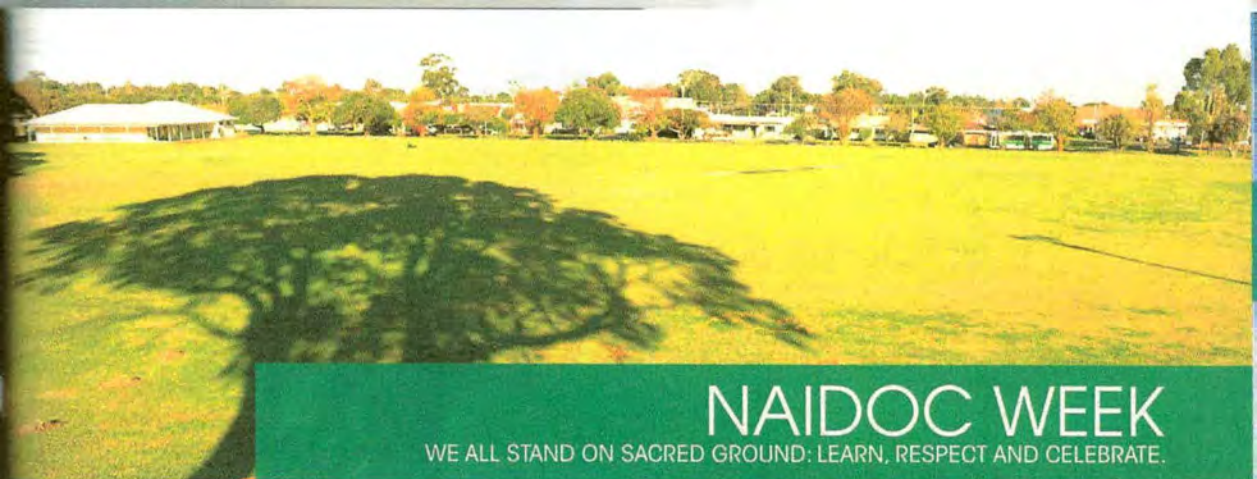

# TOUR TO ITALY

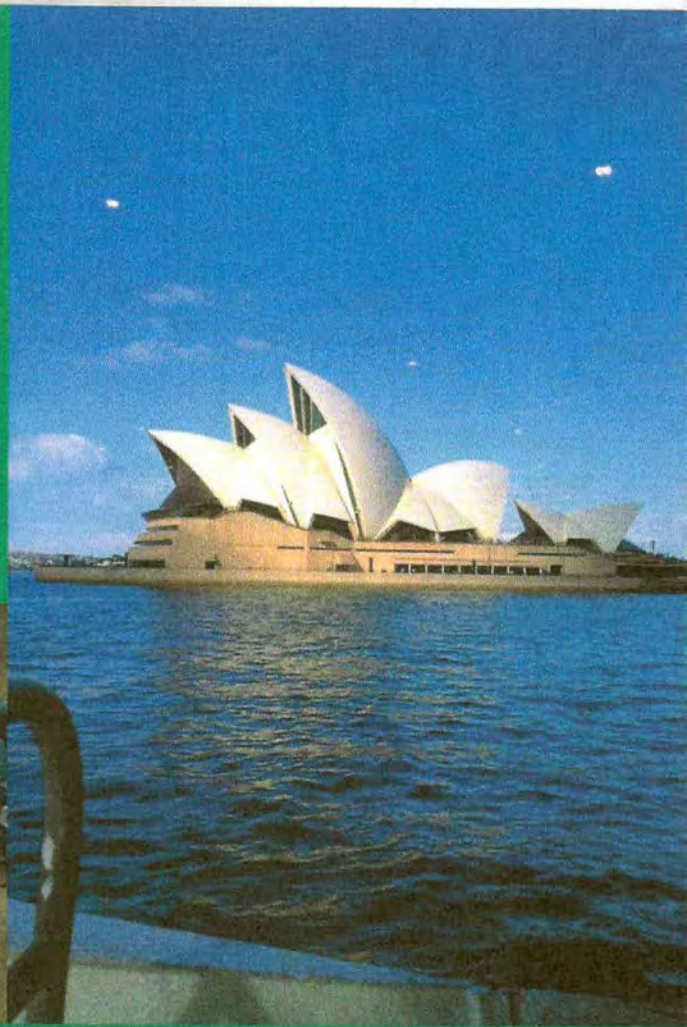

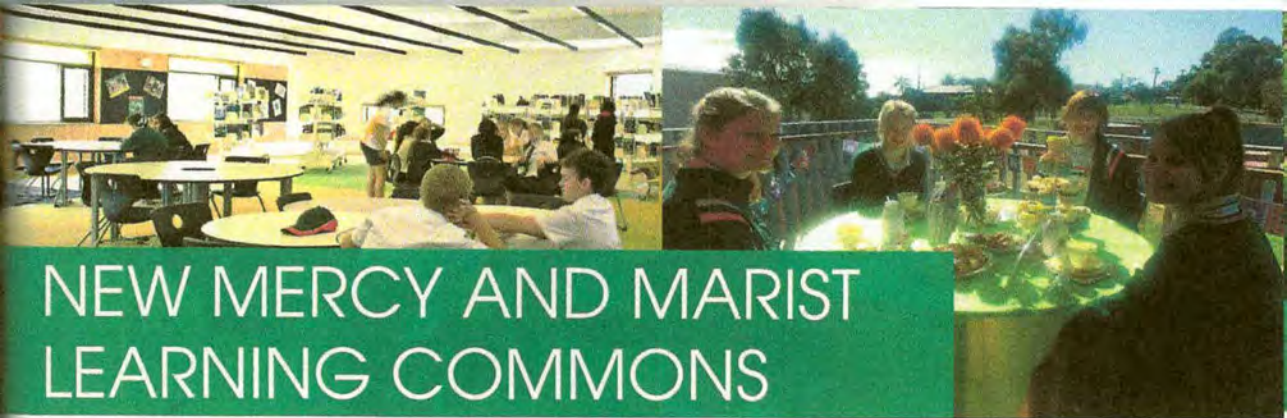
## ART CAMP

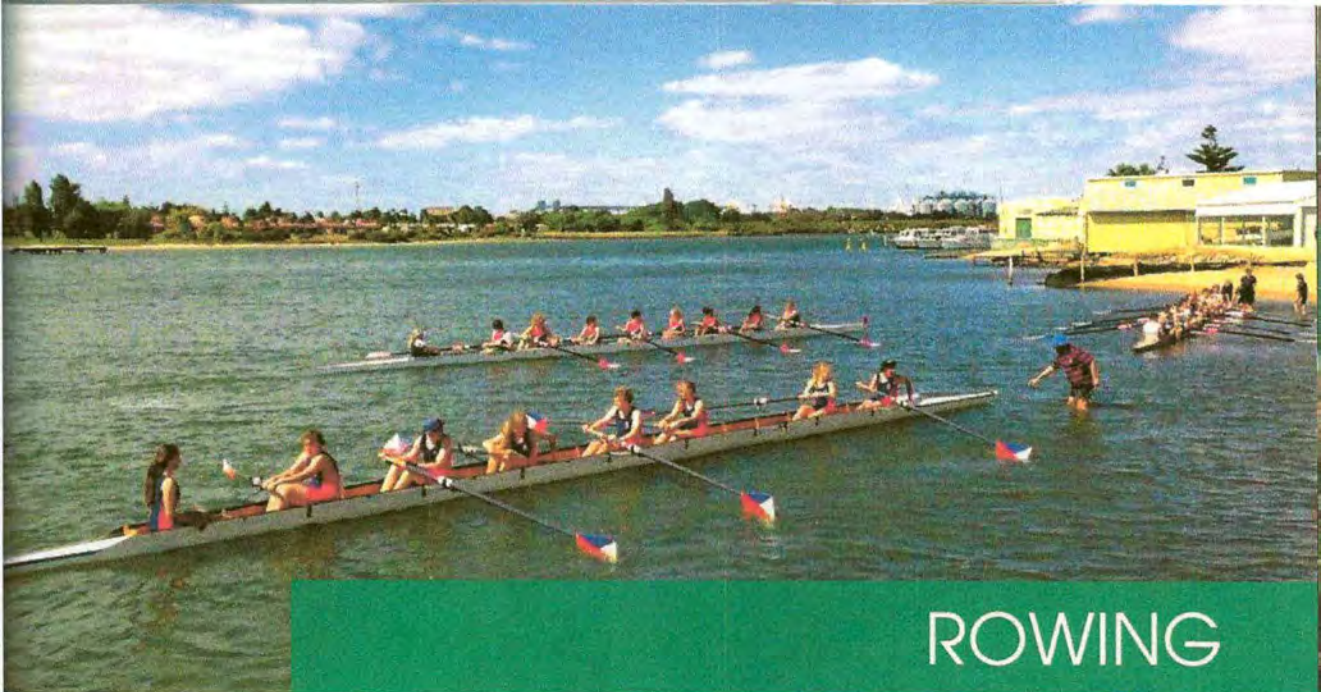
### NETBALL- WINTER CARNIVAL

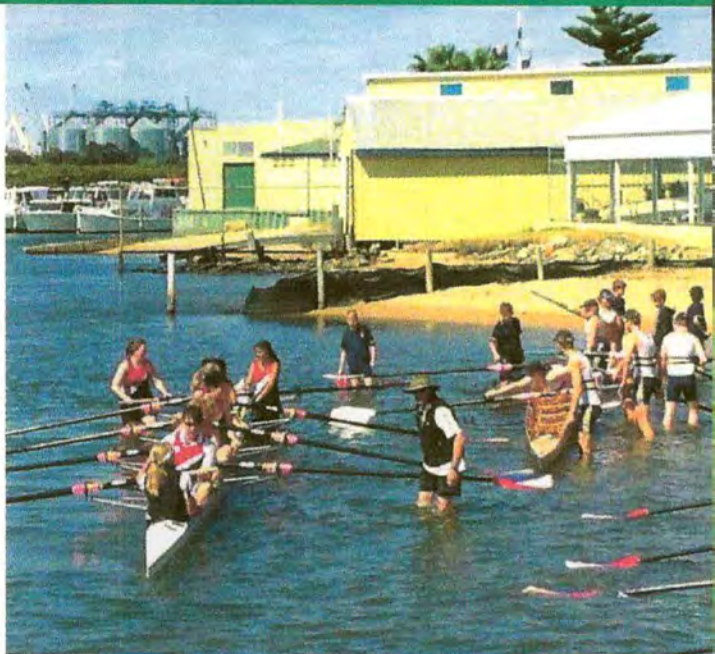
# ROWING

Finally, I would like to thank you all for your support and your willingness to be guided by those around you, it has been an awesome journey!

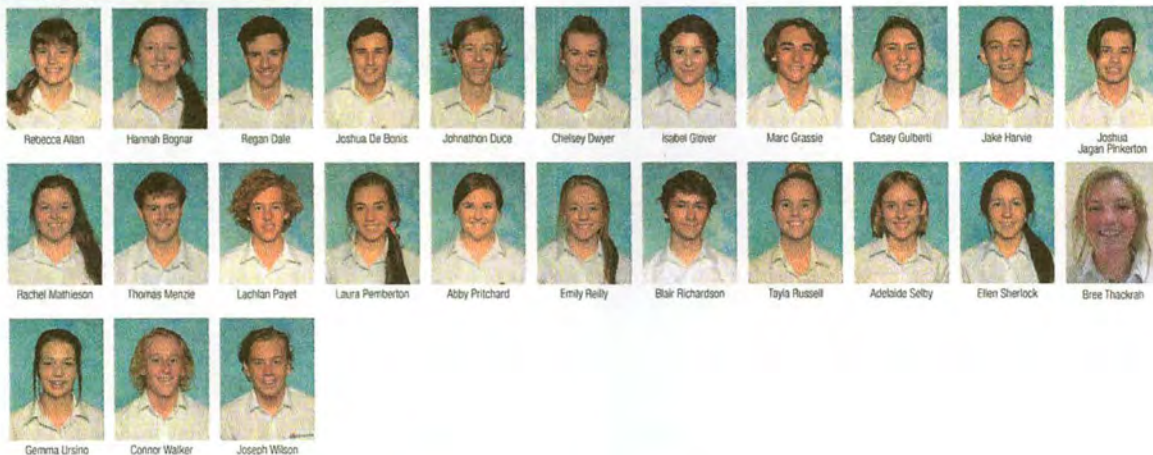
